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

Last issue, we shared with a letter by a Christian who basically damned all gays and lesbian to the underworld. I said at that time that I partly understood his sentiments if that was what he was taught in his youth and that religious tenets, being very powerful, are very difficult to shake.

Shortly after this issue went to press, I went to my favorite watering hole to relieve the pressures of a hard day at the cross-roads desk. I ended up in a discussion with someone I have known for the past three years who admired the work that I've done in the gay community. This was fine as he once again repeated his appreciation, but then the conversation soured. Maybe it was the alcohol. Maybe it was the holiday season. Actually, it was really neither because the discussion turned to the subject of race.

For those of you who do not know, the publisher of crossroads is an African American and has been for some time. I say this partly in jest because this same individual who lauded accolades upon me has done so over the past for years, but at times would say that he did not like blacks. I overlooked this in the past, but this evening I could not.

I don't know if it was the fact that *crossroads* was in the bar and that we were using the bulletin board to advertise this publication (for which we received permission). he raised the issue and I immediately said that he could do the same with his business, but he chose not to.

I preceded to show the person next to me a copy of the October/November Coming Issue which had wonderful artwork courtesy of Harry Long. My other friend saw the cover and proceeded to attack it because he thought the faces were representatives of the African American race. I told him they weren't and ended the conversation (of course, after the bartender asked us to keep it down twice).

Though I believe racism is learned, I do not believe that there is an excuse for it. There are many more people of different races who are obviously making contributions to this country and for that matter, the world. Religious intolerance is one thing, Overt racism is another. I suppose should be happy that he didn't hide his feelings toward me and my people. I hope that he, and those like him, understand that it is the person beneath the skin that makes the whole person. Gee, isn't that what we as gay men, lesbian women and transgendered individuals keep telling the rest of the world?

Though I forgave our writer for his thoughts in our last issue, I cannot forgive this individual's blind ignorance. The gay community has enough to worry about without its minorities having to deal with bigotry from its fellow gay minority members. You who share similar views should wise up if we're ever to be a community.

Hitting A Responsive Chord

I would like to respond to "Grabbing The Rainbow" (Dec./Jan. 1996 issue). You raise an excellent point in this column. As a survivor of multiple sexual abuse, I speak from experience. Upon hearing my history, I'm sure that there are those who would say, "No wonder you're a lesbian!" There was a time when I was younger that even I questioned it. This is the conclusion that I have come to after years of studying my self.

There was a time during my recovery from trauma when I hated and feared men in general. Loving women began long before that period of my life. The straight world (and we too, sometimes) see the fear and hatred of abusers of the opposite gender as the same thing as loving these of the same gender as oneself. This is simply not the case. Although hating men and loving women can exist side by side in the heart, they are not one and the same thing. Hating men was the "phase" that I was going through at the time. I outgrew it. I no longer hate them because I no longer fear them. Now I have male friends, both straight and gay, who are very dear to me, and I am a richer person for having them in my life. In fact, all of the relationships in my life are better for having gotten rid of the burden of such destructive feelings.

So, for all of you out there who are still stuck in that space, it took me many years to get to where I am today, and maybe these suggestions can help. Maybe you won't have to wait so long to feel free:

- 1. Get Help! There are many good therapists out there who can and will help you work through this. Trust your guts when choosing one. If you're not comfortable with one, keep looking.
- 2. Instead of trying to block the memories, remember them, but try to see how they influence your life today. If the sexuality/abuse question bothers you, ask yourself some questions, such as, do I really hate all people of the abusers' gender? Or is it age-specific, or those of a certain appearance, etc.? Do babies and young children of the abusers gender bother you? How about old people? Chances are that if you can relate your negative feelings to specifics about the memories, you will see that it has nothing to do with your orientation, although it may affect your choices in partners.
- 3. Take responsibility for today. This one may be hard to accept, but the plain

truth is that your abuser(s) is responsible for the acts that they committed against us, and we are responsible for healing the damage. I know that it seems terribly unfair, I used to think that if "they" caused the damage, then somehow "they" should be the key to fixing me. I was caught in that space, waiting for someone else to take care of me for a very long time. It may not seem right, but we do have to take care of this ourselves. Rarely will an abuse ever have the courage to say the magic words, "I'm sorry."

4. Last, but not least, and maybe the most difficult of all, try to have compassion for the abuser(s) in your past. To have done such things to us means that they must be truly tortured people inside. Realize that the feelings of fear and hatred are destroying us, not them, and we have suffered enough. What works for me is being grateful that I don't have to spend even five seconds inside my abusers heads. It must be terrible in there.

Freedom and living without the agony of memories on a daily basis can be bought for a price. The price is the willingness to take a giant risk to change what the abuse has made us, to take a look at ourselves and see who it is we want to be, and to become that without letting the memories stop us anymore, and to stop punishing those who just happen to remind us of those we so desperately want to forget. We need to put the blame where it belongs, and too often it gets spread around to include people we don't even know!! It has taken years for me to get to this point, but I am glad I got here!! I wish you all well.

On October 13th Natalie Darkes, Bobbi Carmitchell, Renee Bartholomew and the group Harmonic Convergence performed before a packed house. The event was a memorial for former D-GEM bartender Guy Zearfoss. Angela Byrd, local songwriter/poet, read her poetry and (which was received by a standing ovation) while Harrisburg's *ladies* of the moment Glenda, Kelly Green and Mystery put on a stellar performance.

Event coordinator Emjay Fabiankovitz said she was amazed at the amount of money raised during the three hour show. "This shows you what the women's community can do when we get motivated," said the former owner of Cafe Emjay and former employer of Zearfoss. "When women get together, we speak loudly."

The event, attended by Guy's parents, sisters and brothers, and held in Harrisburg's Paper Moon Restaurant, raised \$2,270; \$2,070 of which will go to the Harrisburg AIDS Residence Task Force, to be matched 50 cents on the dollar for a total of \$3,105 to be given to the up and coming AIDS hospice. The remainder was donated to Gettysburg's Lutheran Home Care Services for the loving and attentive care they provided Guy during his final days at home. The donations were facilitated by Lily White & Company, Inc. and its Lily White Patient Relief Fund, which raises and dispenses funds to AIDS support organizations and gay and lesbian groups.

Organizer's are already gearing up for a bigger and better FAB '97. crossroads salutes all those involved in pulling off a spectacular night and looks forward to a more successful event later this year.

I am proud to be here with so many courageous resisters of intolerance and with so many of my brothers and sisters proclaiming their pride in their full humanity and embracing the human right to love whom we choose.

I am honored to celebrate with you tonight, for we are winning the struggle for human rights. I am honored to be among so many heroes who work to eliminate intolerance and so many vibrant folks who walk the talk of compassion, justice, integrity, and human freedom.

My friends, we are brave warriors and courageous heroes. I share with you the struggles, the anxieties and the moments of loss of courage. But, like you, I keep on trying and I keep on confronting the evils. For courage is simply doing what you know to be right, even when what you really want to do is run away.

I share a hero's journey with you. Heroes discover their true selves. For all of us, accepting ourselves, loving ourselves is a heroes path. A heroes path is accepting our orientation, discovering that we can like ourselves, coming out which means confronting death in life because we have all learned that to be fully who we are means to live.

Every time we choose to celebrate our lives as gay men and lesbians, as bisexual and transgendered people, we slay a dragon---the dragon of hate which we have not let extinguish our lives and our spirits. Each time we celebrate the full joy of our lives, we change each other and the world. What you do here tonight is one more step for a community of courageous heroes.

We are heroes because we have taken risks instead of staying trapped in the prison of prescribed social roles and compulsory heterosexuality. And we have learned that if we don't take those risks all we feel is an emptiness inside.

Each day we move deeper into our integrity because we are human beings who will not give up the human right to intimate and fulfilling relationships.

Many times over, Will and I were offered solutions that demanded we compromise our integrity. We've been asked to deny our love; to claim that we are cell-bate friends; to live lies.

Now don't let anybody tell you that coming out is about flaunting your sexuality. To state honestly and clearly who one is and who one loves in not to flaunt one's sexuality but rather to be faithful to one's integrity, to choose freedom over oppression, to claim life in the midst of death.

As a community we have learned the lessons life offers us. We have been brave warriors because we have used our strong wills and imagined a better world for ourselves and others. We have come to trust our judgment about what is harmful to us and others.

We have gained the courage to fight for what we believe in at great risk---loss of job, friends, family, social regard and even our lives. We have seen the injustice, we have called it by name, and by God we will eliminate it or make it illegal.

You are heroes because you have endured life's trials and tribulations. But we only endure our hardships, we maintain our love for life, our courage and our capacity to care for others.

No matter how much suffering we experience (and

there is plenty) unlike many of our straight sisters and brothers who deliberately hand us suffering and claim we deserve it, we do not pass suffering along.

No, we are better human beings than that. We absorb suffering and declare---suffering stops here. That is heroism my friends.

This sacrifice, instead of maiming us, transforms us into brave and courageous people. The hatemongers want to maim us---they hope they can suffocate the capacity for love, intimacy and joy in ourselves.

But they will not. For in our sacrifices for a better world, we keep getting more and more alive---more and more courageous. Their strategy is failing.

Yes, we are courageous men and women. We have loved well in the face of brutality and tyranny. We have danced and laughed in the face of the evil unleashed against us.

In response to AIDS we have been compassionate, strong and ferocious caregivers. We have helped each other live and die with dignity.

In the struggle for human rights we have been dignified, wise and crafty in our politics. And we forged creative unions of our straight advocates who also seek justice for all.

Our drive toward life has been inexhaustible, we have bouyed ourselves with a wondrous sense of humor and gayety about life.

So let us continue to be uppity queers with ideas, hopes and policies for justice that are pushy, brave and visionary. A vision for a time when no one government, country, gender, creed, nationality, color, or religion will dominate another through exclusion from civil rights or violence.

We have the opportunity to be the heroes and teachers in a morally flaccid society which seems too lazy to do the hard work of discerning integrity and building communities amidst diversity.

Sawyer Armstrong is eight years old and she and her family attend St. George's Church. Some months ago Sawyer gave this prayer crayoned on red construction paper and stapled together. She is our hope for the future. Her prayer was:

Will has his right to love Barry.

And Barry has his right to love Will.

And what does that have to do with Barry being a priest?

I feel sad for you guys.

God bless Barry.

And God bless Will.

What do you say? "Sawyer for President!" "Sawyer for Pope!"

We will dance and celebrate tonight in hope for the future. For we have much to celebrate in each other's lives. We are helping shape a world where the right to love whom we love is a guaranteed human right. And we along with Sawyer and her family and other families like them will help us make it so.





"Why not place a fishbowl in the main room and the people will see it and place their donations within." said one of the members. "What a wonderful suggestion!," they all cried.



The night of the party came fairly quickly and the group was excited for they had informed all their friends and past supporters of the importance of the message they felt they had to share with the rest of the populace.

And the people came to the party and it was a festive affair. Trays of cookies and veggies were emptied and while the punch, soda and beer flowed throughout the evening. And what of the fishbowl. Ah, yes the fishbowl. Well my friends, the amount of money in the bowl grew, and grew, and grew, until over \$800 was raised to support the placing of a message alongside the northbound route of Interstate 83.

And it was for all the world to see. And the message, well it was a universal one; one that every man and woman could relate to: "A Christmas Wish...Don't Drink & Drive!" And it was signed "Gays & Lesbians of Greater York."

alentine's Day and romance to some mean lace, roses and chocolate to many. To a great deal of others, however, it can constitute the primal smell of leather, bondage and discipline.

According to many psychologists, everyone has certain fetishes which Webster's Dictionary defines as 1. a material, commonly an inanimate object regarded with awe as being the embodiment or habitation of a potent spirit. 2. any object of blind reverence.

The use of leathersex is practiced all over the globe and in every sexual orientation although this article focuses its attention on the homosexual experience. In the same respect, though there are countless clubs throughout the world that cater to the leather scene, our focus is on one in particular;

The Pennsmen of Harrisburg.

Bob Fellman, President of The Pennsmen, has this to say in regards to the club, "The Pennsmen are what we consider a Leather-Levi club. Many larger cities have clubs devoted to one specific aspect of leather: S/M. We incorporate several aspects without being limited to just one. Loosely defined the Leather-Levi community includes individuals interested in clubs centered around motorcycles, uniform, country western, (and) bears as well as leathersex.

"I like to think of The Pennsmen as a gay VFW. Many of our social events are an excuse to drink beer with a bunch of buddies and exchange war stories of conquests new and old. We are not a sex club in the way that many clubs functioned 20 years ago. However, we are not in any way puritanical. An individual can always find what he wants, especially through interaction with another club. By being in the leather scene it is easier to find your way around other cities when visiting."

For Bob Deibler, secretary of The Pennsmen, leather represents an image---an image of masculinity and strength. "I am quite aware that an outward appearance often does not reveal the real being, but leather is arousing." Deibler would also like The Pennsmen to be recognized as simply another aspect of the gay community. "That which makes us unique is that we wear leather. However, we are tolerant of all other lifestyles and expect

the same respect. I hope to shed the presumed image that we are only a sex club."

One may ask, "What about rules? How can you tell who is the top and who is the bottom?" According to the *Leatherman's Handbook* by Larry Townsend, the code basically goes as follows---Anything worn to the left of the body e.g., keys on a chain hanging from the left front pocket designates a top. The same follows for piercings or the wearing of the color-coded hanky scheme in the rear pockets. For example, a black hanky worn to the left designates a top into S/M (sadomasochism) looking for a willing bottom

to receive. Wearing the same black hanky in the right pocket designates a bottom looking to receive S/M from a willing top. (For more information on the codes, see the chart below).

