YOU ARE THE CHURCH!

In November and December of 1982 we, the congregation (members and friends) of MCC- Harrisburg made two major decisions. One was to hire Rev. Pat Lichty as part time pastor and the second was to adopt a budget of \$9,900.00 to pay her salary and benefits as well as necessary expenses to continue as a church.

This budget is essentially a bare bones budget and does not rely on fund raisers to help meet expenses. The \$825.00 projected income for each month is broken down with a reliance on \$750.00 of that amount to come from the tithes and offerings. That is a very conservative figure considering the financial prowess of this parti-

cular congregation.

The income from tithes for the five Sunday month of January was \$573.30. Some of this shortage was made up for by the gay skate party. Average attendance in Jan. was 22.2 as compared to 28.5 in Nov. All of that isn't too bad and one can even try to rationalize for the even lower figures for the first two Sundays in Feb. (attendances of 16 and 12 and incomes of \$35.00 and \$60.00) People may have missed Super Bowl Sunday (we only had one womyn in church!) and then we just had that terrible 24 in. blizzard of '83. Even so Rev. Pat Lichty in spite of snow and hours of delay and lay over made it to the Sunday night service all the way from New York City!

What is really bothersome is the change in attitude after the Pastor had been hired. The church had been going great balls of fire through November, perhaps because we felt that we had to go it on our own. After Rev. Lichty had been hired you could feel the air as everyone

breathed a sigh of relief. Perhaps it was everyones thinking that we had a pastor now and could take a break, after all Pat would do it when she got here. Everything would be alright when Pat got here, wouldn't it?

By the time this is published Rev. Lichty and her family will be here. They will have made one of the biggest changes a family can make. The sacrifice that will be made to come here and be a part of our family is great. The adjustments will be hard and time comsuming. It is the responsibility of the congregation of Metropolitan Community Church of Harrisburg to help them with that adjustment. Our love and support is absolutely essential. As members of the Body of Christ God has promised that as we love and care for each other God will bless us all. You see it should not be that everything will be alright when our Pastor arrives but that everything is alright before they come. It should all be right, RIGHT NOW!! God made it clear in I Cor. 12:24-26. It says " But God has adjusted the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior part, that there may be no discord in the body, but that the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together" RSV

Each one of us as a member of this body must perform their function. A few cannot carry the load. Burdens that are shared are light. May each one of us examine our life and ask God if we are doing our part in this Body of our Saviour and King. What a BLESSING we will share when we do our part for God and the Church!!!

Lethal AIDS

I've been reading a lot about Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) lately, and I have to admit that most of the stuff that has come out so far is pretty scary.

In the interest of keeping all the faithful well informed, I will try to condense all I have read for you. Information is the only weapon we have to date to fight this thing.

About 3 years ago doctors began to notice a much-greater-than-normal incidence of Kaposi's Sarcoma, a very rare form of skin cancer among gay men. This particular form of cancer tends to be swift and lethal. Most patients who get it die within six months. Rumors about the "Gay Cancer" began to spread. Fundamentalist leaders took notice.

Since that time, it has been ascertained that the cancer was actually an effect of a much deeper cause. For some reason, the immunological system of certain gay men was breaking down completely, leaving them vulnerable to a host of diseases, not the least of which was Kaposi's Sarcoma and some equal letahl forms of pneumonia.

A lot of speculation went (and is still going) around as to the reason that the immunological systems were breaking down. At first, there seemed to be a link with poppers, but far too many patients who had never used poppers showed up to allow for that possibility. Then the breakdown seemed to be linked with drug or alcohol abuse. But lately there have been patients who do not abuse those things. The cause is still unclear.

One thing is certain: there are 4 different groups of people that are affected by AIDS. 1) Haitian immigrants; 2) Heroine and other injected drug users; 3) Hemophiliacs and others who require blood transfusions; and 4) Homosexual men.

The fundamentalists would like to have us believe that AIDS is actually the wrath of God being visited on us for our sinful lives. Doctors are more inclined to believe that it is a virus.

Apparently there is a virus that affects our immunological system by making it ineffective. This virus is spread in two major media: blood and semen.

The way to catch the virus, then, is from the blood of an infected person (either from sharing a needle with them or from a transfusion) or from injesting their semen either orally, anally, or vaginally. AIDS has shown up in infants of infected mothers.

There is no known cure for AIDS. Once you've got it, you've got it for life--and that life may not last long. There are treatments for many of the diseases you might catch, but the underlying cause remains untreatable at this time.

The only sure-fire way to avoid AIDS is multi-fold: don't share a needle, don't receive transfusions, don't be a Haitian, and don't have sex!

