FROM THE PRESIDENT

"If you treat a person as he is, he will stay as he is; but if you treat him as if he were he ought to be and could be, he will become what he ought to be and could be." GOETHE

I am constantly surprised at how many gay people continue to stereotype themselves, and other gays as well, and persist in regarding themselves in the same light year after year. Yet I am convinced that we all have a residual capacity to rise to new levels of expectations and to become more than we are. To work in DIGNITY is to realize this to an even greater degree. The seeds sewn months and even years ago take time to grow and become, but with persistence and patience they flourish. Time after time we find people who take cursory interest in DIGNITY but do nothing about it for a long time. These people have stereotyped themselves into believing that there is nothing to be gained from satisfying that deep hunger for spiritual growth and personal development.

If we are to be true to our calling to be members of DIGNITY, and its ministers, then we have to not just look at who we are but what we are becoming. We have to realize our own potential for growth and development and when it comes time to be of service we ought not stereotype ourselves into believing we are not up to the job. After all, if everyone thought that way, there would be no DIGNITY.

When others come to DIGNITY we have to see not just what is, but what is to become. DIGNITY works with potentialities, not just with actualities, and must recognize that the desire to develop and improve is a vital part of the person. This capacity is easily discouraged and people will sink back into themselves when they perceive that we are rejecting, not supporting or rejecting their efforts to shed the old stereotypes. Only the most aggressive and determined can accomplish this against these odds, and the rest need our help. For it must be remembered that DIGNITY is not a process of stuffing people like sausages, but of eliciting from people their potentialities hidden even from themselves. Leo Cardinal Suenens put it very succinctly when he offered this: The Greatest Good that you can do for another is not just to share with him your riches, but to reveal to him his own." I believe this is the special service that each and everyone of us is called to in DIGNITY.

Several months ago, in a midwestern state, a priest took his own life. At his funeral more than a thousand shocked friends jammed the church. His bishop declared: "Father was a good priest in every sense of the word".

FROM A FATHER TO HIS SON

I want to take this opportunity to thank you and Tom for your welcome, hospitality, and concern to me during my visit. I have never seen you happier, or more alive. You are more open, more mature, self-fulfilled, loveable, and freer than ever before. It was great to see you looking and feeling so good.

I was pleased to meet Tom. You are good for one another. All relationships require the best of us for continual growth and development. The gay relationship is even that much more demanding because of the enormous amount of hurts, pain and rejection in the past and the tendency to be introspective, to ingrowth etc. It seems to me it would be easier to offend and quicker to be upset. I'm guessing that there is even a greater need for outside nurturing, and affirmation outside of the normal gay relationship so that one doesn't feel so drained, exhausted, and pessimistic. There is a real need for inspiration which I believe in your particular case of Tom could best be fulfilled in an ongoing relationship with a spiritual confessor - someone who would be an external source of affirmation, a special help for spiritual development and growth. Of course you both would have to search to find the right kind of priest or sister to fill that role.

There is one thing that I believe that I observed about the gay community: it is their over concern about themselves; their needs; their sexuality and in general their overeaction to the straight world. This of course is quite natural for to be gay is to be in pain and a yearning for greater understanding, acceptance and approval of one's own self-worth.

The potential of Dignity is mindboggling, not just for the San Francisco community, but for its natural leadership role for the country, and even for the world.

Dignity speaks to each gay's need for self-worth, for his spiritual hunger, for affirmation and acceptance in his and her own Church, to be nurtured, to be understood and to be prized as a child of God - it offers a deep sense of community to those who need it most and to members who cannot but help to feel abandoned by their own families, their church, their community and their country.