Before diving head first into the world of leathersex you may want to check out the book "Leathersex" by Joseph W. Bean, where the entire world of leathersex is encapsulated for the willing but inexperienced leathersex novice.

And what about all this presumed talk about tops and bottoms? Surely you find as many answers as there are people to ask; it can be very personal. According to Fellman, "Tops and bottoms should have full experience on both sides. This helps to set limits and know what works. There are certain rules that must be established during cruising. After all, a bad experience can be had by both partners. A novice must trust the person he is with. This is not an area to be fully explored from a mere pick-up."

According to Deibler, "The best tops are usually experienced bottoms to some extent; however, in a scene, a good top knows that the bottom is really in control. Any experienced leatherman knows what he is getting himself into before the scene actually takes place. A top is no better than the bottom he is with and vice versa." An anonymous voice added, "A true top is looking for the top that will make him a bottom but playing the game is half the fun. Secretly, I am looking for the top who will bottom me out!"

The Pennsmen offer and sponsor new members at their monthly meetings which take place at their home bar every second Sunday at The Neptune Lounge located 268 North Street in Harrisburg. To be considered a prospective member one must attend two consecutive meetings before offering oneself as a pledge. The members then decide by majority vote. If accepted the prospective pledge runs errands for the club and brothers, as well as bartend-

ing and setting up the events the club holds monthly at various bars throughout the Central PA region. Proceeds from these events benefits, "Brothers with AIDS", a non-profit organization that helps AIDS patients with their medical expenses.

For a closer look at The Pennsmen, you can attend the annual run that will be held at the Radisson Hotel in Camp Hill February 21-23. The cost is \$125.00 per person and includes double occupancy room, admission to *The Mr. Harrisburg Contest* (held on February 22nd where the hottest leathermen in the area compete for the title) and all party events and buffets.

Philadelphia's Grand Madam Of Leather

Due to the lack of time before going to press, I had only a short talk with this more than sensational woman. Her history is nothing short of spectacular and this short essay does not do her justice. Therefore, look for an in-depth interview from this magical historian in the months to come.

Leather '96. Viola Johnson, her partner of 23 years, has earned such titles as the Lifetime Achievement Award from Pantheon and the Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Leather Association both in 1995.

Carter has been into leather for 24 years and is part of what is known as the "Old Guard" (the first generation of leather persons). At that time there were no code books, no educational videos on bondage and there were only four hanky color codes.

e learned only what we knew from each other. There were definite unwritten laws and rules of ethics from the first generation of leather. It was taught hand's on and was perfected into an art form where safety was foremost stressed.

"During a scene in such clubs as Hellfire you respected one another as well as having utmost respect for one's property such as slaves. During the scenes no one dare talk or laugh. Strict attention was given in hopes that one would also learn from the players involved. If this respect was broken, the humiliation received was so unbearable that the person exiled himself due to the embarrassment and was not seen again. In the same manner SAFETY was treated. If you were unsafe in a scene you were immediately told about it. If you were smart you learned and listened, if you were not, exile was imminent.

"There were no dungeon masters; we policed ourselves. Again safety was adhered to, to avoid injury or death, and a scene was stopped immediately to avoid sloppy mishaps. You were shown with much care how to discipline a slave

or a willing submissive. It was these things that we loved and we needed to know without a doubt how to treat anyone with the love that we had for one another. In learning this way you earned your reputation by honor, the truth of your word, pride, integrity, and showmanship.

"But as the years progressed S/M became more fashionable and more tourists began showing at the clubs. These tourists, as we called them, were rude and resulted in a disintegration of the unity which in turn caused the Old Guard to retreat from the clubs and sponsor private parties where only the New Guard (the next generation of leather persons) could be invited by a member of the Old Guard. But now we, the Old Guard, are needed and are resurfacing to educate the next generation about safety and the true love of the art form. Our knowledge and respect for the safety and preservation of the art form that which is S/M will be treasured for and by many generations of New Guards." X

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Sarah Humble

Baltimore's First Lady of Leather

She was clear, concise and to the point. Her tone assertive, strong, but not what many would consider overbearingly butch. That, after all, is the impression that I have been left with many a time in the leather days of my past.

Sarah Humble is a lady of the first magnitude who knows what she wants and who proceeds to acquire it... within reason, of course. As the Leather Editor of the Baltimore Gay Paper, Humble examines with an acute eye all that makes leather fun and provocative. In a world that views leather the sole property of men both gay and straight, Humble knows the woman's perspective first hand.

What are your titles past and present?

Ms. Baltimore Eagle 1994-95; the first American Leather Woman 1994-95 and presently 1996 Pantheon of Leather and Leather Journal's Woman of the Year. I am also the editor of the Leather Link column for the *Baltimore Gay Paper*.

Do you receive any negative publicity from leathermen being the female editor of the B.G.P.?

No. The men love it.

How long have you been into the leatherscene?

I have been out and very public about leather and S/M since 1990.

What does leather mean to you?

About leather itself, leather is one of my fetishes. Leather to me, however, is much more than that. Leather is a community; a movement. It's about the state of mind of that person. But leather just touches the iceberg for me about what type of things that I do; sexually, that have to do with S/M. Leather is only the tip of the iceberg.

What is a lesbian leatherdyke vs. a dominatrix?

Dominatrix is solely thought of as a paid professional. Leatherdyke is widely used among the S/M community. Most of the time dyke connotates a sexual preference; but the term is also used among bisexual and heterosexual woman into the leathersex scene.

Then does leather commonly have sexual connotations?

To me? Oh, ABSOLUTELY! But again, leather means many things to me on a sexual level.

What codes exist among the lesbian leatherscene?

The same codes that exist for men exist for woman. For example the terms of top and bottom applies to the submissive and dominant in a scene. Women also use the same hanky codes as the men. What is different is that for those women that are into leather there is a much more sexual S/M connotation. The women into a scene are much more into flogging and spanking, collars and gags than are the men. I know that when I am cruising and setting boundaries I am looking for a particular scene.

Beforehand I am looking at their pockets and seeing if their color code matches the scene I have in mind.

Are there any groups exclusively for leather woman?

Yes, in Baltimore there is an organization called F.I.S.T. which stands for females investigating sexual terrain. It was founded in 1993 and has monthly educational meetings and socials. For instance, this month's meeting is the "Joy of Duct Tape." The group is also open to all woman regardless of sexual orientation. There is also a contest coming up in March to compete for the title of "Ms. Gulf Coast Leather," for more information you can write to Texas Leather Productions, P.O. Box 667072, Houston, TX. X

Love & Romance

The mystery of love is celebrated all over the world in every tradition or culture. There are lotions, potions, aphrodisiacs, perfumes, food, drink and even magic spells. If you think your love life needs a boost, then perhaps there is something here to inspire your lover to new heights of passion. This can be done in some highly creative ways.

Chocolate is considered an aphrodisiac, as it contains a pleasure producing chemical called phenyethylamine. This same stimulant is produced by the brain when a person falls in love or has sexual contact. During the Spanish Inquisition women were prosecuted for drinking it because it demonstrated they were consorting with the devil himself.

The French think that artichokes are the *nourriture d'amour* (food of love) when delicately prepared and served in the appropriate atmosphere. The flesh colored leaves are said to represent the flower of womanhood. The French and others also prized truffles as an aphrodisiac. The famous lover Cassanova was said to have used this edible fungus as a sure way to elicit love and passion. The insatiable Cassanova also loved oysters and was reported to have eaten fifty in one sitting for breakfast. In ancient Rome, oysters were thought to make young people uncontrollably lustful.

The Greeks were reputed to value a number of things as aphrodisiacs, including liver, garlic, fish, and grape leaves. No wonder the word aphrodisiac means "foam" or semen". Fish liver was preferable and you may still be able to purchase this extract in some locations.

Arabic and Chinese people have enjoyed asparagus for centuries and are convinced that they have had many lusty encounters after generous helpings of this phallic shaped vegetable. Fresh figs are popular in Arabia for stoking the flames of passion and, when opened, are said to resemble the female genitalia.

In the Orient physicians prescribe ginseng, which can be administered for sexual problems in a variety of ways. It can be used as a dietary supplement in powder or pill form, applied to the body as ointment or oil, or enjoyed as tea. However, the root itself has to be at least seven years old to be properly effective. You can purchase this at any local health food store or, for fun, you could travel to the forests of Manchuria or to the mountainous glens of Korea to obtain your supply. Ginseng definitely boosts your energy level.

The Mandrake, (another root is called *Dudain* in Hebrew), translates into the *pleasure of love*. The root is said to resemble the lower half of a man's body and is mentioned in the Old Testament. This root can be purchased from a herbalist, but must be used very carefully, as large amounts have unpleasant side effects.

Absinthe, a pale green liqueur made from wormwood, has been recognized for powerful aphrodisiac effects since the 1700's. It was the favorite of poets and artists Gauguin, Picasso and Verlaine. In very small amounts, the chemical thujone found within is a powerful nerve and brain stimulant that triggers sexual desire.

This chemical is highly toxic in large doses and may cause death. In the past it has been used successfully without causing death, but you must know what you are doing. More is not necessarily better, and a little good quality white wine might work almost as well. White wine

was thought to excite witches and induce lust.

Southeast Asian and African men and women have used rhinoceros horn powder, preferably from the white rhino. Although this species is endangered and there are current laws to protect them until recently, a million dollars worth of this powder was auctioned off annually. This product is still sold illegally and contains nothing that you couldn't get from a good multi-vitamin.

The Africans also use **yohimbine**—an alkaloid isolated from the bark of the African Yohimbe tree. This is a marketed and approved drug that is purchased for erectile problems in men. The Bantu people often drink this in tea and is reputed to cause erections lasting from two to four hours. Most health food stores sell this as a tincture called yohimbine hydrochloride. This also must be used sparingly for the proper results.

Ambergris is a secretion from the sperm whale that has been used for centuries. It is still used today in rare and expensive perfumes. Most perfume manufacturers use synthetic substitutes, but the real thing is still available. It is recommended that if you purchase some powdered ambergris, and mix it with a finely crushed pearl, you will have what the French all *poudre de joie* (joy powder). The lovers both partake of this in tea with honey or champagne. This is still used today, but it is very expensive.

There is also **musk oil** to be used in strategic areas (I'll let your imagination take over here). Musk is a substance secreted by an Asian deer used in perfumery. They have synthetics, but I think you need the real thing for it to be effective. The musk oil can now be gathered without killing the deer, so using the genuine musk is not as morally objectionable as in the past.

The real Spanish Fly cannot be purchased legally in the United

States. You will see namesakes in the novelty section of your local love shop, but no cigar.


but I must tell you that I got back much more than I ever gave. Harrisburg is rich with organizations and people who work diligently to weave thousands of invisible threads.



If a bomb drops on this theatre tonight, the only people left in show business would be Bob Hope and Katherine Hepburn." That's what went through my mind as I stood in the biting cold outside of New York City's Zeigfeld Theatre, in the early evening hours of Sunday, November 10th, 1996, anxiously awaiting the arrival of Barbra Streisand, at the premiere of her new film, *The Mirror Has Two Faces*. The event held special meaning for me: For thirty years I had contented myself with seeing the Streisand image on film, on television, on video, on the pages of *Just Like Buttah*, staring back at me like a pseudo-modern-day-Mona Lisa from the posters and photos that decorated the walls of my home, and, to quote Doris Wilgus from *The Owl and The Pussycat*, gracing "the pages of many leading magazines and newspapers". No

longer content with graven images of my idol, and having felt the frustration of having missed other opportunities to see Barbra in person i.e., her celebrated concert tour, I jumped at the chance to see her in the flesh, after having read in the papers that not only would Streisand be attending this premiere, but would be escorted by none other that her new amour, actor James Brolin. Being an actor myself, I had actually worked with Brolin some eighteen years before, on the film, Night of the Juggler. Working on the set of movies with celebrities gives them a special place in my memory, and Brolin's new romantic association with my Barbra elevated him to new Olympian heights in my psyche.

Since New York City is practically around the corner from my home in Philadelphia, and having just recently outfitted my old Mitsubishi Mirage with a set of new tires and a rebuilt transmission, the pragmatic side of my brain told me to go for it! It's now or never!

With just a small amount of detective work, it was easy to find out where and when. Along with my trusted side-kick, South-African-born, star-struck-friend Linda Egnos in the passenger seat, and with a heavily-debted credit card in my back pocket and my Vivitar auto-focus camera on the back seat, I was off to the city that never sleeps to pay homage to my deity.

Excited anticipation gripped us both as we trekked up the New Jersey
Turnpike. We sated our appetites for
Barbra by continuously playing the new
Streisand/Bryan Adams duet, I Finally
Found Someone, purchased just the day
before on cassette tape for \$.99 at the

local Tower Records store. Backed with the Spanish language version of *Evergreen*, I explained to my friend how we *Just Like Buttah* readers had bombarded Barbra's record label with postcards, pleading for them to release what we knew had been recorded some 20 years previously. What a treat that it's finally happened and, we both agree, well worth the wait!

Exiting the Turnpike, the highway blends into the circular ramp leading to the Lincoln Tunnel. As the skyline of the city comes into view, Linda and I agree that we're like Dorothy and Toto, the Turnpike's our yellow brick road, the skyline of New York looks like The Emerald City, closer than ever, and we're off to see the Wizard. Only our Wizard bears a closer resemblance to the good witch, Glenda, from whom we have learned that the possibilities of personal transformation can send the spirit soaring.

