My dear Lawrence.

Since your letter of the 2<sup>d</sup> inst. was received I have been engaged in hunting up the birds you wished and shall send the first installment tomorrow or next day. The remainder will be forwarded before long. They consist principally of hawks and owls that Mr. Ridgway has not, at present, time to select. There are also a number of North American species that straggle into Mexico for the winter. Some of these we have kept to be used in reviewing the subject of our United States fauna, but I will send you the list and you can then see whether you wish hereafter to use the specimens themselves.

I have had proof sheets of the revision of *Crocidea* from Slaten and consider it a very valuable paper. I will send it on to you whenever you shall wish it.

I noted the enclosed slip and was very glad to

learn what <sup>the</sup> fish really was. In return for  
the favor thus done to me I will refer you to the  
article in the last "Spirit of the Times" by Genl.  
C. Scott, in which he gives an account of his interview  
with Professor Lawrence of Columbia College and
