

THE WEATHERVANE

Did you attend the Farmers' Market while you lived in Carlisle? If you missed the experience it is a pity but those of you who managed to find the busy place each week will remember: the colors in season—elegant purple eggplant, golden peaches, rosy apples, greens of every hue, the red and white of meats, and then the odors, or perfumes—freshbaked bread and sweet rolls, cheeses, the earthiness of freshness, pungent horseradish.

And the cheerful conversation. It ranges from, "Have you seen the beautiful turnips?" to an impromptu cooking lesson. About 15 marketers waited calmly one early morning as this new resident learned how to cook good country ham.

If you get there at 6:30 a.m., which is one half-hour before official opening, you find the real devotees. Selection is best then, they say, and there is less trouble parking. You also are sure to get flowers before the rest of the community arrives. A new faculty wife tells of seeing an equally new president's wife with bouquets wedged tightly under each arm while trying to select fruit. The flower stands alone make the market worth a visit.

The Farmers' Market, as you can see, is a matter for the soul as well as for the body. You can buy or just enjoy the atmosphere and color. It is there; there are many ways to use it.

The Farmers' Market is not an intellectual thing but, if you don't mind stretching a bit, it is analogous to the liberal arts experience at Dickinson College. We talk about the liberal arts in this issue and perhaps the metaphor will be evident.

Liberal Arts In Trouble?

For some years there have been mutterings about the worth of a liberal arts education. As Dr. Howard Figler points out in his article which follows, those mutterers really haven't studied the situation. Dr. Sam Banks also makes a strong case for the liberal arts in this issue and at the same time describes two new programs designed to enhance the Dickinson experience.

But, as Dr. Sam Witwer says in his article, Dickinson is having some financial difficulty. He is optimistic but notes that the college needs enthusiastic support at this time.

Some of that support might be an articulate awareness on the part of alumni of the real worth of a liberal arts education. It is entirely possible that some admissions difficulty will come because Dickinson people have not been eloquent enough about the liberal arts experience. There is an attempt underway on campus now to discover the skills people acquire here which are useful in the world. This is not a superficial study but an investigation in some depth.

The faculty and administration certainly are convinced of the importance

of a liberal arts education but perhaps that conviction has not been explained fully to alumni and to students, current or prospective. The Nisbet Scholar Program and the COLE Program are evidence of new approaches to liberal learning with which Dickinson is reinforcing its original commitment.

A liberal arts education is very practical in ways that transcend the limiting idea of job training as both President Banks and Dr. Figler point out. Dr. Witwer is looking for ways to make sure that practicality is around for future Dickinsonians.

Life and the Liberal Arts: An Emerging Answer to an Old Issue

In the past five years, there has been a significant change in the way that many people look at liberal arts colleges. We who are committed to providing a liberal education are painfully aware that increasing numbers are questioning its value. Modern men tend to swing from overenthusiasm to disillusionment. In the post-sputnik years, the American answer to Soviet technology was a heavy reliance on higher education. We expanded academic programs with a vengeance in the uncritical faith that higher educational institutions would solve our technological, political, even religious and family problems.

This trend represented both good and bad news for America's academic leadership. In earlier years, we were pleading with our public like parents with an indifferent child, "If you would only listen to me –." In the 1960's, we were given an attentive audience and unprecedented scrutiny, larger budgets, and great expectations. Frankly, we weren't ready to meet the legitimate hopes or to reject the unrealistic demands. There were few admin-

istrators or faculty members equipped with the skills to meet the complex issues of rapid development. Colleges lacked the experience and organization necessary to plan imaginatively, decide systematically, and evaluate clearly. In the last decade, great strides have been made in acquiring the concepts and skills necessary for sound, creative academic planning. Nevertheless, our post-Watergate society, too vulnerable to quick disillusionment with its institutions, shows signs of "turning off" its earlier enthusiasm for higher learning.

Education in the liberal arts, so essential to our national and cultural history, has not been tried and found wanting. We have simply learned that excellence in learning (as in any significant task) demands sacrificial commitment of resources and imaginative hard work. America's colleges are not sick. They simply need the motivation, money, and creative manpower (students, faculty, administrators, trustees, etc.) to achieve an unfinished destiny. We must rethink the mission of the liberal arts college. We must articulate vividly what we are doing and what we can do, and we must be clear about the difference between the two. If we pretend that we are achieving fully what we should be accomplishing, there is no room for growth. There are both similarities and gaps between the reality and the dream.

Dickinson's task is reflected in the old saying heard at weddings, "Something old, something new." (It is also true that some colleges today are also "borrowing" and "blue," but we won't pursue that!) Our college is in a unique position to bring together effectively an old tradition and new approaches to teaching. We are the repository of a tradition which is the very best, richest precipitate of our culture. We contain the resources of the remembered past transmitted in our libraries, lectures, and laboratories. If we as a people are to create history, we must be able to remember it. We must be able to rely on our collective experience and to perceive realistically the way that human beings have built meaning in past crises.

But if that is all we are about, then the colleges are not doing an adequate job. The liberal arts are not liberating if they only call people into the past. On the contrary, we need to bring the riches of our tradition to focus on the critical problems posed in contemporary society. We must even go one step further, projecting ourselves into the conceived future and continually readjusting our understandings of these trends in order to serve human beings more fully.