And soar we do, through the Lincoln Tunnel and onto the streets of midtown Manhattan. Carbon monoxide stings our noses and the New York sun "spits morning into our faces." The words of Tom Wingo, in *The Prince of Tides*, come to mind: "...this God-awful city. This city that roars down on you...the wall-to-wall noise. There's so much noise in New York...sirens, horns, screaming." As a young man, I had lived here for seven years. Like Luke and Tom Wingo, I hated it. I never became a New Yorker. I'm really a smalltown boy at heart.

We move at a "happy, lucky" snail's pace up Eighth Avenue, dodging the taxis and tourist buses. New Yorker's on bicycles whiz by us. Ratso Rizzo types pound the engine hood of my car yelling, "I'm walkin' here! I'm walkin' here!" At a red light, I politely turn down shabbily dressed men who circle my car and attempt to clean my windshield with a squeegee, in hopes of retrieving a tip from me. Small town boy or not, the lessons learned while living here have not escaped me. Soon after moving to the city, I had learned to stop giving away my token money to every panhandler who hits on me. My New Yorker courage comes back quickly. "Not interested...take a hike", I yell at them through the window. "Aw, common man", one squeegeewielding, window cleaner protests, "I'm tryin' to make an honest living". "Can't help you," I snap back. "Get off my car!"

The light turns green. In front of me, traffic parts and a path opens momentarily. I floor it, race up Eighth Avenue and hang a right onto West 54th Street, smack

into another bottle-necking traffic jam.

Ahead of us, just above and to the left, looms the marque of the Ziegfeld Theatre. The names BARBRA STREISAND...JEFF BRIDGES jump out at me above the bill-board size letters: THE MIRROR HAS TWO FACES. "We're here!", we scream. "We're here!". So near and yet so far, for we are now sitting in traffic, not moving an itch. A limo has stopped in front of my car, at the hotel next to the theater. Everybody in New York moves so fast...everybody but the chauffeur who slowly disembarks and opens the rear doors of the limo to discharge passengers.

I think to myself, "This has got to be a scene straight out of *The Prince of Tides* when Tom Wingo first arrives at Lowenstein's office on East Side Manhattan, his taxi trapped in traffic". I laugh aloud at our predicament and recite the dialogue heard as Tom leaves his taxi and snakes through the traffic and into Lowenstein's office, "C'mon, get dat truck outta here. I'm inna hurry...I gotta doctah's appointment."!

My motion picture flashback dissolves as the limo driver guns his engine and races down 54th Street and out of sight. We crawl past the theatre and salivate at the *Mirror* photos of Barbra and cast displayed in marquee jewel boxes in front of the theatre. Police barricades are already in place around the theatre and across the street. A small group of press people are gathered together in a small herd, already staking out territory and jockeying for the best place to stand in hopes of producing the best photos possible of the arrival of ...SHE!

I tell my friend how I knew my intuition was right...that the premiere would be held at the Ziegfeld. Only fitting, as *The Prince of Tides* played here as well as *Yentl*. In 1983, only months after I moved back to Philadelphia, I took an early train to New York and was one of the first Barbra worshippers in line to see the first public showing of *Yentl*. We were all strangers, shivering together in the early morning November cold, holding our brand new copies of *Life* magazine that had just hit the newsstands that morning with a fabulous portrait of our girl on it.

By the time the 11:00 a.m. showing began, ten of us were now old friends, sitting together in this temple of Barbralatria, passing a roll of paper towels among us to blow our noses and wipe the tears away as Yentl sings *Papa Can You Hear Me?*. I suspected then that this song would always have personal meaning for

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me. I was right. Eleven years later, when my father died, I left my mother's house of shiva and returned to my apartment to light my father's memorial candle. I cued up the CD player and at the stroke of midnight, I stood in the dark and struck a match. As Barbra's first tremulous notes of *Papa Can You Hear Me?* filled the room, I lit my father's memorial candle. This song was my prayer to my dead father and would remain so to this day.

Luck is with us as I spot a car pulling out of a space at the curb just a block away from the theatre. I quickly pull in, grab my camera and we race back to the theatre.

Having never been a geeky fan-type before, this is a day for geeky fan-type behavior and I play the role to the hilt. We snap photos of each other standing before the jewel marquee boxes in front of the theatre. At the ticket booth, I question the ticket-taker about the premiere. "Invitation only", she tells us. "Barbra will be here. Everything should start at seven, so be back here at six". I check my watch...3 p.m. A couple of hours to kill. We decide to have lunch around the corner at the Carnegie Deli.

Fortified by red meat and several cups of coffee, we pay the tab and scurry back to the Ziegfeld. It is now 5:45 p.m. and a crowd has already begun to form. We spot a red carpet being rolled out and positioned to where the curb meets the street. "Let's stand here", I say to my friend. "We'll be able to see her get out of the limo". "Can't stand there," says a worker securing the carpet to the cold cement sidewalk. "The Police will tell you to move." "Where's the best place to



stand?", I ask. He points across the street to tourist buses lined-up on mass at the curb in front of the Hilton Hotel. "If those buses move, that would be the best seat in town," he politely replies. "Until then, you have to go behind the barricades around the corner. Go through the garage next to the theatre. Go out to 55th Street and walk back through the concourse that borders the theatre. You'll see the barricades."

"Thanks!", I yell over my shoulder as we run past the theatre, through the garage, out onto 55th Street, through the concourse, past Circa's Cafe and up to the blue police barricades that severe the concourse wind tunnel into thirds. I quickly size up the situation. We're about fortyfive feet from the red carpet; too far to get a decent snapshot. Facing us, like soldiers squaring off on a battlefield are television film crews from Entertainment Tonight, The E Entertainment Channel, CNN, and various television affiliates. Behind them, across the street, the tourist buses are moving and being replaced with locomotive-sized klieg lights. To the left...the worst place to be standing,...too far from the theatre, I decide. We'd see nothing. To the right, the theatre itself, with one large picture window looking in onto the Press, who have positioned themselves at the stairs for a solid photo opportunity. Inside, at the far wall, an escalator up to the theatre. By the picture window, a staircase.

We position ourselves solidly at the blue wooden police barricade. "Can't stand there," a silver-haired woman says brusquely. "My friends will be right where you're standing. They just ran into Circa for some coffee. These are our spots." "You must be a New Yorker," I dryly say to her. "Philly." she replies. "No kidding," I exclaim. "We're from Philly, too." "How do you like this?", I say to my friend..."Luntsmen!" Her friends return and we all introduce ourselves and kill the time telling each other our stories of how Barbra has touched our lives, and of how we knew that this pilgrimage to pay homage to our deity would be a chance of a lifetime.

More press arrive, more on-lookers, more gawkers. "What's happening here?", ask the innocent, their attention grabbed

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by the lights and the crowd. "BARBRA"!!! we say, incredulously, shocked that New Yorkers don't know what we out-of-towners do. Haven't they heard that that the gates of heaven have opened briefly tonight for a once in a lifetime *mien* of *the* greatest star in all the universe? They'd have a better chance of waiting to see Haley's Comet again, than they would of catching another fleeting glimpse of Streisand at a New York City film premiere.

"Look," I scream, pointing to the theatre entrance. "There's Marty!" "Who's Marty?", my friend asks. "Marty Erlichman!", I explain incredulously. "He's Streisand's manager. He's been

with her since her career began. Without Marty, there might not *be* a Barbra and vice versa. They gave each other a life!" While I fill my friend in on the bio of Marty Erlichman, Marty nervously paces forever on the red carpet at the theatre entrance, cellular phone held up to one ear. It's Marty's movements I decide to watch. I just know that when Marty leaves the theatre entrance and bolts down that carpet, it will because Barbra's arrived.

At 6:30 p.m., we are all momentarily blinded as the television lights go on. We will have to look into them for the remainder of the evening. The first of the invited guests begin to arrive. "Look...who's this?...who's this?", we all whisper. Mirror associates and coworkers, industry people, consequently luminous, albeit to us, anonymous FOB's. Some have brought their teenage children with them. All quiescently parade down the red carpet, past Marty, and into the theatre. Julie Moran from Entertainment Tonight arrives on the red carpet and prominently stations herself in front of her film crew. She's wearing a beautiful, salmon-colored two piece sequined suit. Without a winter coat, and in a short skirt, she spends the next half-hour shivering in the cold to perform her on-camera interviews with the stars for ET.

The gunning roar of an electrical generator fills the air as the klieg lights across the street shoot on and light up the walls of the Hilton Hotel. I see crowds of people have positioned themselves at the windows inside of the Hilton, to look down onto the excitement. Turning the klieg

lights on has turned the night into a glamorously, intoxicating rally. I climb a bench behind me to better see the throng of humanity in front of me. Another fellow climbs up onto a nearby trash can. Linda leaves me and positions herself in front of the theatre's picture window. "You can see better up here.," I scream to her. "You won't be able to see her arrive from there." "But I can see them inside from here," she shouts back, over the din.

The stars begin to arrive, one at a time at first, them in two's and three's. Upon recognition, the crowd screams out their names. First, George Segal. We cheer for him, Segal holding a special place in our collective hearts, as we worshippers recognize him as Barbra's leading man from The Owl and The Pussycat, and now appearing with her again in Mirror. Segal walks the carpet and stops in front of each film crew. He's generous with the time he spends interviewing with each crew, and extremely gracious in his acknowledgement of the fans. When he turns to face the crowds behind the barricades to give us a photo opportunity, we roar with appreciation and snap our cameras furiously. When he turns to enter the theatre, a fan screams, "Wait, George, my flash didn't go off!" Segal leans over the barricade, spreads his arms wide, and humorously yells back, "Where am I goin'?". We laugh with appreciation, the photo is taken and Segal disappears into the theatre, his generosity warming the worshippers, shivering in the cold night air. We love him, and he turns out to be the hit of the evening.

"It's Marvin Hamlish!", someone

screams. We cheer and Hamlish waves to the crowd, stops before the film crews and does a lengthy trek of interviews.

Linda yells to me, "Shane, they've opened the front doors of the theatre. People are entering from there!" I jump from the bench and run to the window, just in time to see Diana Ross and her husband enter the theatre and stand before the press for a photo opportunity. The flash bulbs pop furiously into the Motown Diva's face. She turns and is whisked upward on the escalator. I run back to the bench to retrieve my spot just in time to see Barry Manilow followed by Isabella Rosallini.

Rosallini quickly enters the theatre, but Manilow remains on the carpet to interview and give the fans a photo opportunity. The fans go crazy for Manilow and shouts of "BARRY!...BARRY!" fill the night.

The Nanny's Renee Taylor arrives alone and saunters, dazed-like, down the carpet. She looks lost. I think of her and Fran Dresher on the episode of The Nanny when Fran almost sees Barbra in concert at Madison Square Garden.

RENEE TO FRAN: I loved her first FRAN TO RENEE: I'll love her last I yell out to her, "Renee, where's Joe?" Apparently happy that someone in the crowd knows she's married to actor Joe Bologna, she smiles acknowledgement in my general direction. She really looks lost. Someone walks up to her and leads her to a television film crew.

The film crews suddenly lurch to their right. They're shouting someone's name, but we can't make out who it is. "Who is

it?", we all scream and crane our necks to see who's arriving to our left, just out of sight. It's Lauren Bacall, and seconds later, she appears on the red carpet, looking every inch the Hollywood glamourpuss. her hair, very blond and teased high, looks enormous. "She's beautiful," we all gasp. Bacall spends a great deal of time interviewing with each film crew, braving the cold by pulling her wrap tighter around her.

I recall another time when I had the pleasure of meeting Lauren Bacall. I was playing a male hustler in a Bacall film, titled ironically, The Fan. We were shooting at a pick-up bar on Eighth Avenue. Normally, I would have had lunch with the crew and the extras. However, Bacall and I have a mutual friend. Her hairdresser on The Fan, Jerry Masarone, was my mother's hairdresser in South Philly when I was a little boy. On a lunch break, Jerry, who adored Bacall and vice versa, invited me to join them both at Joe Allen's eatery. He introduced her to me as "Betty", and for the next hour, over spinach salads, I was charmed by "Betty", and listened intently as she lovingly gave me advice on being a young actor in New York. "Be yourself," Betty advised, "but for Christ's sake, find out who the hell you are first! I was a star and didn't find out who the hell I was until after Bogey died, and then I had to learn quick to survive." And who is she now? One hell of a lady, and etched

permanently now in the minds of we worshippers as Streisand's mother in *Mirror*. Sadly, Jerry passed away in 1995 from lung cancer due to AIDS.

"Shane!," Linda screams, "It's Marlo Thomas and Phil Donahue!" Once again, I leap from the bench and run to the picture window just in time to see Thomas and Donahue ascend into the heavens on the escalator. Donahue is tuxed-out. Marlo wears a charcoal grey sequined evening jacket. Her hair is meticulously coiffured and colored a reddish-brown. her face, glamorously made-up. "She's gorgeous!," my friend coos.

Behind me, the crowd roars and I rush back to my perch on the bench just in time to see the arrival of Elle Macpherson. In the bitter cold, Macpherson is truly brave, strutting the red carpet wearing only a black backless, shoulderless, floor length evening gown. Several minutes later, having worked the length of camera crews, someone throws a floor length wrap over Macpherson's shoulders before she interviews with Julie Moran for the Entertainment Tonight cameras. The other film crews turn their collective attention to the arrival of Robin Williams. He briskly walks the length of the red carpet without stopping to chat with the television film crews or acknowledge the fans. We're disappointed!

