My dear Sir /

I have received your letter of the 19th Instant & would most gladly serve your son in the manner which you indicate, if this were in my power. The President has no power to appoint a Notary Public in California or to make any other civil appointments in that territory; & I very much fear that Congress will adjourn without establishing a territorial Government there. For this we are indebted to the Wilmot proviso & the free soil agitation.
