On Dec. 6, the Rural Caucus of Pennsylvania, met in Bethlehem, Pa. for its monthly meeting. Le-Hi-Ho of the Lehigh Valley hosted the meeting. The meeting was chaired by Janet Cooper. On the subject ofa permanent structure, it was decided that the group remain as is and travel throughout the state meeting at designated places. The sponsoring organization will then chair the meeting.

A monthly newsletter that would inform all interested persons of the progress made by the Caucus was established. It was decided unanimously that it operate out of Lancaster County using the facilities of Gays

United of Lancaster.

Political tactics were discussed concerning Senate Bills 196 and 743. Plans are being made for a Legislation Day in Harrisburg soon after the first of the year, the day being a good oppurtunity for Gays to meet with legislators on the position of Gay Civil Rights.

Areas represented at the Caucus were: Allentown, Reading, Lancaster,

Northumberland, Wilkes-Barre, Shippensburg, Bloomsburg, Scranton, Del-

aware, and also northern Maryland.

The next meeting of the Caucus is scheduled for Saturday, Jan.10 at lpm in Reading, Pa. (map enclosed) The Gay Coordinating Society of Reading and Berks County will host the meeting. There will also be a get-together after the meeting over a cold buffet.

PGN EXPANDS TO PHILADELPHIA
