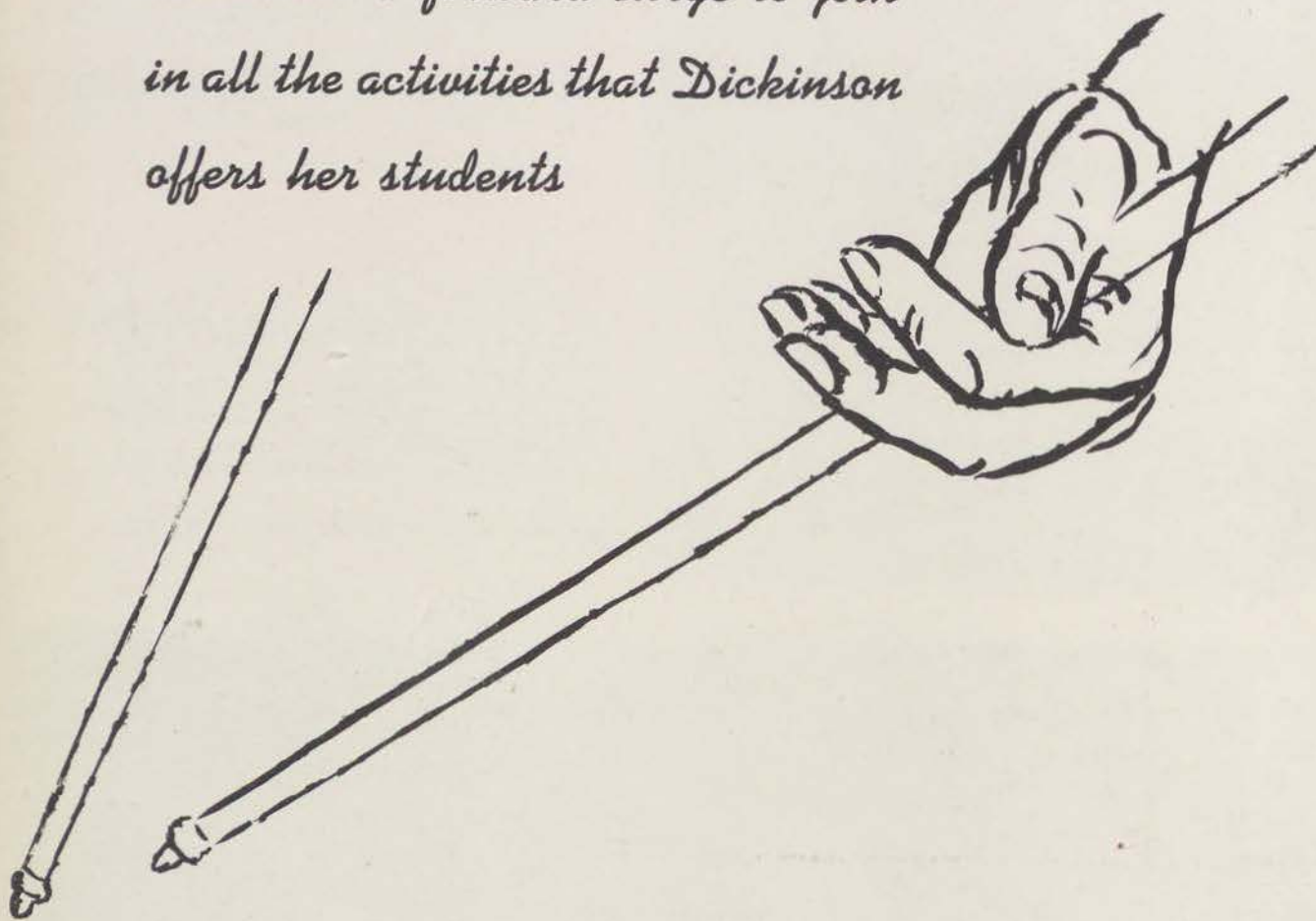

The person who makes the initial reception into the Dickinson circle for each new Dickinsonian is his student counselor. The responsibilities of the student counselor commence with the freshmen orientation program. However, the task of the counselor is more than just the handling of the formal orientation program. His advice to the counselee and his behavior toward him set the tone for the overall orientation which any incoming student must make in making the transition into the college environment. The student counselor knows no limits to his responsibility to the freshmen. He has been delegated to assist him with any and all problems, whether they be academic or social. 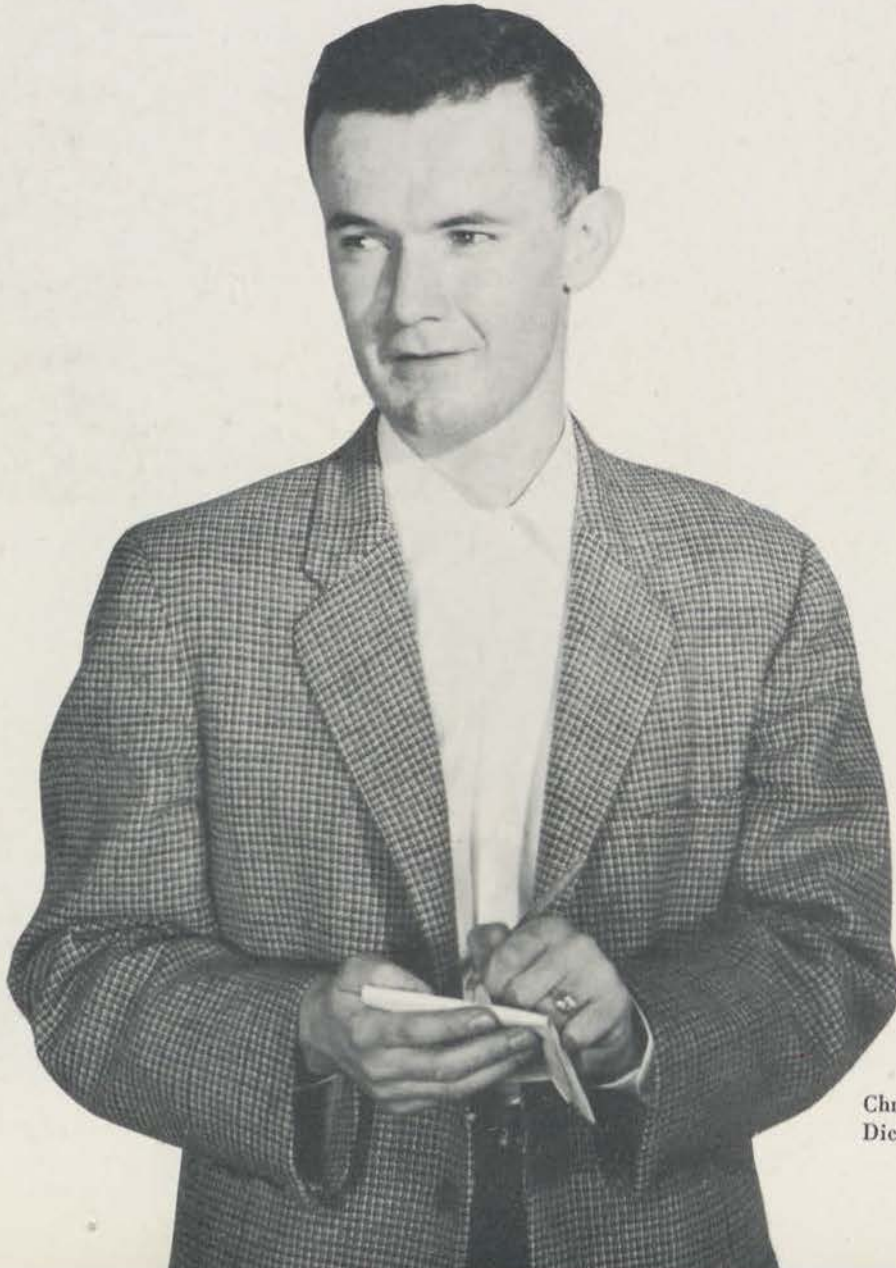

