# THE FRICK CASE

The case raises the issue of whether historical and biographical writing may express critical judgments. Almost every historical work deals, of necessity, with the acts and thoughts of someone's ancestors! Unless historians are to be limited to uniform and fulsome praise of all whom they mention and avoid all assessments of roles and motives other than those which are heroic, some actions and some individuals will be judged less favorably than others. In short, discriminating judgments are the stuff of history.

For the past two years Clio, the muse of history, has been more than an interested spectator in the Court of Common Pleas of Cumberland County as the case of Frick vs. Stevens has attracted nationwide attention. Of immediate interest for Dickinsonians is the fact that, until the recent hearings on exceptions to the decision began, both bench and bar involved in the case have been exclusively Dickinsonians. See the box listing of the personnel. This and the site of the trial only two short blocks from the campus might prompt brief notice in an alumni magazine. But the importance of the case to historians, biographers and all who read their books warrants more extended exposition of the facts and issues involved.

Indicative of its significance for scholars is the fact that while the case was being argued, the two leading professional organizations for historians, the American Historical Association and the Organization of American Historians, created a Joint Committee for the Defense of the Rights of Historians under the First Amendment. They also mounted a nationwide drive to raise a defense fund. Interest in the suit is warranted because it involves the rights and responsibilities of historians, the public stake in undistorted history and recourses open to an individual who believes himself or his forebears unfairly treated by an historian.

Essential facts of the case can be briefly stated. In 1964 Dr. Sylvester K. Stevens, Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission wrote, under contract with Random House, Pennsylvania: Birthplace of a Nation. At Christmas time he presented a copy of the book to Miss Helen C. Frick, daughter of Henry Clay Frick. Mr. Frick had been a prominent industrialist in western Pennsylvania, had played a leading role in the development of the region's coal and steel industries and had been the active spokesman of the Carnegie Steel Company at the time of the famous Homestead Strike in 1892. Consequently in treating Pennsylvania industrial and labor developments in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, Dr. Stevens referred to Frick at several places in connection with the development of industrial monopoly, use of immigrant labor, wage policies, opposition to unionization and philanthropy. Concerning the Homestead strike, for example, he wrote in part (p. 209):

> The power of the union was broken in the bloody and disasterous Homestead strike in 1892 by stern, brusque, autocratic Henry Clay Frick.

MISS Frick regarded this and several other references to her father as not merely uncomplimentary

but "false, scandalous, malicious and defamatory of her father." She also alleged that they had impaired her own reputation because of her association with him in the public mind and that it damaged the memory of her father. In consequence she brought suit against Dr. Stevens asking that the court enjoin him from distributing or allowing others, i.e. the publishers, to distribute the volume unless the offensive passages were deleted or suitably changed. Dr. Stevens, through his attorneys, denied that the statements were defamatory and asserted that they were true. He further argued that in the absence of malice, which he denied, the statements were privileged under the First Amendment's guarantees of freedom of speech and press and that the Fourteenth Amendment prohibited a state (through the agency of the courts in this instance) to abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States. Hearings in the case began in January 1965 and continued from time to time into the present year. Judge Weidner's decision dismissing the action against Dr. Stevens was announced May 25th. A hearing on numerous exceptions to that decision by the plaintiff occurred in late July.

Writing from an historian's perspective it is our purpose to identify briefly crucial issues raised by the case, indicate their resolution in the May decision and explore their implications for historical writing. No attempt is made to treat technical legal points; they are grist for the law reviews.

Above all the case raises the issue of whether historical and biographical writing may express critical judgments. Almost every historical work deals, of necessity, with the acts and thoughts of some one's ancestors! Unless historians are to be limited to uniform and fulsome praise of all whom they mention and avoid all assessments of roles and motives other than these which are heroic, some actions and some individuals will be judged less favorably than others. In short, discriminating judgments are the stuff of history. This suit seeks by court order to restrain expression of adverse or critical evaluations concerning Henry Clay Frick.

ESSENTIALLY what is called for is censorship of a historian's work. That censorship is demanded at the option of a private individual who, for filiopietistic reasons, believes that historical errors are contained in Pennsylvania: Birthplace of a Nation. The May decision rejects the request on several important grounds. Primacy is given to the public's right to know the background and history-the whole story, not a partial or biased account-of current public issues. The opinion defines broadly the scope of public interest in the historical origins of contemporary problems. All of the topics which Dr. Stevens was discussing when he had reference to Mr. Frick are found to be objects of legitimate public interest.

