In October and November of 2001, nine women participated in a nine-week workshop, Moving with Cancer and Beyond. Of those nine, one is still fighting cancer; some are cancer survivors; some are family members or close friends of those who had cancer and, in several cases, had died from cancer; one was a professional who works with cancer patients.

Confidentiality and anonymity has always been a trust l give to each participant in my workshops and individual sessions and l ask the same from participants. Thus, it is not my practice to put before the public such private work as you will be privileged to peek into as you tour the writings and images on the bulletin boards.

The workshop began during Breast Cancer Month, and for that reason I asked the women to think about eventually showing their images and sharing their writings in a "gallery showing" open to the public after closure of the workshop. I felt it would be important for others with breast cancer to have the opportunity to view the images and read the writings. When the workshop closed, all said "Yes!" they wished to share, to impart a sense of what they had experienced. All felt this kind of work was an important piece of their moving closer towards healing from cancer and that which was "cancerous" in their life.

I refer to these images as "cave drawings" as they come from the deeper recesses of the mind where we visualize in imagery — the place before words take over and shape the vision. Take time to read and ponder and let yourself get a sense of these women's journey. I honor their work and feel extremely privileged to have facilitated each of these women's special journey.





Daniel Krynak, Artistic Director

In December 2000, Dan Krynak retired after ten years as Artistic Director of the Harrisburg Men's Chorus and became our director. In 1993, he was instrumental in founding our chorus, and served on our board for several years. He has led the two choruses in several major collaborations: Bendari, an African-based celebration of building community; Boys and Girls with Stories, a lesbian and gay musical; and in December 2000, singing with Judy Collins. He holds a Master's of Church Music from the University of Southern California and a Bachelor's degree from Westminster Choir College.

Catharine Roth, Accompanist

Catharine Roth has been our accompanist since the fall of 1998. A native and resident of Adams County, Catharine performs with "Orrtanna," a traditional music duo, and works in a local vineyard. Among her many talents, she is a published novelist and makes braided rugs in the traditional style, including the one that will be raffled at the Harrisburg concert.

Rev. Erica Trantham, Master of Ceremonies

Before formal training for the ministry, Reverend Trantham worked in New York City theater and TV as an actor, producer and teacher, and in the entertainment law division of HBO. She is the Minister at the Unity Center for Spiritual Growth in Mechanicsburg.

Renee Bartholomew, Percussionist

Renee Bartholomew plays percussion in many styles, including classical, jazz, rock, and drum and bugle corps. She was the drummer for the women's singing group, Stone Soup, and plays with many area groups. The Cameo String Quartet (Harrisburg Concert)

Hannah Belser, First Violin

Hannah is a well-known violinist in the area and a graduate of Lebanon Valley College. As much at home playing for musical theater productions as in classical ensembles, she is also a vocalist and pianist, and has sung with the Chamber Singers of Harrisburg.

Debra Anderson, Viola

Debra received her degree from Lebanon Valley College. She has performed with both the Harrisburg and York Symphonies and is currently a member of the Schuylkill Symphony. Debra has taught strings in public and private schools and has an extensive group of private students. Also an accomplished pianist, she has arranged music for the quartet.

Estelle Hartranft, Cello

Estelle graduated from Lebanon Valley College and also holds a Master's degree in music education. She taught music in public schools for over 30 years and recently retired from the Harrisburg Symphony. In addition to her extensive background in cello performance, Estelle has performed as a vocalist and pianist and has served as a church choir director. Lynn Murphy, Second Violin

Lynn earned a BA in music from Temple University. She came to Harrisburg in 1994, established a violin studio and became active in the Central Pennsylvania Suzuki Association. She is a member of the York Symphony Orchestra, a Resident Artist of the Wednesday Club, and plays with many large and small ensembles in the region.

The Oratorio

We are proud to present the central Pennsylvania premiere of *Where I Live*, a breast cancer oratorio by Diane Benjamin.

This piece was commissioned by the Denver Women's Chorus in 1999 when their music advisory committee discovered that four of their six members were daughters of breast cancer survivors.

It was premiered in May 2000 with two performances in Denver as well as performances in Ft. Collins and Colorado Springs, and a subsequent performance in San Jose, California at the 2000 GALA Choruses Festival. Additional performances have been given by choruses in Washington DC, Los Angeles, Portland, Oxford (Ohio), Grand Rapids, and Phoenix.

Ms. Benjamin says of the piece, "Where I Live was both a difficult and an easy piece to write. In 1998, one of my friends was diagnosed with breast cancer. Katherine graciously allowed me to become part of her journey, as she found a path of healing and courage through this life-threatening condition. I wanted to create a piece that would offer support to those living with and surviving cancer, validating their experience. I wanted to create something that would encourage their loved ones, family and friends, and that would inspire other in the community to step forward and help. I wanted to raise questions about the role of environmental pollution and the importance of focusing on cancer prevention, not just diagnosis and treatment. And I wanted to create something beautiful and healing for all of us. I hope I have succeeded."



The Composer

Diane Benjamin is a musician and composer living in Minneapolis. A self-taught composer who wrote her first piece at age eight, she took up composing again in 1992. Her choral commissions and instrumental pieces have been performed throughout the United States and Canada. Her most recent commission was a three-movement work, commissioned for a joint concert by the Portland Gay Men's Chorus and Denver Gay Men's Chorus in June of 2001. Many of her choral works are published by Yelton-Rhodes Music in Los Angeles.

Actions you can take to help prevent cancer:

- Stop smoking.
- Have an annual breast and pelvic exam and pap smear.
- Have an annual mammogram after age 35.
- Perform a monthly breast self-exam.
- Avoid excessive exposure to the sun.
- Establish a healthy and balanced diet.
- Establish an open relationship with your healthcare provider.
- Visit your healthcare provider on a regular basis.
