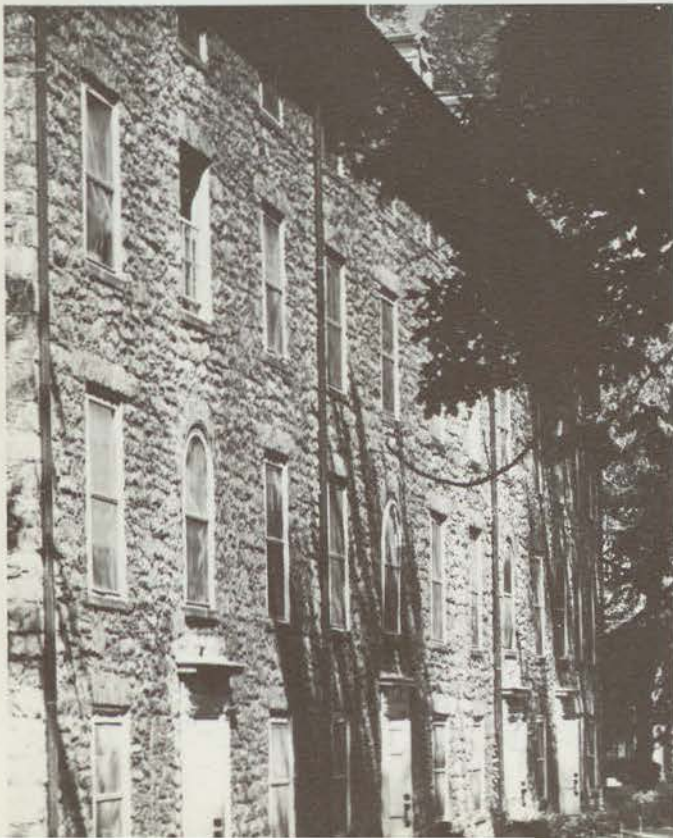

President Howard L. Rubendall



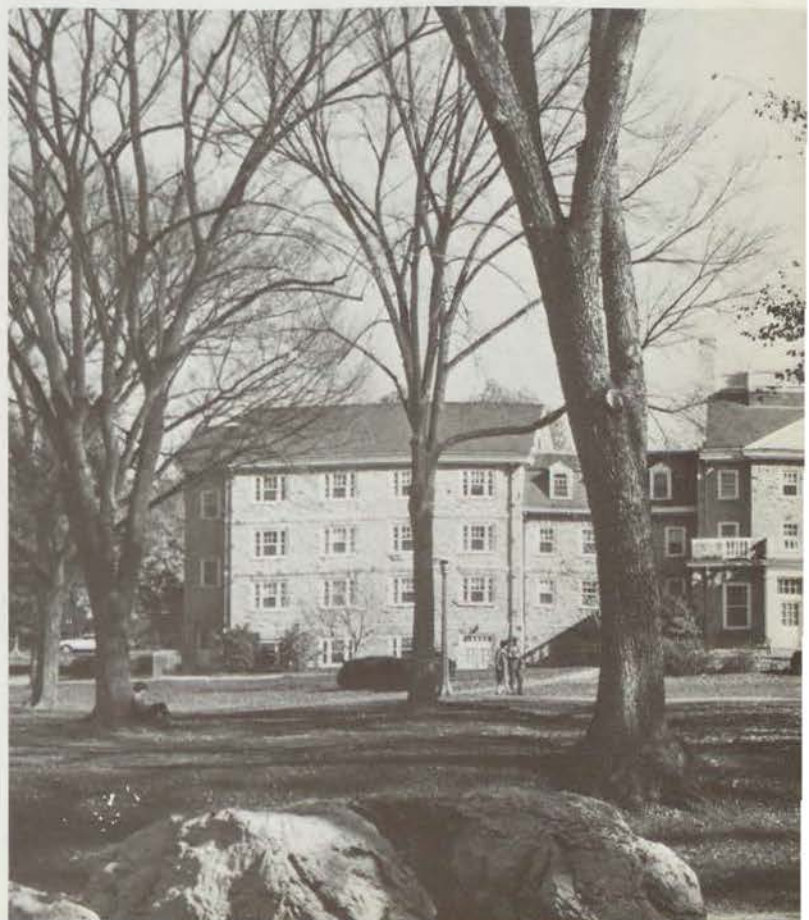

Priestley Award

Dr. Joel H. Hildebrand, Professor of Chemistry Emeritus, University of California, Berkeley, was the fourteenth recipient of the Dickinson College Priestley Award. In honor of the memory of Joseph Priestley, 18th century English scientist and theologian, and in recognition of Dr. Hildebrand's work, he was presented with a ceramic portrait of Priestley and \$1000. A physical chemist, he has been recognized for his contributions to chemical education and has done research on a variety of topics including electroanalysis, spectra, intermolecular forces, liquid structure, and the general theory of solubility in non-electrolytic solutions.

An added highlight to the celebration was the presentation of the largest private collection of Joseph Priestley memorabilia in America, donated to Dickinson College this year by Mrs. Temple Fay of Philadelphia, a direct descendant of Priestley. A great number of books and pamphlets by him and about him, as well as letters, portraits, and commemorative medals, were included in the gift. The new collection has been added to the scientific apparatus of Priestley which was obtained by Dickinson after his death in 1804. The collections will be placed in a Priestley museum in the new college library to be built next year.

The Dickinson chapter of Phi Beta Kappa recognizes and encourages outstanding scholastic achievement.

