

# THE WEATHERVANE


Did you know there are fossils in Althouse? Now that is a provocative question which might be leading to some kind of undergraduate-type answer. But no, this is not an exposé of dull, antiquated lecturers. It isn't a story about the geology department's display cases either.

Quite literally there are fossils in Althouse. In the limestone blocks which make up the walls it is possible to find trilobites and brachiopods.

Surely there are some in the walls of Bernard, said the observer whose questionable logic posited that the classical department's residence there made it mandatory. Or what about Old West? All the Dickinson buildings, except for dear, odd, Denny, are of limestone and what is in one should be visible in the others, you say?

Strangely enough a cursory inspection did not reveal many fossils in the blocks of the other buildings. Professor Noel Potter, when asked about this lack, suggested that the blocks may be from different strata in the same quarry or even from different quarries, all local. The geologist says the fossils are about 450-500 million years old. Trilobites, by the way, have a horseshoe crab shape; brachiopods are clam-like in shape—and all are very small, requiring one to assume a nose-length approach.

Perhaps it does not make you smile, this business of fossils. To observe grown people looking closely at a building's walls in the twilight, with now and again a voice wafting over a bush to say, "Here's one. Oh, this is a beauty," did strike this writer's funny bone. It also brought about her own peering acquaintance with the trilobites in the Althouse walls. Intellectual curiosity you understand.



# **ENERGY**

The word energy these days is almost always coupled with that other word—crisis.

It has been called a crisis without a shortage and a crisis that is not visible. And not everyone is convinced that it even exists.

And yet: There is a 3½ percent per year rate of increase in the use of energy. Coal, oil and gas are finite resources. An MIT scientist has predicted that our oil will run out in ten years. Another, more optimistic, scientist, puts the end 20 years away.

A television program on energy mentioned three possible ways to slow down the rate of energy consumption: more solar energy, more insulation, more coal production. One commentator sees more imagination and more technology as solutions. Some Dickinson writers look at the energy crisis in this issue—and three of them, the students whose combined research is on page three, don't think technology is going to do it for us.

The November 1977 issue got started a bit before energy was so dramatically brought to the nation's attention. There was a chance remark last fall about a class studying ecological anthropology and that sounded intriguing. Then the class, along with the rest of us, ran into the winter of 1976-77 and an issue on energy happened.

The Dickinson magazine does not solve the possibility of crisis; it has no such pretensions. It suggests some problems, offers a few facts, and answers one or two questions. NLW

# Anthropology and the Energy Crisis

Despite the frigid temperatures of the 1976-77 winter, students in Prof. Wade Seaford's ecological anthropology class exhibited a peculiarly warm reaction to the whole discomforting occurrence. The energy crisis produced by, or merely exacerbated by the atypically cold weather, provided an excellent opportunity for devotees of ecological anthropology to apply its methodology to a concurrently unfolding phenomenon.

What has anthropology to do with a modern problem such as the energy crisis? This is exactly the question which might be asked by those who think of anthropology as the discipline of moribund civilizations and defunct species. These same individuals shake the foundations of Old West each year as they ridicule the value and relevancy of a liberal arts education.

Anthropology attempts to understand man, his culture, his society-in brief. all those instrumentalities which have made possible his survival. Ecological anthropology proposes to solve this conundrum-man's survival-from the perspective of man's relationship to the environment. The most recent impetus in ecological anthropology has focused on the investigation of "system's disruption"-studying the exception which proves the rule. This is exactly what occurred in the Northeast United States last winter when plummeting temperatures fostered a massive systems disruption resulting in isolated cities, factory closings, unemployment, and a plethora of other disquieting impositions, even including death.

Professor Seaford's class consisted of three students: Martha Thompson, Art Wasserman, and myself. It approached the immediate response of American culture and, in a more extended dimension, American culture's response to an emerging energy crisis, from the viewpoint of ecological anthropology. The investigation was developed from three perspectives: economic, technological, and political.

Martha Thompson explored the economic ramifications of the energy crisis. The outcome was a shocking exposition of the complexity and interdependencies of an American "survivalsystem," based on energy. Fossil fuels serve as the main staple of the American energy guzzler. Martha discovered that the 1976-77 winter was a lucid demonstration of the disruption which will occur if a cut-off or even a shortage of these fuel sources develops.

Consistent with anthropology's holistic approach, Martha continued by comparing American culture to other cultures which demonstrate a comparable level of interdependency. For example, she found that the Yir Yiront, a primitive Australian tribe, was unable to make a total cultural adjustment to a changed environment when a fundamental aspect of that culture was altered. The result was the disintegration of the society. American culture is faced with a similar need to adjust in toto. Technology alone is not going to be the answer.

Art Wasserman investigated technological capabilities and potentialities existing in the United States. Once again the facts were hardly a cause for celebration. The U.S. is indeed an energy guzzler. With only 6.5 percent of the world's population, we consume 35 percent of the world energy reserves. No small portion of this amount is due to waste. Art continued by establishing the veracity of the energy shortage. Fossil fuels by their very nature are unreplenishable and thereby limited. Presently 96 percent of our total energy supply derives from this source. Con-

clusion: we are rapidly approaching the exhaustion of an energy source upon which we are almost totally dependent.

