The news came at the beginning of a board meeting following her February leave of office due to illness within her family. Peg said it was a difficult decision for her to make, but she needed more time on a regular basis because of the continuing illness of one of her parents, her responsibilities at work and her need to spend more time with her partner, Delma. #### Dear YAL Members and Friends,

Many of you know that I have been dealing with my father's cancer diagnosis and his declining health since radiation treatments. Since my mother's death in 1992, he has been managing alone, but that independence appears to be coming to an end. Practical matters aside, we have had to negotiate a

new relationship, one that neither of us is completely comfortable with. It has all been stressful, to say the very least.

The stress level led me finally to some decisions about how my limited time can be spent. With mixed emotions, I have resigned as president of YAL, six months into my second term. When I say mixed emotions, of

course one of them is regret- at not finishing out my term after your vote of confidence, and at losing the sense of being part of a great team, namely your board.

According to the process laid out in the YAL bylaws, Doug Warner is now your president. I have every confidence in the world in Doug's leadership abilities. And I have every confidence that board members will continue on as we learned to do together-brining their various viewpoints to the table, engaging in respectful and meaningful dialogue with one another, taking individual responsibility for mutual problem solving, and supporting decisions once they are made. Being part of such an amazing group was a wonderful experience for me. Thank you, each one of you.



### **Registering to Vote is easy in Pennsylvania**

Exercising the right to vote has always been important. Given the current conservative political climate, it may also be vital to retaining the Gay and Lesbian rights won during the past few decades.

In Pennsylvania, the "Motor Voter" law has been established to ease the voter registration process. Karen Holk-Stewart, director of Elections in York County, told the Lambdan registering to vote is as easy as taking a trip to one of your usual stops.

Stewart says voter registration cards are readily available at banks, libraries and many Rutter's Farm Stores in the area. Since last October when



the new law took effect, more than 7,000 new voters have been registered. If you know you will be out of the area on Election Day, Tuesday, November 5, you can apply for an absentee ballot. The deadline for both absentee ballots and Voter registration in October 7.

The registration card asks for your name, address, and how you want to be registered. You may select a political party or simply register as an independent. It's important to remember that in order to participate in a primary election, you must be a registered member of that same party.

If you are unable to locate Voter registration cards\_in any of the areas mentioned, write the Board of Elections or stop by the office located at 1 West Market Street in York. The office is open weekdays 8:30 to 4:30.

### WITF to televise Gay/Lesbian Magazine Show

Public Television Channel 33 will broadcast a segment of the Gay and Lesbian magazine show, "In the Life" on Sunday June 9, from 12:30 to 1:30 A.M. The monthly show features Kate Clinton as host.

Clinton talks about the new series in a newsletter published to promote it to both stations and viewers. Clting it as the "first real-live, regularly-scheduled, refreshingly-produced and outrageouslyentertaining gay and lesbian magazine show," "In the Life" is being produced for public television without any commercial sponsors.

The host describes the program as a mix of 60 Minutes, Ed Sullivan, Oprah and Saturday Night Live which contains a kaleidoscope of Theater, comedy, film, people, music, health, politics ; and debates. It's taped before a live studio audience of 200 high-energy folks who spark some real fireworks when addressing controversial issues.

Life is John Scaglotti, the Emmyaward winning director of Before Stonewall. Other members of the In the Life team come from Showtime, Comedy Central, A

&E, HBO, USA, Gay Cable Network, and advertising and production staffs on both East and West coasts.

#### California Mother of ten authors


#### Mother's Day gift for parents of gay children

SAN RAFAEL, Calif.--Mother's Day is always one of the biggest holidays of the year for Mary Ann Cantwell, a 74-year-old retired teacher who is the mother of 10 children. This year's event marks a special celebration for Mary Ann and her fifth son, Mike, who is gay -- the publication of Mary Ann's book.. Called: "Homosexuality: The Secret A Child Dare Not Tell," (Rafael Press), the book discusses a subject once taboo, the guilt-ridden childhood of most gay youngsters, and the lengths they go to keep their homosexuality a secret from their parents.

Approximately one in 10 children is homosexual. "Homosexuality is usually a natural unfolding that occurs during the early years of childhood," she said. Through her own experience, she tells parents how to recognize signs their child may be gay, how homosexual children protect parents from the truth, and why parents who ignore the truth can cause lifelong problems for their children.