Men's Glee Club

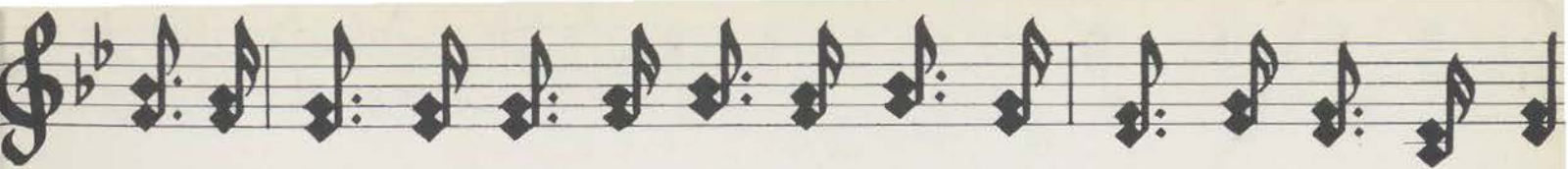
"Frates In Unum" keynoted the musical theme of the Men's Glee Club this year as they proudly carried the name "Noble Dickinsonia" far and wide over the state.

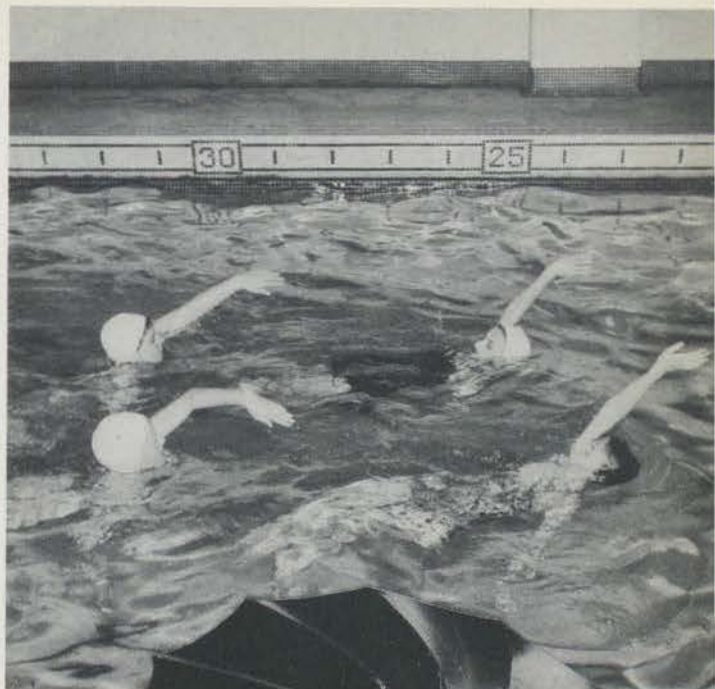

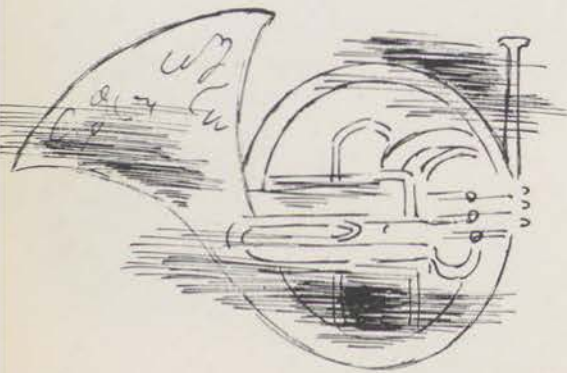

College Band

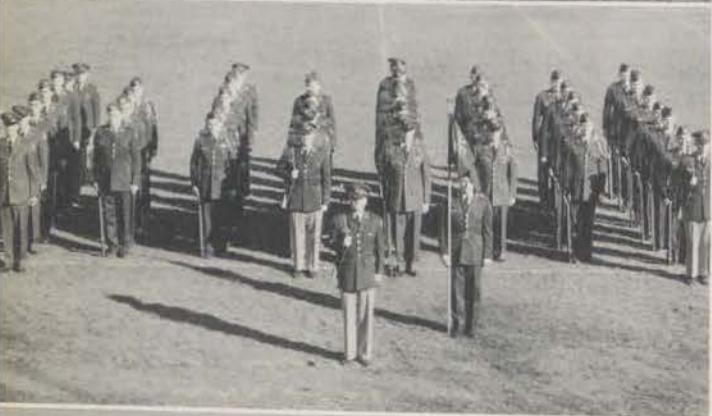

Never in the history of our nation has there been a greater or more continuing need for military leaders who are adequately trained and ready for a possible emergency. The purpose of the Dickinson College Reserve Officers' Training Corps is to prepare college students to serve as future officers.

Since its beginning in 1952 the ROTC has become one of the largest departments at Dickinson College. The program presented to the ROTC student is varied and in keeping with the liberal arts curriculum. It also enables the student to choose the branch of service most closely associated with his college work. Some of the subjects included in the basic and advanced course programs are military history, weapons, drill, map reading, tactics, leadership, operations, personnel management and world affairs.

The military department consists of a training staff of eight regular army personnel under the supervision of Lt. Col. George W. Eason. The Cadet Corps of 282 students is under the command of Cadet Col. Kenneth R. Short. The Cadet Regiment is composed of two battalions of two companies each, a color guard, and the drum and bugle corps, all commanded by cadet commissioned and non-commissioned officers.