Macpherson enters the theatre and the

camera crews go crazy as she poses for them in her backless evening dress.

Brenda Vaccaro arrives in some muddy-brown colored evening thing. She chats with all the TV interviewers. However, most are apparently more interested in the arrival of Donna Karen, who Streisand had recently described as being "like a sister." Karen acknowledges no one and quietly enters the theatre. Unfortunately for Vaccaro, she's abandoned by both the film crews and the fans by the luminous arrival of none other than Liza Minnelli.

Film crews and fans alike fill the air with screams of "LIZA!!!...LI-ZA-A-A!" Liza stops mid-carpet and basks in the adulation. Obviously, she loves us as much as we love her. Also, she loves the attention. One fan vocalizes her observation that Liza looks frail and seems to walk with a slight limp, an almost unnoticeable residue from Liza's hip replacement surgery.

A tall, dark-haired man stands in front of me, blocking my view from my benched perch. "Mister, move," I yell. He turns around and I find myself staring into the handsome face of *Hello Dolly's* Ambrose Kemper, hoofer Tommy Tune. "I'm lost," Tune laments. "How do I getin from here?" "Go around," we all behind us opens and a police woman

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Trying To Regain Their Rights

crossroads' contributing writer **Kevin Welsh** reports on the struggle that Lancaster's gay community is waging to return legal protections to their own.

The Lancaster region is a study in dichotomy. On the one hand, there are the Amish, Mennonites, farms and tranquil back roads. On the other hand, there are the outlet malls, burgeoning residential subdivisions, growing industrial might and traffic nightmares along Route 30. And the politics among residents is nowhere more noteworthy than with Lancaster County being one of the most politically conservative regions of the Commonwealth and the City of Lancaster drawing many of the more liberally-minded of the area.

It is this diversity which makes Lancaster so appealing to many; however, it has also created a stir of controversy that has left the City of Lancaster with no means of enforcing its laws protecting gay men and lesbian women from discrimination in the workplace and housing.

The conflict between the City and the County regarding discrimination against gay men and lesbians started in 1991 when, after more than 20 years of cooperation between the two governments, the City and the County both decided to enact their own separate ordinances to protect their respective residents against discrimination. The goal was to formally establish a joint commission to investigate complaints involving discrimination in employment and housing and, if necessary, take legal action to enforce their laws.

The City Council enacted an ordinance which prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, gender, religion, age or

national origin. This was fine with the County, which enacted its own ordinance recognizing these as "protected classes." Something went awry, however, when the City sought in its ordinance to outlaw discrimination on the basis of two other classes, namely sexual preference and marital status. The City included these "protected classes" in response to petitions from several local residents and groups which had provided studies and statistics showing that discrimination on the basis of sexual preference and marital status occurs routinely in the City of Lancaster.

The County, however, refused to include these classes in its ordinance. In response to a backlash of public opposition from conservative groups, the County Commissioners ended the County's relationship with the City and dissolved the joint Human Relations Commission. Without sufficient funding sources to finance and operate its own Human Relations Commission, the City has not been able to enforce its own ordinance since 1991, and the law has lain dormant since that time. Recently, however, in the face of rising complaints regarding the situation, several members of Lancaster City Council have started studying ways to protect the rights of City residents, gay and straight, under its own

"We want to protect all human beings," said Councilman Nelson Polite at a November 13th special meeting of Lancaster City Council's Personnel

Committee. "That's what the ordinance is for. As an African-American, you know I've seen discrimination. I'm 73, and I've seen an awful lot. I can feel for anybody who's been discriminated against."

Polite, who chairs the Personnel Committee, held a special meeting at the City Council Chambers, Southern Market Center, to hear testimony from residents who believe they have been discriminated against and who, due to the disbanding of the City/County joint Commission, have no means of recourse. The meeting was scheduled in response to letters received by Council from persons alleging discrimination within the City proper.

"We want to take the bull by the horns." Polite said.

Because of Lancaster's lack of funds and inability to establish and operate its own Human Relations Commission, Polite explained that he wants to explore other available options, including use of volunteer groups or the City Solicitor to investigate certain complaints. Presently, Lancaster City residents' only recourse is to take their complaints to the County Human Relations Commission. As explained, however, the County refuses to protect residents against discrimination because of sexual preference or marital status.

"This calls for creative thinking and community-based initiative," explained Ollyn Lettman, one of the council members who attended the special meeting.

Andy Spedden was one of several residents to testify at the November 13th meeting. Spedden testified that he lost two jobs because he is gay, one with a retailer at the Park City Mall, the other with the food services section of a City hotel.

He told the three Council members in attendance, including Polite, Lettman and Billie Jo Herr, that he was also discriminated against by Lancaster Newspapers, Inc., which refuses to publish personal ads targeting alternative lifestyles. According to Andrew Park, an attorney with the newly-formed Center for Lesbian and Gay Law and Public Policy, personal ads (such as those in the Lancaster Newspaper, Inc.'s "Meeting Place" section) constitute "public accommodation," and therefore are covered under the City's ordinance prohibiting discrimination therein.

"Some people say that by amending a law, you are endorsing a certain lifestyle," Spedden told the council members. He explained, however, that no one would

accuse Lancaster City Council of "endorsing" any other protected class simply because it extended protection to other minorities on the basis of race, color or religion.

In response to questions from council members, Spedden said that he would like Lancaster to establish a mechanism to enforce its present law prohibiting discrimination on the basis of sexual preference and marital status. He hopes that a standard process will be established by which a resident can present his/her complaint, a neutral party will investigate the same and, if necessary, will hold hearings regarding the alleged discrimination.

"Thank you for taking the effort," Spedden told the three-member panel. "I know that it's not the politically easy thing to do."

Laura Montgomery Rutt, representing the Alliance for Tolerance and Freedom, told Polite's committee that Spedden and others like him are frustrated and confused by the lack of enforcement. According to Rutt, no one at the district justice level or the County Human Relations Commission is authorized to take a complaint under the City's ordinance. Under its language, Lancaster City's Human Relations Commission must file an action with the court if a solution cannot be found. The problem, of course, is that the City does not have a Human Relations Commission.

"Lancaster is under financial constraints," Polite said. "I don't think we'll be able to establish a full-blown Human Relations Commission." Accordingly, the Council members are currently looking at other alternatives, including utilization of the Lancaster Mediation Center, an independent nonprofit organization that mediates conflicts and provides binding arbitration for resolution.

"The [City Council's] Personnel Committee is doing some brainstorming," Grace Biler, Executive Director of the Lancaster Mediation Center said recently. "Part of the feeling was that a lot of the situations could be diffused if the parties had a chance to sit down face-to-face."

Accordingly, Biler's group has agreed to provide mediation services for complaints filed with the City regarding discrimination under its ordinance. The process would be voluntary, but Biler and others believe that many perceived incidents of harassment can be explained if the accuser can discuss the matter in a neutral setting with the alleged discriminator, be that a landlord, employer, or any other party.

Several of those in attendance at the November 13th meeting agreed that there would not be a great number of complaints filed involving discrimination on the basis of sexual preference or marital status. This, however, did not matter to the council members present.

"Even if only one person a year is discriminated against, it's up to us to see that the discrimination is redressed," said Herr. "Government has no greater obligation than to protect the rights of the citizens that it governs. Look at the ordinance without regard to the [anticipated] case loads. If we don't have a process to redress the problems, then we have failed."

Under a recently announced proposal,

the Lancaster Mediation Center will offer its services to the City on a one-year trial basis. The tentative arrangement, pending approval by Council, allows anyone to file a complaint with the City alleging that he or she has been discriminated against within the City's boundaries. The complaint would be reviewed by an enforcement agent and, if warranted, would forward it to the Mediation Center, which would attempt to get the parties together to discuss the matter. The problem remains, of course, that the Lancaster Mediation Center has no enforcement powers, and if either party refuses to use its services, the City's ordinance remains unenforced.

AMONG CENTRAL PENNSYLVANIA'S THREE metropolitan areas, Lancaster is unique in its lack of power to protect gay residents from discrimination. The communities of Harrisburg and York have in place the mechanism necessary to protect its residents against discrimination on the basis of sexual preference.

According to Michael J. Bowles, Executive Director of the Harrisburg Human Relations Commission, the Capital City's ordinance expressly protects gay residents from discrimination in employment and housing. Bowles explained, however, that many of the complaints filed the allege such acts of discrimination are later withdrawn because, he admits, the complaint process can be long and arduous. Explained Bowles, "We get a lot of inquiries, but these may not go any further."

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Pittsburgh are the only cities in Pennsylvania that offer such protections to its gay residents. The Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission, on the other hand, offers no protection from discrimination on the basis of sexual preference or marital status on a statewide level. This is in part due to the lack of protections in such pieces of state legislation such as the Ethnic Intimidation Act which provides protections against those who commit acts of violence toward an individual or group because of their race, color, religion or national origin. Therefore, until the majority of the Commonwealth's legislative body call for an end to discrimination against individuals due to their sexual orientation, many

"That is more of an expression of his particular point of view than it is of his view of the Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission," according to Steve Busch, Executive Director of York City's Human Relations Commission in reference to


Butcher's statement. "Lancaster as a community decided that it wasn't important enough for it to protect the rights of all of its residents."

Busch said that while Pennsylvania's Human Relations Act may not expressly provide for statewide protections on the basis of sexual preference, local communities are not prevented from providing such protections. He also advises the forces in Lancaster to join and take their messages to Pennsylvania lawmakers, to ensure that the rights of all the Commonwealth's citizens are protected. "The whole issue of certain rights in Pennsylvania is a sad state of affairs. It's fragmented. It's a mirror of legislation on the federal level. But the policy makers have forgotten that the business of Pennsylvania is business, and discrimination is not good for business."

Busch, who testified before the House Judiciary Committee on Hate Crimes and Terrorism in Pennsylvania, cited statistics stating that the fastest growing ethnic discrimination intimidation is based on race. The second fastest growing intimidation is based on sexual orientation.

"The issue is simple. Are people being discriminated against in Lancaster on the basis of sexual orientation? As a society, we must answer 'yes.'"

Linda Martin, president of the Lancaster Chapter of the National Organization of Woman, explained at the November 13th special meeting that the 200 members of her group support

enforcement of the ordinance. The Peace and Justice Coalition and the Pink Triangle Coalition have also taken steps to persuade the City of Lancaster to enforce its ordinance and were represented at the November 13 meeting. Several Lancasterarea organizations, including an ad hoc group of approximately 20 religious and civic leaders, also have submitted written requests to the City asking that at a minimum, a study is completed regarding methods of enforcing the ordinance.

The issue of discrimination among the gay and lesbian populace of Central Pennsylvania as well as throughout the Commonwealth is of paramount concern now more than ever. Many anti-gay individuals use Pennsylvania's intransigence on the subject of inclusion of sexual orientation into its Ethnic Intimidation Act as permission to commit heinous acts of violence against a people who want nothing more than to be officially accepted as equals among the general populace.

The Lancaster's elected body have a decision before them that can ensure the rights of **all** its citizens. To take the right step would be an act of courage that many in its gay and lesbian community will applaud. Many feel that the very tenets of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness will be close at hand for many in this extremely diverse metropolitan area who now feel oppressed by the lack of such protections. X

No Paper Tiger Is She by Jim Cassell

Philadelphia's Rita Addessa attempts to attain Civil Rights for all Pennsylvanian gays and lesbians...and she wants the midstate to come along for the ride.

Addessa recently spearheaded the second compilation of statistics via the surveying of 3,000 participants (the largest of its kind) concerning violence and discrimination in Pennsylvania. The results are astounding in that they place discrimination based on sexual orientation second only to that found in this country's African American population. This includes verbal, physical, criminal, and police abuse as well as other hate crimes such as murder.

It is because of these phenomenal endpoints that Addessa came to Harrisburg one Wednesday evening in December (the second time in as many months). With the Capital City's lesbian and gay leaders, she shared her vision of an all-encompassing civil rights legislation for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Addessa and the Task Force are dedicated to pass the PA Civil Rights Bill so that it "is not encumbered by any infringement on our rights. We cannot allow any legal disabilities to be created as a process of making civil rights a reality." She adds, "We will also not allow any homophobic insults such as 'Homosexual men are child molesters.' If we want to protect our children from pedophilia, then we should ban heterosexual men. Media only plays into our already less than desirable public image and because of this we cannot allow any room for compromise or begging on our knees in this heroic effort to pass the Civil Rights Bill."

Since 1986 the Philadelphia Lesbian and Gay Task Force has done most of the

essential footwork in legislation for civil rights statewide. Addessa urges the (gay and lesbian) community to form smaller organizations to represent all major cities statewide. But it is the lack of State and local funding that limits these options. What can we do? Addessa suggest, "We need to give something back of ourselves to support this movement; whether that be personal talent, time or funding. We need to have a sense of conscious commitment to the larger common good."

According to Addessa, "We cannot depend on certain legislators who claim to be our friends such as PA Senator Allison Schwartz whose Senate Bill 803 momentarily excludes sexual orientation in regards to law enforcement. We cannot tolerate legislators that have no guts. How then do we differentiate between who are our friends and who are our enemies? Are our enemies those who attack us directly and our friends those who do not openly attack us yet do not support us? Do we continue to give awards to such legislators such as Schwartz who would not agree to co-sponsor a meeting concerning the Civil Rights Bill unless someone else from the House agreed to it also?"