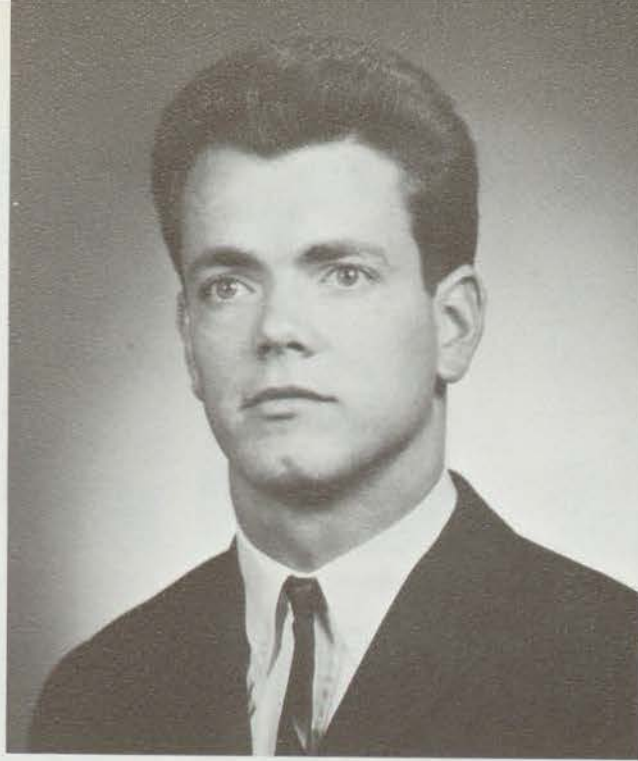

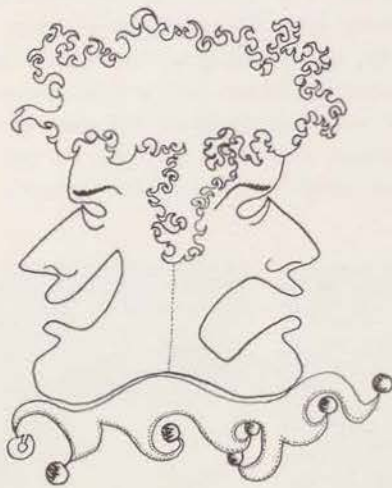

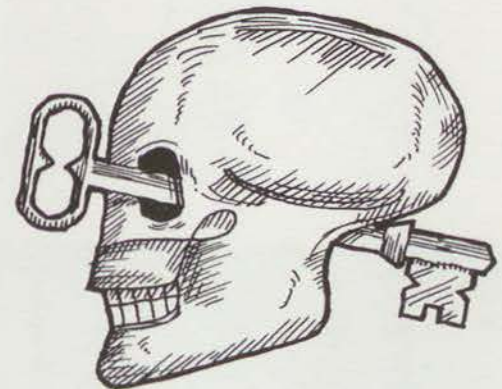

Each spring at the tapping of the new members, an award is given to the freshman woman judged to have been the most outstanding during that year.