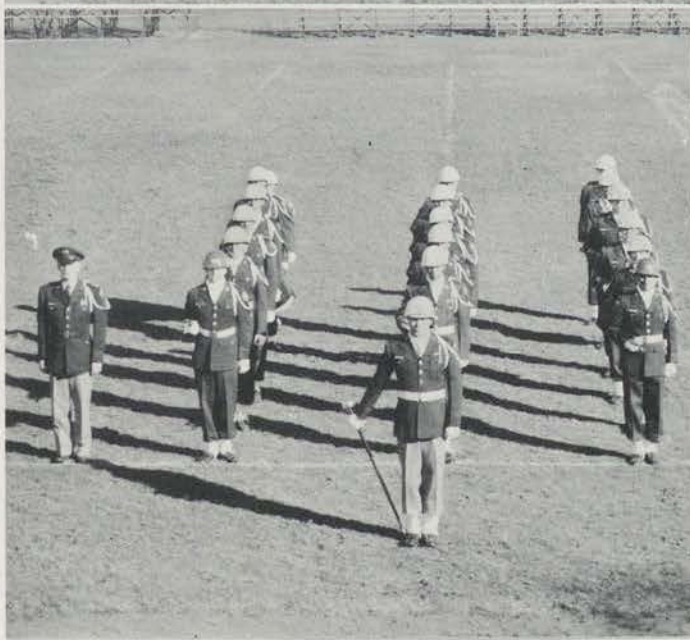

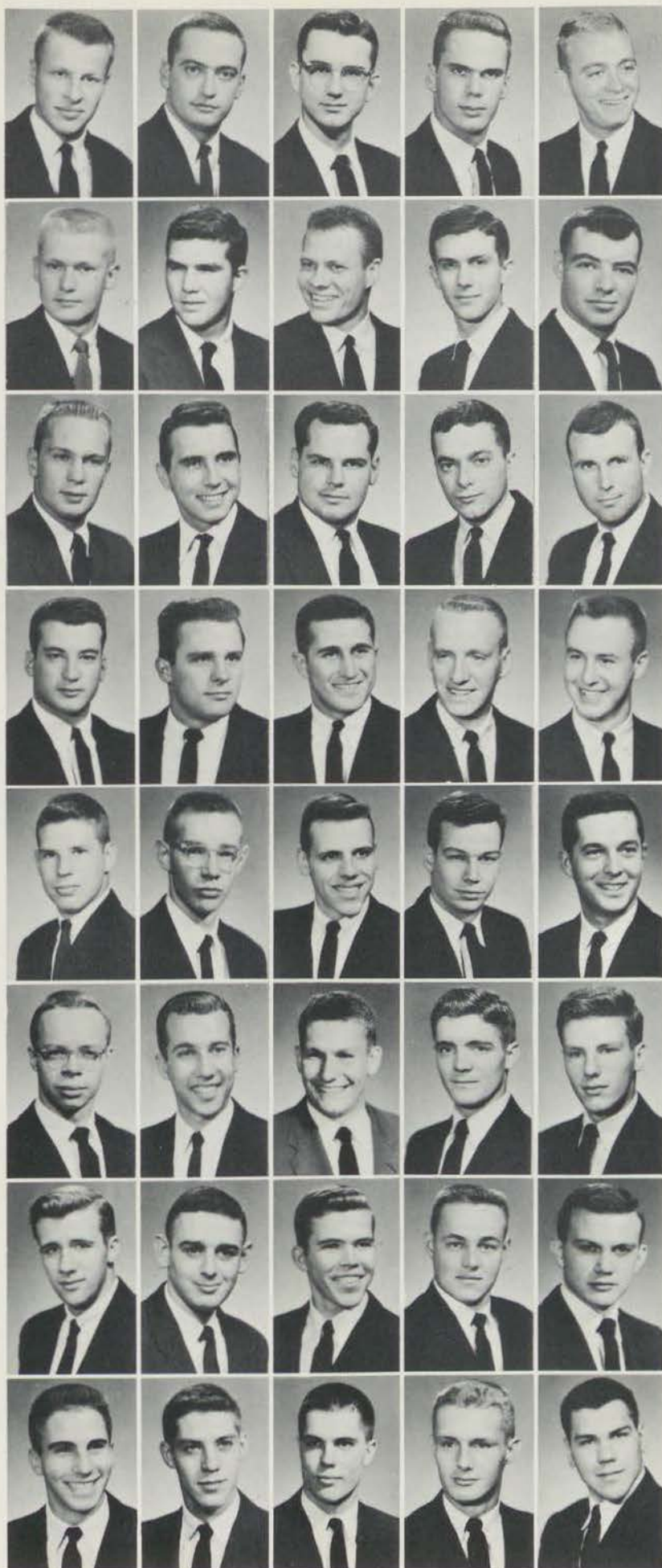


Phi Kappa Psi

Sigma Chi

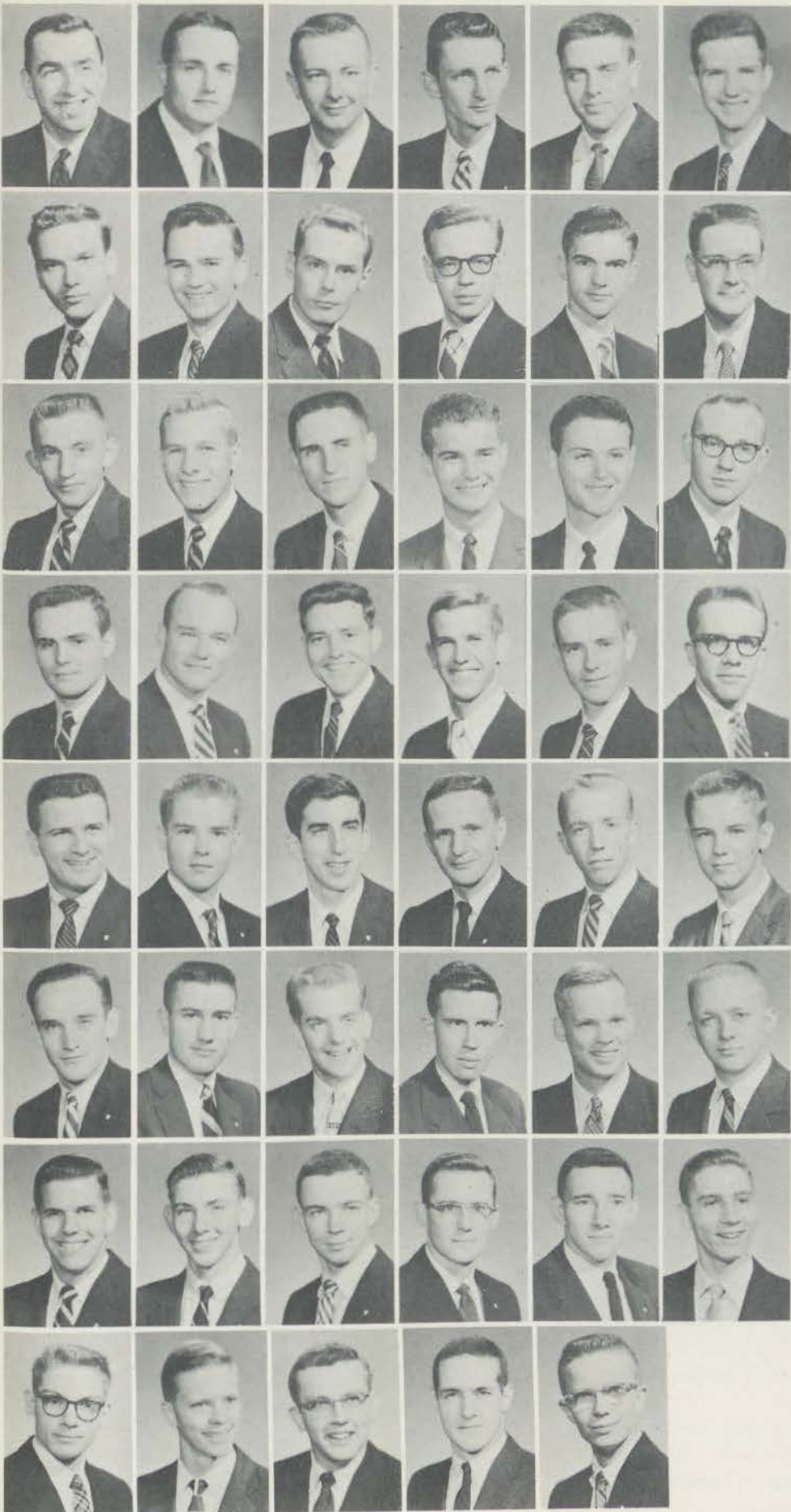

Beta Theta Pi was founded at Miami College, Oxford, Ohio, during the year 1839. It has the distinction of being the first fraternity founded west of the Alleghenies. The Alpha Sigma Chapter at Dickinson received its start in 1874.