Eight states (Connecticut, Hawaii, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New Jersey, Rhode Island, Wisconsin and Vermont) presently provide protection for lesbian and gay people against discrimination in the areas of employment, housing and public accommodations based on their

(we) commit to organize, to educate, and to negotiate with integrity for a PA civil rights bill. We will be grounded in and guided by the principle that we deserve our full rights. We will support the achievement of civil rights protections in employment, housing, public accommodation, and in education-at a minimum.

(we) will suffer neither a restriction of our rights (e.g., parental rights, domestic partnership rights, the recognition of marriage) nor homophobic insults (e.g., the presumption of criminality or immorality) in a PA civil rights law. We will support efforts to broaden our rights in the areas of family law, in assuring contract compliance, and in insurance regulations in tandem with our civil rights efforts. Lesbian women and gay men in Pennsylvania currently have no civil

rights protections at the federal or state levels. It is only at the local levels [Philadelphia (1982), Harrisburg (1983), Pittsburgh (1990), Lancaster (1991), and York (1993)] have legislative bodies enacted legislation to prohibit discrimination in employment, housing, and public accommodations. (Lancaster City's enforcement powers were rescinded shortly after its passage by the county's Human Relations Commission.

"What we have to do is force legislation to include a multiracial, multicultural, gender education policy to protect our students and teachers as well. This combined effort to have the Civil Rights Bill passed inclusively statewide to also include education will at best take another 5 to 10 years to become a legal reality. It is premiere litigation organiza-

tions like Lambda (Legal Defense Fund) that ease this task." Addessa further explained, "We need to maintain the integrity, dignity and honor of our lives. It is our collective fears that limit all of us."

While I was in one of my "get rid of the trash" frenzies, I stopped short of discarding a pamphlet my partner received from a friend in West Virginia. A "former flame" of his, the guy still keeps in touch. I've never met him, but I suspect he is a neat individual. Instead of cards this year, he sent a brief personal note and a booklet entitled Metamorphosis (sic) Toward a Creation Center Life-Style. It was written by Robert Barzan and is available from White Crane Press, P.O. Box 170152, San Francisco, CA 94117-0152.

What impressed me the most about this little earth-centered publication is it offered ten ideas on how to transform your life. Most of the ideas are so simple they are difficult and I don't know that I could do all ten because I'm not that disciplined. At any rate, if you are willing to renew the zeal of New Year's resolutions, here are ten suggestions. Barzan states in his introduction, "Since we are all different, I cannot say exactly how these activities will affect your life, but I can say that if you approach them with a sense of adventure and fun, amazing things will happen." For what they are worth, and I think that could be a lot taken seriously, here they are:

Free yourself for the mass media. Barzan states that the average adult watches television for nearly five hours a day. He also lists an astounding statistic: By 9 a.m., the average radio listener has heard more than 100 commercial messages. Allow yourself to form your own sense of your environment and not a company selling soap or a radio news commentator.

Work part-time. This may require some cuts in lifestyle, but it can be done. If you need to work 40 hours or more a week, make sure it is a field you are excited about and

Barzan notes that Americans today work 48-50 hours per week. European serfs in the Middle Ages worked less. He also states Europeans today have significantly shorter work weeks and far more vacation days. As a person who was forced to look at new work due to being forced out of a job, I know this can have a strong impact. It has taken two years, but I finally am working in areas I love and feel make a difference in people's is but one example.

Proclaim a buying fast and do a possession inventory. The author suggests for at least one month, but preferably three to put the skids on purchases. Don't buy anything except what is absolutely necessary for housing, food, transportation and health. That's right guys and gals. Those handy dandy new kitchen gadgets are a "no no"! He further urges that you take inventory of everything you won, including storage and the attic or basement. Ask yourself; "What do I tend to accumulate? Am I using what I have?" As Barzan points out, "A buying fast will deepen your appreciation for materials objects."

Cook meals and share them with your friends. Among other points in this category Barzan suggests, "The meal I does not have to be fancy or expensive. Invite people to share the meal that you would enjoy spending time with. You can invite old friends or new friends...Linger over the meal, spend time talking, let the evening unfold as it would."

Walk. Barzan claims the average American resident spends less than 15 minutes outdoors a day. He also points out that walking has many benefits and lists more of them than the space of this column would allow. He suggests to walk on unpaved surfaces when possible and vary from walking alone with a friend or two.

Learn a new skill or craft. Those skills should not include computers used at work, or how to program the VCR. Take a look at adult enrichment classes offered by local area schools. They often include such things as woodworking, cooking, ballroom dancing, ceramics, piano, upholstering, drawing, tennis, and sewing.

Change religious paths. For many, myself included, this may be a real toughie, but worth it. The teachings of Hinduism, Wiccan, polytheism, non-theistic Buddhism, Christianity or Islam are all possible. Also immensely rewarding are the Native American traditions practiced by various local tribes. By examining other traditions, we gain a whole new appreciation of people's religious values and the factors that influence them.

O Volunteer. Barzan suggests you select an organization whose cause you would like to further and volunteer for six months. I can tell you from my own experience that nothing gives back to you as much as your giving to help others. It's a whole new rush if have never done it.

Garden. Even if it's pots or in a window box, maintain your garden for a full year. Be ready to experience a whole new awareness of the harmony and cycle of living things around

There's a whole gay community out there that I've never seen before," said a friend of mine after attending the winter concert at Harrisburg Community Theater. Although not an entirely gay audience, sure enough, the theater was packed with an audience made up of the more mature, culturally seasoned, and harmoniously appreciative members of the community. The combination of the Harrisburg Men's Chorus, 3 J's and a C, and The Flirtations showcased not only the remarkable talents of the community, but also, as portrayed explicitly by The Flirtations, the concept that gays and lesbians can live in perfect harmony and make beautiful music together.

The Harrisburg Men's Chorus began with a few not-so-well-known winter selections that displayed a serious commitment to the quality of their presentation. However, as they continued with *Sleigh Ride*, complete with jingling bells, members took on a more jovial air that is more typical of the holiday season. Continuing with an agenda that was not restricted to winter festivities and colder weather, one particular line from *The Pasture* struck a note that warmed the heart - "I shan't be gone long.... You come, too."

Though only a brief performance, the four-woman ensemble of 3 J's and a C generated thunderous applause and exclamations of "You go, Girls!" from the audience. The group's a capella rendition of Swing Lo, Sweet Chariot promises a future of excellence, considering they've only been performing as a group for one year.

The Men's Chorus returned to perform a second set of more comedic and light-hearted tunes. The members broke their traditional choir formation to gather comfortably at the piano for an expressive *Mr. Right Now.* Laughter from the audience accompanied the pre-intermission number, *Johnny Schmoeker*, a Pennsylvania Dutch folk tune that appeared to be as much fun to perform as it was entertaining to hear.

The Flirtations opened the second half of the concert with an amusing version of Fun, Fun, Fun which introduced a humor-

ous flavor to gay issues. The recent addition of their first female voice, Suede, offered opportunities for the group to intermittently poke fun at the stereotypes of gay and lesbian personalities. Many of their comments affirmed the masculine/ feminine-confused stereotypes, such as the fact that both men owned cats, and Suede was odd-woman out as a dog-owner. Between numbers, the trio joked and confessed more issues of this nature, such as male cheerleader tendencies, female marching band roles, and male-portraval of female vocals, among others. But the group did not limit their treatment of homosexuality to the indulgence of humor. Using a combination of musical selections and commentary, The Flirts also addressed awareness of more serious concerns including sexual abuse, dearly departed friends, and the struggles of coming out.

Regardless of the tone of the message within the lyrics, the vocal appeal of The Flirtations' a capella performance impressed the audience with the natural blend of their voices. Their range from *Sister*, which spotlighted Suede's ability to reach that deep, throaty, jazzy, 40's era sound, to the way Jon Arterton and Jimmy Rutland were able to portray the softer vocals in *Mr. Sandman*, displayed the diversity of their talents.

As many have expressed concern over the occasional difficulties experienced by gays and lesbians to function as one community, this particular event proved that as we mature and find ways to appreciate one another, we can relax and enjoy the harmony. X

Take for instance the comments heard postshow following a particular performance within the past year. Heterosexual members of the audience walk away pleased with the positive impressions that this group of two gay men and one lesbian woman imparts during its concerts.

And it's not as if straights are caught unaware of the sexual orientation of The Flirts. In fact, their contract stipulates that when advertising The Flirts that they are known as "unabashedly lesbian and gay a cappella". Even when asked to perform in concert series, The Flirts want to be known as "out a cappella" and let individuals make the decision whether to see them in concert.

The group's bittersweet discourse presented during their performances is at once humorous ("One of us didn't realize they were gay until they were thirty-six", "One of us received a letter in track and field when in high school") and at the

same time tinged with heart rendering sadness ("One of us is the victim of child abuse", "One of us has never had their parent see them in concert").

All in all, The Flirts feel they've been given a talent that helps many who struggle with external and internal oppression. According to Suede, "The battle is the same whether it be gay issues or women's issues." Their performance of *One of Us* encom-

Her influences range from Ella Fitzgerald, Pearl Bailey and Louis Armstrong (the lady plays a sweet trumpet) to James Taylor, Crosby, Stills, Nash & Young and The Grateful Dead. Her musical tastes are indeed "eclectic" though she does lean toward instrumental jazz. She attempted not to sound like anyone else when she began.

passes the sense of justice and dedication they feel in the outgoing struggle for public respect.

The group was faced with the hard decision of replacing singer Michael Callen who died of complications of AIDS in 1995. In order to replace Callen, an individual would have to be found whose voice would come close to matching his feminine qualities. At one point it was suggested to bring in a woman to replace their fallen comrade. The idea, however, was voted down time and again until finally it was decided to admit Suede into what had always been known as a malesonly group.

The inclusion of this highly regarded figure of women's music was no stranger to the members of The Flirts. In fact, the three carried on an ongoing relationship for fourteen years.

And how has Suede's inclusion into the once male dominated musical group been received by their gay audiences. According to group founder John Arterton, the feedback has been nothing

but positive, although "a lot of people expressed fear of what it would be like; whether or not it would resemble the old group." As a result, more women can now be found in the audiences of Flirtation concerts, due in part to the credentials that Suede brings with her.

Suede finds time to strike out and perform solo calling it "a delicate balancing act" when compared to the seemingly endless performances that the trio find themselves giving. For instance, that balance found her performing one week in 1995 at the Harrisburg Area Community College with The Flirts and the next on a York, PA stage on her own with comedienne Maggie Cassella (Vol. I, Issue 1).

"Flirt" Jimmy Rutland, whose comic genius is a perfect compliment to the others during many a performance, feels that the group is currently changing. "Evolution is a perfect word," says Rutland, in that it brings to the fore "issues and causes" that are tantamount to the gay and lesbian community. He is happy to be working with Suede and

couldn't be happier that a woman has joined The Flirtations.

Who knows? Maybe their attempts at changing the world are proving true. After all, they are proof positive that gay men and lesbian women can work together harmoniously. Something that gays and lesbians need to continue if they are to gain the recognition and the rights they so deeply crave. X

Angela's Magical Musical Tour

Local lyricist Angela Byrd gives crossroads an exclusive sneak preview of a local Top Forty smash while crossroads introduces you to her cosmic world.

nglea Byrd has always been a writer. Even now she carries pen and paper wherever she goes just in case the Muse strikes. She also considers herself a lyricist. Writing the words that will inspire many to listen intently to their overall message. It's this talent that may find her at the top of the national music charts. When Love Wants To Stay may be that lucky vehicle to national prominence.

One will be struck by the Hootie-esque quality of When Love Wants To Stay. The song stylings, courtesy of local guitartist Tony Perry, who added music to Byrd's lyrics, adds a certain poignancy that will caress the '90's listener in a familiar yet unique manner.

The Perry/Byrd collaboration goes back two years when the two decided to put together a program for a coffee house. The program, "Words and Music", Would present an opportunity for Perry to provide background music behind Byrd's original poetry.

Later, when Perry joined forces with two other local musicians, Byrd realized the potential in continuing the partnership. Byrd handed her lyrics to Perry and within a month, Perry began to visualie and write music to Angela's words. Perry and his band later stunned Byrd when they played they played the composition at a celebration commemorating Byrd's parents' 45th wedding anniversary; the

first time she heard her words put to

Through the next year, Byrd made a list of all she needed to do get to a recording session going. She also compiled a list of performers that she wanted to work with on a potential four song EP; asking them if they wanted to work on writing music, lyrics and/or performing. And most importantly, it was imperative for Perry to continue to be integral to the success of the overall project.

A vice president of a subsidiary of EMI Records read Byrd's lyrics and encouraged her to send a tape in order to break

her lyrics to the industry.

A friend connected Byrd with a local recording studio which jumped at the chance of making Byrd's dream a reality. Well-seasoned musicians, those familiar with the Los Angeles music scene, hung out at the session and after two practice runs, both Perry and local drummer Scott Goddard realized that 80% of the track was near perfection. Everyone present sensed the magic that afternoon.

The 36-year-old Byrd, hails originally from Berea, Kentucky. Went to college to study communication at Pfeiffer College in North Carolina after a stint at nine high schools. Her father was a retired minister which allowed for a continual uprooting of the family throughout the eastern half of the United States. This would be key to help strengthen her later in life.