Art further determined that though the technology to expand utilization of present energy sources exists, it will serve only as a temporary ameliorative. The technology to use new forms of energy (solar, nuclear, geothermal, wind, etc.) has been stultified and must now be rapidly developed. How very strange that we are so dependent on an unreplenishable fuel source when, on a worldwide scale, two weeks of solar

energy radiated on the earth equals all known resources of coal, oil and natural gas!!!

The third phase of the investigation, the political response, was developed by me. With the rise of the modern state, it is the political sphere which has become the causal nexus for response to challenges—and therefore, for societal adjustments and adaptations. The Presidency, currently oc-

cupied by Jimmy Carter, is the focal point of response-initiation in the United States. Carter, immediately confronted with the energy crisis upon entering office, attempted to go directly to the root of the problem. His initial efforts were directed at changing American values, the source of the energy crisis.

A mixture of what Toynbee called "apathetic fallacy" (disregard for nature) and a protean American belief that technology can overcome any challenge are at the very root of the energy crisis, my research indicates. Working initially through a symbolic blitzkrieg, Carter attacked these American values at an esoteric level. Emphasis on conservation was a primary aspect of this program. President Carter has recently admitted the failure of this attempt. More substantive measures, including a Department of Energy, are currently characterizing the political response. My investigation determined that regardless of the nature, scope, and intensity of the challenge, it is the political sphere which must direct and initiate

the American cultural response.

The energy crisis, despite the fortuitousness of its development for ecological anthropology students, is a very real danger to American society. Moreover, the apathetic fallacy so strong in American culture may be maladaptive to the point of being lethal. Flooded towns, skyscrapers and atomic reactors built in earthquake-prone areas, complex aqueduct systems, droughts, exhaustion of nature's ability to absorb waste, and even the present energy crisis, reflect a dangerous societal attitude. Perhaps the technological specialists might open their purviews to a more variegated approach to solving societal problems. The avenues of approach are

undoubtedly multitudinous and multifaceted in pursuit of the juggernaut of progress.

Whatever the future holds, our study of ecological anthropology suggested that it will necessarily be very different from the present. American man and his culture are still adjusting and adapting; evolution has not ended. The configuration of any culture is so dependent upon its technological base, and thereby its energy system, that American culture will undoubtedly be greatly changed as it adapts to altered energy sources. Periods of change, despite the obvious possibility for chaos, also present enormous potentialities for positive gains.

Fear-feeding scenarios of modern dark ages to the contrary notwithstanding, a total cultural response initiated and properly directed by the political sphere could provide rewarding and

comfortable living for our species indefinitely. The direction of society, if it is to survive and make use of change, must be innovative and must also respect a holistic comprehension of man's development qua Homo sapiens. Using A. N. Whitehead's imagery we must not only keep a close eye on the deck of the vessel upon which we're moving, we must also be attentive to the stars and constellations which have been time-worn points of reference. Anthropology, as exemplified by this stimulating class, may share in this process. Most certainly a liberal arts education is relevant. In the final analysis it may very well be the creative. diversified, and adaptive students such as those of Dickinson College who will best be able to direct society in its response to future challenges.



# Servants — Or Villains?

If our house is our castle, appliances must be our servants. With the rising cost of energy, can we afford to keep all these servants?

Appliances have become a part of our life; we purchase them at will and expect to have enough energy to operate them as much as we want. But when the electric, gas, or oil bill comes there are flailing of arms, stomping of feet, and shouting: "Turn out the lights! Off with the stereo! Throw out the electric can opener!" After this ritual, frustration sets in: frustration at our inability to pinpoint just which appliances are the villains. Which appliances use a lot of energy and which ones use only a little?

For most homes in this country, the biggest energy user is the home heating system. In the central Pennsylvania area, the cost of home heat can account for 60 to 80 percent of the total home energy bill; the exact amount depends

on the type of heating fuel used. The second largest user is the hot water heater: it can account for about 10 percent of the total energy bill. Contestants for third place include the clothes dryer, cooking appliances, refrigerators and freezers, and the air conditioner. These four use about the same amount of energy in an average home, but the exact ranking in any individual home depends on the family's habits. Generally the lights use less energy than any of the above appliances, but in some homes they can use more if a lot are left on.

How much energy does each appliance use? If a home uses either gas or oil for only heat or hot water, the bills do indicate the energy for these needs. However, the monthly electric bill shows the total energy used by all the electrical appliances, not the energy

used by each appliance. A home has a multitude of electrical appliances, and the contribution of each can be small, but a small amount of energy each month can become a lot of energy over the lifetime of the appliance.

With few exceptions, the cost to operate an appliance over its lifetime is as much or more than the purchase price. A \$400 refrigerator, for example, can consume between \$500 and \$2000 worth of electricity over its 15-yearlifetime, the exact amount depending on the size and efficiency of the refrigerator and the cost of electricity. A \$200 air conditioner can cost from \$200 to \$500 to operate over its 10-yearlifetime. Even a 60¢ light bulb can use \$3 worth of electricity before it burns out. The only notable appliances that cost less to operate than to purchase are the solid state television, the microwave oven, and the first appliance deemed unnecessary in time of an energy crisis-the electric can opener.

SERVANTS, continued from page 5 And, the only reason the first two cost less to operate than to purchase is because their purchase prices are high.

We still have the question of how to conserve. You can save energy in two basic ways: reduce the use of appliances or reduce the wasted energy. If you reduce the use of some appliances, you will need to change your way of living. Not using the clothes dryer means that you will have to spend time and your energy hanging clothes outside to dry. If you reduce the inside room temperature during the winter, the furnace uses less energy but you need to change your way of dress. That awful looking sweater you received from a favorite aunt for Christmas all of a sudden looks good-it can keep you warm.