Sigma Alpha Epsilon

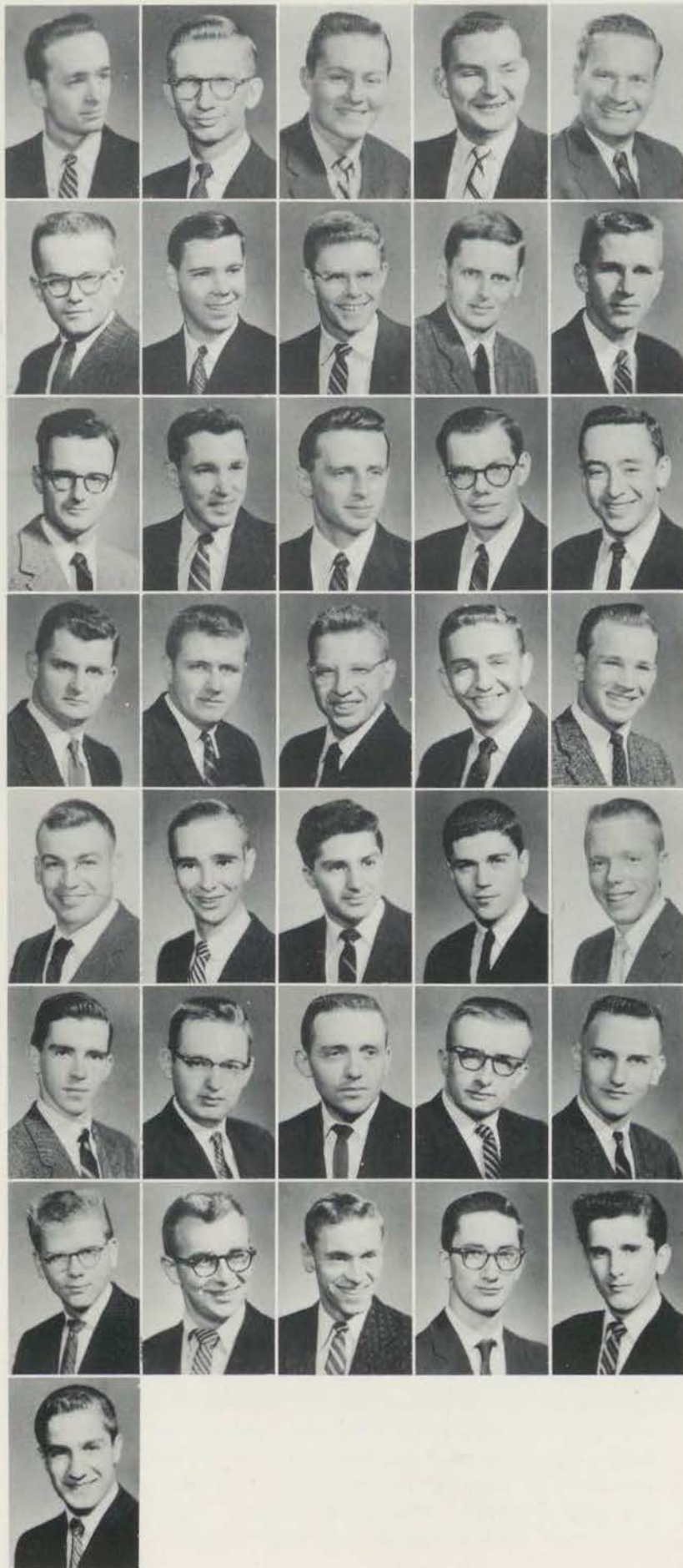

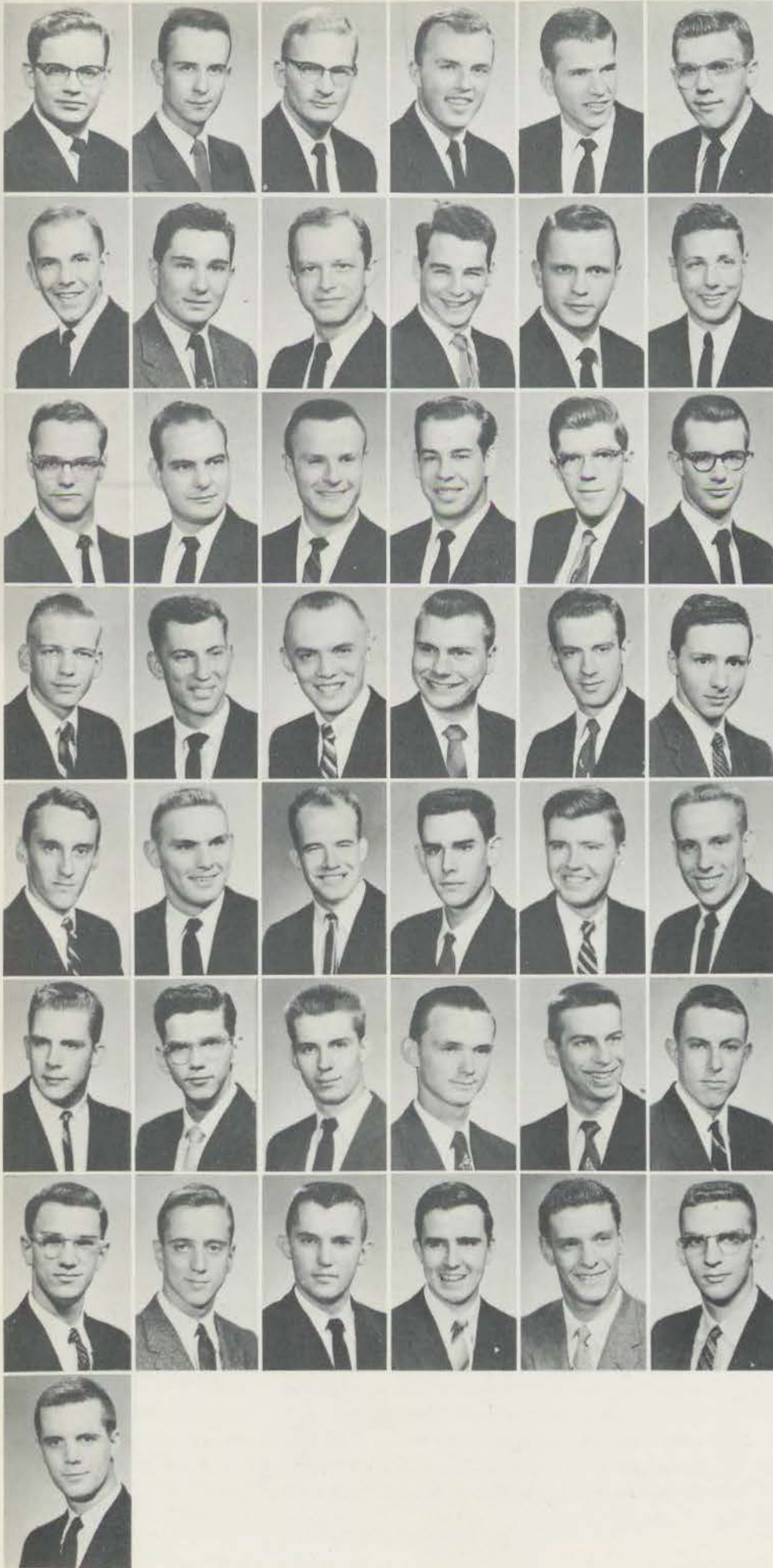

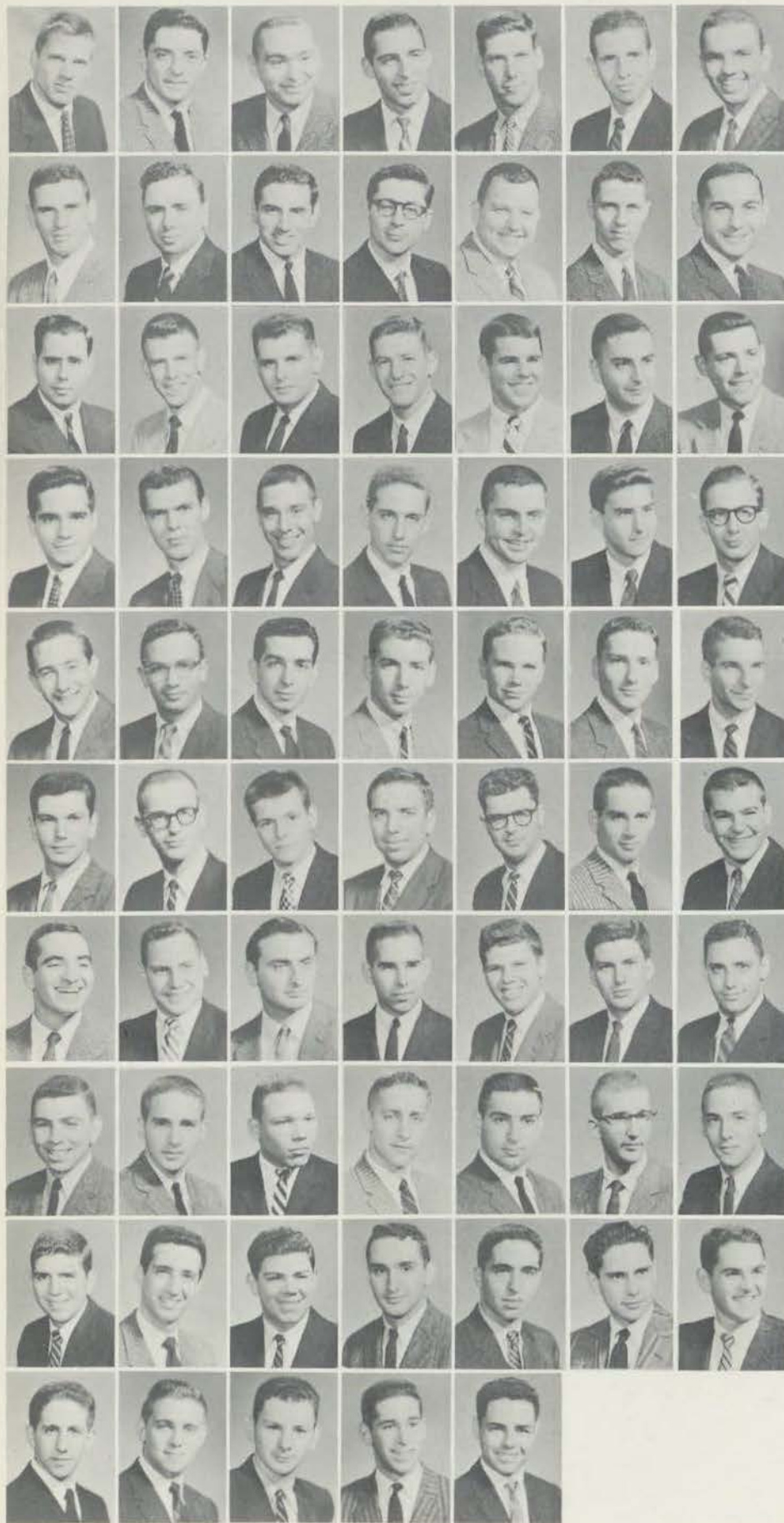


Phi Epsilon Pi