She arrived in Hershey in 1978 and presently works production for the Harrisburg ABC-TV affiliate WHTM-TV. Her duties on the morning and noon news shows include in-studio camera operator and part-time floor directing (making sure the direction from the direc-

tor gets to the anchors).

Before her stint at WHTM, Byrd worked in the PA Attorney General's office and was about to be transfered to another department of which she was uncomfortable. A friend told her of the imminent arrival of U2 to Hershey to rehearse for their upcoming concert tour. Byrd, whose primarily interest had been in writing, with an eye to the music business, decided to go see her favorite rock group.

So off to Hershey Byrd went in hopes of perhaps catching a glimpse and maybe to a picture or two of her idols. Upon her arrival, she was intoduced to the promoter of Electric Factory Concerts who asked if she would like to work during the rehearsals since they fell during a week's vacation from her job. This one week work excursion wound up being the one

and a half year joyride known as the Zoo

Starting out as front of house catering manager, Byrd set up the dining area for band and crew. During that period, she made three times her salary at the State as production assistant of what would become the highest grossing tour of 1993.

The experience presented Byrd with many opportunities to learn the ins and outs of that portion of the entertainment business. One of the lessons learned was the generosity bestowed upon the crew by the boys from Ireland. Throughout the tour, U2 would give their help hats, jackets, shirts, and other tour paraphrenalia to express their gratitude.

Byrd got to meet the group's booking agent who, upon viewing the work of the young lyricist, felt it comparable to Bono; U2's lead singer and songwriter. A statement Byrd found to be "the greatest compliment ever given me." Overall, Byrd found U2 as "amazing people and amazing employers. It was great learning from them."

As the American leg of the Zoo TV ended, Byrd decided to keep her hand in the concert biz and was eventually hired by the Paul McCartney people for his upcoming U.S. tour. Byrd turned it down, however, for the sake of her father who requested that she accompany him to his alma mater Wake Forest University in North Carolina. She decided to in part due to her pater's heart condition.

The trip benefited her in two ways: 1) her meeting with writer such as those from Time and Newsweek and 2) the opportunity to get closer with her parents.

For Byrd, the past two years have been "cosmic" ride; a spiritual journey which began during the Zoo TV tour. A stop in Arizona put her in touch with her Native American heritage. Byrd views on life take on a cosmic magical bend. She interprets past events as being instrumental to the journey that is before her in relation to her first recording.

And she wants to bring along others for the ride. For instance, Byrd has no problem with the fact that Tony Perry will be out in front when the record hits. According to Byrd, this project is "bigger than life. This came out of left field. I was thinking we were going to take our time and put this EP together." Friends and total strangers who caught wind of this project have given Byrd the thumbs up and much encouragement.

Byrd's inspiration for her lyrics stems from her experiences as well as her inter-

est in other people. "My whole point in writing is...so that it helps or touches someone; makes someone laugh or cry. That's my contribution" adding, "The thing that changed me most was the loss of life and how fragile it is. I've gone through a transformation."

When Love Wants To Stay stems from this sense of personal loss and separation due to failed relationships, friends who have moved away and those who have died. "This is more personal."

That has come in handy recently via her reading at few funerals and memorial benefits. She received her first standing ovation for her words during the October reading at former D-GEM bartender Guy Zearfoss' memorial benefit. After the reading she was complimented by a friend who told her, "Angela, you found your voice." It was then that she knew there was a reason for the doors that opened in the past.

Byrd really wants to make a living from her writing, though she jokingly suggests her goal is to receive a Grammy. She also wants the opportunity to share of herself through her talents.

Her love of laughter aptly enables her to write in a way that would make her aunt, who once told her, "If you can't crack yourself up, you'll never make anyone else laugh," proud. Byrd adds, "If someone is having a hard time of it, I can make the most ridiculous rhyming stupid little poem that I can think of and give it to that person. I like doing things like that for people."

Just as their namesakes set off to explore the polar wasteland, Angela Byrd (Admiral Richard E. Byrd being a distant relative) and Tony Perry have already set forth on a journey that will send them on an excursion though somewhat familiar territory. With Byrd at the helm, the unforeseen perils may seem minimal due to the magic that has already worked its spell through her lyrics and her life. X

The *Brave Boys* of Gay Music

In anticipation of their visit to York's Valencia Ballroom in February, Ron Romanovsky and Paul Phillips gave crossroads an insight to their world and their opinions on the current political climate inside and outside the gay community.

One thing that one can say about Romanovsky & Phillips: they are not stagnant. The title of their current release, **Brave Boys** (Fresh Fruit Records), says it all. Performing since 1982, the duo's six CD's have mirrored the times they were



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recorded; their discography can be viewed as a chronicle of the gay movement from the 80's through today.

However, though their music admittedly speaks to the gay experience, Ron Romanovsky states that "most (of their lyrics) can be considered universal when appreciated with an open mind." The duo found that to be the case with Straightening Up The House (Emotional Rollercoaster). A straight male fan approached the duo after a concert and stated that he could relate to the duo's description of "degaying" (the removal of any openly gay articles from open view). Unbeknownst to his parents, the man was living with a woman and hence the reason to remove all feminine traces before their arrival.

What Kind of Self-Respecting Faggot Am I? (Trouble In Paradise) is another example of lyrics that, when taken out of their context, describes the angst felt by individuals who do not epitomize their specific subculture's stereotypes; even those perpetrated by their own compatriots:

I don't brunch on Sundays, don't own a set of weights I wouldn't dream of screwing 'til after several dates I know it's quite pathetic, I might as well be straight What kind of self-respecting faggot am I?

The current revision of *Faggot*, found on their greatest hits compilation **Brave Boys** reveals the evolution in their 15 year professional relationship. Like The Flirtations, R & P feel compelled to alter their lyrics to fit the current social climate. In the case of *Faggot*, now titled *What Kind of Self-Respecting Faggot and Politically Correct Lesbian Am I?*, on **Brave Boys**, the duo's lyrics become more inclusive as they highlight the female side of the gay

stereotype:

I like wearing dresses, don't care for Birkenstocks I'm not a vegetarian, and this may be a shock: I sometimes use a dildo, that looks just like a...rooster What kind of politically correct lesbian am I?

But then lesbians have always been reflective in their lyrics ever since R & P noticed the sensitivity that gay men have toward lesbian concerns and their overt compassion displayed over their concern for the suffering of their gay brothers in the era of AIDS. Ending the tune with What kind of self-respecting homos are we? provides a wonderful example of R & P inviting the politically correct to the community table.

Examples of their lyrical evolution maturation abound as evidenced in *Don't Use Your Penis for a Brain* and *Homophobia* ---both satirical commentaries, written in 1985, that reflect the gay populace's frustration with the Republican domination of the White House in the 80's. *Penis* (**Trouble In Paradise**) originally included an anti-Reagan reference which was eventually changed to Bush and subsequently included references to the intransigence of

the military establishment.

The lyrics of Homophobia (Trouble In Paradise), a call to arms for all gay men and lesbian women to end societal sexual oriented discrimination, also changed in chameleon fashion along with the political climate. One of its incarnations included mention of Colorado's Amendment 2-the majority-approved referendum that gave way to societal bias against the state's gay population which was deemed unconstitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court last May.

Their music, along with their lyrics is

further evidence that the boys are not afraid to tweek different musical genres. Take for instance the hip-hop influenced Ho Ho Homophobia, an original tune from Brave Boys. Phillips would admit that this tune is more reminiscent of his "disco bunny" days, when he would dance to the funkier jams like those of Parliament/ Funkadelic and funkmeister George Clinton. Ho Ho has a urban freshness that can be initially alarming to the longtime R & P fan. Romanovsky even related to crossroads the story of a fan who purchased the CD and believed that the recording company placed the song on the wrote CD.

This foray into uncharted waters has had a sobering effect on the duo who in their first eight years of recording received accolade upon accolade from the gay press. The **Be Political Not Polite** CD was considered a departure for a group who used humor on a grand scale in their past material to describe their community's frustration.

Both R & P find humor a universal device which proves, as Phillips puts it, that "gay people are not so different than straight people. I think the majority of the gay community would rather not have to look seriously at any issue." Phillips feels the release of **Be Political** demanded fans to feel emotions and to think independently; something not encouraged in either gay or straight communities.

Romanovsky adds, however, that the furor over **Be Political** garnered the duo the greatest praise from an ambivalent gay press. Yet, the most criticism as fans and the press alike questioned the lack of humor in the CD's lyrics. As it related to their music, camps were beginning moving to diametric ends of the critical spectrum for the first time. Says Romanovsky, "At least they were talking about it."

As for their impression of the current political climate, Phillips, not a single issue voter or thinker, found the recent elections "one of the biggest snoozes we ever had in American politics." He's happy, however, with the outcome and reminds friends where gays were four years ago and the progress made within that time. He further states that "we have seen gays go from a taboo area that politicians never went to or tried to avoid to where the words gays and lesbians" have become commonplace on the nightly news programs and sitcoms. "Bill Clinton is not totally responsible for this, but he played a big part and that's why I felt Clinton deserved a second administration." He also admires the legislative skills of Republican challenger Bob Dole



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
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NO POSTAGE NECESSARY IF MAILED IN THE UNITED STATES and wishes Dole had never left his Majority Leader position in the U.S. Senate.

Romanovsky and Phillips have known each other for 15 years. During that time, they were romantically involved and lived together until their 1992 break-up. Romanovsky's struggle for independence resulted in his solo debut, **Hopeful Romantic** which was a critical success though not as big a seller as the duo's past recordings.

Ron, with Paul's encouragement, recorded tunes originally written for the duo which did not fit within the framework of their act. Ron credits Paul for allowing him to use those songs on his CD. To his credit, Paul feels **Hopeful Romantic** is a fine piece of artistic expression and is glad his ex recorded it.

Experiences such as breakups provide inspiration for their lyrics. Relative to his desire to write a song about domestic violence, Romanovsky realized he could not do so until coincidentally a girl friend of his went through her ordeal; finding that "an emotional link to the issue that makes it real" is necessary before he can pen a tune.

Living With AIDS (Emotional Rollercoaster) is another example. The song encourages friends of PWAs to encourage the victims and to not psychologically bury them before their demise as the duo have found acquaintances to do in the past.

Asked whether they consider themselves pioneers in the realm of gay music, they tip their hats to ground breaking independent recording companies such as Olivia Records and Redwood Records. The seventies era of feminine liberation became the impetus for women to no longer wait for the male dominated behemoths to record and release their music. It was this brand of music, known today as "Women's Music", that provided the artistic desire in Romanovsky's early years.

This artistic credit given to women songwriters and performers extends to the 37-year-old Romanovsky's musical tastes which include "the Carly Simons and Joni Mitchells" as well as the Roches. He also appreciates the 60's folk stylings of Bob Dylan contemporary Phil Ochs, Simon & Garfunkel and The Mamas and The Papas.

Phillips, 42, a preacher's son, cut his musical teeth on his mother's selection of Broadway show standards from the 40's and 50's, as well as Peter, Paul & Mary and Burl Ives (largely due to his mother who was a music director at summer

camp). The Sixties witnessed a rebellious side as his musical appetite shifted, unashamedly admiting that "it was radical when I got into the Monkees, but I think The Carpenters are more my speed."


They do admit that if it hadn't been them in the early 80's, it would have been another duo who would have related their gay experiences from the stage. Therefore, they are not surprised when they find gays who are oblivious to them and their music. Take the recent GLAMA (Gay/Lesbian American Music Awards) ceremonies. There were those in attendance who had no clue to who R & P were. Phillips theorizes that the gay community is dependent on oral history and thus both he and his partner realize that it is indeed likely that there are many who are unaware of their status in today's gay music scene. Unpretensiously, he further states, "We have already made a major mark on history even though it's been in a very small quiet way."

With their place in gay history assured, they are about to open themselves up for more critical commentary by the gay & mainstream press as well as their following. They are currently hard at work on an off-Broadway musical (Jayson) that will have its debut later this year. Jayson is to comic strips as R & P is to gay music being one of the first collectively accepted gay strips. Inspired by the underground gay cartoons of Jeff Krell, Jayson will be a light show that, according to Phillips, "will not be a lifesaving event for anybody." It, however, will be yet another evidence of the diversity that is R & P.

In fact, they are putting the finishing touches to their final three contributions to this project. There may, in fact, be a original cast recording released by year's end. (R & P reported that they will probably include some of these tunes in their York program.)

Whether it's a poignant love song or a hilarious look at this country's institution, or a wake call to their gay brothers and sister, the music of Romanovsky and Phillips continues to illuminate the frailties of the human existence. Gays and lesbians would bode well to check out the music and lyrics of this groundbreaking duo in order to attain a clear understanding of where we've been and our potential as a political force. X



I'll never forget the limo ride from Harrisburg to Baltimore and the big "family" fight on the way home. I'm such a





Becoming Heart Smart

Dr. John

Recently, an acquaintance of mine spoke with me about a friend of his who passed away suddenly and unexpectedly at age 34 of a heart attack. This young man did not have any form of congenital heart problems but was found to have severe coronary artery disease or coronary atherosclerosis at autopsy. My acquaintance found this unfortunate event alarming and asked for some advice on how he might avoid a similar fate.

No one will deny that AIDS has justifiably gained our attention and respect over the last decade as a major threat to our existence. Nonetheless, we must not lose our awareness that many other disease can be just as threatening. Hereditary factors are often the cause of life threatening or disabling illness, as I suspect was the case in the unfortunate young man mentioned previously, however, disease is often acquired as a consequence of habit and behavior. Approximately 1.5 million Americans suffer heart attacks each year and about 500,000 die as a result. Another 6 million people are estimated to have stable coronary disease, while an unknown number have coronary atherosclerosis

that has not been discovered. Almost all of us will be touched by coronary artery disease in one form or another.

