THE DEFENSE OF CARLISLE—NOBLE SERVICE OF THE MILITIA.

No Pennsylvanian will fail to rejoice at the determined and resolute stand made by General SMITH and his forces, on Tuesday night last, in the defense of Carlisle and the repulse of its Rebel assailants. It is deeply gratifying to observe that our preparations for defense are so far advanced that we are no longer subjected to the humiliation of giving up our fair towns to pillage by every marauding band of LEE's army that sees fit to send in a flag with a summons to surrender. General SMITH and his forces deserve our warmest applause. This excellent service was performed by the militia, and, as we judge by the reports of the wounded, mainly by the militia of this city. The new regiments are, therefore, supporting General MEADE's army in the most valuable and effective way. They are doing the State and the country at large noble service, and every additional regiment and company that is sent to the field will be like that much added to the Army of the Potomac.

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
