Dear Sir,

I have just received your kind letter of the 30th ultimo, inclosing, for my perusal, the letter of President Tyler to Govr. Branch. I thank you kindly, and have read this letter with much pleasure. I have confidence that Mr. Tyler will endeavour to carry out his republican and state right principles, - he has an arduous task and it will require all his firmness to do this. It behoves him to meet <u>now</u> the arrogant pretensions of great Britain at the threshold, and meet her with a firm front on the creole case, assuring her that indemnity must be promptly made, and the murderers restored for trial to the united States - that our national rights we are determined to protect and maintain at all hazzards - our motto, we ask nothing but what is sheerly right, and permit nothing that is wrong.

I return you Mr. Tyler's letter and when you write to Governor Branch pleas convay to him & family my kind salutations & believe me to be very respectfully, yr mo, obdt. servant
