

The phrase "bread and roses" is commonly associated with a successful textile strike in 1912, with the mostly immigrant workers appealing for both fair wages and dignified working conditions. It may have originated from a speech given by socialist Rose Schneiderman, who said "The worker must have bread, but she must have roses, too." While not specifically associated with women's suffrage, the song lyrics draw together the social movement of the time, sounding familiar for today's struggles.

SECOND FIDDLE -- Shaashawn Dial-Snowden

The piece uses lines from the Song of Songs (Song of Solomon), a book of the Old Testament which can be interpreted in many ways. The title and first line refers to a beautiful black woman. It can be read as a literal description of a sexual relationship, which may or may not be consensual, given the gender and ethnic mores of the time. Jewish tradition reads it as an allegory between God and Israel, with the woman standing for a whole people; a Christian reading could be an allegory of Christ and his "bride," the church.

This adaptation of an old Canadian folksong focuses on the endless to-do list of a pioneer woman, all true. But *Old Grandma* is meant to be a sort of a female tall tale, with her hoops and bustle in the wilderness, keeping her husband fat and sleek while popping out 21 healthy boys — a far happier tale than the life of the average woman of the day.

"If you love for beauty, oh, do not love me ...if you love for love, oh yes, do love me." Clara Schumann (1819-1896) exerted her influence over a 61-year concert career, changing the format and repertoire of the piano recital and the tastes of the listening public. However, for many years after her death, she was not widely recognized as a composer. Female composers were traditionally ignored or even barred from the profession since it was thought that women were not able to "control present the logic and reason, masculine attributes requisite for composition."

This is a modern (1999) setting of an ancient prayer by a Venezuelan composer. Mary holds a special place in Catholicism; one theory about why Catholics pray to Mary is that during some historical eras, she was seen as more accessible and compassionate than Jesus. Surprisingly, there are more mentions of Mary in the Koran than in the Christian Bible! Since Mary is not well described from Scripture, people have projected upon her many cultural and religious values. She has inspired countless beautiful musical venerations.

Harriet Tubman (1822-1913) was an escaped slave, a successful conductor on the Underground Railroad, abolitionist, spy for the Union Army and women's suffragist. A proposal to replace Andrew Jackson on the \$20 bill with Tubman was characterized by the current administration as "pure political correctness." As our song goes, uh huh, uh huh.

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