It is not enough to increase our store of knowledge. Through imaginative teaching and study, we must assist our students in living out their values and understandings with increasing effectiveness. Further, the effective college must say—and live out—more clearly the ways in which a liberating tradition can empower a new generation to live with its pressing challenges in the arenas of work, leisure, family life, worship, community service, and national purpose.

There is a disturbing tendency today to separate post-secondary education into two camps, advocates of "pure" liberal arts programs and proponents for vocationalism. Such a superficial split would force liberal learning into one of two ditches: (1) withdrawal from the real societal issues found in current concern over careers, or (2) "selling out" by abandoning critical thought in the pursuit of technical training.

At Dickinson, we are proposing that there is a third way, strongly contrasting with these unthinking and unproductive attitudes. The humanities, social sciences, and physical sciences can provide conceptual tools necessary for students' thoughtful participation as future leaders in daily life. For over a year, our faculty have been developing two new approaches to liberating learning: the Nisbet Scholars and COLE programs. They are still taking shape. Both are experimental, first approximations, not final blueprints. The two programs share a common commitment to renewing and strengthening liberal education by interaction with the world of concrete events.

The Nisbet and COLE programs will be intended as separate but closely related aspects of Dickinson's long history of meshing an age-old tradition with the cutting edge of contemporary problems.

The COLE (Career-Oriented Liberal Education) program will be designed to assist some students to examine systematically the human questions and life styles arising in the careers for which they are preparing and in which they will spend a large portion of their lives. The program is based on our awareness that liberal arts fields must be constantly reformulated in events beyond the campus wall. Philosophy developed in the marketplace of Athens.



Historical events are not confined to the campus. Literature is created beyond the academy. It would be constricting to study these only within the confines of the classroom. Therefore, we are considering new ways of bringing faculty members into regular contact with professional, business, and government settings in order to examine those issues to which his field can speak. A professor of economics may spend some time each week in a medical school focusing on the values implied in health care today. A philosopher may explore ethical issues with attorneys in their offices or aesthetic considerations with engineers and government planners. Bringing these new found colleagues back to the campus for a week as "residents," the "faculty intern" can assist his fellow teachers to relate these insights to their specific fields.

From this interaction, new courses can arise that will explicitly center on the skills that the liberal arts offer: clear thinking and communication, ethical issues and perspectives, analysis of complex problems, systematic decision-making, understanding of organizational systems, responses to crisis, and change, and the values underlying allocation of

resources. Internships can be developed that blend supervision in career settings with rigorous study programs carefully tailored together by students and faculty. Career guidance will be closely related to academic counselling through the development of faculty expertise in each department.

Of course, COLE represents only an alternative, one expression of Dickinson's commitment to regenerate liberal education systematically. It will be matched in the coming year by the experimental Nisbet Scholars program. A small percentage of the entering class will be selected as participants. These students will be freed from the usual distributional required courses in order to accomplish an even more highly demanding task. In addition to pursuing their major courses of study, Nisbet Scholars will explore intensively with professors in small groups the basic purposes of a liberal education as these are expressed concretely in the regular courses that they are taking. In other words, they will examine intensively why they study what they are studying. They will examine the very roots of liberal education in seminars and tutorial settings that break down the artificial

split between teacher and learner.

This close engagement with faculty members will also provide stimulation for the teacher to reexamine his courses in exciting new ways. Such teaching goes far beyond simple transfer of information to a grappling with the values underlying education itself. The student becomes an active, critical participant. He can gain a larger view of the ways that different courses and fields relate to each other as well.

These two programs are simply examples of fresh, new winds blowing in private higher education. There is an exciting stirring, a growing awareness of the opportunities as well as the risks posed by the challenges of the 1970s. The mandate of society is not for the colleges to leave their former tasks but to do them more fully and effectively.

Of course, there have always been creative moments between skilled teachers and capable students. Our task is to build programs that transform sporadic occasions into dependable, regular activity. The cost of such development is great. It requires intellectual energy and emotional risk on the part of faculty and administrators to continually reassess the nature of their contribution and the value of their fields. It requires openness on the part of trustees, alumni, and foundations and commitment of their time and funds.

The time is ripe. The question is not whether such programs as COLE or Nisbet will emerge in private colleges but whether they will be done with depth and strength so that the integrity of the liberal arts will be maintained

and that the real problems of human beings will be addressed. The final result will be a student reflecting the true purpose of education: not simply a more efficient worker or a more insightful scholar in later years, but a human being with broader perspective, greater awareness of his values, and ability to live with purpose in a world of profound and rapid change. Our goal then is the furtherance within our faculty and among our students of the spirit expressed at the conclusion of James Joyce's A Portrait of the Artist As A Young Man:

Welcome, O life! I go to encounter for the millionth time the reality of experience and to forge in the smithy of my soul the uncreated conscience of my race.

LIBERAL, NOT VOCATIONAL, SKILLS

Which of the following do you believe doesn't belong? Vocation, Work, Liberal Arts, Career, Occupation, Practical. Though there is really no right answer to this multiple choice conundrum, I suspect that most folks, inside or outside of the ivy walls, would spot Liberal Arts as the supposed black sheep in this family of work-related constructs. It is the popular view that liberal arts has little to do with real problems, real people, or real employment.