The defense contention that this particular volume was entitled to protection under constitutional guarantees of freedom of speech and the press was re-enforced by several characteristics of the book. First its topic supported the argument that this was an inquiry into the background of matters of public interest. Second, the particular

topics under discussion in the passages containing the challenged references were germane to a history of the development of the state. Third, not only had Frick participated in public discussion and expressed public positions on most of these topics but also his views had been of importance to his contemporaries. He had "injected himself into the vortex of public issues" by his words and deeds and had thereby become a logical subject of attention for the historian. It should be noted that while historical works may find shelter under the constitutional freedoms they do not qualify merely because they are historical in character. Furthermore, for many legitimate historical topics it might be extremely difficult to demonstrate a direct relevance to contemporary issues. The weight placed in this case on Frick's being a public figure is understandable, but a historian might for equally good cause attempt to deal with an individual not engaged in public controversy or a document not intended for public scrutiny such as a personal letter or diary. A better basis for invocation of freedom of speech and press with regard to historical works than has been developed in Frick vs. Stevens is desirable to insure full freedom for historical inquiry.

Freedom of speech and press confer no immunity for irresponsible statements, hence the author whose work is challenged must undertake to establish the historical truth of his writing. This any historian always must be prepared to do before the historical profession in defense of his work. In scholarly

publications he indicates the basis for his finding of fact and the extent of his reliance on the judgments of other scholars through footnotes and bibliography. This has the effect of transferring to the cited author a portion of the burden of proof. But the volume with which we are concerned carries no footnotes, and in any case proof in a court of law is a different matter. The court insisted that the truth of the statements relating to Mr. Frick be substantiated from contemporary sources even though there was no claim that Stevens in preparation of his book had worked from primary rather than secondary sources.

HE truth is traditionally a defense against libel. In this case the truth, i.e. historical validity of statements of fact and a reasonable basis for evaluative judgments, served as a defense against the charge of defamation. Dr. Stevens, in the opinion of the judge, was able to present convincing data supporting each of his statements concerning Mr. Frick. Because of the court's insistence on presentation of primary sources and failure to consider the fact that Stevens' critical judgments were in each instance similar to those of other historians who have written on these topics, the defense seems to have been deprived of an opportunity to introduce expert testimony. Evidence to establish the author's professional qualifications to undertake the work was received. If no historian may take as his point of departure the work of another historian and must stand ready to provide in full the original evidence behind every judgment, few works would be produced. General histories, textbooks and encyclopedias would be almost out of the question.

If court reviews of historical evidence and the insurance of orders sustaining authors or plaintiffs became frequent, the burden

on the courts would be almost unlimited. Judges would have to become qualified historians and published works might become not the product of an author-scholar exercising critical judgment but of a court of equity. The decision at several points recognizes the practical problems which a judicial review of historical evidence would entail as well as the adverse effects court authorized history would have upon the public's right to know man's heritage from the past.

Judge Weidner's opinion referred

to the differing versions of the Kennedy assassination each regarded by its author as the true account and to the dilemmas a court would face if the history of that event came before the court. Extrapolating from his reference it must be observed that the obstacles to producing a consensus version of the assassination, i.e. one acceptable to all parties, stagger the imagination. Projection of court review and determination of the type sought in Frick vs. Stevens to the Kennedy assassination might provide pos-

terity with a single court authorized account or none at all. The controversy over it, which is itself a historical phenomenon, would be lost to view. For the historian the decision in the case which we are discussing shows reassuring evidence that the presiding judge was acutely conscious of the impracticality and social undesirability of court review of historical facts or interpretations.

The case raises, but does not clearly resolve, the problem of what constitutes "reasonable in-

vestigation and research." This problem, which has plagued generations of dissertation supervisers, review committees and advisers of honors candidates, awaits its Solomon. The decision does find that evidence substantiated the truth of the statements about Mr. Frick. No distinction is made between the evidence which Dr. Stevens had in hand when he wrote the book and that which has been developed by him and his attorneys in the course of defending the case. Quite obviously it is incumbent upon the historian, biographer or other researcher to secure adequate evidence supporting both his favorable and his critical appraisals of individuals or groups about whom he writes. The absence of guidelines or a formula defining what is reasonable investigation leaves the matter where it probably ought to remain. It is subject to the discretion of the individual author, his editors and the book reviewers; individually and collectively their sense of standards and obligations will insist upon adequate documentation.

