PRIDE * 78 THE PENNSYLVANIA GAY CONFERENCE

#1 Introduced by, Dan Maneval, Co-ordinator of H.O.W.

WREREAS, the Pride '78 conference offered an opportunity to exchange knowledge and information;

WHEREAS, the Pride '78 conference offered an opportunity to establish rapport and friendships among peoples;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this conference be repeated on an annual basis for the exchange of knowledge and information as well as the rapport and friendships established may continue.