How does coronary artery disease **develop?** The heart contracts rhythmically about 100,000-150,000 times a day in order to circulate oxygen-rich blood to the body's tissues. This continuous contractile activity requires a constant supply of oxygen. The heart muscle is generously supplied with oxygenated blood by a network of arteries known as coronary arteries. Coronary artery disease, or coronary atherosclerosis, refers to the accumulation of fatty material within coronary artery walls. The formation of fatty plaques in the coronary arteries impairs the flow of blood to the heart muscle. If blood flow to an area of heart muscle is significantly reduced, myocardial ischemia results. Myocardial ischemia may cause warning symptoms, such as chest pain or shortness of breath, that blood flow to the heart is abnormal. If blood flow to an area of the heart is completely interrupted, the muscle cells in that area may die in a process known as myocardial infarction.

Although the exact mechanism(s) that cause fatty material to be deposited in artery walls is poorly understood, it is currently believed that when certain lipids (cholesterol and triglycerides) are present in abnormally high levels in the blood, they are absorbed into the inner layers of the blood vessel wall. These fats then bind with other biomolecules and accumulate in the artery wall. It has also been suggested that damage to the lining of an artery may result in accumulation of fatty molecules and inflammatory cells at

the site of injury. Inflammatory cells then release chemicals that may cause blood clotting in the area of the fatty plaque. Formation of blot clots can lead to further narrowing of the blood vessel and provoke myocardial ischemia or a myocardial infarction.

Who gets coronary artery disease, anyway? Anyone can develop coronary atherosclerosis, although certain factors increase the risk of fatty plaque formation in the coronary arteries. Major risks include abnormally high blood lipid levels, obesity, high blood pressure, diabetes mellitus, cigarette smoking, a genetic history of atherosclerotic heart disease, stress, and sleep apnea. Coronary artery disease is a multifactorial process; the hazard posed by any one risk factor may be influenced by others, and no single risk factor alone is strictly essential or sufficient to cause atherosclerotic narrowing of the coronary arteries. Contrary to popular belief, coronary artery disease is not just a disease of older men. Although more common in men, experience in recent years has taught that either gender can fall victim to this disease at any age in the presence of an unfavorable risk profile.

Lipids. There is a direct correlation between blood cholesterol and triglyceride levels and the accumulation of fatty plaques in the coronary arteries. These fatty plaques may appear at an early age and, in fact, have been found in the artery walls of teenagers at autopsy. If blood cholesterol and triglyceride levels are abnormally high from an early age, critical narrowing of the coronary arteries may occur by age 30. Mild elevations in cholesterol and/or triglycerides can often be corrected by limiting cholesterol and saturated fat intake. Regular exercise can help reduce cholesterol and triglyceride levels. In situations where diet and exercise fail, medication may be required to reduce lipid levels and the accompanying risk of coronary atherosclerosis.

Hypertension. High blood pressure is a significant risk factor for development of coronary artery disease in both sexes at any age. High blood pressure may create

sheer stresses within the coronary arteries which cause tears in the vessel lining. Such points of injury become the site of lipid and inflammatory cell accumulation and fatty plaque formation. Like blood lipid levels, high blood pressure can often

be lowered by diet and exercise. Individuals who have persistent hypertension despite weight loss, salt restriction and regular aerobic exercise may require medication to achieve normal blood pres-

sure.

The Heart and Coronary Artery Anatomy

Diabetes Mellitus. The high blood glucose levels of uncontrolled diabetes mellitus accelerate the formation of atherosclerotic plaques. Furthermore, diabetes are at an increased risk of unrecognized myocardial infarction due to abnormalities of sensation that prevent recognition of symptoms such as chest pain. The risk of coronary artery disease is especially high in women who suffer with diabetes.

Cigarette smoking. Cigarette smoking is a powerful contributor to the development of coronary artery disease. Smoking lowers HDL (High Density Lipid) cholesterol levels; it also causes abnormalities in blood coagulation which result in increased blood clotting. Smoking has been associated with chemical damage to the lining of arteries and subsequent plaque formation. Cigarette smoking lowers the oxygen content of the blood and causes the release of adrenal hormones that irritate the heart muscle. As a result of these effects on the blood and heart, smoking may precipitate a myocardial infarction and/or sudden death. It is important to recognize that the risk of coronary artery disease due to smoking is not cumulative. The risk of coronary disease rapidly declines with cessation of smoking regardless of how much or how long the individual has been smoking.


Sleep disturbance. Several complaints of disturbed sleep are associated with a higher risk or coronary artery disease; these include difficulty falling asleep, difficulty staying asleep, awakening too early, and wakening feeling tired and fatigued. Snoring is another symptom of disturbed sleep that has been associated with development of coronary disease, hypertension, and stroke. This association is probably due to the high prevalence of obstructive sleep apnea in people who snore consistently. In these individuals, the upper airway collapses, or obstructs, during sleep. Obstruction of the airway results in decreased oxygen levels in the blood. Decreased oxygen levels in turn increase the chances of developing coronary occlusive disease, high blood presObesity. Obesity has far reaching effects on many other risk factors for coronary atherosclerosis in that it increases blood pressure, causes insulin resistance (thereby increases blood sugar levels) and is associated with elevated triglyceride levels and low HDL cholesterol. Blood coagulation is altered by obesity, making clot formation easier. Many obese individuals develop obstructive sleep apnea due to the accumulation of excessive fatty tissue around the neck and upper airway. Weight reduction is often the single most important factor in modifying an individual's risk for heart attack.

sure and stroke.

Estrogen levels. Estrogens are considered protective from coronary disease. Coronary heart disease risk increases substantially in women after menopause. Replacement therapy with low-dose estrogen has been shown to protect postmenopausal women from coronary atherosclerosis. It is noteworthy that estrogen replacement therapy may cause endometrial hyperplasia and uterine cancer unless progestins are also given.

So, how do I know if I have coronary artery disease? Unfortunately, many individuals will not be aware that they have coronary artery disease until they begin to experience the symptoms of myocardial ischemia or suffer a myocardial infarction. As previously mentioned, this disease can affect either sex at any age. Anyone who has one or more of the aforementioned risk factors is more likely to develop clinically significant coronary artery occlusive disease and its sequelae.

Individuals with narrowing of the coronary arteries usually begin to note symptoms with activity or exertion. With severe coronary occlusive disease, symptoms may occur at rest. The most common symptom is chest pain. Chest pain associated with coronary artery disease is typically described as pressure, tightness or aching in the center of left side of the chest. Some individuals experience a sensation of crushing or burning in the chest.




These painful sensations may radiate to the neck, jaw, left shoulder, or left arm. Occasionally, individuals experience more subtle discomfort and report indigestion as their prevailing symptom. Pain which feels sharp, or changes with breathing or movement as their prevailing symptom. Pain which feels sharp, or changes with breathing or movement of the chest wall is less likely to be related to myocardial ischemia.

Several other symptoms may indicate a problem with the heart's blood supply. Unusual shortness of breath is probably the second most common symptom of coronary insufficiency. Individuals may also note palpitations or sweating. Occasionally, dizziness or lightheadedness are reported. Rarely, individuals with myocardial ischemia or infarction suffer from sudden loss of consciousness.

If you experience any of these symptoms, visit your physician and discuss them with him. There are several non-invasive methods for determining whether your symptoms are caused by coronary artery disease. if you do have coronary artery disease, risk modification and early treatment may prevent progression of the atherosclerotic process and/or myocardial infarction.

If you have not experienced symptoms of coronary insufficiency, but have risks for coronary disease, it's never too late for risk modification. Some risks, such as obesity and cigarette smoking, can often be modified without physician input. However, your physician may be able to offer weight loss and smoking cessation guidance or provide a referral to appropriate resources in the community.

Other risks, such as hypertension, elevated lipids, diabetes, and sleep apnea, will require supervised treatment by a physician. Regular checkups with your physician provide an opportunity for preventive screening, especially if you have a family history of heart disease or any of the aforementioned risk factors. X



Why Therapy?

uring a recent visit to one of our local drinkeries, I met up with an acquaintance. He, John, inquired into some of the specifics of my profession---psychotherapy and more specifically the specialty areas in which I treated. One of the areas of therapy piqued his interest. This lead him to ask what my hourly fee is. After explaining my practice guidelines, I told John my fee. His face expressed surprise. He said, "Gee, that's a lot of money!" I was equally surprised and dismayed. As I am blessed with a good memory for important details, I remembered a prior conversation where he had just told of getting weekly massages for his stress-ridden body. A beneficial and proven massage does help provide relief. In fact, today many in the areas of body manipulation work with psychotherapists to provide optimal benefits. Interestingly, the hourly rate John was paying was exactly the same I charged!

The point of telling you this story is central to what and how people put a value on therapy. (My dentist has told me of similar stories in his practice.) Many people question why therapy?

Given the stress filled world people live in today, therapy may be one of the most important adjuncts to learning how to cope. News stories are replete with Americans having more today than ever yet feeling more uncertain, more anxious and more cautious. When looking at the added burdens placed upon gay men and lesbian women in this society, therapy seems to be an appropriate response.

Homophobia, internalized homophobia, coming out, abuse, establishing, maintaining and when appropriate ending relationships in healthy ways are some of the issues psychotherapists can help clients address. Certainly issues of self-esteem, family, parenting, adoption, civil and legal rights, the problems of gay adolescents, discrimination, dual career couples employment and vocational choice impact significantly on one's life and "lifestyle".

Of course, today one would be hard pressed not to have to confront the issue of AIDS. How many of us have not lost friends and family to this overwhelming disease. How many of us struggle to deal with the grief and loss while trying to go forth into healthy functional relationships? How many folks do we see also attempting to handle addictions to drugs, alcohol, food, sex... Often in the face of hopelessness and helplessness due to the traumas of the past and the present as well as fears for the future, people shut down---this is where therapists can be of significant benefit.

Confronting and dealing with such issues can allow for enhanced living.

Numerous studies have shown the being in therapy has improved job performance and income. Thus, therapy may be seen as a valued investment in yourself economically. Beyond this is the improvement in self-image, life functioning in family, intimate and social relationships which generally occur.

Often finding gay-affirming therapists can be frustrating at times. Looking in the Yellow Pages and/or the "Gay Pages" of magazines/newspapers, therapists will tell of the specialty areas they offer. Like seeking services with any other health care professional you should feel comfortable asking questions about their treatment philosophy, expectations, policies, credentials, service hours, fees, and payment schedule. They should feel at ease in offering you this information. Call several, if needed, to make sure you're comfortable with the therapist's style and personality. A good "fit" is often one of the most critical components of successful therapy.

Given the numerous issues unique to gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgendered persons in our society, therapy can be a place where self-acceptance and affirmation of self occurs. Very often with selfacceptance and affirmation comes a personal environment of stress and anxiety as well as anger and depression. Helping clients work through these issues toward

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

SAPPHO'S CHAMPAGNE PUNCH

Sappho, the burning goddess of love from the isles of Greece, lured thousands to her with her beauty and her sweet siren's song. You can lure someone to your table with this excellent champagne punch to start the meal. Perhaps you can place a pearl in the bottom to use a little love magic, but in that case make it a dinner for two.

6 lumps of sugar Dash of bitters

1 cup high-quality cognac

- 3 bottles of chilled French champagne
- 1. Place sugar lumps in a punch bowl. Sprinkle with bitters and add the cognac.
- 2. At serving time, uncork the champagne and add to the bowl. Add ice. If desired decorate with fruit.

CUPID'S CRABMEAT AND ARTICHOKE CANAPES

For those of you who think artichokes might be the *nourriture d'amour*, Cupid's arrow may pierce the heart of the one you love. This recipe is tasty, easy to prepare and leaves time for the important things.

1/2 cup Russian dressing

1/4 tsp dry mustard

- 1 six-ounce can crabmeat, pick over well
- 1 ten ounce can artichoke bottoms, drained
- 2 T chopped parsley lemon wedges
- Combine the Russian dressing and mustard and fold in the crabmeat, mixing thoroughly.
- Pile the mixture on the artichoke bottoms. Just before serving, brown the canapes in a preheated broiler and sprinkle with chopped parsley. Garnish with lemon wedges and serve immediately.



PAN'S PRIMAL OYSTERS

In this recipe we combine the aphrodisiac effects of garlic and oysters. Invite the legendary Pan, god of hunting and love to your table and entice your lover to go hunting. (For you!) This may be used as a first course for ten or an entree for five.

1 bunch parsley 2 cloves garlic

1 12 oz. can mushrooms (drained, reserve juice)

1 lb. butter (softened)

1 tsp. black pepper

1 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. nutmeg

1 cup of bread crumbs

5 doz. parboiled oysters

- 1. In a blender or food processor, blend in this order: parsley, garlic and mushrooms, until parsley is finely chopped.
- 2. Add butter and spices and blend again.
- 3. Add mushroom juice and bread crumbs; blend well.
- 4. Place six parboiled oysters in each of four and one half inch au gratin dishes. Smooth butter mixture over them.
- 5. Place under broiler until brown and bubbly.

Note: To parboil oysters, place them in a large pot of cold water. Bring water to a boil and cook two to three minutes until oysters are plump. Next, plunge them immediately in cold water to firm them. Drain.