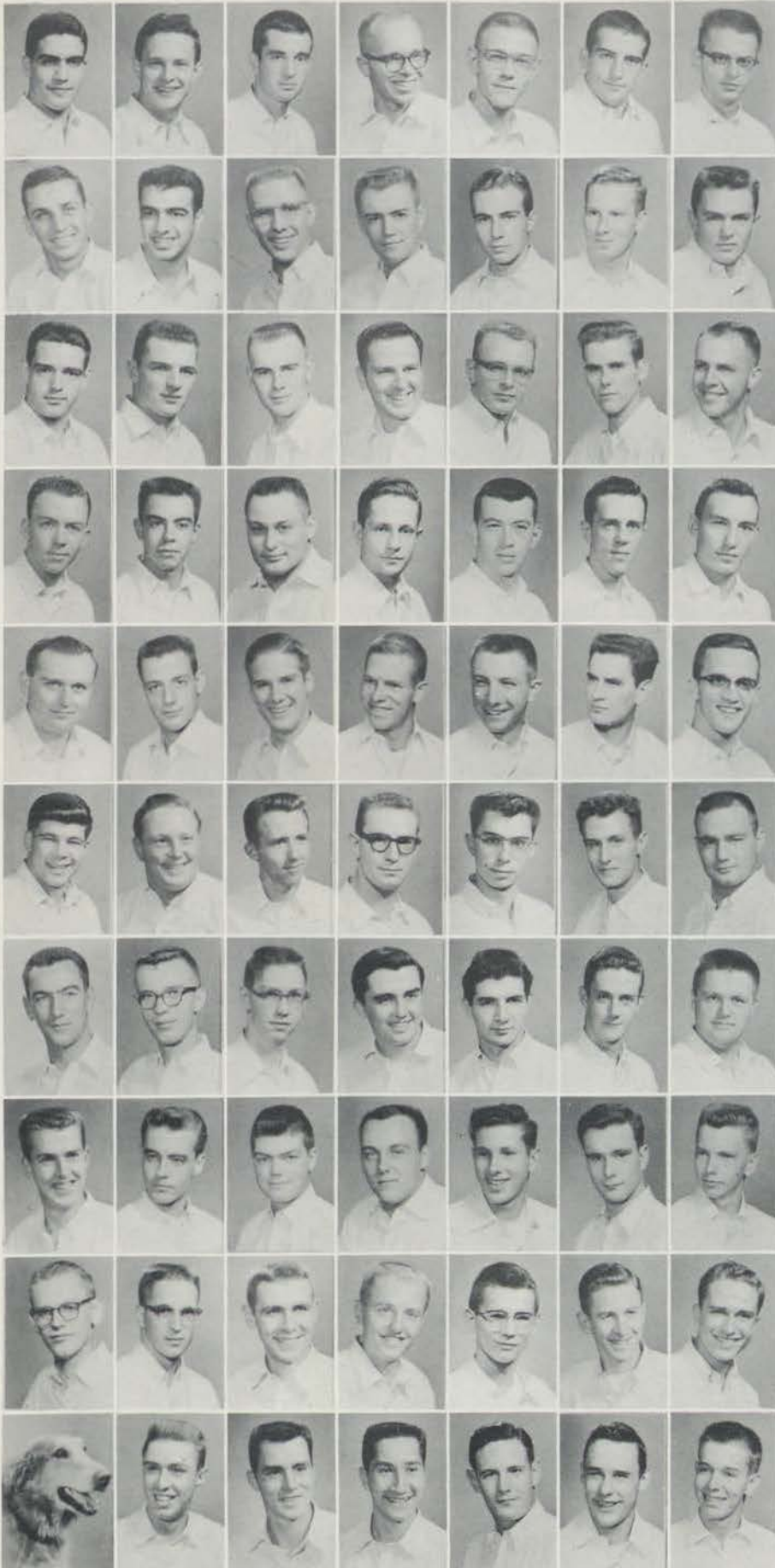
The men of Theta Chi strive for mutual understanding among all and for the "promotion of knowledge, the advancement of culture, and the building of character."