To reduce waste, however, you generally do not need to change your way of living. First you need to spend some time, effort, and probably money, but after taking some initial action, you can go on living as before. Adding insulation to the house can be a hot, dirty, and even expensive job, but you can reduce the heat loss for the lifetime of your house. Or you can spend a little extra time to find the most efficient model of an appliance. You may have

to pay more for it (though not always the case), but once you have it you save energy every time it is used. The most efficient model of some sized air conditioners can use about half the energy of the least efficient model; the difference in operating cost can be enough to pay for the air conditioner itself.

When shopping for appliances, you may have difficulty finding the most efficient models. Presently only air conditioners, refrigerators and freezers have any energy information available. Air conditioners have the Energy Efficiency Ratio (EER) listed on each unit. Although the EER values range from 5 to 12, any unit with an EER of over 9 is considered an efficient model. When purchasing a refrigerator or freezer. look for the expected monthly consumption on the unit or ask the dealer for the information. Refrigerators use from 50 to 200 kilowatt-hours per month, depending on the model and size, and would cost from \$450 to \$1800 to operate over 15 years if you pay 5¢ per kilowatt-hour. For clothes washers and dishwashers. look for the models that use the least hot water. (Ask the dealer for the instruction manual, the information should be there.) When purchasing a television set, look for the lowest wattage (listed on the back of the set).

Under a new federal program all appliances are being checked for energy consumption and this information will be available to the consumer in the near future. Listed on each appliance will be the expected energy use per month or per year and the expected cost of this energy. The values listed will be for average conditions and energy costs and may not be close to your actual operating costs. However, by comparing the values for the different models you can determine the most efficient one.

# Here Comes the SUN!

An increasing number of homeowners is joining the ranks of sun worshippers. They are not concentrating on the cosmetic effects of the sun, but are exploring it as a practical energy alternative.

Though solar energy is a relatively new field without any statistics indicating long range success, the exorbitant and climbing fuel prices of gas, oil, and coal have already convinced many that it is the solution to today's energy situation.

The principles behind the use of solar energy are extremely simple. Candie Wilderman, assistant professor of environmental studies at Dickinson College, summarizes them as three basic processes—collection, storage and distribution of the sun's energy.

What Professor Wilderman refers to as collection is capturing the sun's rays in "collectors" which are typically constructed of clear glass plates covering black metal absorber plates mounted on either a roof or a wall at an angle to the southern sky. Insulation under the absorber plates prevents heat loss out of the back side of the collector and the clear coverplates serve as insulation on top, creating what is called a "greenhouse effect."

The number and size of the collectors vary in relation to the size and capacity of the system. They heat either water, air, or oil, all effective mediums of heat transmission, and the medium travels from the collectors by means of insulated pipes or ducts to an insulated energy storage tank located either near or in the building.

The heat is then transferred to the hot water tank or air ducts by a heat exchanger, usually coils of metal tubing or a fan blower. Most systems are designed to fulfill 50-80 percent of a

household's energy needs and have an average capacity of four to five days storage of energy. The remaining quarter or so of needed energy is produced by a secondary source such as oil, wood, or traditional electrical resistance energy.

Among those who have already begun planning for a solar future are several members of the Dickinson College faculty and administration.

Kenneth and Priscilla Laws, both physics professors at Dickinson College, are in the midst of drawing up a design for a complete solar home which they plan to build themselves in approximately a year and a half. Their home will be equipped with a solar hot water and a solar space heating system, the combination of which will supply the major portion of the household's energy needs. Since no solar system is 100 percent efficient, the remaining energy will be supplemented with oil and wood.

The Laws' primary motivations for building a solar home are environmental, economic and political.

The solar hot water and space heating systems are integral parts of the environmental scheme of the Laws' future

building which includes a composting toilet, a large underground root cellar, and a natural wood interior and exterior. Since solar energy does not produce any energy pollutants, as do all other forms of energy, the Laws' home will be a study in complete ecological living.

The economic prospect of free fuel is, of course, very appealing to the Laws, but they are personally more attracted to the political implications of solar energy.

Both agree that solar energy gives one a "sense of independence," an independence of the government and utility companies in particular. Priscilla Laws sees solar energy as a means of "redirecting the goals of technology from bigness to something people can understand and even fix. Solar energy is simple to understand. One doesn't need engineers or technology to fix a solar system. The individual can fix it." Ken Laws describes solar energy as a movement towards "a positive lack of dependence on a large scale operation."

Ron Doernbach, registrar of Dickinson College, plans to retrofit his present home with solar energy, not only with hot water and space heating systems, but also with a heating system for his swimming pool. Like the Laws, his plans are still in the future, possibly two years. In the meantime he is working on the installation of two systems which will be complementary to future solar systems and are economically beneficial at the moment. The first is complete insulation of his home, which Mr. Doernbach feels will repay itself in savings on his fuel bill in one season. The second is a modern wood stove for

heating and cooking which will become the secondary source of energy when he eventually installs the solar systems. When the two sources, solar and wood, do finally operate together, Doernbach estimates he will save approximately \$600 over his last season's fuel bill.