We are immersed in an era where it appears that the liberal arts graduates must sit at the back of the bus, vocationally speaking. We are led to believe that most everything a B.A. or B.S. graduate may learn is nice in theory and certainly speaks to the larger issues of mankind, but has little "practical" value in the arenas of corporate enterprise.

A first cousin to this view is that some colleges offer courses of study which are more vocationally relevant than major areas of concentration in the liberal arts. Consumers of education believe that a young person can acquire a certain amount of "job training" before he/she enters the labor markets.

and thereby will be a "more qualified" job candidate.

I wish to challenge the assumption that some programs of college study are more equal than others in terms of job marketability. To parents, their children, and others who urge Dickinson and other colleges to adapt their curricula more closely to vocational ends, I maintain that you are plodding along a false trail. I propose instead that the college student's personal level of attainment will result far more from forces over which he has control than it will from curricular labels or content.

Parents who fret about whether to send their children to liberal arts colleges or others which carry "vocational" programs, are chasing after a straw man. There is no particular evidence to suggest that career attainment is a function of liberal or vocational education. By contrast, there is plenty of evidence to suggest personal factors are at work. Send 10 youngsters to the same college, put them in exactly the same courses of study, and watch how widely their levels of success will vary.

False Trail

A timely text called Education and Jobs: The Great Training Robbery, has laid bare the argument that college courses are predictive of occupational futures. Berg shows that so-called "vocational" college programs, more often than not, prepare people for jobs that do not exist. He also maintains that it would be virtually impossible to align educational programs with job markets, even if we wanted to do so.

Many scare stories in the media lead us to believe that liberal arts graduates are virtually unemployable. It is little noticed that these news reports gather data from liberal arts graduates after they have been seeking employment only 6 to 18 months. The reporters also fail to mention that the 18 months following college are often a time of roaming, discovering, fluid personal plans, travel, and just plain hiding from organized, button-down humanity.

Michael Walsh, an astute researcher from Southern Illinois University, had the wisdom to survey his liberal arts graduates after they had been gone from college two years or more. What his data revealed would surprise most of us:

By all indications, then, liberal arts graduates responding to this survey were satisfactorily employed. Their rate of unemployment, while not particularly low (7.5 percent), was nonetheless not as high as the national rate (over 8.0), and the rate for married males was an extremely low 2.0 percent. Graduates had an encouraging variety of occupations, and the majority reported that their occupations had both career potential and adequate financial rewards. (Walsh, Change, June, 1975)

For the liberal arts graduate who cares to investigate closely, there is abundant evidence that opportunities are plentiful in a wide variety of work environments. If you consider the language major one of your hardest cases, then behold "Foreign Languages and Careers," a priceless little booklet published by the Modern Language Association, which tells of employers' fervent desire for language talent in banking, manufacturing, finance, advertising, marketing, government, and numerous other areas.

It is often said, with some justification, that liberal arts graduates will progress farther and faster, the longer they are away from college, because the depth and breadth of their understandings will be used in higher level decision-making. We should be cautious about assuming that success will accrue to every student in a liberal arts college. As Stephen Bailey has argued:

A person is not necessarily educated just because he or she served a 16-year sentence in an educational institution. More precisely, the educated person knows how his field of specialization relates to other areas and divisions of human knowledge and experiences.

Attributes That Make a Difference

By emphasizing relationships between formal education and work, teachers have unwittingly cultivated the idea that job attainment is related to what you know. In fact, a variation on the reverse theme is closer to the truth. Those who make a difference in their work are continually engaged with what they don't know. To illustrate:

(1) <u>Decisions on Partial Information:</u> Picture the marketing executive who must decide how to distribute and promote a new product, or anyone who must reckon with alternative futures. He must commit millions in the face of what he knows little about.

(2) Interpreting Foreign Tongues: Imagine the administrator who must deal with computer languages, government jargon, scholarly terms, mathematical notation, or artist's representations of a foreign culture; he must grasp the essentials of a new technology or art form by interpreting what the natives are saying and, in the next breath, translating these new ideas into action.

(3) Mediating Between Interest Groups: So many decisions which affect people's lives are made by others who know little of their predicament. Consider the government leader who funds projects he will never see, the college president who negotiates between trustees and faculty, but lives in the world of neither, and the corporate manager who mediates between a stockholding public he seldom hears and all-but-invisible clientele.

(4) Dealing with the Unknowable: Highest levels of responsibility are reserved for those who grapple directly with unfathomable topics: future economic conditions, moods of the body politic, unconscious psychological states, the nature of spiritual movements, and unobservable physical phenomena. It is their taient for handling the unknowable and even creating new ideas and constructs from it, which set the leaders apart from technicians.

The ability to deal effectively with what one doesn't know derives from what I shall call the "liberal skills." These skills relate not to specific tasks, motions, or operations, but to those capacities generalizeable beyond themselves to a wide variety of contexts.

Liberal Skills

For the student who doesn't engage in vocational major, who lacks "practical" education, it is often said that he/she needs some sort of "skills" to qualify for good employment. We must be careful of this word "skills." I am uncomfortable with the ways in which it is usually interpreted. It calls forth images of some bygone era, when a man had to learn a manual trade or be familiar with a certain product in order to gain employment.