HE decision offers the historian several lines of defense in case his work comes under attack in the courts. First, there is insistence that the volume as a whole must be considered. Isolated sentences or paragraphs may not be taken as a basis for suits for defamation. The context in which the critical judgment appears is important. If care is taken to relate an action to the practices or code of conduct prevailing at the time, i.e. if it is placed in perspective, support is provided for arguing that no malice is implied toward the individual. The truth of a statement, of course, is its best defense. Second, the passage of time in no way exempts an individual from criticism, hence the historian may make the types of judgments which he is free to make of persons playing similar roles in his own epoch. He ob-

viously will not make judgments without what he regards as reasonable evidence. But his freedom of speech is not inhibited by the fact that time has passed since the event about which he writes occurred.

HISTORIANS are not exempt from actions for libel or defamation. For such actions to succeed, however, it must be shown that there was on the author's part "knowledge that the statements were false or reckless disregard of whether the statements were false or not." In effect this offers protection to the historian who has substantial evidence in support of his position and whose work attempts to treat his topic with objectivity. For an historian these are not new standards of validity. Yet it must be recognized that historians with different frames of reference or differing interpretive theses often draw quite dissimilar conclusions from the same facts. Consequently suits for libel or defamation might prove equally difficult for plaintiff and defendant. The legal remedy which is open to a plaintiff is an action to recover provable damages. Actions to require revision of a work by virtue of a court order seek an inappropriate remedy.

The decision in this case, if it is upheld, is no direct barrier to criminal prosecution or civil action for damages. It recognizes the primary right of society to valid history and the founding fathers' fears of censorship or prior restraints upon publication. The founding fathers' remedy against abuse of the freedom conferred by the constitutional guarantees for freedom of speech and the press and that suggested by Judge Weidner as the best protection is that enlightened public opinion will effectively discredit those "who handled the truth carelessly or abandon it." Whether a descendant has a stake in the reputation of a forebear which can be damaged to such a degree as to give him cause for legal action

was a recurrent issue in this case. Miss Frick failed to convince the court that she had suffered injury in this instance or indeed that a relative has a right to institute a suit for defamation of a person who has died.

Historians may note with concern and some degree of shock that the author, not the publisher, was the subject of the suit even though the relief sought was an end to the distribution of the book in its present form. Furthermore the publisher did not rush to aid his author either by assistance of the corporation's counsel or by supplying funds to meet the substantial costs of an adequate defense. Possibly there were technical reasons for this course of action, for as the case was handled the court disclaimed power to issue orders binding on the publisher.

PROBABLY the first conclusion which should be drawn from the case in its present status is that the old caveat emptor must be expanded to read caveat auctor. The relation of free historical inquiry and publication to the public interest and constitutional guarantees has been affirmed. The impracticality and undesirability of resort to the courts to establish findings of historical fact has been recognized by the The historian has been court. alerted. He knows how perilously he lives and what a premium rests on the adequacy of his research. His profession has reacted by undertaking to mobilize support for its members in their publication of the historical truth. As for Clio the answers to date are reassuring. She has not, she ought not to be enjoined. But she must demand of her devotees even more rigorous commitments to objectivity and documentation of their search for the truth about the past. She must also await the outcome of the hearings on the exceptions to the decision and face the possibility that the case may be appealed.

Dr. Ripley, who received the doctor of laws degree, became the eighth secretary (head) of the Smithsonian in 1964 after serving four years as director of Yale University's Peabody Museum of Natural History and 18 years on the Yale faculty.

Chairman of the Federal Council on the Arts and Humanities and a biologist and ecologist, Dr. Ripley follows in the Smithsonian's tradition of scholarly leaders, one of whom was Spencer F. Baird, a Dickinson graduate, Class of 1840, who was the second head of the famed institution.

The doctor of science degree was conferred on Dr. Gibbon, surgeon-in-chief of the Jefferson Medical College Hospital and a pioneer in cardiovascular surgery, who holds many awards for his work in this field.