APHRODITE'S ASPARAGUS TIPS WITH PROSCIUTTO

Aphrodite, goddess of love, may arrange an assignation when you serve this tasty and easy to prepare entree.

24 asparagus tips 8 long thin slices of prosciutto 1/2 cup of butter, melted 3 tbs grated Parmesan cheese

- 1. Preheat oven to 400°F.
- 2. Cook the asparagus in briskly boiling water for approximately ten minutes. Drain well.
- 3. Wrap three asparagus tips in each slice of prosciutto and fasten with a toothpick. Place in a greased baking dish, sprinkle with half the butter and the cheese and bake five minutes. Remove from the oven and pount the remaining butter over the top.





BACCHUS' FILET DE BOEUF

Truffles were prized by royalty all over the world for their aphrodisiac effects. You can please your lover's palate and capture their heart with this entree and "Bacchus", Roman god of love and wine.

3-5 lbs. of filet or tenderloin of beef

2 T. olive oil

1 T. salt

1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper

1 carrot (sliced)

1 T. onion (chopped)

4 T. lemon juice

3 cups of beef stock or boullion

Sauce

6 T. butter (divided)

3 T. flour (browned)

2 cups stock (reserved from beef)

1/2 cup Madeira wine

1 1/2 dozen sliced truffles

- Rub tenderloin with olive oil, salt and pepper.
 Place in pan on top of carrots and onions; pour on lemon juice and let stand for two or three hours.
- 2. Preheat oven to 500°F.
- 3. Pour stock over meat and bake for five minutes. Reduce oven to 350°F and cook to desired done ness, approximately forty minuets for rare.

4. Remove and place on heated serving platter and keep warm. Reserve two cups of stock.

SAUCE

- Melt two tablespoons butter and add browned flour, stirring until smooth. Add reserved stock and Madeira, stirring slowly to thicken. Cook for fifteen minutes over medium heat.
- 6. In separate pan saute mushrooms (truffles) in remaining butter and add to sauce.
- 7. To serve: Slice meat and arrange. Serve warmed sauce in heated gravy boat.

Note: This serves 4 to 6. To brown the flour put it in a cast iron skillet or other heavy pan, stirring constantly. It should be a golden brown in color. This method enhances the flavor and is wonderful for gravies and sauces.

CASANOVA'S CHESTNUT CREME CHOCOLATE TARTS

This unuusually elegant and attractive dessert will nelt in your mouth and melt your lover's heart. This is rich and delicate at the same time.

6 cold, baked tart shells, each 5 inches in diameter Chestnut-Chocolate Filling (see below) Rich Vanilla Cream Filling (see below) One third cup heavy cream, whipped

Fill the left half of each tart shell with the chestnut-chocolate filling and the right half with the rich vanilla cream filling. Garnish with a row of whipped cream down the middle of each tart.

Chestnut-Chocolate Filling

3/4 cup creme de marrons glazes (chestnut creme)

3 tablespoons butter, softened

1 square (1 ounce) unsweetned chocolate

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Mix the chestnut cream with the softened butter. Melt the chocolate over hot water, cool slightly, and add. Stir in the vanilla extract. Cool.

Note: Chestnut cream is available in finr gourmet food stores.

Rich Vanilla Cream Filling

1/4 cup granulated sugar Dash of salt

3 tablespoons all-purpose flour


1 cup of milk

1 egg, beaten

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

- Combine the sugar, salt, and flour in a saucepan. Gradually stir in the milk and cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thickened.
- 2. Remove from the heat. Stir a little of the mixture into the beaten egg and then blend into the mixture. Cook over low heat until very thich, one to two minutes. Cool.

peel of 1 lemon (cut thin)


3 lumps of sugar

escorts Tune inside. "What a putz!", I think.

Linda turns to shout to me that the lobby's filled with soap opera stars. I, who never watch daytime television, don't have a clue as to who the names belong to that Linda's yelling out, but I can see from a distance through the picture window that on the escalator, beautiful women and men are ascending into the second-story hitherlands.

"MIMI ROGERS!", the fans scream, as I turn to watch the arrival of the beautiful, leggy actress who plays Streisand's mean sister in Mirror. The arrival of Jeff Bridges follows and the crowd goes nuts. The film crews rush him, the fans scream his name and flash bulbs pop-pop-pop as Bridges interviews with all the crews. When he turns to acknowledge the fans behind the barricades, worshippers surge forward and press against the blockade. Security men come running and firmly stand their ground between the frenzied worshippers and Streisand's new cinematic leading man. We all voice approval of his striking new look...hair long and blond, framing his face like a studly lion's mane. A new bushy goatee frames his mouth. He exuberantly waves to the throng of thrilled fans and we scream back our adoration of him before he leaves us for the safer milieu of the theatre lobby.

We have a moment to catch our breath. My eyes fix again on Marty Erlichmen, who has finally put away the cellular phone that has been fixed to his ear for more than an hour. All that could possibly be left is the arrival of ...SHE!

A brief moment of anticipatory silence ensues as we all brace for the big moment. With bated breath, I watch Marty, fixed stoically at the theatre entrance. My heart begins to pound and I'm aware of its increasing rhythm beating out of my ears.

I'm suddenly aware of my own breathing and have to actually make an attempt to bring air into my lungs. I make a feeble attempt to suck in more oxygen. I no longer feel the cold air I've been shivering in all evening. Suddenly I'm warm all over. My palms actually begin to sweat and my legs feel like rubber bands.

As if hearing a silent starter pistol,

Marty suddenly bolts down the red car-

pet. The film crews surge heavily to their right, bodies and cameras, hand-held microphones and elevated lights, moving and pressing and crushing into one another in a cacophony of crashing waves of jumbled, frenzied humanity. The fans rush forward, pressing into the wooden barricades. Linda leaves her post and races into the crowd surging forward, forward, forward, the barricades wheezing under the weight of bodies pressed into it. I firmly stand my ground on the concourse bench, head and shoulders above the blur of people and lights in front of me. The night air is filled with a chorus of shouts from the media crews of one name only as the God Of My Idolatry debarks. still unseen by me, from her heavenly chariot-limo and steps onto the red carpet. Flash bulbs pop and pop and pop in the direction that she is coming from. I wait, I watch...and then, suddenly, suddenly...THERE SHE IS!!!...THERE SHE

IS!!!...THERE SHE IS!!! Unknowingly, I'm screaming these three words repeatedly, as if singing lyrics from Sunday in the Park With George. The next day, while watching all the television coverage I can find, I

realize it's my voice I hear above the crowd screaming "BAR-BRA!!!...BAR-BRA!!!"

A shock of white hair greets us...it's handsome James Brolin, Barbra's new "soul mate". At 6'3", we can see him clearly as he protectively holds one arm around Barbra while waving to the fans. She herself also looks tall. Her hair looks so-o-o big and blond as it reflects the flash bulbs and media lights now trained on her. A large, bugle-beaded beret anchors her big, big hair. She looks so big in person, I think. Not this tiny little wisp of a woman I've been told she is. She's wearing an oversized black coat with matching bugle-beaded piping down the sleeves over an ankle-length black skirt. I realize she's looming large because she's tottering on very high-heeled black boots.

Brolin and Streisand never break their fast gate as they move toward the theatre entrance. Like an obedient lackey, Marty follows discretely, making sure he stays several feet behind the couple. The media yell questions at Barbra, and she, midstride, yells back answers to them, her voice, lost to us in the din. Center stage on the red carpet, Barbra stops, turns to the screaming throng of worshippers, holds her arm up high and waves to us. We go crazy and cheer our adoration at her.

Now you see her...now you don't, as she and Brolin are whisked inside the Ziegfeld theatre. So fast, I think. It all hap-



pened so fast. I leap from my perch and race with the fans to the theatre's picture window, hoping for just one last glimpse of my deity.

The tallest man in the world has fixed himself, like a suction-cupped stuffed animal, onto the picture window. I have to bob and weave under and around him to see inside. I can see, I can see, and I'm one of the privileged few of devoted voyeuristic talesman to bear witness to the pantomime that begins inside the lobby: Barbra and Brolin have entered the theatre and are positioning themselves between the lobby's escalator and staircase. The press jump the gun and begin to pop flash bulbs into Streisand's celebrated face. Streisand holds up her much ballyhooed hands, as if to say, "Wait, wait, wait!" This is too much for me and I scream to the fans behind me, "She's directing!...She's directing the press!" That's my Barbra, true to form!

The flashbulbs stop their popping as Streisand squarely positions herself to the left of Brolin. I, however, have the best view of her; as Jami Bernard said in her New York Daily News review of *The Mirror Has Two Faces*: "The right half of Barbra Streisand's face is like the far side of the moon---we trust that it exists, but we've never seen it." I, however, like an extraterrestrial lunar astronaut, have the best, and certainly the longest observance that I can remember, of the deity's right profile.

Now firmly positioned to her liking, on Brolin's left, and as if she has said "GO!", the barrage of camera people, like an effervescent firing squad, begin their rat-a-tat-tat of flash bulbs into the awaiting couple's eyes. As if reflecting a hail of heavenly fireworks, Barbra's face is lit up like the Statue of Liberty's on the Fourth of July...and I clearly see for the first time just how beautiful that face is. The camera must not like this woman's face, for in person, it is unbelievably more beautiful than any graven image of it her public has ever seen. "She's absolutely beautiful...she's beautiful," I murmur aloud. And she looks so big to me. Maybe I've seen too much of her on television, I think, for in person, she looks so big. And she doesn't look real to me. More like a waxworks. Like real-life Barbie and Ken dolls, I decide, as the barrage of flash bulbs continue their Tommy gun-like bombardment upon the couple.

Being pressed up against the glass as I am, looking in at it all, the scene being played out in front of me appears surrealistic, as if I'm being pressed up to the glass of a large-screen television broad-

casting Barbra's likeness.

Blinded now by the hail of flashbulb fireworks, Streisand and Brolin flee the photographers and effect the unimaginable: all evening, through the picture window, I've watched the stars ascend into the heavens via the theatre escalator at the far side of the lobby; Streisand and Brolin give us an added treat. They turn, and being closer to the lobby staircase at the picture window, they appear in front of us, on the steps, only inches away, so close that if the glass were not separating me from her, I could reach out and grab her. She looks miffed, I observe, perhaps because she's consequently blinded by the flash bulbs, or, I guess further, because some detail of this choreographed evening did not happen as meticulously planned. In any event, I am now inches from the celebrated face, and I see how heavily, albeit, beautifully the Streisand face is painted and powdered...details that don't read through a camera lens.

Lacking the ethereal quality provided by the escalator for the ascending exits of the other evening's stars, Streisand's exit on the staircase just inches from me give she and Brolin a more flesh-and-blood feel. The celebrated nose of the hardly ever-before-seen right profile leads the momentarily-flashbulb-blinded woman in front of me up the stairs. Streisand tentatively trod's each step carefully, feeling the solidity of the carpeted steps firmly with each foot before lifting her body up onto each of them. Brolin has an amused look on his face as he stares down through the window and into the faces of we fans. I notice how handsome he is, how tailored and expensive-looking his suit and tie are.

Now you see her...now you don't! She's gone from sight...the elusive Streisand! It all happened so fast, I think. I'm left unsatisfied, like a neo-King Tantalus of ancient Greek mythology.

Wanting more, my friend and I return to the theatre two hours later to watch the stars leave the theatre. If Streisand's entrance lasted mere minutes, her exit lasts mere seconds. Her limo pulls up onto the sidewalk at the opened doors of the theatre, Streisand gallops out, followed by Brolin, waves quickly to the screaming crowds, and departs. Security turns to pulp after Barbra's exit, and we watch the stars fend for themselves as they depart the theatre, aided only by chauffers and a handful of New York City police.

We learn from a chatty policewoman that an after-movie gala is being staged at the Tavern on the Green. We race up

Central Park West and watch a repeat of the evening's hysterics, now played out in front of the twinkling, lightbulb-lit trees of the Tavern's exterior. Nearly midnight now, party favors are handed out to guests as they depart: red-ribboned CD copies of the *Mirror* soundtrack along with one red rose. The paparazzi are now out in force and run ramrod over anyone in their way as they snap the photos that we know we'll see for months hence on the pages of The Globe and The National Enquirer.

On the road out of the park I see someone has dropped a single red rose. I retrieve it from the cold cement, and save it to press into my scrapbook. My one solid remembrance of my pilgrimage to the premiere.

Briefly, before leaving the city, we drive past Streisand's Central Park residence, then over to 84th and West End Avenue to see the apartment building used as Rose Morgan's home in *Mirror*.

Later, ensconced on the Turnpike, we drive back through New Jersey, back to our uncelebrated lives in Philadelphia.

I say to my friend, "You know what, Linda? I never want to do this again. I never want to be that kind of a fan. I have a life." "I know what you mean," she says. "Let's not ever do this again." And then it hits me..."You know what, Linda," I say, "James Brolin's filming a movie in Ireland. About a year from now it might have a premiere in New York City and Streisand might be there."

"Would you go?", she asks.
"Well, we could,", I reply. "Now we have on-the-job training.

As we drive quietly home, the words of Tom Wingo come to mind again, as they had only hours before. They seem to accurately interpret my post-pilgrimage hangover succinctly. I paraphrase and personalize them in my thoughts.

As I cross the bridge that takes me from New Jersey into Philadelphia, I feel the words building inside me. I can't stop them or tell you why I say them. But as I reach the top of the bridge, these words come to me in a whisper. I say them as prayer, as regret, as praise. I say:

"...STREISAND!...STREISAND!" X
