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Title: Letter from James Buchanan to J.C. Plumer

Date: August 26, 1841

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Senate Chamber

Washington 26 August 1841.

My dear Sir,

I have just received your kind letter of the 21st Instant. I am gratified to learn that you approve my public conduct & I hope that I may continue to merit your esteem.

The House have passed another Bank Bill. The being which it proposes to create is called "the Fiscal Corporation of the United States". It will meet the same fate at the hands of John Tyler as its predecessor. We shall shew it off in its naked deformity before it passes the Senate. The ancient proverb that "whom the Gods wish to destroy they first make mad" is being verified by the Whig party. Unless I am greatly mistaken they are rushing to their own destruction at full gallop. They have never yet possessed power without abusing it. - I think we shall adjourn about Monday week.

My information from all parts of the State, with the single exception of Mercer County, is favorable to Governor Porter. His success by a handsome majority would seal the fate of the Whig party in the Union.