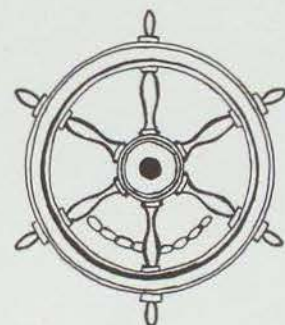

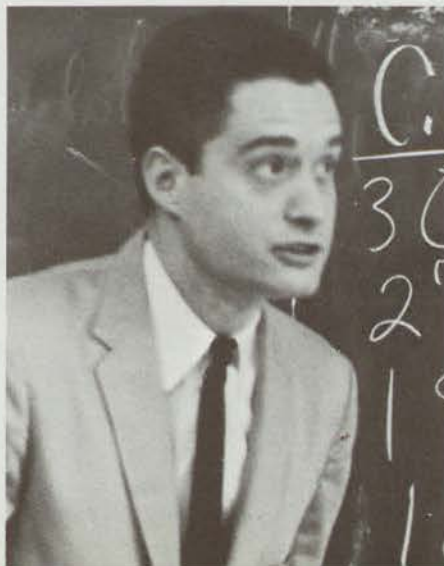

Mohler Science Club

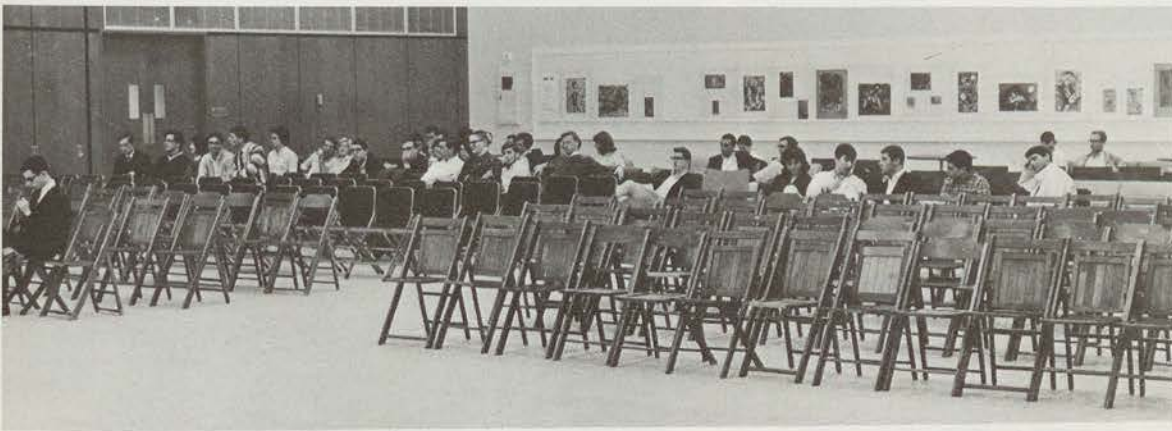

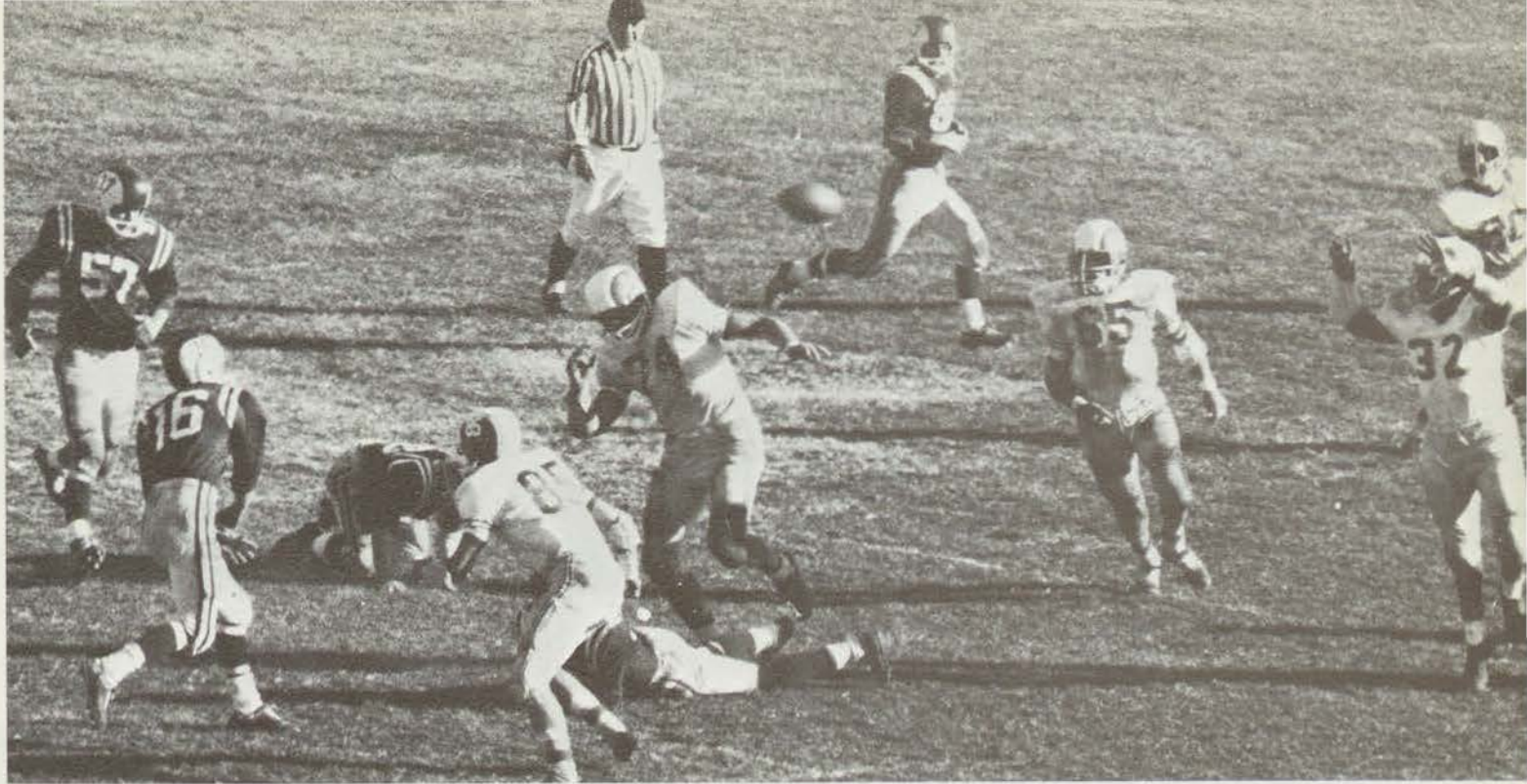
Football

