You may therefore expect us on Tuesday morning unless the night should be too inclement for the voyage. The loss of dear little Lizzie & the fears for Susanna have utterly overcome my poor wife and you can hardly imagine what a wreck it has made of her. I think she would have fallen while the letter which brought the sad intelligence was reading if she had not been supporting herself by grasping the bed post . She is I trust better today & I hope will continue to improve under the more cheering account in our letter of today. She desires to give her fondest love to you both & to the children, more if possible more dear to us than ever - and she desires me to say that she would write herself if her disabled hand would permit her - we all unite in most affectionate love to you and dear Anne & the children - may God comfort & preserve you -