Dr. Gibbon has also pioneered in the diagnosis and surgical management of lung cancer and he and his associates developed the heart-lung machine. He is an honorary fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons of England and a past president of the American Surgical Association.

Dr. Miller received the doctor of humane letters degree. Widely known for his work in helping shape the course of education in Pennsylvania in recent years, he is a member of the Master Plan Advisory Committee for Pennsylvania and serves on the Advisory Committee to the State Commission on Academic Facilities.

He became the Commissioner for Higher Education last April after serving 16 years as president of Lebanon Valley College. Holder of the State Y.M.C.A. Master of Men Award, he is a leading layman of the Evangelical United Brethren Church.

Bishop Taylor, a native of Oklahoma, who served Methodist parishes in North Carolina and New York City before elevation to the bishopric in 1956 and assignment to the Monrovia, Liberia Area, was awarded the doctor of divinity degree.



# Biddle Field Reconditioned

The College has reconditioned Biddle Field!

On completion of the work July 1, Dickinson boasted a new turtleback gridiron (the former was one flat) and an all-weather running track.

The track is six lanes and has a 220 straightaway and is constructed of Tartan, a tough rubber-like surfacing material made by the Minnesota Mining & Manufacturing Company and used at some race tracks and colleges, including the Universities of Pennsylvania and Delaware.

For better utilization of space, the stands have been relocated. This and other changes made room for larger practice areas and five more all-weather tennis courts, for a total of 11. Lacrosse matches, formerly played on the football field, will be moved to a reconditioned area now the site of field hockey.

Biddle Field, built in 1909 and containing 11.5 acres, is a memorial to Herman Bosler Biddle, Class of 1903. It has local fame as the site of the welcome for Jim Thorpe on his triumphant return

Time Teaching Prof. Benjamin D. James, '34, a prominent member of the faculty for nearly three decades, returns to fulltime teaching in the Fall after 20 years

as a teacher-administrator. For the past four years Dr. James was the dean of students, the first person to hold that title at Dickinson. Before that he was the dean of admissions for

15 years. For a long period he was also the chairman of the department of psychology and education and since 1957 he has held the Richard V. C. Watkins Chair of Education. During all this time he has taught at least one course.

During the coming semester he will teach three courses including one called the Principles of Counseling and will supervise some student teachers.

Dr. James came to the faculty in 1941 to teach and help coach varsity sports teams. His services to education began in 1934 when he took a teaching position at the high school in Plymouth, Pa., upon graduating from Dickinson.

"As an educator, the classroom was my first interest," says he. "I find myself impatient to devote full-time to it again."

In 1963 Dr. James became Dickinson's first dean of students, responsible for all non-academic student affairs, including housing, counseling, discipline, health services, student government, and extra-curricular activities. The deans of men and women, director of counseling, and all student advisers came under his supervision.

Dr. James believes strongly in giving young people responsibility for their own behavior and stands with those educators who would give students a voice in decision making in all affairs of the college.

Last October when Dr. James asked to be relieved of his responsibilities as dean of students in order to return to full-time teaching, Howard L. Rubendall, president of the college, spoke highly of his services.

"In his four-year tenure as dean of students," said the president, "Dr. James undertook for the college the arduous task of developing and implementing a new approach to student affairs.

"The college is grateful to have had the benefit of his leadership during these transitional years and, though reluctant to let him go, is sympathetic to his wish to teach full time."

Prof. Harold R. Gillespie of the English department is the new dean of students at Dickinson, carrying also the title of assistant dean of the college.





"One program is necessary to provide for current educational expenses, the other for capital improvements which are long overdue." The judges in the award citation, noting that New England tombstone carvings are often works of art whose visual symbolism penetrates deep into Colonial life, said the book raises early stonecarving to a significant place in America's primitive art and contains new information on early American thought and institutions.





#### CONTINUING EDUCATION

Chairman Sidney D. Kline, Jr., reported that the Committee recommends that a panel-type program on the topic "The Role of Athletics in the Small Liberal Arts College" be considered for next year.

#### ALUMNI AFFAIRS

Chairman Robertson C. Cameron announced that Homecoming will be November 4, 1967. The new library will be dedicated at this time.