The Redmen then traveled to Swarthmore to deliver a 14-12 defeat. Larry Snyder's good kicking and Dallas Wins-



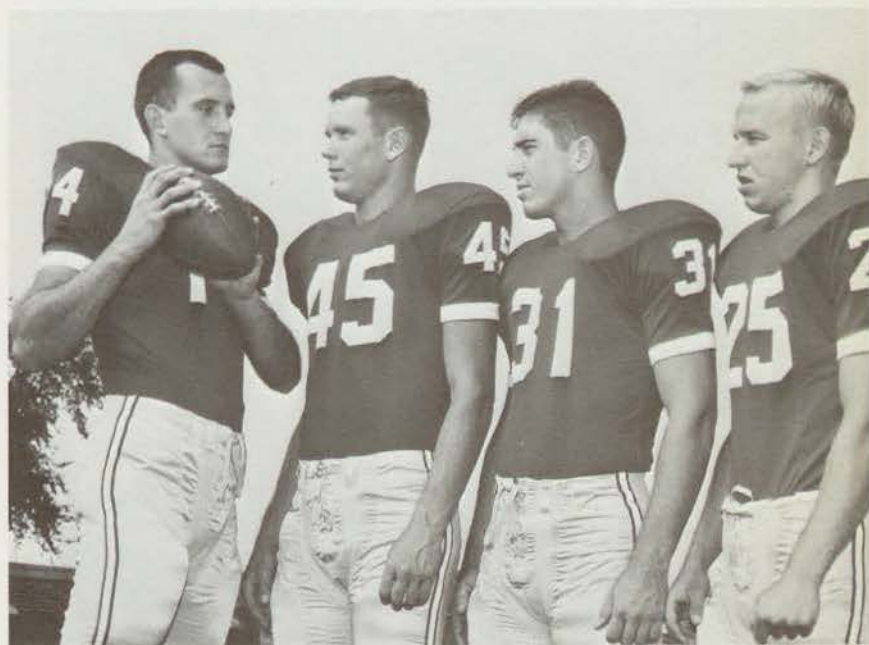


low's key punt return frustrated the Swarthmore eleven.