Though Doernbach is hesitant to invest in a solar system right away because of the experimental quality of solar materials, such as absorber plates which tend to either deteriorate or decompose, he believes "the cost of energy today and a likely 10 percent increase in future fuel prices still make solar energy economically worthwhile. Some parts of a solar system (storage tank, distribution system, etc.) will be retained even if others are not. You can always modify and add on to a system."

Doernbach is also very adverse to feeling dependent on a single utility company for all his energy needs. "I want to be as independent of a blackout as I can be."

Up to this time, Marvin Israel, a sociology professor at Dickinson College, is the only member of the Dickinson community and one of few in the area to have already completed a solar home. Professor Israel is, in fact, two years ahead of everyone else. Whereas many are just now becoming interested in solar energy, the Israel house was built two years ago in a cooperative effort with a Japanese architect then in Philadelphia, Frank Kawasaki, and a plumber from Mt. Holly Springs, Frank Slyder.

His house is a three bedroom, 1,600 square foot structure with one wall serving as the heat collector. This heat collector consists of black painted corrugated aluminum roofing covered with a sheet of fiberglass for insulation. Heat is captured in a "flat plate trickle

collector" in which a "trickle of water flows along the wall, is heated by the sun, then drops to a basement tank where the heat is transferred to and held by rocks. A fan blows through the heated rocks and the air is distributed around the house."

An oil fired water heater and wood stove provide the additional supplementary energy for the house.

While Israel does cite the "political/personal" aspect of individual independence as a plus for solar energy, his major motivation in building and investing in a solar home was an economic one. Last winter, when everyone doubled heating bills, he spent a total of \$150 on oil and wood for the season's heating.

Obviously Israel's solar home was a good economic investment and he is concerned that others, in particular the college, are ignoring the economic advantages of solar energy. He feels most people have waited too long to acknowledge the fact that solar energy is a practical, worthwhile solution to the nation's energy problems. "What gets me, is that three years after I planned my own (solar) system, ... everyone and his brother ... here are acting like they've rediscovered the wheel."

The future for solar energy is getting brighter every day. Government solar subsidies and grants given out by the

Energy Research and Development Administration (ERDA) and a future prospect of free fuel make solar energy an appealing energy alternative. The initial investment in a solar system can be great, from \$1,500 to \$7,000, depending on the size and type (handmade or commercial) of system, but solar energy is the only energy source whose prices are decreasing with time. Therefore, as the industry becomes larger and solar companies start manufacturing on a greater scale, prices of solar materials will eventually drop to the point where everyone will be able to reap the benefits of some form of a solar system.

## ARCHIVES ADDS ITEMS

Because of another librarian's suggestion, the Dickinson College library has recently received two treasured items. Dorothy Williams Baker '38, high school librarian in Glenshaw, suggested to Mrs. Albert W. Sloan that she send to Dickinson two documents relating to her great grandfather. The college now has in its archives a diploma dating October, 1815 and presented to George Thomas Martin and also his certificate from a literary society dated August 12, 1819. As the college's archivist wrote to Mrs. Sloan, "The college diploma is especially treasured since it bears the signature of Professor Thomas Cooper. We have earlier diplomas but I think this may be the first one with his signature." Mrs. Martha Slotten added that she thought perhaps Dr. Martin was inspired in his medical studies by Professor Cooper.

Dr. George Thomas Martin was the eldest son of Dr. Ennalls Martin and was born at Easton, Maryland, April 17, 1793. After graduation from Dickinson in 1815, he took his medical degree at the University of Maryland. He practiced in Easton and Denton on Maryland's Eastern Shore and also in Baltimore. Dr. Martin died in 1860.

His father attended the Newark

# Golden Opportunity

Few of us, including myself, take full advantage of opportunities when they present themselves. You will find that this oversight is especially true of opportunities that are right in our backyards. How many times have visiting friends embarrassed you by knowing more about your city or your community than you do? This lack of initiative in investigating opportunities is especially true in college communities. Students usually have ample chance to examine both cultural and social affairs, but usually they forfeit these occasions because they are either too busy or too tired to attend. At least, that is the excuse they use. Which is why it is nice to write about a student who has seen an opportunity and seized it.

Susan R. Fisher graduated from Dickinson in January, 1977 with a B.A. degree in psychology. While at Dickinson, Susan became interested in the field of deaf communication. Thus, it was only natural that she was excited when she learned that Dr. David Denton, superintendent of the Maryland School for the Deaf, was scheduled to speak to her anthropology class in deaf communication. Unlike some of us, Susan took the time to attend the lecture.

Dr. Denton had recently returned from a tour of Great Britain where he had lectured on the philosophy of total communication for the deaf. For over 100 years, educators had argued over whether sign language or oral communication was the most natural method of communication for the deaf. Under the concept of total communication, Dr. Denton stressed that neither method is superior, but that if the two methods were combined and amplified hearing was used, the total system would be of great benefit to the deaf community. At the conclusion of his lecture, Dr. Denton remained so that he could talk with interested students. Again, Susan was there. Sometime in the spring of 1977, with Dr. Denton's lists in hand, Susan arrived in Edinburgh, Scotland to do some sightseeing. While there, she visited Dr. G. W. G. Montgomery, professor of the applied psychology unit at the University of Edinburgh. In Susan's own words, "They rolled out the red carpet." Dr. Montgomery had one of his assistants take Susan on a tour of the University and of the nearby Donaldson School for the Deaf where the University was engaged in ongoing research. Dr. Montgomery's research concerned the field of vocational guidance for the deaf. Susan was given the opportunity to observe various classrooms in session, discuss teaching methods with the instructors, and even fingerspell with some of the children. Since Dr. Denton's visit, the instructors had begun to increase their knowledge of manual communication and its usage in the classroom. When Susan returned to Dr. Montgomery's office she received quite a surprise. Dr. Montgomery suggested that Susan do her postgraduate work at the University of Edinburgh. Naturally, Susan grabbed at the chance and, with Dr. Montgomery's help, she was easily accepted into the program.