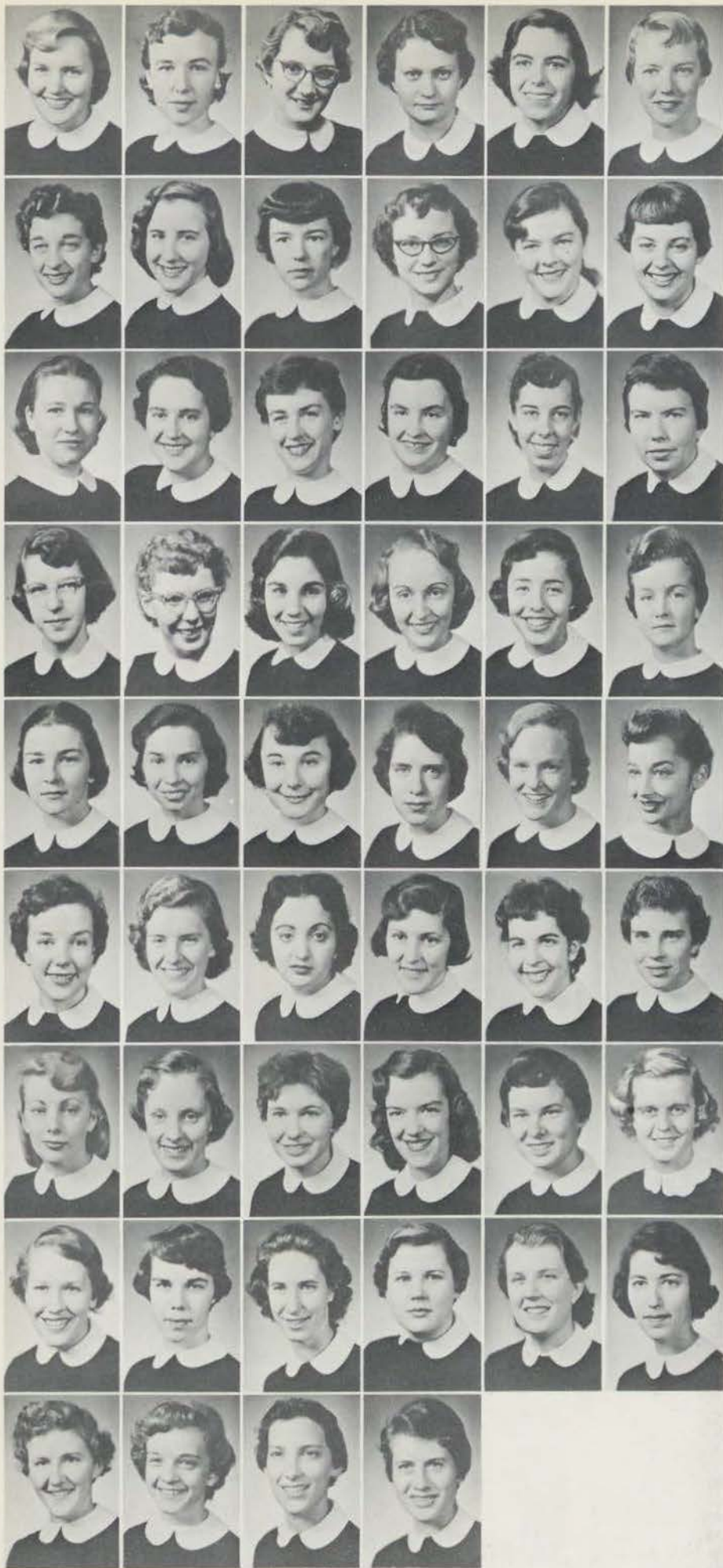

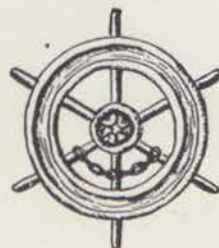

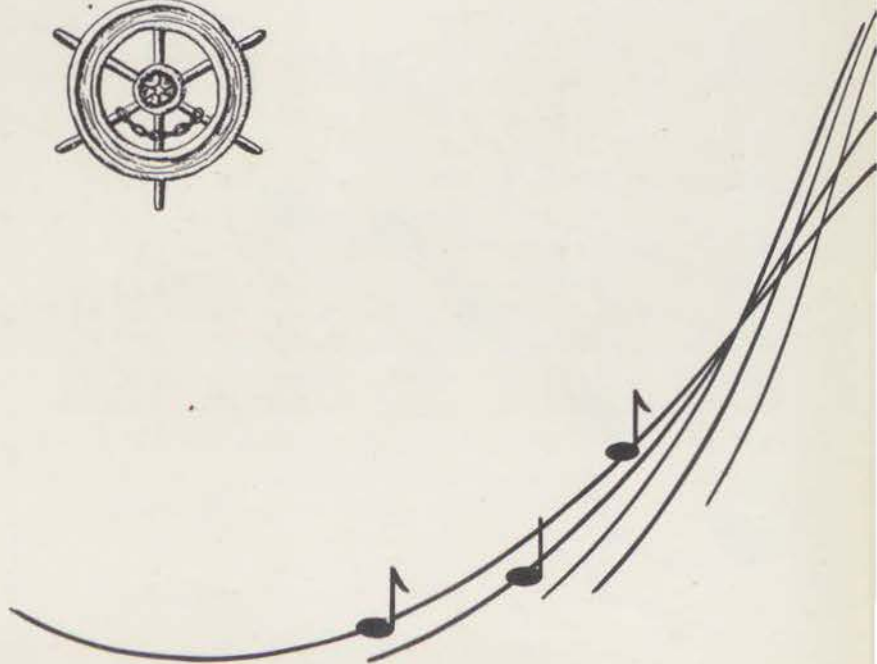

Football





With a new offensive attack, a greater depth of reserve strength, and twelve returning lettermen, prospects for the 1956 football season loomed bright. There were such veterans as Graham, Myers, Woodside, Shanaman, and Rose to launch Coach Piez's single-wing attack; there were two backfields of nearly equal ability to harass the opposition; there was high morale and a will-to-win.

In a tightly played opener against Western Maryland, the Red Devils stole the show during the second half but dropped a disappointing 12-6 verdict. The running drive of Sonny Rose at fullback and the bubbling team spirit, however, seemed to be omens of a fine season.

Off the toe of Bob Cook came a 20-yard field goal to give the Devils a 3-0 win over Wagner College in the season's first home game. After a halftime scoreless tie, the Dickinson line, featuring Cook and Bair, and the improved backfield led by Berger, Rose, and Kienzle, punched holes in the Staten Islanders' defense, laying the stage for the winning conversion.

The following Saturday, Parents Day, brought a wet field and a Franklin and Marshall squad averaging 15 pounds more per man than the Dickinson lineup. Although team spirit never lagged, Coach Piez's boys could not utilize several yardage windfalls that came their way and the more massive Diplomat eleven triumphed, 15-0.

Journeying to Pittsburgh's Forbes Field to meet Carnegie Tech, the Red Devils failed to advance beyond their opponent's 30-yard marker as they lost 31-0. Missing from the lineup with injuries were Stafford and Rose. Dickinson experimented with a split-T and managed to shake loose Chick Berger for a 20-yard gain.

Against Juniata, best Pennsylvania small college team of last year, the Red Devils, despite the fine play of Frank Campanelli, fell to the count of 44-13. Two of Woodruff's fourth-quarter passes, one to Shanaman, the other to Campanelli, accounted for Dickinson's scoring.

It was Dickinson all-the-way against Swarthmore, in spite of the 7-6 score indication. Woodruff's passing was

deadly; Shanaman's running was hard and elusive; Graham, Woodside, and Myers' line play was stubborn and aggressive. Again Cook's conversion was the deciding factor.

A rain-soaked Homecoming game with Lycoming College's Warriors saw one of the finest Red Devil performances of the season. Lycoming scored on two breaks, a blocked kick and an intercepted pass, and although outplayed constantly by a game Dickinson squad, copped a 13-0 victory.

At Baltimore, it was a powerful Johns Hopkins offense that plowed through the Devil line at will to post a 40-0 win.

Six seniors played their last game in the season's finale against Allegheny College—Rich Graham, Bob Woodside, Frank Campanelli, Bob Myers, Bill Matthews, and Chuck Ferrone. Although Campanelli tallied once and Shanaman twice, first on a fifty-yard gallop set up by a trick play and again on a pass from Woodruff, Allegheny's "Pancho" Villa racked up four T-D's as his team notched a 24-19 win.

The Freshman team, under Coaches Joe DuCharme and Vic Bihl, posted wins over Franklin and Marshall and Western Maryland, while losing to Mercersburg Academy, Johns Hopkins, and Kiski Prep. The abundant ability and spirit displayed by the team gives promise of a big boost to next year's varsity.

With a nucleus of four lettermen from the previous year's squad, Coach Joe Ducharme's cagers opened the season with an impressive victory over an aggressive Susquehanna team as high-scoring Ray Weaver, Ralph Chase, and Jack Wiley led the attack for D-Son. Although the Red Devils managed to emerge victorious in only two ball games, their record is not a true picture of the team's calibre. The competition was above average with even the weaker teams playing outstanding ball against our squad. Lack of height and experience proved to be too much of an obstacle for the team to overcome.

Against Wilkes College, Dickinson was unable to cope with an excellent fast break and lost, 82-43. After leading Johns Hopkins for three quarters, the D-Son attack faltered and Hopkins copped a 77-66 decision. Tiring in the late minutes of the game the local five dropped a well played game to Elizabethtown, 86-74. Weaver, Chase, Wiley, and Glick all played fine games. Gettysburg had too much height for the team and overpowered the Red Devils.

