I would thank you, if, amongst  
the other obligations, I am under to you  
you could procure for me the secret mi-  
nutes of the convention, which framed  
the U. S. constitution, and printed by a  
resolution of Congress, which I am inter-  
ested to, as being a member of the congress  
that passed said resolution, and if you  
can procure, to deliver them, to the bearer  
Mr. Childs, who is from this place &  
will carry them for me, if practicable

I and family are all well and  
hope to hear of you & yours being all in  
health. I expect to be in your place this  
winter yet. The Presidential question is  
considerably agitated here. Gen. Jackson  
is the most prominent candidate. I will  
write you more fully on the subject shortly  
accept the assurance of best wishes for the  
welfare of yourself & family. whilst I don't  
scathe myself. your respected friend -
