Have you been reading the newspapers? Who among us would choose to be called disgusting, immoral or perverted? Would you prefer to be called right-wing, a

moralist, or a bible-thumper?

I have never before been called so many names and lumpted into so many categories by so many people I don't even know. It really makes me angry. These names and prejudices cut to the bone. They strike at my very being, not my behavior, but at my core. They attack my self-image, devalue my worth and put me a step below other people. I can't believe that someone labeling me in such ways could accept me at any level.

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#### OUR FINEST HOUR?

By a vote of 4 to 1 on February 16, York's City Council added sexual orientation to the city's anti-discrimination law. Mayor Althaus has signed the bill, and it will become law by mid-March. An effort to undo the action failed, when a petition gathered only 389 of the required 1,252 signatures by the February 26 deadline.

For those of us heavily involved in supporting this action, the past two months have been both frightening and encouraging, tiring and exhilarating, expensive and rewarding. While it is impossible to know just how much they affected the outcome, the efforts led by Lambda were ambitious and numerous.

We obtained extensive information on Paul Cameron's record and reputation, and distributed it among the Council and the media, along with our own Position Statement. The special edition Lambdan helped mobilize our community to attend the Council meetings, and the signature ad we sponsored in the Sunday News just before the vote gave nearly 400 citizens an opportunity to express their support. And we responded to numerous media requests for information and interviews.

We believe we have already reaped benefits beyond anything in the law itself. Whenever people fight for their rights, their feelings of integrity and self-worth are strengthened. During the last few weeks, many closet doors were cracked open, many were opened a bit further, and some were totally shattered. When Theta came out at the Council meeting, she also helped educate a certain anti-Gay minister she has known for years. When Kate and Cindy had their picture in the Sunday News and appeared in television interviews, they showed that happy gay couples do exist here. Every gay person whose name appeared in the signature ad or in letters to the editor helped strengthen the communityand showed true pride. The more we stand up for ourselves, the more we will accomplish together, and the more positive we will feel about ourselves.

A surprising and gratifying number of

non-gay individuals and organizations went out of their way to support the ordinance, and to help educate the general public. A student at York Country Day School got 20 classmates to sign on the ad form. Even though we wouldn't use minors' names in the ad without parental permission, these students showed us a glimpse of, and gave us hope for, a future without ignorance, prejudice or hate.

about being labeled. They view these labels as judgemental and demeaning. These labels, however, describe beliefs and values held by people-- not the persons themselves. If I were called right-wing, conservative and rigid, I would probably be offended. I might even feel hurt, but my integrity as a human being, my self-worth and my value would not be diminished.

I can live in society with conservative, right-wing bible thumpers. They bother me, not because I disagree with their position, but because they are mean and disrespectful. However, I do hold onto the hope that, with patience and education, they will begin to open their minds and try to view differences as less terrible and threatening.

ON COMING OUT

As many of you know by now, Cindy and I "came out"

in a big way in the York Sunday News on January 17, 1993. It was a difficult decision to make, and neither one of us did so without considering the potentially negative effects of taking such a bold step. We worried (Cindy by day, and me by night) about the reactions of our families, co-workers and non-gay friends. We were concerned that some of our Lesbian and gay sisters and brothers might not want to be associated with folks who were so open. But the pictures were taken and the article was written, so there was nothing left to do but wait and see.

I didn't sleep much that Saturday night. When I went downstairs Sunday morning and retrieved the paper from the front steps, my heart skipped a beat -- the first thing I saw was my name under a quote that was printed BIG AND BOLD on the front page! I turned the paper over with trepidation, expecting to see our faces. I was relieved when that wasn't the case. I read the article, which was continued to page 4. I opened to that page, and nearly fainted -- the picture was SO BIG! I rationalized, "It doesn't look that much like me, but Cindy is so photogenic, anyone would recognize her."

We agreed that the reporter had done a good job, and that our views were accurately reported. The only thing to do was wait for the phone to start ringing ... and it did, at 8 a.m. It was a dear friend of ours, offering her congratulations! Of the five or six calls we received that day, only two were negative, and they were the only ones we've ever gotten. One was from a woman who said, "yous should be run outta town. If yous weren't so fat and ugly, yous could get a man." The other call was left on the machine, and neither caller would give their name. tone was menacing, but made no real I guess anonythreats of violence. mity, with or without white sheets, is still the refuge of cowards.

Our friends and families are still speaking to us, the sky has not fallen and the world still turns. The support and encouragement we have received has more than compensated for those two phone calls. But the best result of all is that a number of our friends and acquaintances were able to come out too, to their bosses, their families and their non-gay friends.

We are not advocating that everyone come rushing out of the closet. Each person must know where they are in their evolution, and how important not having to hide such a major aspect of their lives is to them. We can attest to a great feeling of freedom. We feel that our young people need visible role-We feel that if the non-gay models. world gets to know us as responsible, productive, law-abiding friends, neighbors and loved ones, the less we will be burdened with the debilitating effects of homophobia. It's easy to fear and hate the unknown. It's hard to hate people that you know to be worthwhile human beings.

legally married, with from 2 to 12 children. Threatened with extinction whenever any people not fitting the formula are offered any recognition or

respect.

FAMILY VALUES: Love, devotion, work, honesty, loyalty -- but only when found

in a TRADITIONAL FAMILY .

GAY LIFESTYLE: The most bizaare dress and behavior ever seen in San Francisco

or New York City parades.

CHOOSING GAY LIFESTYLE: Remember when you were 12 or 14 years old, and after considering your options and the lifelong consequences, you decided to be gay? Evidently, that's how straight people get to be the way they are. PROMOTING GAY LIFESTYLE: (1) Gay people seeking any legal protection or feeling any sense of worth, or (2) Gay people being accorded any protection or recognition.

FLAUNTING GAY LIFESTYLE: Gay people no longer willing to pretend to be straight and to laugh at anti-gay jokes

and remarks.