As Peter Drucker, the noted management consultant tells us, we live now in the era of "knowledge jobs," jobs which depend upon information and concepts, rather than upon products or manufacturing process. Teaching. management, consultation, administration, and many others are all "knowledge jobs." There are two things to note about such jobs: (1) The skills necessary to knowledge jobs can be transferred from one company to another, one industry to another; (2) Many of these skills are not only taught in a classroom or theoretical context, but are available only through total life experiences.

I am speaking, of course, of the wide range of "universal" skills that are so important to personal attainment, so crucial to corporate growth, and so absolutely vital to personal satisfaction, that we simply forget they even exist.

Despite some employer's insistence upon "marketable skills" from new college graduates, we must look carefully at what they mean by "skills."

Thus, the skills employers are looking for in graduates are not specific to a

machine or industry; they want young workers who can read, write, compute, pick up new skills quickly and eagerly, and interact cooperatively with others. These are the adaptive skills of liberal education, not the specific skills of vocational education.

(O'Toole, Change, 1975)

Thus, when a college student asks you: "What can I do during college that will improve my chances of advancing in the world of work?", don't waste his time talking about course selections, how to study harder, or doors that will be opened by the Dickinson degree. Instead, speak to him of the "liberal skills":

Communication Skills: Writing reports, essays, and correspondence in plain language; speaking effectively to individuals and to groups; listening carefully and emphatically whenever necessary; portraying ideas clearly and imaginatively in visual media, etc.

Thinking Skills: Defining a problem cogently; evaluating alternative courses of action critically; creating divergent solutions to a problem when more than one answer is possible; shaping new ideas in the context of old circumstances.

Human Relations Skills: Interacting cooperatively with superiors, subordinates and peers, communicating orders, instructions, and feelings with openness, genuineness, and understanding. Delegating tasks in ways which show respect for the other person and receptivity to his ideas.

Valuing Skills: The ability to view and assess an area of work activity in terms of the effects it will have upon human welfare, and the ability to make and enforce decisions in terms that will maximize such welfare.

<u>Detective Skills:</u> Discovering and identifying people who have information that is relevant to a task or problem, and identifying resource materials which are necessary for solution of the problem.

Interviewing Skills: Acquiring information from people, when the people may be difficult to reach, or reluctant to divulge information. Generating trust in such situations, necessary for future contacts.

Self-Marketing Skills: The ability to sense an idea whose time has come, move toward work modes that capitalize upon this idea, and sell this idea to appropriate people.

"Liberal skills" are shown repeatedly to be in the world of work. Employers of recent MBA graduates complained most about their inability to read, write, and speak clearly among themselves and with others (communication skills). When individuals in "judgment jobs" are fired, released, or nudged into deadend jobs, executives will tell you it is most often due to their inability to relate cooperatively and harmoniously with the people around them (human relations skills), not because they didn't understand the technical functions of the job. Supervisors constantly laud the individual who can do more than his job, can seek new insights, find people and pump them for new data (interviewing skills, detective skills). And, finally, every personnel manager or employment agency director will admit that the advantage in job markets belongs to the Initiator, the person who tracks down opportunities before other people hear about them.

Though I refer to these as liberal skills, it does not follow that these necessarily derive from the liberal education. Such skills can be nourished anywhere, in vocational programs, noneducational experiences, or any other context where the individual can refine his personal attributes. The student who decides that liberal skills are important to him will not allow a curricular bias

to stand in his way.

Liberal Arts and Liberal Skills

The educated person who lacks the liberal skills will function at the level of a mere technician. A world filled with technicians would be unable to see beyond immediate tasks. Those who offer liberal education maintain staunchly that they teach broader intellectual processes and that these ideas do carry weight in the vocational world.

Certain common intellectual processes are involved in the practice of any vocation. The processes of abstract reasoning and generalization from a body of data, and the differential application of relevant principles are essential to all continued intellectual growth. Instruction which does not cultivate these abilities, regardless of its current value, is not worthy of a liberal arts college.

(McGrath, Change, Sept., 1974)

Where are these skills derived? That is to say, where does a person learn how to think critically, reason imaginatively, express ideas clearly, acquire information from others, make decisions? Well, everywhere. In class, out of class, off the campus, at home, away from home. G. B. Shaw once said that the only time his education was interrupted was when he was in school.

It would be nice, from our perspective, to claim that the liberal education does a superior job of nurturing the "liberal skills." In fact, we tend to operate on just this assumption. Whitehead argued vigorously: "If a nation fails to give liberal skills to all workers, society will then get what it deserves." (O'Toole, Change, June, 1975)

However, there is no guarantee that such will be the case, that is, it does not follow that liberal education will inculcate liberal skills. Liberal subjects can be taught with a decidedly vocational bent.

If liberal education is narrowly construed... then in practice it is likely to be education that is vocationally directed, toward one or another profession of scholars, historians, critics, and so on. Its aim in practice, especially at the level of higher education, is thus likely to be the production of specialists in one or another field of the so-called liberal arts."

(Thomas F. Green, Work, Leisure, and the American Schools, p. 99)

Even a liberal subject taught in a liberal way does not ensure the emergence of liberal skills. The teacher and the college can provide the environment where a student may grapple with uncertainty, but the student may reject these opportunities if he chooses. There are always

paths of least resistance available, if one looks hard enough.