#### ALUMNI CLUBS

Chairman Howell C. Mette reported the establishment of five new clubs bringing the total number to thirty-four. The newly established clubs are Binghamton, Rochester and Syracuse, New York, Atlanta, Georgia, and Jacksonville, Florida.

#### ALUMNI TRUSTEES

Roy Kuebler reported on the day-long meeting of the Board of Trustees. His report, as only he can give it, was interesting, informative *and* entertaining.

#### ANNUAL GIVING

Evan Frey, Director of the Dickinson Fund, reported on a special meeting of the Dickinson Fund Committee held on January 2, 1967 to consider certain recommendations made by the professional fund-raising organization of Marts and Lundy following a study of the Dickinson Fund. After due deliberation, the following resolution was adopted by the Committee:

"Whereas the Dickinson Fund represents a highly organized and effective alumni activity in the support of the College; and

Whereas the Dickinson Fund represents an increasingly important long-range program to assist in meeting the operating expenses of the College; and

Whereas it is vital that the Dickinson Fund show a definite pattern of growth each year; and

Whereas historically the previous campaign of the College and the Dickinson Fund were conducted simultaneously with success as separate and identifiable efforts.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that this procedure be continued and that there be no interruption or temporary discontinuance of The Dickinson Fund or Dickinson Fund solicitation activities during the Third Century Development Program."

Mr. Frey further stated that Samuel W. Witwer, President of the Board of Trustees, sent a letter to all alumni of the College in February 1967 setting forth the fact that the Annual Giving Fund (used for current operating expenses of the College) and the Third Century Fund (capital funds) will con-

tinue to be maintained as separate funds. He reported gratifying progress for the 1967 Fund, although at this date our goal has not been reached.

#### NOMINATIONS

Chairman Robertson C. Cameron reported for the Nominating Committee, proposing the following officers for 1967-68:

President—Sidney D. Kline, Jr. Vice President—John D. Hopper Secretary—Mary Mackie Eshelman

It was moved, seconded and passed that a unanimous ballot be cast for these nominees.

President Kline then took the chair and introduced our dynamic Alumni Secretary, Vince Schafmeister, who presented his year-end report to the Council as follows:

#### ALUMNI SECRETARY

Over 1,500 alumni administrators from other institutions saluted Dickinson College last July at the Greenbriar in White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, when, during the annual awards program, we were presented one of four national honor citations emblematic of superior alumni service to education and to their college. The occasion was the National Conference of the American Alumni Council. The citation read. "In recognition of Distinguished Service to alma mater and to education through organized alumni effort, the American Alumni Council gratefully confers this 1966 Honor Citation for Alumni Service on Dickinson College and its Alumni Club of Washington, D. C." This citation marked the third successful year of a tutoring project that administered to the culturally and socially deprived in Washington. Dickinson alumni directed this inspiring project and in terms of productivity for those whom they teach it is a joy to be able to advise you that during the second phase of our testing program, where these underprivileged youngsters are brought to the campus for a weekend and thoroughly examined, one young lady has shown such remarkable improvement and has demonstrated such potential that the College has sought entrance for her into a private school system in New England. We are hopeful she will be accepted, awarded a sufficient scholarship, complete her secondary schooling creditably and enter Dickinson, where her private fairy tale will become a reality.

It is likely that in two other major metropolitan centers, Dickinson alumni will inaugurate similar efforts soon.

Later in the Greenbriar program, Dickinson received the United States Steel Company's check in the amount of  $$_3,\infty\infty$  emblematic of first place in the nation in competition to discover the small college most improved in terms of support for an annual giving campaign. We replaced Harvard. And Dickinson was the only institution to be honored with two major awards.

Our serious attention to alumni clubs and continued amplification of offcampus relationships is intended to bring Dickinsonians together for occasions of fellowship, enlightenment in the business of higher education, and to relate the Dickinson story. Five new clubs, as Howell mentioned, have been formed in the past year bringing our total to 37, a number considerably in excess of schools larger than Dickinson. They join in the serious matters of proselyting in secondary schools, providing strength for annual giving and the capital campaign, promoting the College locally through active publicity chairmen and welcoming parents into their structures with their studentchildren.

The Alumni Council grows in strength as increasing numbers of alumni of significance permit their names to appear on the yearly ballot. Our long range goal for the Council continues to attract and hold Dickinsonians of such stature that in time and with appropriate involvement in the affairs of the College, they might be advanced to the Board of Trustees.