As of August, Susan began one year of postgraduate work, under the supervision of Dr. Montgomery, in the field of vocational guidance for the deaf. Susan will also hold down a part-time job as a research assistant at the Donaldson School for the Deaf. After she completes her year of study, Susan hopes to return to the United States and earn her master's degree in counseling. As you can see, Susan is well on her way to that goal.

So, the next time you have an opportunity to do something, do it. Have the initiative, as Susan Fisher did, to turn an ordinary opportunity into a golden opportunity.



# Sabbatical in Israel

The first time we left America for Israel, our ship sailed two days after the assassination of Robert Kennedy. While we were gone, the eruption of Columbia University in New York City and the power assertion of the Black Panthers in Chicago made headlines. Reading the newspaper abroad, one got the impression that the United States had become one vast smoking ruin.

Two years later, when it came time for us to say goodbye to Jerusalem, (for the moment—no one ever really leaves that city) Israeli friends asked, "Aren't you afraid to go back to America?" Well, yes.

And when we settled in the quiet rural town of Carlisle, or revisited our home towns in Illinois, Americans wanted to know, "Weren't you afraid over there?" Well, yes. During our sojourn in the Holy Land, terrorists had bombed the supermarket, the openair produce market, and the Hebrew University cafeteria, all places my husband and I frequented. Once we left our children with friends and went on a camping trip to Galilee. We bedded down in the open under the Golan Heights the first night. The night before, there had been shelling there; the night after, there was shelling again in that place, but the night we camped out, Katyusha rockets were aimed at Jerusalem . . . where the children were.

Before we returned to Israel for a sabbatical last year, an Arab-American friend who is much involved in the political situation said, "I sure hope everything is all right, if anything happens to you I'll be really unhappy, but I'd have to say, 'They shouldn't have gone'." Well, thanks.

This time around we found Israelis less incredulous that we still call America home. Their lifestyle is still arduous and shows no immediate prospect of getting easier. The mood has sobered since the '73 war. Enemies are all around, prices and taxes skyrocket, the government rots from within. Sound familiar?

A cabinet minister makes \$8,000 a year. A modest three bedroom apartment costs \$45,000. Coffee costs exceed ours, and meat is a once or twice a week treat.

A married man may spend two

months out of each year in the army reserves, risking his life on subsistence pay. Meanwhile, his wife comes home from work and rests up to take her turn on civil defense guard duty, hauling a heavy gun up and down the shadowy streets at midnight.

My parents' apartment complex in Waukegan boasts its own swimming pool and tennis court. My in-laws in Highland Park have four TVs, three of them color. We eat meat every night. In Pennsylvania, our house is waiting, the house we never bother to lock unless we're going to be gone for more than a day. People say, "Aren't you glad to be back?" Well, yes.

And other people say, "Didn't you just love it over there?" Well, yes.

Certain images stay in the mind, and I don't mean the price tags on beef.

Attending a Roman Catholic mass said in Hebrew, and in the Jewish manner—no kneeling, but a dip and bow of obeisance—matzo for communion bread—and a young man in Israeli uniform lifting the chalice of the Eucharist under the white-washed arches of a catacomb-like chapel on one of the main streets of new Jerusalem.

Being entertained in a Moslem Arab village—the hostess barefoot, eyes filmed with trachoma, talking enthusiastically in a language I don't speak. At the same time, she communicates in one I do understand—her hand stroking and kneading my arm, my shoulder, my cheek, while she presses upon me the hospitality of her spotless parlor and a glass of mint tea.

Outside, a low, blackened brick structure mounds against a housewall. Inside it is the fire upon which the village's bread is baked. A call brings forth an occupant, a young woman who has been tending the baking, squatting on the far side of the coals, deep within the oven. She stoops through the tiny opening and proffers the hot, flat cake she has just finished. Her brow is beaded with sweat, her bare feet are gray with ashes... but her long embroidered white dress and flowing Muslim headcloth are immac-

ulate, her gold nose and ear rings gleam. The bread is a gift.

At a filling station near the King David Hotel one morning, a man stops his donkey by the gas pump, firmly inserts the nozzle, and the indicator numbers begin to spin. The beast stands solidly. Only a closer investigation on the far side of the pump reveals the tiny jerrycan strapped to the animal's side.

In the garden of Hebrew Union College, two people are introduced and politely greet each other with good wishes for the Jewish New Year that is about to occur. Neither realizes, during this interchange in Hebrew, that one of them is a Moslem, the other a Christian.

Once I sat nursing my sick infant in the public ward of a hospital during visiting hours. After some time, a woman in the dress of the strictly Orthodox Jew stumped toward me with fire in her eye. Knowing the Orthodox disapproval of the nudity of even as much as the arm, I began to marshal defensive arguments in halting Hebrew. I didn't need them. "I've been watching you," she said in an indignant tone, "sitting there for hours and nursing that baby. Don't you know your milk will dry up if you don't have enough to eat and drink? You get down to the coffee shop right now. I'll watch the baby."

