PI DELTA EPSILON REPORTS

Pi Delta Epsilon reported on the Commencement Issue of the Dickinsonian to the Student Senate yesterday. The committee, chairmanned by Alan Smith, included Russel Adams, Dr. Bowden, Ann Lemkau, and Janet Parkins. The following is a synopsis of that statement.

Pi Delta Epsilon established a code to "set the standards and preserve the dignity within campus publications." The code's seven principles are: (1) intellectual honesty, (2) freedom of thought tempered by responsibility, (3) literary leaders are accountable to the college community, (4) the college is an entity greater than the publications, (5) accuracy, (6) good taste, (7) consider the reader.

The statement then discussed each controversial article in the issue in the light of the aforementioned code and made the following recommendations. "The committee of Pi Delta Epsilon considers unfair the criticism brought against the Editor of the Dickinsonian.....In view of these facts we recommend that the editor receive continued support in his editorial capacity and that the Dickinsonian be allowed to follow its present editorial policy."

The daily senator is of the opinion that this matter is of such significance to the campus as to warrant the printing of additional copies of the report.

These copies should be placed at a centrally located place so that each student has the opportunity to examine one for himself.

STUDENT SENATE

Yesterday in the Student Senate a letter of resignation from Treasurer Jack Gardner was read. Mr. Gardner admitted to doing a job which was far from dedicated and took the blame upon himself. At the same time, Ass't. Treas., Jack Ross, resigned. Mr. Ross resigned because he felt that "the job of Ass't. Treas. has become more important than the job of Treasurer."

At this time a motion was passed to give President Tom DeMarino power to appoint a successor to Mr. Gardner. Mr. Ross was appointed with the tacit felicitations of the Senate.

EDUCATION BY TELEVISION

"Teaching by television which has both its evangelists and skeptics, will get its first nation-wide test this school year in a college physics course on a coast-to-coast network program. The program, originating in New York City, will be offered for full credit by approximately 300 colleges this semester. Its sponsors predict that another 300 colleges may add it to their catalogues next term...

There is general agreement that television instruction will serve to equalize educational opportunity. It will improve the course offerings of many small colleges and will make college courses available for a vast adult education program.

There is less agreement on whether courses like languages and public speaking, which require practice, can be effectively taught by television, or whether television teaching can surmount the problems of an individual's own peculiar problems and blocks in learning.".....New York Times of September 21, 1958.

Most of the students and faculty members of our campus will have their first opportunity to hear the National Symphony of Washington, D.C. on Thursday of this week. This will be the first in the student-sponsored cultural events series of the 1958-59 season, and certainly promises to be one of the finest. If past experience is any indication of popularity, then the following quote from the Shreveport Times is conclusive evidence, "The Centenary College student body went madly wild over the National Symphony and gave it a demonstration such as no other event of the campus lyceum series has enjoyed this season."





In the punting department Dickinson averaged 35 yards. The majority of the punting was done by end, Barry Dasher. Total scores for the season were as follows: opponents, 146 points; Dickinson, 117 points.