#### **Rhode Island Cadets Get Diversity Training**

PROVIDENCE, R.I. - A Rhode Island Police department is fighting a bad reputation among minorities with diversity education for its trainees. Cadets' training at the Providence Police Academy included a visit from a police official who is gay. During the cadets' 21 weeks of training, each receive 2 weeks of diversity training. They also perform six hours of volunteer service in community agencies where they learn to deal with different ethnics groups, the poor and the sick. `



#### Poll Shows 3.2% OF U, S. voters are gay

WASHINGTON, D.C. -The first detailed profile of the gay vote pegs it at 3.2 percent of the national electorate - ahead of Asian Americans, equal with Latinos, just behind Jews and well behind African Americans.

The profile, based on exit polling from the 1992 election, confirms the conventional wisdom: The gay vote is heavily urban, Democratic, liberal and concerned with social issues. In towns of 5,000 to 10,000 people, they make up 1.3 percent of voters. In cities of more than a million people, gay men numbered about 8.5 percent of voters, while slightly fewer lesbians voted.

#### Two Lesbian women beaten by neighbors

LONG BEACH, CA -Two women live on Temple Avenue in Long Beach were allegedly beaten by a dozen of their neighbors with sticks that resembled police batons. Their transgression, according to those who live nearby, is that they parked a little too close to some neighbors -- and that they were lesbians. What those in the neighborhood say is that the two women exchanged words with neighbors, possibly over where a car was parked, and that the bloody incident ensued from there.

The incident occurred about 12:25 a.m. when 10 to 12 people from the next block attacked the women after an argument. Long Beach Police spokeswoman Maria Mendez said that during the attack derogatory remarks were made about the sexual orientation of the two women.

### Leader of Human Rights Campaign Sees **A Grand Paradox for the Gay Community**

For the gay community today, says Elizabeth Birch, there exists what she calls ``a grand paradox.''

`On the one hand, Pat Buchanan is lobbing emotional grenades to ignite a hateful spirit,'' says the leader of the Human Rights Campaign, ``but on the other hand most Americans have gone through an enormous education process''.

Many thousands of families have had to grapple with the reality of their sons' and daughters' homosexuality. ``It has been painful and difficult, but mostly parents come out the other end and embrace their child.''

As a result of that education process, homophobia has gone down in the last three years, she said, quoting a *Times Mirror* poll. But legislation doesn't necessarily reflect that.

Clting the yet-to-be-passed Employment Non-Discrimination Act, which would ensure that people could not be fired solely for being gay, lesbian or bisexual, Birch added that Congress is way behind the rest of the country on such civil rights: ` About half of the Fortune 1,000 companies have nondiscrimination policies.''

Last week, Congress and Birch were in tune on one issue: Lawmakers agreed to repeal a law requiring the military to discharge service members with HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. Birch, whose organization had lobbied hard against the law, was jubilant. But the fight may not be over. A panel chaired by ultraconservative Rep. Robert K. Dornan (R., Calif.) quickly tacked a similar discharge measure onto next year's defense budget, and added a bid to ban gays from the military. Such battles are among the reasons that politics and the future of the gay civil rights movement are central to Pride-Fest Philadelphia's first National Gay and Lesbian Leaders Symposium.

The seminar was taped at the Old City studios of cosponsor WHY-FM, and will be broadcast later on National Public Radio.

as the major national annual symposium on the discussion of gay and lesbian issues," said Malcolm Lazing, founder of the three-day political, educational, cultural and social festival held May 3,4, and 5 in Philadelphia..

Elizabeth Birch is well known for her background as chief litigate for Apple Computers Inc., and as one of the highest-ranked openly gay corporate officers in the country. She has a reputation as a negotiator with a conciliatory style who nevertheless seems to get what she wan's. Last year within days, of the start of the new Republican led Congress Birch took the helm of an organization that could expect to find few friends among those newcomers ...

She and her staff chalked up speaking tours, intensive lobbying, grassroots getout-the-vote campaigns. They got House Speaker Newt Gingrich's lesbian halfsister, Candace, to speak out for AIDS funding and gay rights. Nurtured gay and lesbian employee groups in the workplace. Earmarked \$1 million in nonpartisan PAC money. Come August, they'll launch a political convention in Chicago.

For the first time, the organization will stage out vote '96, to rally support and train members to work to influence national, state and local political campaigns this fall.

`I think all new solutions for this country are going to have to take the best of the left and the right," she said.

Just a few weeks ago, she spoke at the University of Notre Dame in support of gay students and faculty. ``A lot of faculty had to sign on to get me on campus, but once I was there I think the leaders were disarmed,'' she said.

`If people can't hear you, there's no use in speaking,'' she adds. ``If we can't find ways to talk to Middle America and traditional institutions, there's no point in taking the podium. Because that's where change occurs - at the Rotary Club and the Jaycees and the Junior League. That's where change occurs.''