And there are the million details that make up the fabric of daily life. The marvelous bounty of fresh produce all year round. The calm of a Sabbath afternoon. Taking an entire morning on a purchase, because time has to be allowed for drinking coffee, for chatting, and for haggling . . .

Being smartly whacked across the shins by an elderly woman's shopping bag as she dives to get onto the bus before you... and you were standing aside to let her on in the first place. (There is a theory that Israel's secret weapon, invincible in war, unwavering in peace, is The Old Lady Corps.)

The ambrosial savor of a roasted chicken when it's the first bite of meat you've had in a week. The omnipresent crunch and nibble of toasted seeds.

Never being smiled at by cashiers or salespeople: "We are not servile. We left that in the ghetto." Always being helped by total strangers when you need them: "We're all Jews together." "But I'm not Jewish." "Never mind, Jewish,

not Jewish, it's the same thing. We're all Jews together anyway."

Spending all day in a clinic, filling out forms, standing in queues, even for a simple prescription for a skin salve. Never having to worry that medical expenses will cripple your family, or that you won't be able to afford the best care.

The merciless glare of the afternoon sun, the dust, the parched wind. Then coming inside to the invariable cool of shuttered rooms, thick walls, stone floors, high ceilings, a twining breeze, and a glass of iced pomegranate juice.

Those same bare, cavernous rooms in winter, a driving rain howling outside and seeping through the cracks, everyone huddled cosily around the cheery glow of a kerosene burner, eating thick bean soup and crusty bread.

The memorable sight of the golden walls of Jerusalem on a spring evening heady with jasmine.

"Will you go back?" they ask us here. "You will come back," they tell us there. Well, yes.

# Visiting Scientist


Willy Elliot from Dickiebird U. was the nickname given me by Hy Marx, curator of reptiles and amphibians at the Field Museum of Natural History in Chicago, when I arrived there in the early summer of 1975. Hy is the museum's version of Woody Allen and informality is his way of life. Hy is very familiar with Dickiebird U. because he hired Harold Voris away from Dickin-

a little over a week! The offspring of the barnacles are released as swimming larvae less than 0.1 mm. in length and they go through several molts before becoming the cypris larvae which settle on the snakes. The cypris larvae have two antennae equipped with sensitive bristles to explore landing sites, suction cups and cement glands for temporary and permanent attachment respectively. Whether in response to the micro-ornamentation on the scales of the snake or to current. the larvae "know" which is the head end of the snake and attach in the proper attitude so that the barnacles can make maximum use of their feeding appendages, with minimal effect from drag as the snake swims.

It seems obvious enough that any small, soft-bodied creature would derive protection while living on such a hospitable and self-sufficient host, but intimate associations between organisms usually are of mutual benefit. How could the snakes possibly benefit? A favorite hypothesis is that the barnacles, being soft and succulent, may be attractive as lures to the fish upon which the snake feeds. In the turbid waters of the river mouths, it would be advantageous for the snakes to have clues as to when prey are nearby. To date, however, fish removed from snake stomachs have not, in turn, been found with barnacles in their mouths or upper digestive tracts.

The relationship is all the more intriguing because of the fact that this barnacle, unlike even its closest relatives, is host specific on sea snakes and has not been reported on any other creature or substrate. How could the relationship have evolved? What factors interact to make it mutually beneficial? Why is it that the barnacles are present in increasing numbers, head to tail, along the snake, and most numerous on the tail? These are just a few of the questions that stimulate us to pursue this interesting association.

Will Bill and Harold get to go to the Straits of Malacca and the South China Sea to seek answers to these and other questions? Will the little beggars give up their secrets? Tune in this time in a year or two and, hopefully, we'll have some answers.

BILL JEFFRIES is professor of biology. In recognition of his ongoing research on the biology of sea snakes, he has been given an honorary appointment as research associate in the department of zoology of the Field Museum of Natural History. According to E. Leland Webber, president, "These appointments, which are for a five-year term and renewable, are intended to honor active persons who frequently use the Museum's resources or collaborate with members of its staff in their research. The title does not impose any specific obligation on your part, rather it enables us to express the relationship that exists between you and the Museum and to facilitate collaboration on scientific matters."

son's biology department in the spring of 1973. Where he dredged up the Elliot to go with Willy, he alone knows.

Harold and I are working together on a project which is just one facet of his research on venomous sea snakes. It involves examination of an intimate association between members of two very diverse groups, arthropods and vertebrates, hence the collaboration of an invertebrate zoologist and a vertebrate ecologist.

The organisms being studied in this biological association are small, fleshy "goose" barnacles and sea snakes, which evolved from land forms. The former, hardly more than a centimeter in length, live on the snakes which are 20 to 100 centimeters in length. The barnacles are filter feeders on plankton and the snakes are carnivorous on several species of fish. The association is not true parasitism because the attachment of the barnacle does no harm to the host's tissues. Indeed, the barnacles are sloughed off every time the snake sheds its skin. That may be as frequently as every 2-3 weeks, perhaps as often as once a week in very young snakes. Imagine, having to complete a life cycle and produce viable offspring in

## Students Clean Appalachian Trail

In September, about 30 Dickinson students helped clean up four miles of the Appalachian Trail. These four miles fall within the boundaries of the state park which encompasses Fuller and Laurel Lakes not far from Carlisle. The rest of the trail, extending from Maine to Georgia, is cleaned and cared for by Appalachian Trail clubs. Because this four-mile section of the trail falls within the boundaries of the state park, no club takes responsibility for it.



