

New Chapel Ready For Services

The recently renovated Durbin Oratory will be ready for full operation this September. The chapel, which was completely redone during the past 18 months in cooperation with the Hillel Council, is used for Friday night Sabbath services and this year will be used for the High Holydays.

The chapel, which seats 75 persons is decorated in the college's colors, red and white, includes wall-to-wall red carpeting. It houses the holy scriptures as well as a set of Sabbath and holiday prayer books and 200 volumes for the High Holydays and other religious articles.

The cost of the renovation was about \$17,000, most of which came from donations from the parents of Dickinson students.



The new chapel which seats 75 persons is used for Sabbath services each week and on holidays. Among other items the chapel houses a Torah used for religious services as well as other religious articles and prayer books.

The Meaning of Hillel Council

The Hillel Council is a religious organization representing the Jewish students on the college campus, a group that numbers some 200 or 14% of the student body. The Council works vigorously to try to

bring more of the Jewish life, in both academics and culture, to the students.

Solely run by students, this organization conducts weekly Friday evening services. In cooperation with the Chaplain of the college, other religious and cultural functions are held throughout the year.

High Holyday Services are conducted by the Hillel Council and a guest Rabbi and represents the first big event of the year. Following this the organization sponsors bagels and lox brunches, a chanuka party, a huge Passover Seder and strictly Kosher meals for the entire eight days of Passover, a Jewish-Christian dialogue weekend, guest speakers as well as many other exciting events.

This year, through the efforts of the Hillel Council, the Chaplain, and the department of Religion, a Hebrew scholar, Ned Rosenbaum, will be on campus and will be teaching courses on the Scriptures and the Hebrew language.

High Holyday services will be sponsored by the Hillel Council on the eve of Sept. 30, Oct. 1 and 2, and the eve of Oct. 9 and 10, 1970.

Guest rabbi, Harlan Wechsler of New York, a graduate of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, will conduct Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur services together with members of the Hillel Council.

The services will be held in Old West at Dickinson. There is no charge for tickets. All are invited to attend.

The Seder, attended by some 175 persons, was conducted by Professor Neil Wolf, Hillel Advisor, and Mel Narol, president, as well as other officers and members of the organization. After the reading of the first part of the Hagadah, the story of Passover, a full course dinner, complete with all the traditional trimmings, and prepared by the college food service, was served. Many residents of Carlisle and surrounding communities aided in the prepara-

For the entire eight days of Passover, strictly Kosher meals were provided by the food service under the direction of Mr. Carl Staszyn.