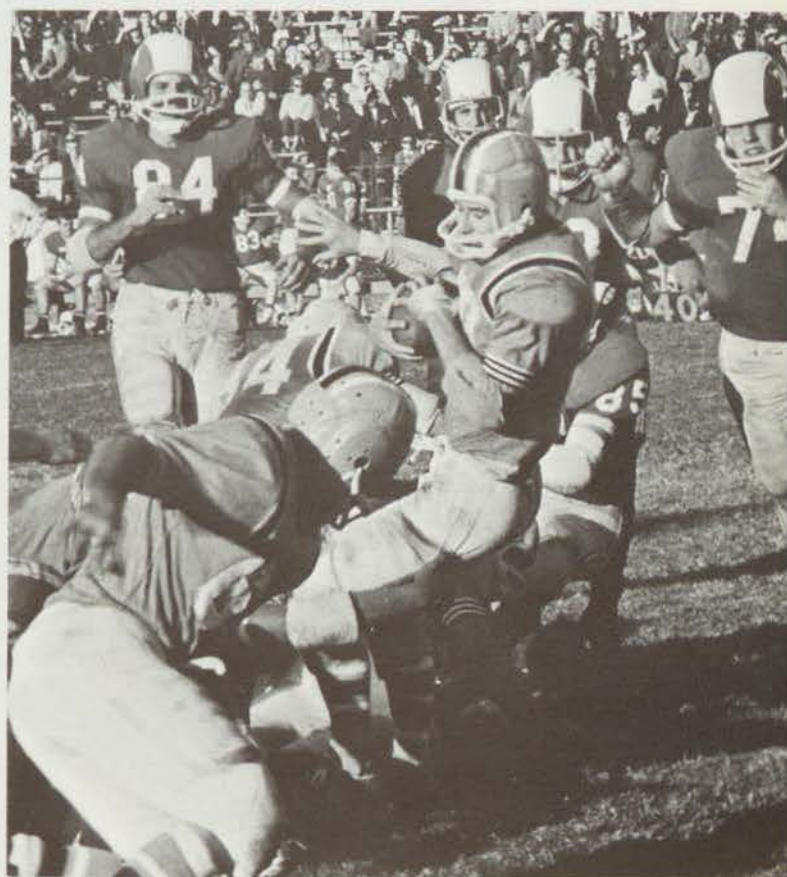

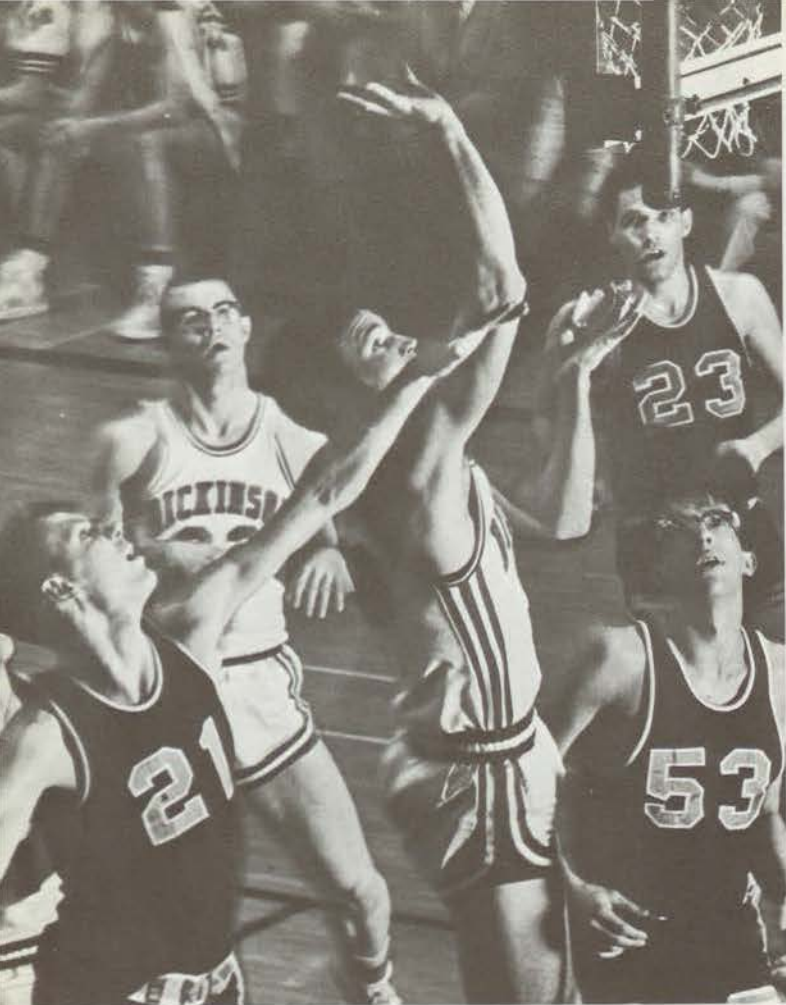
Soccer

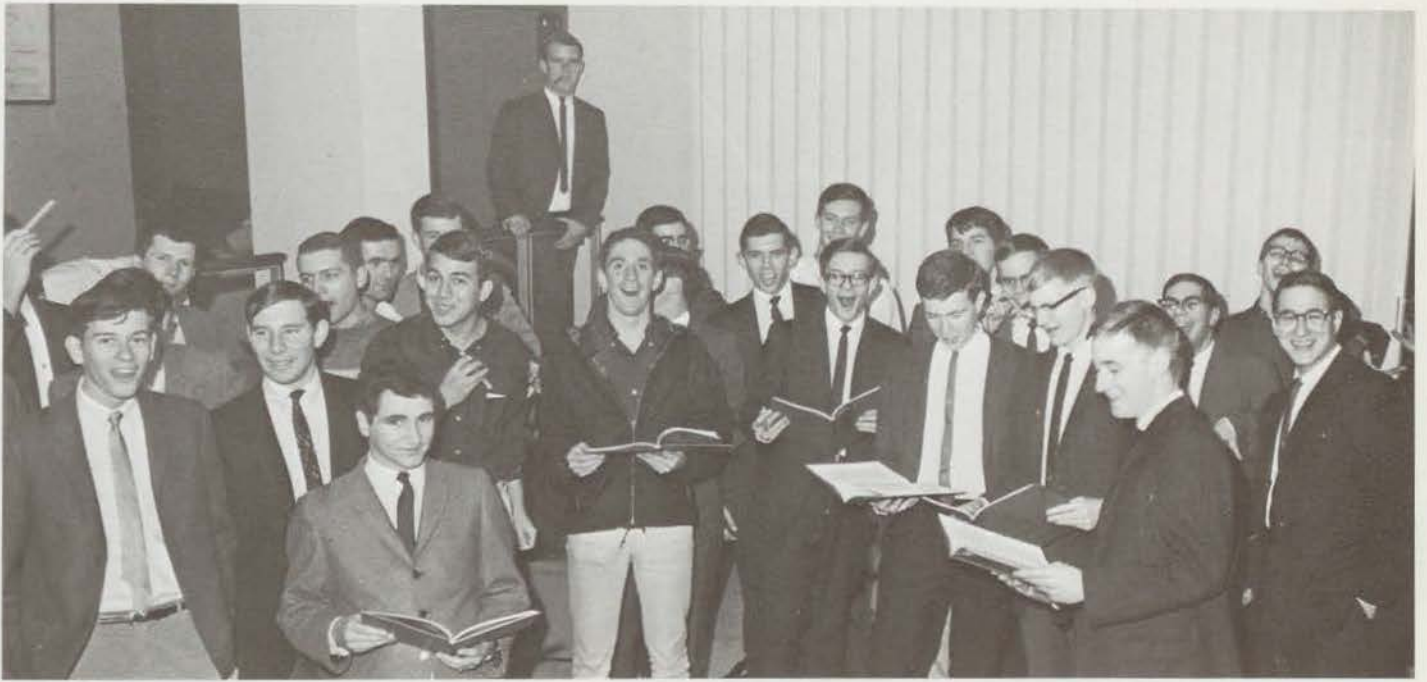
The Inter-fraternity Council coordinates and regulates the activities of the ten national men's fraternities. The Council is composed of the president and two representatives elected

Active participation in all areas of fraternal life has lifted SAE to a position of prominence on the campus and has provided an atmosphere in which the individual may grow and develop.