During the past few years Carlisle area high school students have cleaned up the trail in the spring. Trash, of course, collects on the trail during the

whole year and the College students felt it was necessary to clean the trail in the fall as well.

The four-mile section stretches between the park headquarters at Pine Grove Furnace and Woodrow Road. Michaux Road, which leads to Camp Michaux, conveniently bisects the trail halfway between these two points creating two sections of two miles each.

The students were divided into two groups, representatives of the local ROTC unit and the local chapter of Alpha Chi Rho. Al Norris '78, one of the organizers of the project, points out that the activity "shows a concern on the part of a greatly diverse number of students over the condition of the natural resources of this country. This project has demonstrated that ROTC and fraternity members are actively involved in serving the community and are an integral part of college life."

# Paper Battles and Human Victories

For the first time in five years Dickinson won the opening football game by defeating Lycoming College 7-3. Gaining momentum from the victory, Dickinson went on to trounce Moravian College 18-0. Hopefully the team will be able to continue these winning ways.

This year's team is full of stories of dedication and determination. Coming into the season, the phrases used to describe the team were, "small in both size and number," and "inexperienced." These phrases are still accurate, but what the squad lacks in size, number, and experience, is more than compensated for by a large dose of spirit.

Sophomore offensive guard Jay Steinman is a perfect example of the type of spirit that I am talking about. As a freshman, Steinman saw little playing time. Some of the reasons he did not play were because he is only 5' 10" tall, weighs 180 pounds, and because he suffered a separated shoulder in high school.

Realistically Steinman knew that he could do little to increase his size and weight, but he knew he could improve his shoulder. To that end, Steinman had his shoulder operated on over Christmas vacation. He later used his summer vacation to strengthen his shoulder by lifting weights and exercising. Currently Steinman is starting at offensive right guard and is doing a good job. In a game situation, it is not unusual for him to face a defensive tackle who is 40 or more pounds his superior.

Lack of playing experience was also a team concern. This year, juniors Paul Saucier and Lloyd Shaffer are starting as defensive tackles. Shaffer had had limited playing experience, but Saucier had never before played defensive tackle. In fact, Saucier sat out last year's entire season.

So far, the coach's worry over lack of experience has proved to be no worry at all. In Saucier's first outing, he distinguished himself by sacking the quarterback a few times and earning the Red Devil award for outstanding play by a lineman.

With two games under their belts, Shaffer and Saucier have combined to completely-shut down the other team's rushing attack and on more than one occasion they have caused a confused quarterback to hurry his pass. I might also add that the entire Dickinson defense has been spectacular.

Contrary to what you believe, sports are not all work and concentration. The rigors of summer camp must be paced with some humor. During this year's camp, Mark Gorscak, starting offensive center, broke the tedium by announcing his candidacy for the Heisman Trophy. The rugged, six-foot, 195-pound junior signed a few autographs and enlisted some team members to act as his press secretaries.

To date, no votes have been cast for Gorscak, but the boys are still trying. The phrase of the day has been, "Gorscak for Heisman, of Gorse." A balance between levity and seriousness must exist if a team is to survive and this

team has that balance.

I cannot say enough for the total commitment team members demonstrate to each other and to the game. Seniors Washington, Johnson, Shannon, Miller, Yazvac, Fahey, Dowell, and Worthington add experience and leadership to the young team.

Worthington, Jonson, Yzvac, and Miller know their way around on defense. All four men can truly be characterized as smart, hard-hitting players. Washington, Shannon, Dowell, and Fahey play a similar roll on offense. The first three players add quickness, speed, agility, and a scoring threat, both on the ground and in the air, to the team. Captain Jack Fahey is recognized as the total leader of the team.

In recent seasons, Wilbur "Goby" Gobrecht has had to play the role of "good" loser more often than he wanted. This was not easy for a head coach who wants to win and Goby wants to win. In Dickinson's victory over Moravian, Goby had the chance to run up the score. The Red Devil's were in complete control of the game. Instead of running up the score, Goby put in his second unit.

In the past, other colleges have not treated Dickinson as fairly and with as much class. I, for one, am very proud that Coach Gobrecht is representing Dickinson College. With the victory over Moravian, Goby proved that he is truly a "class" coach.

A winning season always sharpens and expands the recognition given to a team. I hope that the Dickinson Red Devils have that winning season; they want it and they deserve it. If everything, however, does not go their way, you should recall with pride the individuals and their personal victories. In the end, it is the individual who really counts.

By virtue of a 4-0 winning streak, the Red Devils went as high as second in the Lambert Bowl rankings of Division III Eastern colleges. The record now is 4-2 (as of October 24) with three games remaining.

## No Rusting for Him



M. P. "Pat" Potamkin reminisced recently in the Philadelphia *Inquirer* about his days as the athletic director at Shackamaxon Boys Club during the Depression. The paper said, "Pat Potamkin cut a pretty distinctive figure in Fishtown 45 years ago. Fishtown was predominately Irish and Catholic and Meyer P. Potamkin was a Jew from Fourth and Queen in South Philadelphia."

Apparently he not only coached at the boys club but also at Immaculate Conception, the parish grade school. He got that job because the Mother Superior needed a coach for the eighthgrade team and decided that Potamkin loved children. In 1938 his team had a chance for a championship but ran into

a conflict with confirmation services. Potamkin went to call on the late Bishop Lamb and told him of the problem. The Bishop did not cancel confirmation services but did move them up a few hours. The eighth graders wore basketball uniforms under their communion suits and when services were over, were rushed to the tournament in a waiting police wagon.