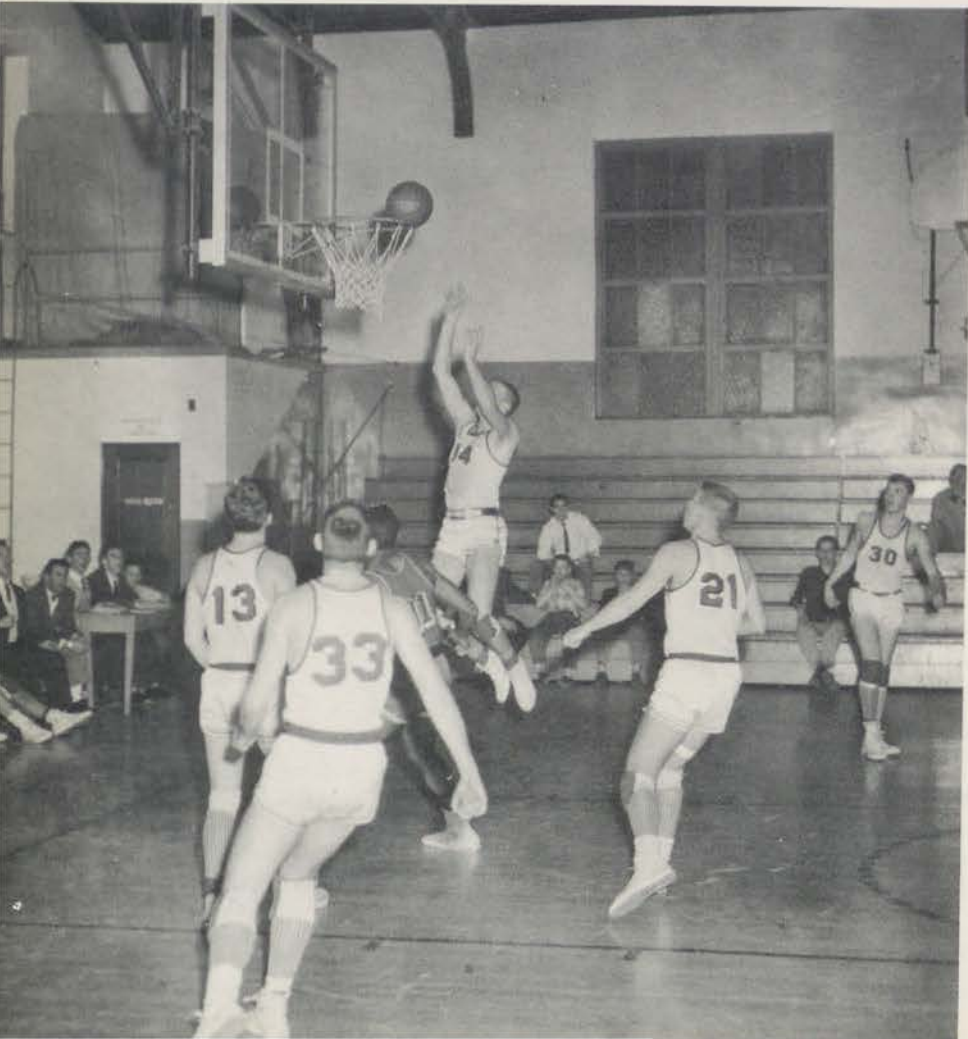
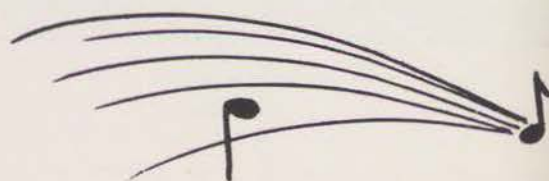
The D-Son five, rusty from its long Christmas lay-off, led the first half against Franklin and Marshall, but then faltered and dropped a 98-76 decision. Stromberg, Chase, and Weaver played well against Susquehanna on the Selinsgrove court, but the accurate shooting of Frank Romano was too much for the Devils. Lebanon Valley and Juniata edged D-Son in close games on the home court. The victory in both games could have gone to either team, and the outcome was in doubt until the final buzzer.

Although Glick, Weaver, Chase, Stromberg, and Shafer kept the D-Son cagers in the game until the last seconds against Albright, the Redmen lost a heartbreaker, 81-79. Capitalizing on mistakes, Lycoming defeated our boys, 87-70, on the Williamsport court. Moravian and Lehigh had little trouble defeating the squad with their superior height, speed, and experience. Traveling to Lebanon Valley the team dropped a close game, 73-66. Juniata, with four men in the double-figures, defeated D-Son, 112-96, in the highest scoring game of the season. In the Lancaster Armory, Franklin and Marshall rolled to a 92-76 victory.



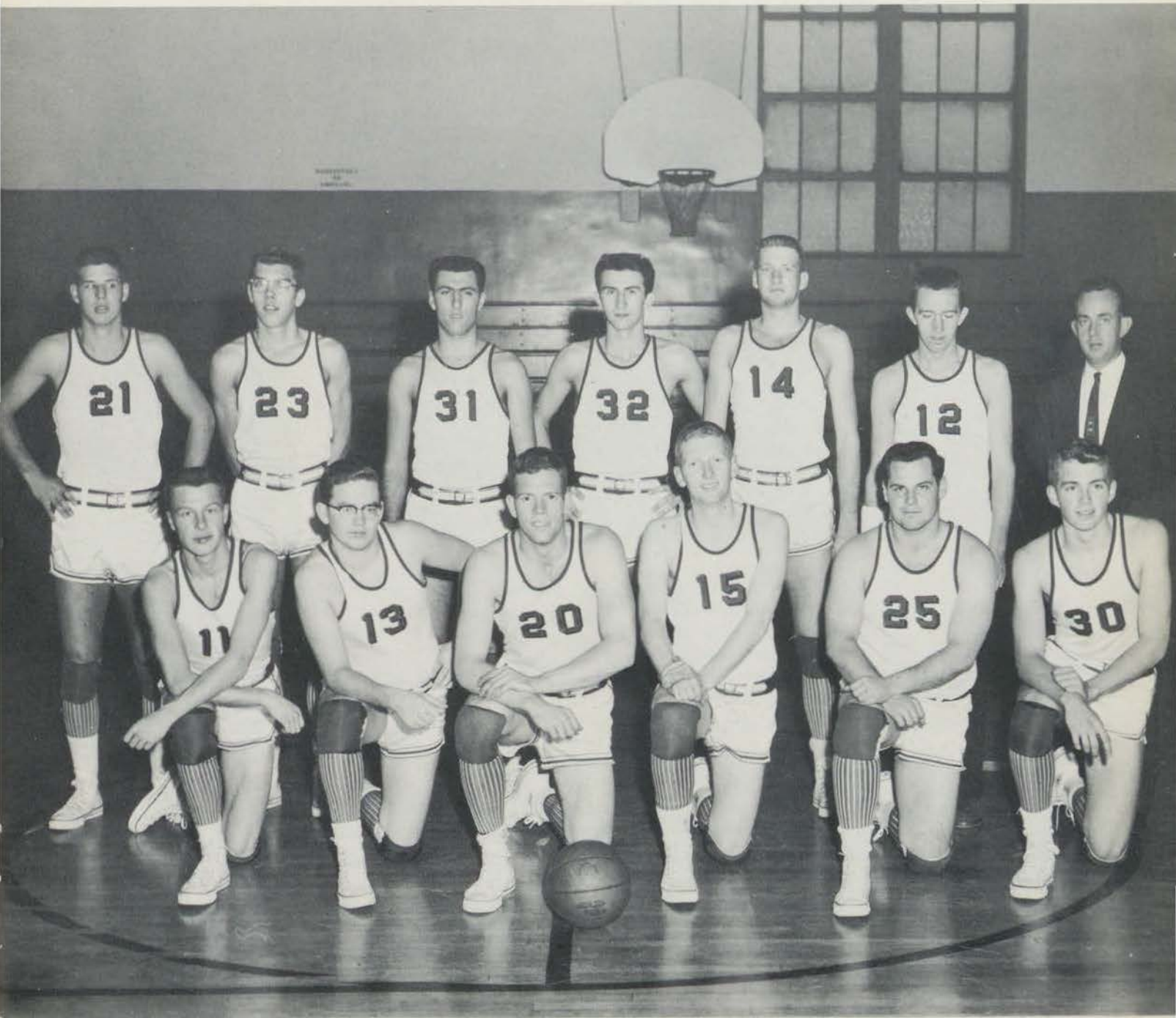
Back in Alumni Gymnasium, Elizabethtown had to pull out all the stops to defeat the local five. A good first half against Gettysburg allowed D-Son to stay close for three quarters with the opponents finally pulling away and winning, 89-74. Tied 64-64 at the end of the regular game with Wilkes, Dickinson lost in overtime to the highly favored team from Wilkes-Barre. Although deprived of the play of the injured Weaver, the Devils closed the season with an upset victory over Lycoming, 63-57, as Valenti, Chase, Stromberg, and Glick played outstanding ball games. Weaver, missing the game, lost his chance to break the school scoring record and finished the season with 338, a mere one point shy of the mark.