The Dickinson Alumnus is now published in 12,800 lots as additional "lost sheep" are discovered through application of more sophisticated techniques in tracing. The magazine continues to reflect an image of the total picture of the College instead of solely the academic institution. Faculty and alumni are writing for us with enthusiasm as we seek to continually improve upon the magazine's intellectual thrust without losing its values as a purveyor of the newsier matters relevant to both institution and constituency.

Placement enjoyed a fine season with 124 corporations and governmental agencies recruiting on campus. Eleven graduate schools also recruited and the results are gratifying. More Dickinsonians will enter the better graduate

and professional schools than at any other time in our history. Vocationally, some of our young men and women will receive a starting salary in excess of \$8,000. And not even narrow geographical limitations deny first-rate positions to those going into teaching. In a recent administrative reorganization, Dr. Rubendall brought together the individual strengths of the Office of Information Services, the Dickinson News Bureau and the Alumni Office. This new department is described as the Office of Public Relations and Alumni Affairs, and Dr. Rubendall has honored me with the appointment of Director; another evidence of the high regard, I believe, that the President has for the Dickinson family and of his genuine encouragement to us to assume our appropriate role in the affairs of the College. This new office continues to be represented in the President's Cabinet, and when it is coupled with the new Development function prescribed for Fred Lumb of the Class of 1929, the College will surely be the richer in the total business of External Affairs.

At the present we accept the fact that there is an interdependency of fund raising, public relations, placement, admissions and alumni relations within Dickinson's over-all communications effort. Coordination is required. So we are attending to four primary matters in publications:

- in-depth planning for the audience approach;
- (2) design for readership and identity;
- (3) organization, writing and programming for the *audience*; and
  (4) establishment of a team effort.

Hopefully, you have witnessed this change in our publications and you approve.

I participated in a considerable number of conferences and symposiums last year with attention to my competence as the motivator, and it has been my continued pleasure to serve as Chief of District VI for Beta Theta Pi National Fraternity, and locally as Alumni Advisor and Financial Advisor for the Dickinson Chapter. Offices added since the Council meeting last October are the vice presidency of the Beta Alumni Corporation, and the Faculty Secretaryship of Omicron Delta Kappa. This latter office was especially heartwarming since it was an election by the students which brought it about.

And again, as immodest as I continue to project myself, as your representa-

tive on the campus I must advise you, not without, I confess, great delight, that the Interfraternity Council presented me their certificate of appreciation for what they described as "Devoted and Creative Service to IFC and Dickinson College."

The harshness of youth at times is trying; but never oppressive here. Personnel deans, college presidents, trustees, food services, most administrators are the bad guys (this is fashionable) and today's students cannot be fooled (or diverted) merely by the donning of a white hat. So it is particularly gratifying when a student group has something kind to say about an administrator.

And this hair fact leads me to a point I should like to make. It takes a touch of carbon to make good steel, a touch of salt to make a worthwhile stew. In any mix of elements or personal skills a missing ingredient always shows up in the quality of the end product . . . in an unsatisfactory result. Its importance is then fully realized and appreciated.

In the business of alumni and student affairs, it seems to me that one of the most important ingredients is a human attitude called Care. Without this virtue on the part of the administrator, his services can be as unappetizing as the stew without salt . . . flat to the taste.

If our own professional pride did not demand the use of plenty of Care we would use it any way. We might lose an alumnus or a student because of our inability to solve his problem or meet his concern but we will never lose one through lack of Care!

#### FORD CHALLENGE CAMPAIGN

Mike Elliott of the firm of Marts and Lundy, reported that as of June I, 1967, pledges and cash received in this campaign total \$2,188,000. He felt that this amount was just about what could be expected at this particular time in the campaign.

President Kline then introduced Kenneth Claus, a graduating senior, and the immediate past president of the Independent Students of Dickinson. Mr. Claus delivered a most provocative talk on "The Old Dickinson and the New Dickinson." Council members and their guests evidenced great interest in his views and a lively and spirited discussion followed.

Likely, no one except "Red" Malcolm knew intimately more alumni between the classes of the years 1914 and 1967.