And they defeated St. Patrick's for a coveted title at the St. Joseph's Prep Invitational Tournament, a moment that Potamkin told the *Inquirer* he would never forget. But he added that he would never forget the meeting with Bishop Lamb either.

"It was the nearest I've ever been to royalty," Potamkin said.

## Not Handicapped

Jeff Bohrman '67 is deaf and has tunnel vision and limited speaking capacity—and a post doctoral fellowship at the Oak Ridge National Laboratory in Tennessee.

Jeff told *The Sacramento Bee,* "I have never regarded myself as handicapped." He recently added a doctorate in physiology-pharmacology from the University of the Pacific School of Pharmacy to his bachelor's in biology from Dickinson and a master of science degree in pharmacology from the University of Illinois.

"I try to think of myself as normal

... The odds in this world are not against me," he told the newspaper. Married and the father of two children, Bohrman explains that people with handicaps "should not feel sorry for themselves because of their problems or feel that a handicap limits their usefulness as a human being."

## Pope Greets Corsons

Private audiences with Pope Paul VI usually are reserved for dignitaries or for special occasions. But Dr. and Mrs. Hampton P. Corson were received privately by the Pope for a more personal reason. Dr. Corson's father, United Methodist Bishop Fred Pierce Corson, and Pope Paul became acquainted at the Second Vatical Council and have continued their friendly relations through the years. The Corsons received an official invitation to meet the Pope during a visit to Rome in the spring.

Dr. Corson is a 1949 graduate and his wife (Mary Ellen Dykstra) graduated in 1952. The physician is president of the medical staff of Conemaugh Valley Memorial Hospital and director of the high risk maternity center at the Johnstown Hospital. Bishop Corson was president of the College from 1934-1944 and a trustee from 1944 to 1967. He retired in 1968 as resident bishop of Philadelphia. In 1963 he became the first Protestant leader to receive an honorary degree from a Catholic school when St. Joseph's College of Philadelphia awarded him a doctorate of letters.

# Taxes and Charitable Giving—Taxpayer and Donor

Most of our lives we have been reminded that there are two inevitables: death and paying taxes. Under the Tax Reform Act of 1969 Congress mandated certain opportunities for individual taxpayers to make gifts to non-profit organizations which have the effect of modifying estate taxes while providing tax deductions immediately. Thus while we still must be certain about one inevitability, taxes can be altered.

By employing a charitable remainder trust a taxpayer contracts to receive a term or life schedule of income payments from an irrevocable gift of principal to a named charity such as Dickinson College. As a qualified charitable institution, Dickinson College would receive the principal sum at the end of a term (up to 20 annual payments) or at the death of the donor or his or her designated beneficiaries.

Ordinarily, during the lifetime of the income earner two primary needs must be met: the production of income and the preservation of at least some part of that income through various forms of savings. After basic savings goals have been met, the income producer next seeks opportunities to invest a part of the earnings. The return on these investments, securities, real estate, etc. offer the investor, under ideal circumstances, an opportunity to increase his or her wealth. Wealth can be translated into security against the perfidy of future unknown events. It can also be used for, and commonly is, a source of protection for loved ones: wives, husbands, children, and even grandchildren.

However, as we are all aware, the production of income and the accumulation of wealth also exacts a reduction of both through various tax mechanisms. The basic philosophy behind a tax schedule involves the redistribution of wealth. Tax revenues also provide services for the common use and benefit of all citizens. Donations to qualified non-profit institutions can be viewed as a form of self-regulated taxation. In many instances the money used for a worth-while donation would be taken by the tax process were it not donated. In fact, the very desirable goal of passing assets from one generation on to the next or to the one beyond almost

always involves the payment of taxes.

Many alumni are concerned that a gift to the College from their estate will act to reduce the effect or the size of their gifts to family and loved ones. Actually, at least a portion of the latter gift will be consumed by the taxing mechanism and the alumnus has no control over how the money deducted by various state and local taxing authorities will be spent.

On the other hand, those gifts made to Dickinson College can be specified should that be the donor's wish. A trust created during the donor's lifetime or a bequest made from a donor's estate can be used to endow certain vital activities at the College, either totally or partially

and in perpetuity. In short, a gift to Dickinson is not an either-or proposition, the College or the family.

The estate plan strategy urged here is one that will allow a generous provision for survivors along with a gift to Dickinson College. The gift to the College will have the effect of reducing the size of the gross estate but what is important to consider from a purely tax point of view is that the gift can reduce the overall rate of taxation on the remaining estate. This effect is heightened if the gift is made during the donor's lifetime. Such an inter vivos gift ordinarily will generate an income tax deduction in addition to an estate tax reduction and. if a charitable trust is employed (a pooled income fund, an annuity trust, or unitrust), a scheduled payment of income can also be realized.

The Tax Reform Act of 1969 can be looked upon as a motivation to donors to make gifts to those institutions that they deem to be worthwhile, whose work or service they want to continue. 1948 — The Alumni Office was recently notified of the death of JOHN W. M. ALMONEY, Delta PA, on June 18, 1976.


1960 — DAVID GRAHAM, Abington PA, was killed when his car collided with a truck near Chestertown MD on June 24. He was 38 years of age. He
