BLESSED be the GIVER

On a Saturday a couple of weeks ago, six church members helped us move. This was no small task being that we are a family of four (and have furniture and possessions for all of us) plus equipment and furniture from my former graphics business. We moved 4 desks, 4 dressers, a piano, refrigerator, freezer, sofa bed plus many other boxes and pieces. It took us from 10:30 in the morning 'til 9:30 at night. It was a day of physically difficult work which we all shared.

After we had finished, an amazing thing happened. The people who helped us all made "testimony" to how much their day of helping <u>us</u>, made <u>them</u> feel better. After busting themselves for a whole day of hard labor without "recompense", they bordered on a state of consciousness that could only be called "ecstatic".

It made me think about a passage from Ecclesiastes I have read: "Cast your bread upon the waters, for in time you will find it".

It's really true. When you do something for someone, you become "blessed". Not so much bless'd by God (1 syllable) -that God "rewards" you by making you feel good, but bless-ed (2 syllables) -- by your actions you are infused with a feeling of well-being, of ecstacy. You become bless-ed, in a new state of oneness with the other creations of God. God transforms you. You are on God's side again. by Laurie Israel

At times I feel that I've gone "off the track". I feel depressed, alienated, out of sorts. I feel separated from God, other people, and the beautiful creations around us. I know this is a human feeling that everyone has at times, but it's really hard to shake. In times like these, we can't read the Bible, have no joy in relating to people -- life itself seems to have lost its glimmer.

But there is preventative medicine for this ailment. When I consecrate some of my time and energy to helping other people, I tend to feel good (blessed) <u>all</u> the time. In fact, the mathematical formula for this seems to be: the harder and longer you work for others, the more benefits accrue to you. That is why that 12-hour stint by our six friends gave them so much.

Our commitment as followers of God consists of the three "T's": Time (spent in working for others), Talent (using your Godgiven talent, whatever it may be), and Tithes (setting aside onetenth of your monetary funds to further the work of this community). Doing all these things to the fullest is the most important thing each of us can do for the sake of MCC, and even more importantly for the sake of ourselves. It is a sure cure to what ails us.

"Real Good Salad Dressing"


PENNSYLVANIA DUTCH HOME REMEDIES


NEW EDITORS OF FREEDOM COME FORTH

God's Good News

June, as you may know, is Gay Pride Month around the country. The event is marked by celebrations all across the land. Once again, MCC-Lancaster is sponsoring a bus trip to Washington, D.C. for Gay Pride Day on June 19. And while I have not been officially informed of it, I rather imagine that Dignity/Central Pennsylvania will once again host a bus to New York City for Gay Pride Day there, usually held one week after the event in Washington.

But what of Central Pennsylvania? How do we celebrate Gay Pride here except by going off to other cities to celebrate? Different bars are holding individual celebrations, and different clubs and organizations are holding special events (usually at bars), but where, oh where, is the "Gay Pride March" or the "Street Festival" so common in the larger cities? Here in Central Pennsylvania we keep our pride firmly hidden in the closet!

"But we're not ready for that, here. . ." I hear you protest. Well, let me tell you something. Folks in the big cities are not ready for it either, but they do it anyway. Gay Pride Day celebrations are not only indicators of how far we have come, but also indications of our vision for the future.

And there is much more to Gay Pride than marches and street festivals. They are only the outward manifestations of an inner-felt grace. Gay Pride may be expressed in the streets, but it is felt in our hearts. And if it is not there, then the street festivals are all a sham, anyway.

As a gay Christian did you ever feel like a double outcast? The Christian church does not want us because of certain behavior we practice in the privacy of our own bedrooms, and the gay community does not want us because we have sold out to the oppressive, patriarchal Christian church. That is like being stuck between a rock and a hard place. But, believe it or not, there is good news here. And that is because in MCC gay pride and the good news of Jesus Christ come together. They may not know it yet, but MCC is and will continue to be instrumental in the reconciliation of God and God's people. Both the Christian church and the gay community need us very much (and we need them) in order that God's plan for humankind will be fulfilled.

It is for this reason that Gay Pride Day takes on special meaning for gay Christians. Gay Pride Day is the culmination of what we preach and teach all year. At its heart Gay Pride Day is an affirmation that we, as gay people, are not dirt. On Gay Pride Day we claim our full humanity with the rest of humankind. This is in perfect accord with the gospel that we preach. Jesus died that *all* might live. We, God's gay children, are just as much heirs to the promise as the rest of God's children. God does not play favorites. God loves us, just the way we are. We don't have to change to please God. Straight Christians may want us to change to please them, but that is *their* wish, not God's!

As Worship Coordinator of MCC-Lancaster, it falls my lot to teach workshops on the Bible and Homosexuality. I have taught many in the past and I will continue to do so in the future. But I am coming to believe that such workshops really miss the point of what is at stake here. They are important because they are the antidote to all the poison that straight Christians have been feeding us for years about what they think the Bible says. As important as that is, it is still only a first step, and many of us are now ready to start taking other steps. The time is come for workshops on Homosexuals and the Bible. Once we have internalized the truth that God does not condemn us for being gay, we must move on to the more pressing question: What is the good news for God's Gay children? What does Jesus Christ have to say to us? How does the gospel relate to us?

I expect to spend the rest of my life finding answers to those questions, but this much I do know. I know that we are created in the image of God. And I know that we, as creatures of God, are good. And I know that reconciliation with God is possible for any who will have faith in Jesus as the risen Christ. And I know that the dominion of God is for all those who in faith claim the promise as theirs. And I know that try as they might, humans cannot place restrictions on who may or may not enter God's dominion. Admission standards are up to God, and Jesus says, "Come unto me all ye who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest."

Gay Pride means that the gospel is true. But it is the gospel which comes first. Gay Pride only exists because the gospel is true. But because the gospel is true, we are free (dare I say expected) to claim our pride. Gay Pride starts within—with prayer, but it is manifest in every area of our lives. As we celebrate Gay Pride this year, let us remember the gospel from which it springs. And let us not be afraid to proclaim Gay Pride, because it is really the gospel which we are proclaiming. Let us not be ashamed of our gay identity any more than we are ashamed of the Gospel. For if we are not ready for Gay Pride, then I fear we are not ready to receive the gospel.