The Investment Fallacy

Whoever pays the bills for Dickinson education has a right to wonder whether the results will justify the expense. However, it can be misleading to deal with this investment motif too simplistically, for two reasons:

(1) The experience of liberal arts graduates in the world of employment probably will not crystallize until many years after graduation. B.A. graduates change jobs at least once every two years during their 20's and do not reach levels of "judgment jobs" for some time thereafter. I do not view this state of affairs with alarm. On the contrary, I urge students to use their early job experience to explore, experiment, discover, and even look for situations in which they can create new jobs.

(2) As suggested earlier, two Dickinson graduates having identical courses of study can fare very differently in their respective life's work. The person who pays for a Dickinson education is investing far more in the student as an individual than in the college as an institution. Liberal skills must be actively chosen, not passively consumed in the classroom. The student can exercise free choice with approximately 80% of his time. Liberal skills can be nourished or ignored during these hours of free choice.

You may wonder whether I am choosing a fancy way to say "Don't blame us if your son or daughter doesn't get the job or profession he/she desires." It is not so much a question of blame as it is the existential choice of the individual. Frost speaks of a "road less traveled by." We attempt to light the way toward this road but have no method, nor do we desire to, to enforce that the student travel along it.



A TWO-FOLD PROBLEM

Private colleges are in serious trouble. The story is repeated almost daily in your local newspaper and feature articles treat the subject in depth in the Sunday supplements. Dickinson has its difficulties, too. No private educational institution, no matter how venerable nor how distinguished, is immune from the threat.

The major problems are two-fold. First there is a decline in the number of students seeking admission to college. This is a simple demographic factor linked with the leveling of the birth rate after the post World War II "baby boom." The second is economic inflation which has been creeping steadily upward since the end of World War II, but which has accelerated its pace to a gallop in the last several years.

Dickinson has weathered the admissions situation well so far. We filled our freshman class this fall with qualified students. However, a short fall in returning students, largely attributable to upper class students in off-campus programs, has resulted in a student body somewhat smaller than was planned. This has caused budgetary stringency in the current fiscal year, which ends June 30, 1976. A possible deficit is looming.

As the total number of students seeking admission to college shrinks, the candidates for admission become more critically selective. We find that more students who would normally be applying for admission to Dickinson are now encouraged to try for and often are gaining admission to schools which were formerly considered to be the exclusive and unattainable "Ivies."

In a manner of speaking we are caught in a vise, because the relentless pressure of rising costs directly results in inevitable increases in tuition and fees. Dickinson's increases have not been out of line in comparison with other similar institutions. Nevertheless, there is the haunting spectre of "pricing ourselves out of the market." We know that some candidates who would normally apply to Dickinson are now seeking admission to public, tax-supported institutions where the costs to the student are significantly lower.

There is no simplistic answer to the financial problems. Throughout the years of my Board Presidency, Dickinson has managed to operate in the black, and significant advances have been achieved. Three major fund drives have been conducted resulting in the raising of more than \$16 million from alumni,

corporations, foundations, and other private sources. The Dickinson physical plant has been put in excellent order. Endowment has been increased from \$3.5 million to \$15 million. This is good, but it is not enough.

In this period the College has gained in national and international stature. Faculty salaries have been greatly improved. Dickinson graduates have won admission to major graduate and professional schools. Individuals of world renown have participated in Dickinson academic programs and special events. We have justly achieved a degree of self-confidence, which did not always prevail, in Dickinson's general recognition in educational circles as an institution of excellent quality and high standing.

But the financial equation is implacably insistent on balance. Student tuition and fees plus endowment income plus gifts and grants equal Dickinson's income. For too long a time the tuition and fees figure has had to carry more than 80% of the burden.

Major efforts have been devoted to heightening the effectiveness of management in every area. This fall under the highly knowledgeable and energetic direction of President Banks, who assumed his duties on July 1, 1975, the threat of a potentially large deficit for the current year was diminished. Carefully thought out reductions in expenditures were effected by trimming supplies and equipment orders, and, where possible, deferring action on repairs and renovations. All of these actions were recommended with the participation and accord of the faculty and administrators and were approved by the Executive and Finance Committees of the Board of Trustees meeting at my call in special joint session in Carlisle in November. The Finance Committee has subsequently initiated action to develop additional ways to strengthen the return from the College's endowment portfolio.

The facts in the case are clear. There has to be a brake on the upward rise of tuition and fees. The bringing in of additional income by increasing the size of the student body is not feasible because of the shrinkage of the nationwide applicant pool, and, moreover, the Trustees determined some years ago that Dickinson's unique characteristics and high quality educational program were definitely linked to the present size student body. It is, therefore, essential



that income from gifts and grants be increased. The president and the development department are conducting an intensive campaign of cultivation and investigation of funding possibilities with major philanthropic foundations. A number of exceptionally good grants possibilities have been developed. A major award from one of these is possible this year.

Our planned giving operations have been expanded. A cohesive program of encouraging bequests to Dickinson and support through various trust arrangements has been implemented. We are soliciting support beyond our own Dickinson family. Last year I was proud to play a major part in securing a bequest of \$150,000 for Dickinson from one who had not been closely related to our College.