Several good breaks could have changed the whole record this year, as the team was not lacking in ability. Coach DuCharme is counting on lettermen Chase, Weaver, Valenti, Wiley, Shafer, and Shapley to couple with promising freshmen ball-players to return D-Son to the winning ways next year. The solid play of Glick, Stromberg, and Tafel will have to be replaced, but Dickinson is in the rebuilding stages and the basketball picture looks bright for the future.



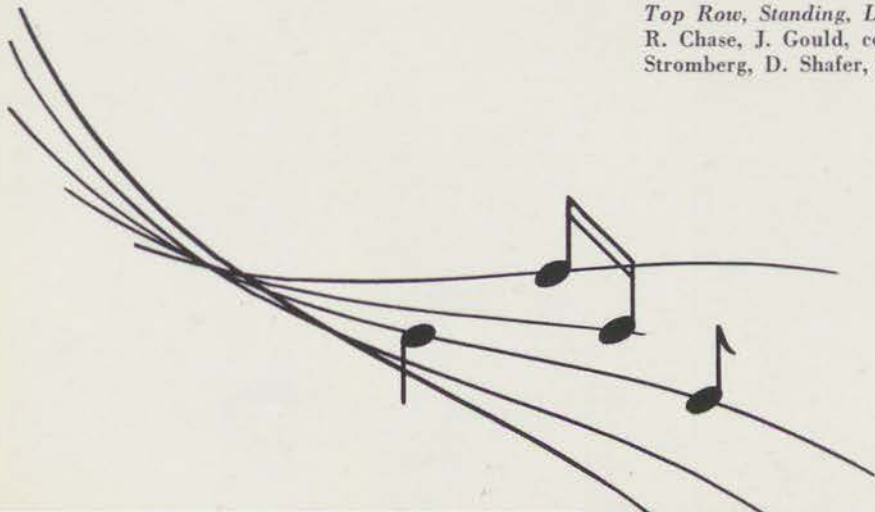

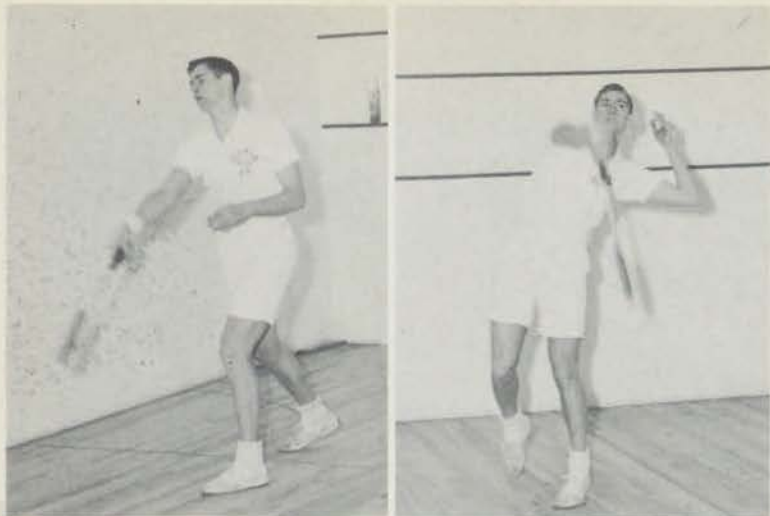
Coach Eavenson's rugged practices, along with an undying team spirit, resulted in the breaking of several school and pool records. The veteran point gatherers, Coston,

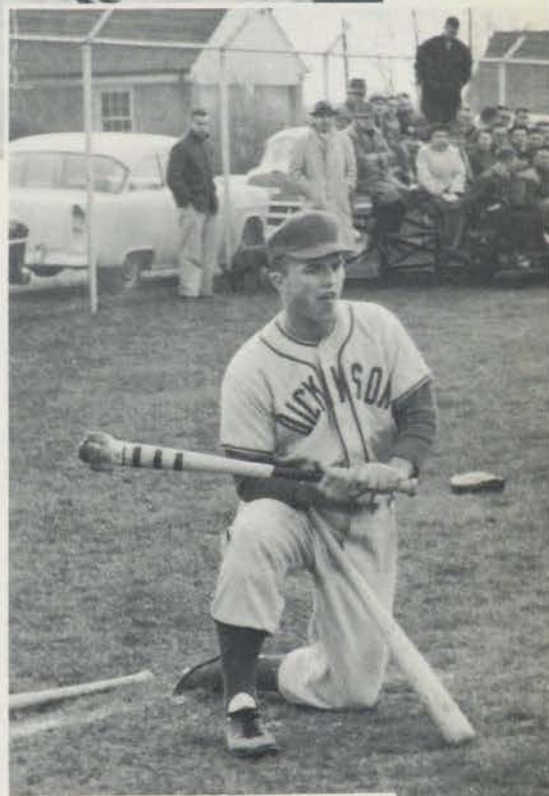

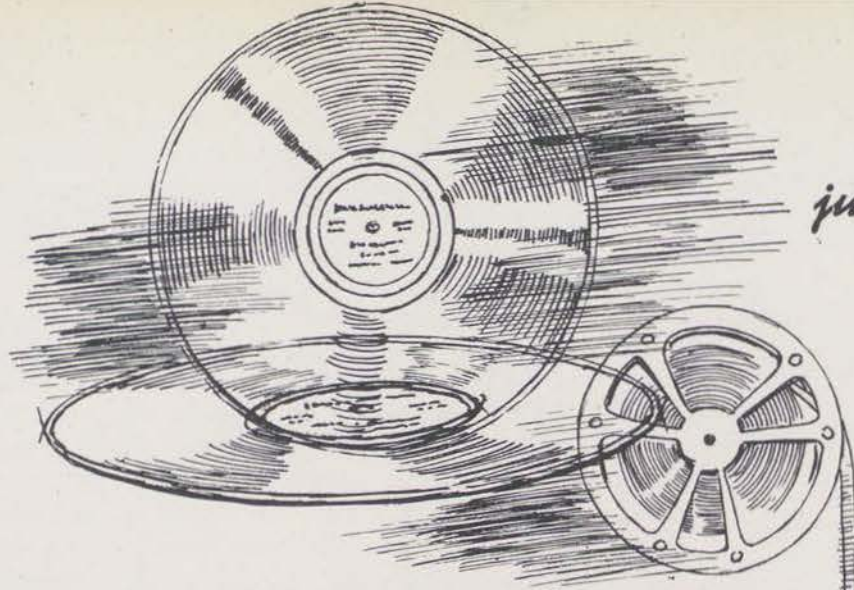
