titled MAKING LOVE.





BOOKS. A SEPTEMBER PUBLICATION

Under the suspices of the Caucus on Gay Male & Lesbian Concerns of the Speech Communication Assoc., a new book entitled Gay Male & Lesbian Communication will be available for class-room adoptions and as a personal reference work in Sept. 1981. The volume is edited by Dr. J. W. Chesebro of Temple Univ. and is being published by The Pilgrim Press of the United Church in New York.

The book posits a new approach for dealing with homosexuality as a social issue. Previous approaches have emphasized the overt biological and sexual release which occurs between two members of the same sex and then traced consequential behaviors as extended by-products of the sexual act. The alternative and central premise of this book is that homosexuality is a social issue because of the social reality people have created about homosexuality. Human reactions have made homosexuality a social issue. Insofar as responses to homosexuality are the issue, this book argues that these responses should be the proper subect of inquiry when dealing with homosexiality as a social issue. communication perspective adopted by this book is particularly well designed to deal with an inquiry into the use of human responses and counterreponses as the method used to define the social meanings of sexual behavior.

Major sections within the book deal with "The Social Meanings of the Words Homosexual, Gay & Lesbian," "Inside the Gay Community, " "Homophobia, " "Institutional Forces Shaping the Public Images of Gay Males & Lesbians," "Gay Liberation as a Rhetorical Movimt," and "Gay Rights & the Political Campaigns." Particular chapters deal with topics such as the effect of labeling a person homosexual. coming out as a communication process, recognition among lesbians in stright settings, gay masculinity in the gay disco, gay fantasies in gay publications, Anita Bryant & homophobia, media reactions to gay liberation, lesbianfeminist rhetoric as a social movimt, and gay civil rights and the roots of oppression, among several other topics.

The book is composed of 26 essays. Eighteen of the essays are original works published for the 1st time in this volume while 8 are major, if not landmark,

articles on gay male & lesbian communication issues which have appeared in print before. Authors of these essays are typically communication professors associated with the major institutions of higher education throughout the United States.

The volume is tenatively priced at \$13.95 per paperback copy. All royalities derived from the same of the book are donated to the Caucus on Gay Male & Lesbian Concerns of the Speech Communication Assoc., a solely educational, non-profit division of the Speech Communication Assoc.. A NEW BOOK


Guess who's coming to the prom! No one in Cumberland, Rhode Island was surprised when Aaron Fricke appeared at the high school prom with a male date; he had sued his school for the right to do so, and the papers had been full of the news ever since. Magazines like Newsweek and People reported the case, and Fricke appeared on the Phil Donahue and other talk shows.

Yet until his senior year, there would have been nothing to distinguish Aaron Fricke from anyone else his age. You would not have guessed that he was gay—and Fricke did his best to keep it that way. He created a shell around himself as projection against a world that he knew would reject him if it knew the truth. But finally his anger at being stifled became too great, and he decided to make a stand.

Reflections of a Rock Lobster is Aaron Fricke's story, but the thoughts and feelings he describes will ring true with millions of other people who grew up in the closet. With insight and humor, Fricke tells how he first became aware of his homosexual feelings in childhood, then learned to hide them from adults, and finally to repress them completely, before he developed a positive gay identity. Ultimately he gained enough self-confidence to take a gay date to his senior prom, and thus for the first time drew nationwide attention to the fact even teenagers can be gay.