All of these sources of support are vitally important, but the gift support which will keep Dickinson strong is the support which comes for current operations through annual giving. For years Dickinson alumni have done a good job with annual giving. But now we must do better. Too many of us have developed the routine of making the same gift year after year.

Unless we address our problems on every front and do so promptly, the plight of the College several years hence could indeed be serious. We have many built-in strengths which should permit Dickinson to go forward, not merely to survive—if we are willing to avoid complacency at this time, to give sacrificially, and to take the steps necessary to avoid a crisis situation later. Let us press forward together at this turning point in the long history of this fine old College.

The year was 1959 and I was an eager assistant professor facing three sections, roughly 170 students, on the Monday, Wednesday, Friday schedule at 8:00, 10:00 and 11:00. The lecture room was small, crowded, and often smelled of bodies on damp days in the fall when the temperature outside precluded any opening of windows or doors. Yet the room had an intimacy and charm-with its moose head, stuffed birds, and the varnished storage cabinets with the glass doors at the front of the room. Baird was the name of the building and from 1939-1965 it was the home of Biology. Eddy, Herber, McDonald, McDonald Ogren, and then me, Jeffries, the professors, and a steady procession of students: Adam . . . Baumert . . . Engelking . . . Horsley . . . Mellott . . . Snyder . . . Standing . . . Wellington . . . and Zilinsky. This story concerns one of those students, a rough-hewn but sensitive local lad, John Mellott.

It was an afternoon in October, I think, when the laboratory instructor, Nancy Peer, came down the spiral staircase from the general biology laboratories on the second floor to my firstfloor office. She reported that there was a student in the lab who was obviously ill but who would not leave. Half in doubt. I followed her. It was difficult to believe what the eyes perceived. Oblivious to us, and to the other students at the table, he bent over the microscope for a moment, then swayed against the back of the chair. His body oscillated briefly from side to side as he steadied himself to make some marks with a pencil on a piece of drawing paper beside the microscope. Only after I insisted did he consent to being walked to the infirmary. It was later we learned he had encephalitis.

Determination and singleness of purpose got him through that first year, overcoming some weaknesses in preparation on one hand and a period of poor health on the other. As a result of his dedication and promise, he was hired as a research assistant. Each new success, it seemed, spurred him to greater academic effort and achievement.

Graduation with Honors in Biology was just the beginning of a scientific career that resulted in a master's degree from the University of Delaware, where he won a coveted annual award for the outstanding thesis in science, and a Ph.D. from Oregon State University. Reports of his research have appeared

in Acaralogia, Annals of the Entomological Society of America, Transactions of the American Entomological Society, and the Journal of Protozoology.

But it is work with people, rather than with protozoa or mites, that gives him the greatest satisfaction. As an Assistant Professor in the Extension Division of Oregon State University, he has primary responsibility for the personal development of youth through 4-H groups in the counties surrounding Portland. He has prepared Teachers' Guides for numerous Mini-Courses on such topics as Plant Science, Entomology, Pigeon and Dove Projects, and Chick Development. The work includes instruction through frequent visits to many of the schools in the area. As a part of the Chick Development Mini-Course, he had a regular travelling companion who was in fact the star of the show. Herman, a large Plymouth Rock rooster, accompanied John, riding uncaged on the front seat of the car. "Service station attendants were always shocked when I would stop for gas and this big chicken would stand up in the seat and watch them. The closer you get to the city (Portland) the more excited the children are about Herman. Herman has always been very fond of crowing for his audiences. Once, during a visit to a classroom in a school in the heart of Portland, Herman belted out a crow to an unsuspecting group of students who'd never seen a chicken before. The kids were so terrified that most of them ran out of the room and down the hallway. When they returned we all had a good laugh." The Mini-Courses are designed for children from elementary grades through high school. Approximately 2250 younger children completed the course in Chick Development last year and 2900 the year before. For many the memory of Herman is overshadowed only by the sounds of a chick about to hatch and, of course, by holding a chick in their hands.

Near Boring, Oregon, John, Tess, their 4- and 2-year-old sons, André and Chad, share a few acres with numerous domestic animals, many of them prizewinning specimens. Often classes from neighboring schools visit the Mellotts and the children get to see and touch the animals. On the 23 of August 1975, we took some of their birds to the state fair in Salem; John, and Earl-an arthritic, octogenarian friend for whom partial care of the poultry is a primary reason for living-and I. (I was their guest for a day and a half following the annual American Institute of Biological Sciences meeting held this year at Oregon State University in Corvallis.) The birds were entered in four categories and they were finalists in three. Among 800 birds in the show, they were the grand champion rooster, the reserve grand champion rooster, and the reserve grand champion female.

As an interested observer of Dickinson students past and present, much satisfaction accrues to me as I see the liberating arts come to fruition in persons such as John. Yes, he has

demonstrated excellence in Biology, but more importantly, he is a questioning, creative, productive member of society. He does many things well.

John's voice acquires a special timbre when he describes a recent project with mentally retarded adults, MeRe. His own idea from the beginning, the MeRe

program utilizes the skills, the enthusiasm and, yes, the love of teenagers—mostly from the 4-H groups—to teach mentally retarded adults during a summer camp experience and a summer gardening program. All volunteers, the youngsters teach archery, horseback riding, and beginning Entomology, to

name a few of the offerings at camp. Beautiful in its simplicity as an idea, using the young to teach the retarded works well in fact.

