Dickinson College is both traditionally old and excitingly new.


The college is proud of its 18th century founding for as such it is one of America's oldest small liberal arts colleges.






It is to one of Dickinson's "richest" men that the student body of nineteen hundred and sixtytwo dedicates its **Microcosm**.


COLLEGE

> these college guests on our campus is well worth the hard work of the student and faculty members involved.



THE JOSEPH PRIESTLEY AWARD

THE JOSEPH PRIESTLEY CELEBRATION

Each year in the Spring, a special commemoration is held known as the Joseph Priestley Celebration, at which time the Dickinson College Award in memory of Joseph Priestley, the discoverer of oxygen, is given to a distinguished scientist for his discoveries or contributions to the welfare of mankind. The award is in the form of the Priestley Medallion, a ceramic medallion struck from the original molds made in 1779 by the first Josiah Wedgwood after a pen sketch of Priestley drawn from life by John Flaxman in the same year.

This year the award was presented to Robert Burns Woodward for his work in the synthesis of chlorophyll. Dr. Woodward, a native of Boston, was educated at the Massachusettes Institute of Technology where he received his doctorate in 1937. Since then he has been associated with Harvard University. Dr. Woodward has received many honorary degrees from universities throughout the United States, Canada and England. Dickinson College is proud indeed to recognize one of the outstanding scientists of our day.






Alpha Chi Rho


Sigma Alpha Epsilon







Council and Rushing



The Women's Athletic Association Council coordinates women's intramural sports and supervises a point system whereby classes and individuals may earn awards presented each spring at the WAA Banquet.





FOOTBALL 1961



For the first time since 1949, Dickinson enjoyed winning football. This was truly the most exciting and hardhitting football team that the school has seen in years. It was a team blessed with unusual talent. Although lacking depth up front, the fierce line play of such stalwarts as Field, Wagner, Lipinski, Morrissey, Smith, Packard, Shoff, Jacks, Creps, and Zuyus was consistent and inspired. It would be difficult to find another Red Devil backfield that could compare with this years. Harlowe, Thomas, DiOrio, and Shaver were among the finest breakaway runners in the MAC. Walt Buckley's pinpoint passing made him invaluable when the going got rough. Lou Verdelli, the unsung hero at fullback, ran and blocked with authority. This spirited squad was a rewarding tribute to the long-awaited efforts of the patient coaching of Don Seibert and Web Gobrecht, who were ably assisted by Thomas DeMarino and William Smith.


In their opening game against an aggressive Swarthmore team, the Red Devils jumped into a 6-0 lead. But the Maroon gridders with Lillie's pinpoint passing and three Devil fumbles won 23-18. The D-son offense looked great in a losing effort, as Thomas, Packard, and Harlowe shared scoring honors.

The following week the Devils traveled to Haverford. In her first "must game" D-son romped to a 26-6 victory. The offense was led by DiOrio who scored twice, Lipinski, and Harper. The line played magnificently. D-son's new offensive weapon, the field goal, was very successful. John "the toe" Harper kicked two long ones for 6 points.


In another "must game" against Franklin and Marshall, the inspired Devils washed out a 36-year jinx with a 25-0 victory. This was the most exciting game of the year. DiOrio continued his stellar ball playing as he moved the team to a TD on the opening kickoff, scoring himself from the 9 yard line. In the second quarter Shaver took a Diplomat punt on his own 20 and raced 80 yards for the scorb. Halfback Thomas went 57 yards for the third score. In the fourth quarter Buckley threw to Warden for the final 6 points.

The Devils next faced Wagner, one of the top small college teams in the East, and played one of their finest games but lost 18-13. They weren't outplayed, just outmanned! Strong points were the outstanding play of the line led by Bill Smith, the unveiling of the new "shotgun" offense, and the powerful running of Thomas and DiOrio.



Another soggy day at Wilkes but a 7-6 score gave the Devils their third win. The defensive line was outstanding. Alert signal calling by DiOrio on a 20 yard pass to Lipinski resulted in the TD. Harper kicked the winning point.

Against Hopkins the sputtering Devil attack exploded to a 20-8 victory. Harlowe ran well all afternoon scoring once. Probably the most outstanding Devil play of the year came on a 52 yard "wrinkle go" pass from Buckley to Thomas, early in the fourth quarter. The third score came on a 1 yard plunge by DiOrio.

In the final game of the year the Red Devils soundly defeated Drexel 28-8 for their fifth victory and the winning season. The Devil defense led by Wagner and Lipinski was very tough. DiOrio scored three times, once on a spectacular 57 yard run. This was the final game for seven outstanding seniors: co-captains Wagner and Field, Thomas, Harlowe, Howell, Lipinski, and Morrissey.

The Dickinson cross country team continued its winning ways by compiling a 4-3 record for the fifth consecutive winning season.








Tennis

This year all 5 men returned, and freshmen Mickey Shapiro and Larry Rand are expected to add depth to the squad. Another fine season is highly probable.




Baseball







Dear Dickinsonians,

The Dickinson College we now leave is not the one that greeted us four years ago. Since our arrival we have seen three presidents, two deans of women, two academic deans, and even a winning football team. The class has been a member of an apathetic student body and a member of a catalytic one. We have seen bad professors leave and good professors come and the opposite. We have worked against a naive, superficial administration and we have worked with a receptive, dynamic one. In short, we have seen mutability erode that hard shell of traditional tradition which circumscribed and symbolized Dickinson College.

The Class of 1962 is unique, not only for what it has witnessed, but also for what it has contributed to this transition.

Four years ago the Student Senate operated as adequately as it could under partial paralysis. Senate contributions to the college community were anaemic; Senate power and influence were pathetically feeble; and Senate activities were a campus enigma. It would have taken a rather elaborate miracle to correct all these disorders, so consequently many remain. However, by publicizing Senate proceedings and activities, sending delegates to college conferences, and sponsoring good film programs for student enjoyment, the Student Senate has made a positive contribution in eliminating the very popular and patented "individual" lethargy. This year the Communications Committee and S.R.E.C., infant and adolescent committees of Student Senate, have become strong and influential liasons between students and administrations; they have further become mutual insurance policies against misunderstanding and injustice.

When the new Editorial Board inherited **The Dickinsonian** last year, it received a rather weak and supine legacy. One year later **The Dickinsonian** emerged an empathetic media, sensitive to every phase of the college, on and off campus.

As the Class of 1962 leaves, it prescribes one course of action for the undergraduates. In the next few years, students must work with Dickinson College just as one would with a patient coming out of a general anesthetic. Exercise every fiber of every muscle of every limb to insure complete recovery in the very near future.