A very dear friend of "Hutch's," Paul Walker, '21, President of the *Home Star* Co., Inc., of Harrisburg, published an obituary in his newspaper which read in part:

"You started young and were out of college at an age when most youngsters are just getting in. I wasn't there but they tell me you were pledged Phi Kappa Sigma, the fraternity that brought us together, in knee pants.

"Later in more mature years you were the Phi Kap chapter visitor and your advice and counsel to the undergraduates is well and pleasantly remembered. Their problems became your problems and you helped many a lad find the way when the going was rough. Like "Mr. Chips," you had many children—and they were all boys. You and I never missed a Commencement, well hardly ever, and the oft-heard question was: "Is 'Hutch' here yet?"

"The "L" in your name stood for Loomis. It could well have stood for Loyalty, for loyalty was one of your outstanding virtues—loyalty to friends, to family, to church, to college, to fraternity, to profession, to whatever organization or cause you were affiliated with was one hundred percent. And no one knows it better than I since the Fall of 1917 in old Carlisle.

"You paid your civic rent many times over in service to the community —and it's on the record: President of Tri-County Assn. for the Blind; President of the Camp Hill Library Assn.; Dauphin County Bar; Pa. Supreme Court; American Bar Association; U. S. District Court; Superior Court; Counsel for Pa. Dept. of Forests and Waters; Deputy Atty. General of Pa.; President, Phi Kappa Sigma Club of Central Pa.; Mason-Shrine; President, Hbg. Chapter of the Red Cross; President of the Hbg. Community Theatre; President of the Dickinson Alumni Assn. (and what a



job you did there!) Quite a list and these are but some of the highlights of your many civic activities.

"You fought the good fight, you played a good part in this dizzy old world, you have finished the course, and all is well. And your friends are so glad that you left them happy when you said goodbye."

May Morris, the librarian of Dickinson College for 29 years until her retirement with professor emerita rank in 1956, died Jan. 27 in Carlisle Hospital after a long illness.

Miss Morris, who was 81 years old, was the last surviving member of a family that had helped settle what is now the state of Delaware.

Although she maintained an apartment here, she regarded *Morris' Pleasure*, the family estate near Greenwood, Del., as her home. The property had been in the family from Colonial times.

She was born in Greenwood, the daughter of William Wilkinson Morris and Mary Lutner Collison. The late Judge Hugh Martin Morris, of Wilmington, a prominent Delaware resident was a brother. He was a United States District Judge and a prominent Corporation Lawyer.

Miss Morris was graduated from Dickinson in 1909 and the Pratt Institute of Library Science in 1917. After ten years on the library staff of Bryn Mawr College, she became the Dickinson librarian in 1927. In 1949 she was made a full professor, the second woman to gain that rank at Dickinson.

A good manager and resourceful, Miss Morris left a profound mark upon the library. She tripled the number of catalogued books, modernized its procedures and, according to associates, brought it into the life of the campus to an extent matched at few other colleges.

To bring the library staff, faculty and students closer together, she introduced a weekly library tea and this became a Dickinson tradition.

In 1947 Miss Morris helped establish the Boyd Lee Spahr Lectures in Americana which explore the colonial college's relations with the men, events and culture of 18th century America. Prominent historians give the lectures.

At her retirement the president of the College said Miss Morris had "served Dickinson beyond computation." In a tribute to her, admiring alumni established the May Morris Associates to encourage financial support for the library. "Anyone interested in American liberal arts colleges," said a Dickinson official, "will applaud Miss Morris' contribution to Dickinson as its librarian for 29 years.

"She made the library function efficiently on modern principles, made it indeed an integral part of the College. What Dickinson also had in her was a great and gracious lady of courage, imagination, and elegance."

Miss Morris early set up a student advisory committee on the library, anticipating by many years the clamor of today's students for a voice in college management. In addition, she maintained close relationship with her student assistants, many of whom went on to prominent place in scholarship and the professions.

Last June when Dickinson broke ground for a new \$2.3 million library Miss Morris had helped to plan, she turned over the first spadeful of earth. A room in this Library will bear her name.

Most of the brothers in the chapter house at Dickinson came to Philadelphia by chartered bus for the tribute to Hodge, who acknowledged the event and the tribute with gracious words of thanks. Alumni as far back as the Class of 1917 turned out, and they came from as far away as Ann Arbor, Mich., Washington, Baltimore, Stamford, Conn., and New York to pay honor to the popular Hodge.