The MeRe persons arrive at the camp being treated as children by their parents. Paradoxically, their teachers, being children themselves, expect more of the MeRe's and they respond accordingly. It is a poignant truth that the MeRe's are reluctant to leave when the week is over; to leave new friends; to become children again.


Through a weekly radio program and a monthly educational television program some years ago, John reached thousands of young people. That may explain in part his success in aiding current efforts of concerned citizens in Portland to acquire, and to hold in perpetuity, a key tract of land in the city of Portland, along the Willamette River, as a wildlife refuge when it seemed local politics would put it into the hands of developers.

During November 1975 John was elected (in absentia) one of the editors of the Extension Journal, a national educational journal, at the annual meeting of 4-H Extension Agents in Kentucky.

He is a man without pretension, unafraid of loving animals and people. It is small wonder that he achieves such remarkable success with both. He is John Mellott, Dickinson College '62.

Top Educator

Change Magazine recently asked 4.000 college and university presidents, foundations executives, journalists, and government officials to nominate those they considered the most important people in higher education. Change chose 44 top leaders on the basis of frequency of mention. Listed in that top 44 is Frederick W. Ness '33, president of the Association of American Colleges. A Shakespearean scholar, he was president of Fresno State College in California before going to Washington, D.C. in 1969.

Horseshoes and Racing

There are stories of Ph.D.'s driving cabs these days so anyone learning that Steve Parker '72, a biology-economics graduate, shoes horses at the York Fair might think he is in difficulty. Not so. Steve learned to be a farrier to take care of some of his expenses while in college. Soon he turned to harness racing. Now he owns three racers and is working toward a license so that he can drive at the big tracks. But, as an economics major, he knows about supply and demand and there is a shortage of blacksmiths these days. He may be America's best-educated blacksmith but he likes what he is doing and is successful at it, too.

Crime Prevention President

Meyer P. Potamkin '32 has been elected president of the Crime Prevention Association of Philadelphia. A former judge said of his election, "I don't know anybody who's been more loyal or has worked for crime prevention longer than Pat Potamkin." Columnist Chuck Stone wrote in the Philadelphia Daily News, "A Jew, Potamkin's one of the special people in Philadelphia who gives bountiful meaning to the Christian injunction, 'Let your light so shine before men and glorify thy Father which art in heaven."

"For the past 39 years, he's been lighting the way for the city's progress. At 65, when most people think of settling into the cushioned comfort of retirement, Potamkin's life is just beginning..."

The article also quotes Potamkin on an ironic twist to the election: "'In 1936, I was working for Crime Prevention Association at \$21 a week as an athletic director and almost got fired for breaking the rules. I brought in young kids because the facilities weren't being fully utilized by the older kids. Now, our creed is full utilization of all facilities.'"





University Chancellor

Dr. William E. Kerstetter '36, president of DePauw University, has been elected university chancellor. Dr. Kerstetter, who is continuing as president until his successor has been chosen, is devoting a major portion of his time to the development of the university. He also is working in the area of off-campus relations in connection with DePauw's Design for a Decade program. Prior to going to DePauw, he was president of Simpson College for 10 years.

New Book on Paris

A recent New York Times Book Review includes a review of Hugh Ford's newest book. American and British Writers, Printers and Publishers in Paris, 1920-1939. The favorable review of the 1950 graduate's book mentions his "scrupulously accurate chronicling of the Paris scene of 50-odd years ago." The reviewer said, in reference to the men and women mentioned, "Ford's dedicated chronicling of their lives and works heightens an understanding of all they were or ought to be." Professor William Bowden says that Hugh Ford is "probably the leading publishing scholar among our alumni."

Refugee Resettlement



Jewish Appeal Leader

Another war has meant a major change in the life of another Dickinsonian, David S. Greene '64. The young Washington, D.C. lawyer is campaign chairman of the Young Leadership Council of the United Jewish Appeal of Greater Washington. Mr. Greene says that the Yom Kippur War taught him that he is "no longer an individual who could be marginally involved." For his work, he was honored recently at the Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds general assembly in Miami Beach.

Former Trustee Dies

The Rev. Dr. F. LaMont Henninger '24 died in November. The former member of the board of trustees had been living at the Bethany Village United Methodist Retirement Center, Shiremanstown, PA. A life member of the General Alumni Association, Dr. Henninger was a member of Kappa Sigma fraternity.

Born in Williamsport, he attended Drew Theological Seminary after graduating from Dickinson. Dr. Henninger received an honorary Doctor of Theology degree from the college in 1959. He served as superintendent of the Harrisburg District of the Central Pennsylvania Methodist Conference from 1953 to 1959 and was executive secretary of the Interboard Council of the United Methodist Church from 1959 until his retirement in 1969. Dr. Henninger served pastorates in Altoona, Carlisle, and Sunbury.

A BICENTENNIAL CONTRIBUTION

Dickinson College had its Bicentennial in 1973 and out of that celebration comes its two contributions to the national Bicentennial in 1976, projects of cultural and scholarly importance.