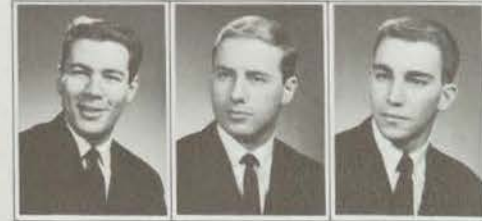

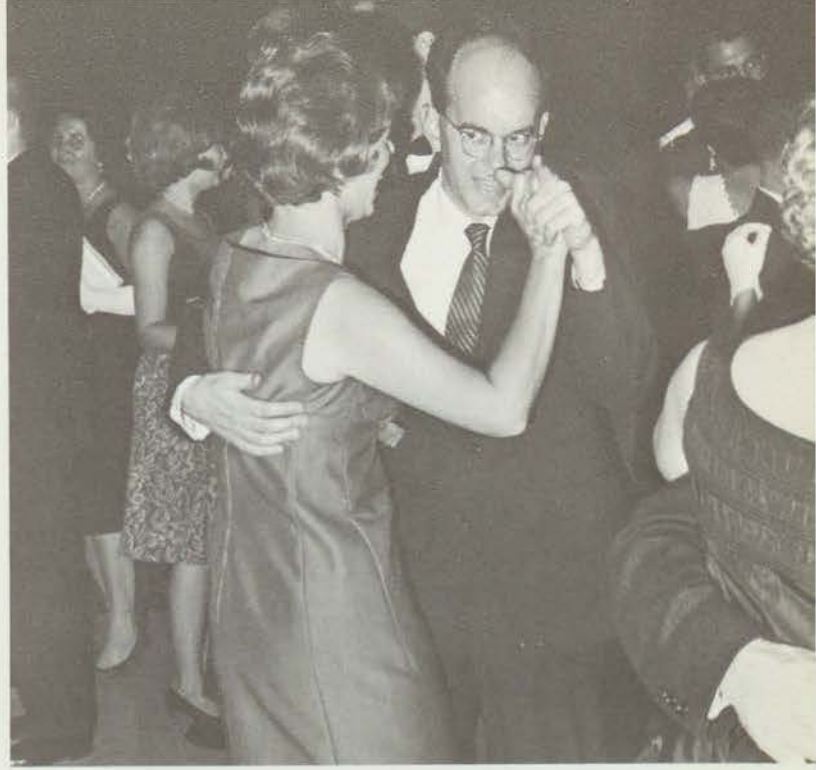




Military Ball

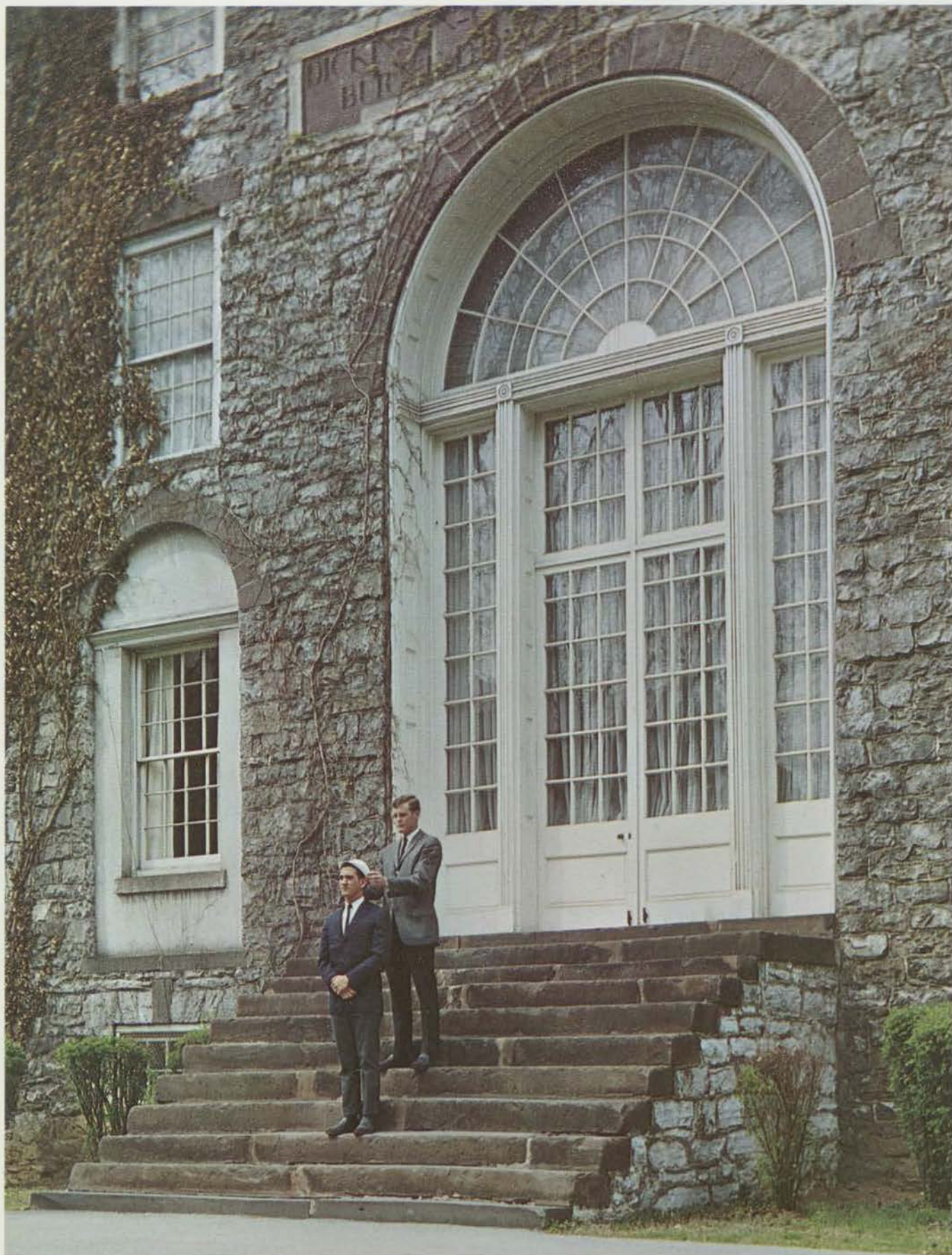




Spring Weekend

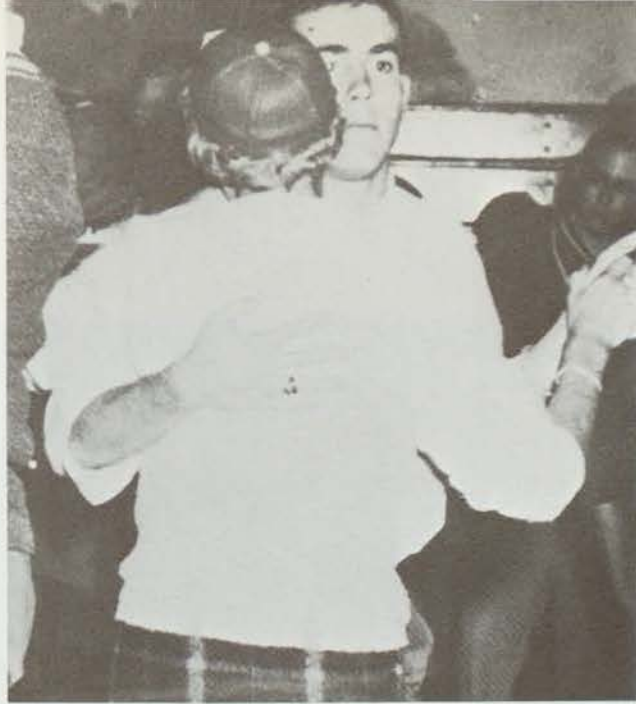