While one cannot avoid being a Haitian or receiving a blood transfusion, we certainly can control our drug and sex lives. Unless you have diabetes, there really is no reason to go sticking needles in your skin. Most folks agree with this, so I won't belabor it. If you are in the habit of self injection of recreational drugs, there are several competent substance abuse counselors and agencies in both Lancaster and Harrisburg to help you. Check the blue pages of the phone book or call the church.

As far as sex goes, the best alternative to celibacy I know is an exclusive relationship with one other sex partner (a.k.a. "lover" or "spouse.") If you absolutely, positively have a need for promiscuity, moderation is the watchword. The more you know about your sex partners, the safer you will be. If you are only satisfied by endless nights of anonymous sex, then you really are courting danger. (And I suspect that if you engage in endless nights of anonymous sex, you aren't being satisfied by it, anyway.)

How ironic that a little virus can inflict on us what Jerry Falwell was unable to -- straight morality!

I must mention that the virus theory is not yet proven, but it does explain most of phenomena thus far observed.

I ANCASTER!

After some delay and disappointment, GayRap is finally scheduled to begin in Lancaster. GayRap is a rap group for Lesbians and gay men; it is an opportunity to meet and get to know new people for those unaccustomed to, unwelcome in, or uncomfortable in the bar/bookstore scene.

Our first meeting will be at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, March 10 in Emerson Hall at the Unitarian Center, 538 W.

Chestnut St., Lancaster.

The plan is for the group to meet every two weeks for planned discussion as well as free form discussion on any topics that might be on the minds of the participants. A convenient day, time, and meeting place will also be considered at the first meeting.

Originally we had planned to kick this whole program off with much hoopla and the showing of the film, "Word Is Out" in order to draw a large initial crowd. However, the public library put the kibosh on that idea by refusing to verify our reservation of the film until 2 days before the projected date. The film, therefore, has been rescheduled for May 5.

A collection will be taken to pay for the room rental. MCC-Lancaster has agreed to subsidize the collection to meet the required amount up to a point, but after the first few meetings, the group will be expected to support itself.

Its success, then, depends on your support. We feel that this is a valuable ministry to the gay and lesbian community of Lancaster. If you agree, show your support by being there on March 10th. GayRap will be what you make it!

LENT IN LANCASTER

The emphasis for Lent in the Lancaster Study Group will be on Stewardship this year. In his sermon on the first Sunday of Lent, Art Runyan challenged the congregation to stand on the promise of God.

Specifically he mentioned the promise God makes to God's people in Malachi 3:10, "Bring the full amount of your tithes to the Temple, so that there will be plenty of food there. Put me to the test and you will see that I will open the windows of heaven and pour out on you in abundance all kinds of good things."

"This is not meant that you should bring 10% of all you earn into the church as a get-rich-quick scheme," explained Arthur, "but rather that the tired old excuse that you cannot afford to give to God what God requests of you is no longer valid (for that matter, it

never was)."

Members and friends of MCC-Lancaster are being challenged to set aside 10% of their gross income for God's work either in the Lancaster church or in charities of their own choosing. In addition, all participants in worship services are being asked to consider bringing two items of non-perishable food each week as an offering to the Lancaster County Council of Churches Food Bank.

This should net about 30 cans and/or boxes of food each week. It is estimated that this will feed 2

or three families a week.

"As far as the tithe (10%) of gross income goes," Arthur said, "I think that a lot of people are going to be in for a big surprise. It is truly miraculous how much money you have left when you set aside God's portion first, and it is amazing how little you have left when you don't!"

God has also seen fit to bring to the church several gifted pianists and future plans for a reg lar special music ministry are in the fire. Completing this months music outreach are the plans for the Gospel Concert to be held at the YWCA on Market St. on April 15th at 7:30 PM The Scripture verse adopted for this Month is taken from Psm. 89:la- I WILL SING OF THE LORD'S GREAT LOVE FOREVER ... in to the opponent?"



There will be a fundraiser for AIDS research in New York in the near future. Please see the article elsewhere in FREEDOM explaining the details.

Until a cure is found (or, better yet, a vaccine) one thing is for sure: gay men who want to live long are going to have to drastically alter their sexual habits.

One final note: the vast majority of AIDS cases among gay men are located in New York City and San Francisco. However, the top ten cities for AIDS also includes Philadelphia, Baltimore, and Washington. Cases have been reported in the Lehigh Valley, apparently imported from New York. I do not know of any cases in Lancaster or Harrisburg, but that does not mean there aren't any. Still, those of us in the small cities in central Pennsylvania have a lot less to worry about than do those in the big cities. But, considering the high mobility of our community and the number of folks who like to spend weekends in the big cities, our advantage is only one of