"Symbols of Peace," an exhibit organized by the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts and Dickinson College, opens May 12 in the Peale House Galleries of the Academy in Philadelphia. A catalogue of The Books of Isaac Norris (1701-1766) at Dickinson College is being published in April.

"Symbols of Peace" is based on the Benjamin West painting of Penn's treaty with the Indians. The exhibition will remain at the Peale House Galleries through October. Seminars and other events are being arranged by Dickinson in Philadelphia and the exhibit will be shown at other Pennsylvania galleries.

As Chaplain Paul Kaylor explains, the West painting has become an American icon. West did the painting in 1772 and since then themes of peace related to it have been created throughout the world. The exhibition features items from the 18th to the 20th century all

based on West's painting; these include engravings, paintings, tableware, books, quilts, official documents, stove lids, children's toys.

An engraving by Robert Delaunay (French) in 1778 shows how early the theme was copied and how widely. There really is a cast iron stove plate in the exhibit, ca. 1840, and American. Paintings by Edward Hicks and Edward Savage, a piece of English stoneware of the early 19th century, a certificate for a loan from the city of Philadelphia in 1857, an 1860-65 German-English wooden jig saw puzzle, a certificate of membership in the Universal Peace Union—all are part of the display and all are based on West's theme.

The original idea for this exhibition came from Mrs. Vivian Potamkin, whose husband Meyer is an alumnus of Dickinson. Mrs. Potamkin began collecting various objects dealing with the treaty scene after becoming interested in what she believes to be a universal longing in man, the desire for peace.

Dickinson was about to celebrate its Bicentennial at the height of her interest in this theme and she expressed a hope to Mr. Kaylor, who was chairman of the celebration, that a campus project around the theme of peace might be developed. That particular idea could not be worked out at the time. Instead Mr. and Mrs. Potamkin worked with the college in presenting a major 200th anniversary art exhibit, "An Alumnus' Salute to Dickinson College," at Harrisburg's Penn Museum for six weeks in 1972-73. That exhibit was from the Potamkin Collection, one of the major collections of American art. A large portion of "Themes of Peace" is from that collection also.

As a result of Mrs. Potamkin's original suggestion, she and Mr. Kaylor talked with Richard A. Boyle, director of the Pennsylvania Academy, about a national Bicentennial project. Mr. Boyle was interested; former Dickinson president Rubendall agreed and appointed Mr. Kaylor to continue with the project. For the current exhibition, Mr. Kaylor and Mr. Boyle have been joint project directors. They secured a planning grant from the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts and raised other funds.

Both Mr. Kaylor and Mr. Boyle con-



cur that the Potamkins' joint interest in the two institutions (Mrs. Potamkin is on the board of directors of the Academy) has been the essential factor in the resulting exhibition. A former executive director of the Academy has called it the most exciting Bicentennial art project he has seen planned.

Along with the "Symbols of Peace" exhibit, a major catalogue is being published with 12 plates of the more than 60 items being displayed. Introduction to the catalogue is by Paul Kaylor and Richard Boyle. Mrs. Potamkin has written a prologue explaining the genesis of the idea. Also in the catalogue are two scholarly articles: by Anthony N. B. Garvan, University of Pennsylvania, and Charles Coleman Sellers, Dickinson historian and authority on Early American art.

The other project is quite different. It is based on a rare collection of books Dickinson has owned for almost 200 years.

What Dickinson, a liberal arts college, has is a collection of books devoted to what one man thought a liberally educated man of the 18th century should know. The original gift, almost totally intact after nearly 200 years, has 1,902 titles in 1,750 volumes. At the time of the college's Bicentennial it received major funding, with the help of Judge Robert Lee Jacobs '32, from the Bicentennial Commission of Pennsylvania for the cataloguing project

which began in 1973 and ends with publication April 8, 1976 on the campus. There also has been a grant for the project from the Pew Memorial Trust. Dickinson committed matching funds toward completion of a card catalogue and toward publication of the book.

Dickinson College was very young in 1784 when the wagonload of books arrived in frontier Carlisle, a gift from John Dickinson, the man for whom the college is named. The books had been collected by Isaac Norris II, Dickinson's father-in-law. A famous collection, the

books had narrowly escaped destruction during the Revolution and their arrival brought the Dickinson College Library instantly to a front place. The volumes were ancient and rare even at that time.

Isaac Norris had a great enthusiasm for books and he carefully catalogued his acquisitions. None of his catalogues survive but the armorial bookplate engraved by James Turner, his labels, his own annotations, and the marbled endpapers he pasted into hundreds of the books give an indication of his love for them.

The wide-ranging collection deals with the classics, natural science, theology, and the occult, and extensively with medicine since Isaac Norris apparently was a hypochondriac.

Marie Elena Korey has prepared the entries and edited the catalogue. Edwin Wolf 2nd, librarian of the Library Company of Philadelphia, has written an introduction. A preface containing the history of the Norris Collection at Dickinson has been written by Martha Calvert Slotten, curator of special collections.

The edition has been limited to 750 copies. The college is expecting interested bibliophiles to be on campus for the publication date in April. At that time, Professor Michael Kammen, chairman of the department of history at Cornell University and noted American historian and author, will present a major lecture on Colonial America.