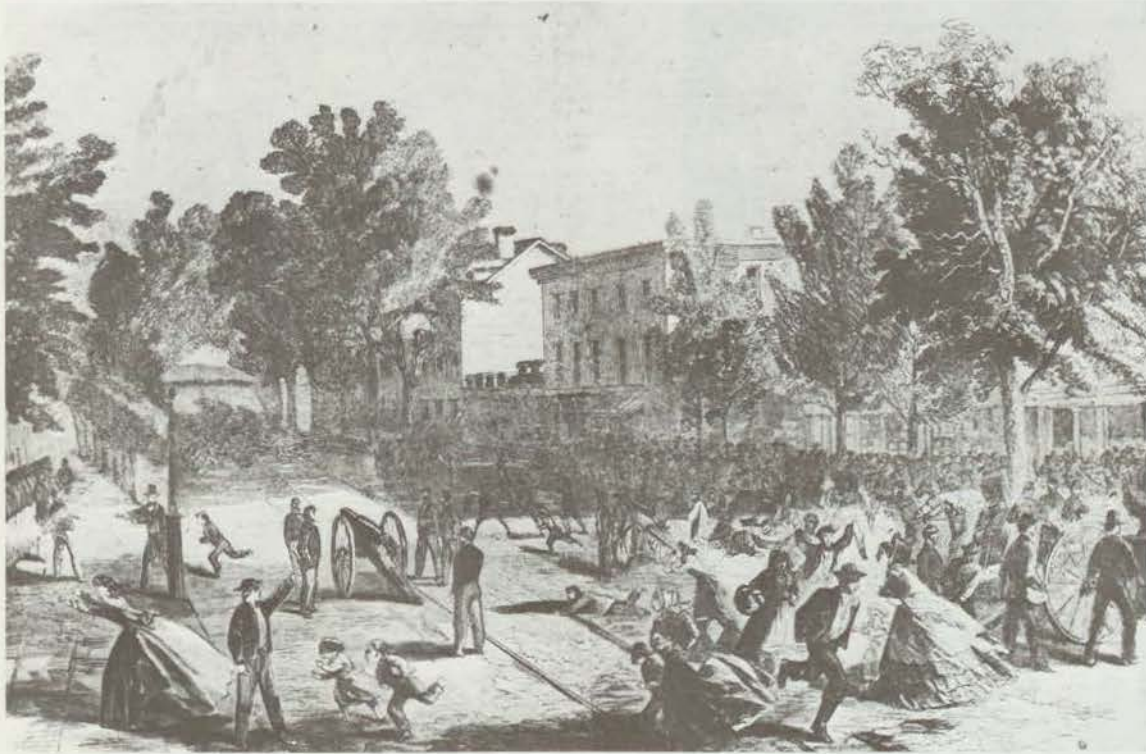

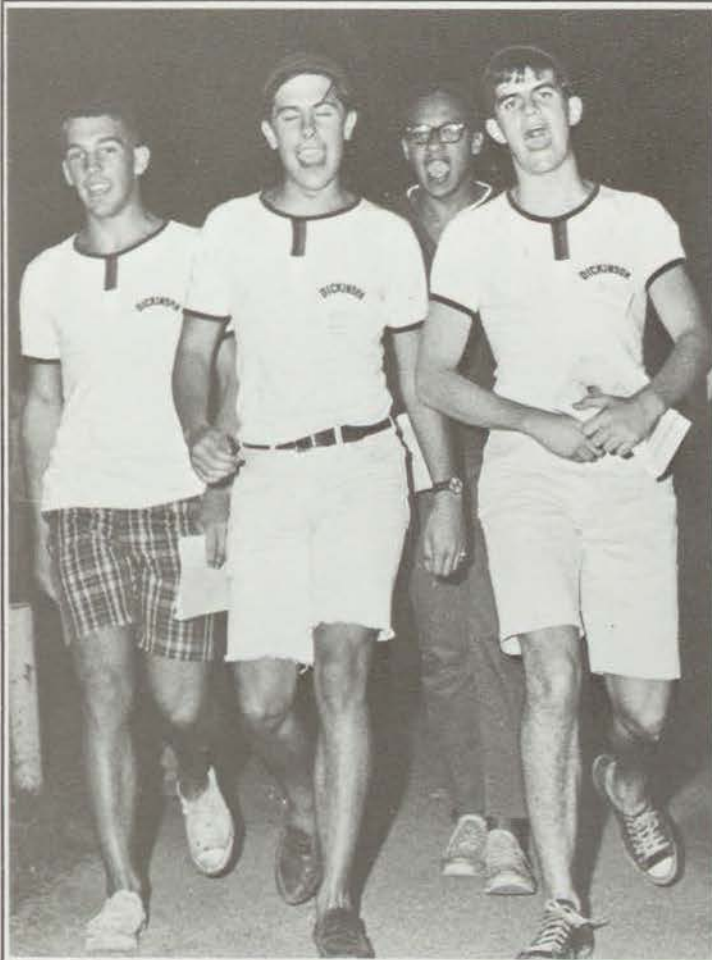






The rebels shelling the New York Militia in the main street of Carlisle. Sketched by Mr. Thomas Nast. Photo by A. A. Line. July 1, 1863

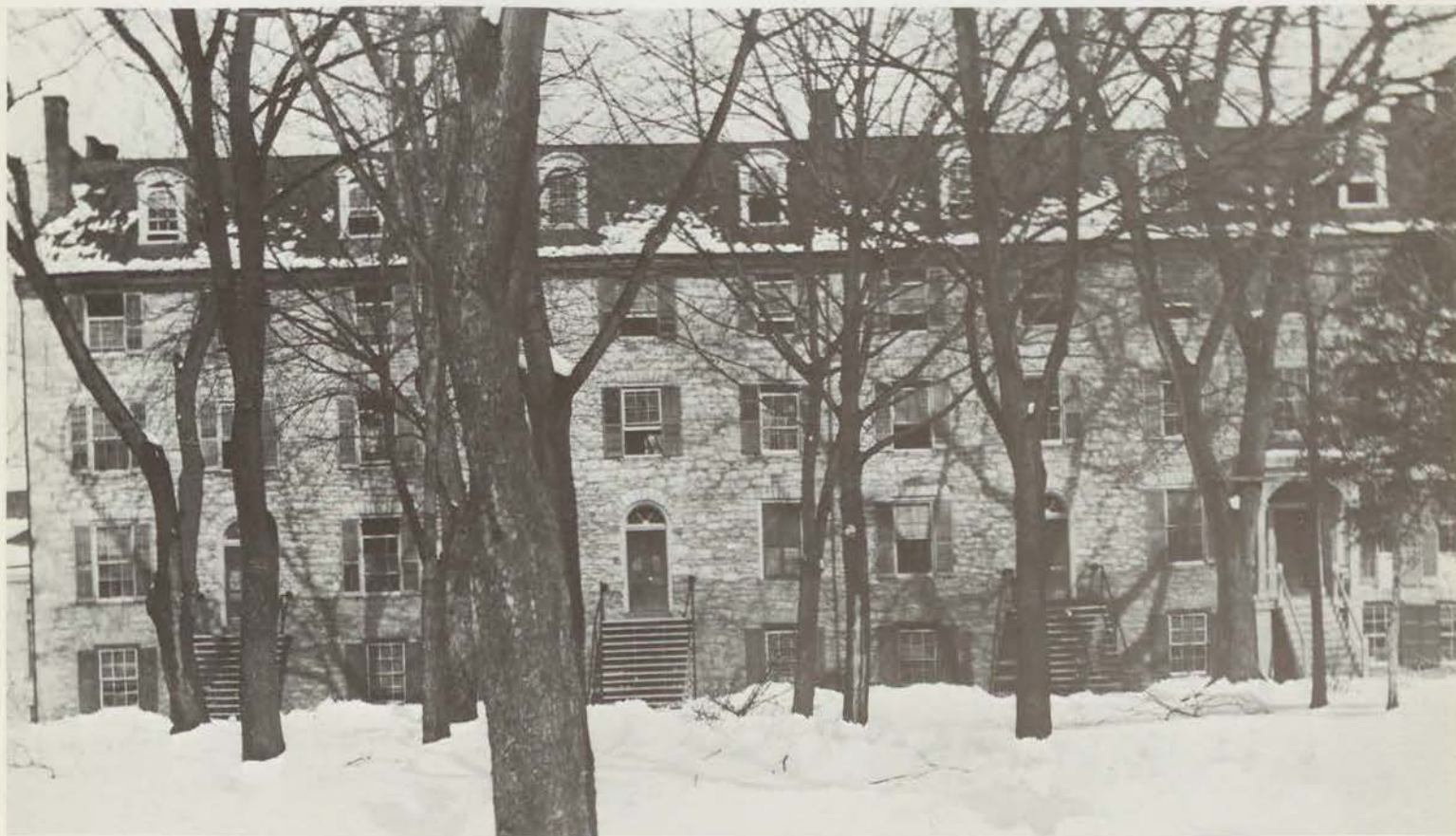

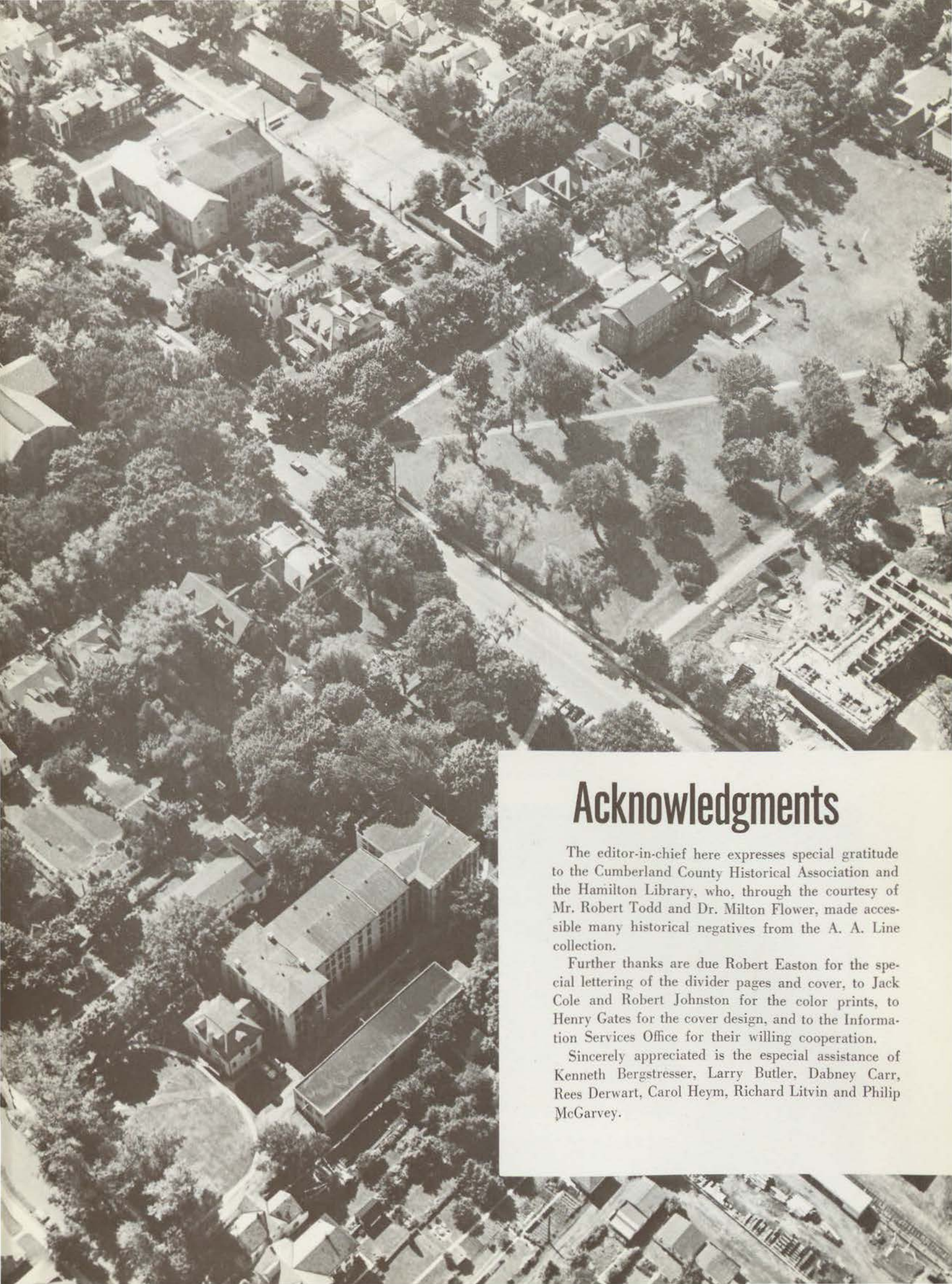
