There has been some question concerning training of the resident advisor staff (see August Alumnus, page 14). Since there has been a change from the practice formerly followed, Diane Ronningen, author of the article, responds as follows:

"Dickinson has gone through a dramatic administrative change in the Student Services area. The Counseling Center assumed full responsibility for the counselor training of the Resident Advisors. New Resident Advisors went through 30 hours of training by the Counseling Center staff in preparation for this academic year. The topics covered include Crisis Intervention, Suicide, Confronting Skills, Human Sexuality, Feedback Techniques, Conflict Resolution, and others. The training program held in June and in August will continue throughout the year."

I was amazed to read in the *Alumnus* of August '78 that the College does not have an accurate record of its Fulbright Scholars . . .

I wonder if the College has any record of the faculty who have Fulbrights? I do not claim to be the first, but I had a grant in the summer of 1964 to study Chinese civilization at Tunghai University, Taichung, Taiwan, Republic of China. This program was under the U.S. Department of State. (The year following he and Mrs. Kellogg, a former Dickinson dean of women, studied at Hebrew Union College Biblical and Archaeological Graduate School in Jerusalem, Israel.)

I would think that it would be helpful to the College in applying for Foundations and U.S. Government grants to be able to list its undergraduates, graduates, and faculty who have had Fulbrights . . .

Ed. Note:

First it must be said that President Banks did not in any way connect the fraternity rush information with SAT score information. He mentioned a very slight decline in SAT scores but also reported that the class rankings had gone up.

The SAT decline is not new and is not a Dickinson phenomena. It is a nationwide problem. To quote The Chronicle of Higher Education, "... average scores rose to a high in 1963, declined slowly from 1964 through 1968, and have been dropping more rapidly since then."

No one answer has been found to completely explain the decline, but fraternity rushing as a possible cause has not been in any reports seen by the editor. It should be noted that Dickinson SAT scores are well above the national average and still place Dickinson in the very selective group of schools.

Vergil To Veblen: Classics and the Leisure Class

For the Greeks and Romans, leisure, not work, was the natural state of the free man. It is not enough simply to dismiss this fact on the charge that we are here dealing with a slave economy and to feel some superiority in the knowledge that what the ancients did with slaves we do with machines. One thing that makes the study of the clas-

sics vital for our time is that they represent the same urban, democratic, and leisure-centered world in which we live today. There is consolation and instruction for us in the fact that in history, if not in space, "we are not alone."

In both Greek and Latin the word that we translate "leisure" is an unmodified, positive term. The Greek term is *scholé*,

the source of our word "school"—education, of course, being the exclusive privilege of the leisured class in Athenian society. (Students meeting this etymology for the first time react in one of two ways: either they snort at the perversion that our grubby and demanding system has made of education or they whoop for joy that the

Augustus ruled with a policy of leisure/peace.

Quad has been established, once and for all, as the official and proper center of Dickinson life.) The Latin word for "leisure" is *otium*, sometimes confused by students, not without some Freudian overtones, with *odium*, "hatred". Those of us who date to the Happy Days of the Fifties have a tradition of translating *otium* as "security"; often it is rendered simply as "peace."

Conversely, the world of business, which we honor with a fine Anglo-Saxon positive, is for the ancient world a grimly negative state; for the Greek it is *ascholia* (using the negative prefix *a* which we have inherited in technical terms like *aphasia* and *atypical*) and for the Roman, *negotium*, a word much more familiar to the casual Latinist than *otium* and ordinarily translated as "business". It is as if the ancients saw only the "busyness" of "business" and found it all quite ungentlemanly. In the *Phaedrus* Plato damns the very idea of *ascholia* that leaves no time for philosophy. The dictionary dismisses the denominative verb form, *ascholeo*, meaning "I'm busy and don't want to be disturbed", with the supreme put-down known to Greek lexicography: "Not used in the best Attic prose."

Roman Augustus was able to make his rule the turning point of history on a simple policy of leisure/peace, of *otium*. Although not one Christian in ten can tell you that the chief event of his salvation, the resurrection of Christ, took place in the reign of Tiberius, the Christmas story in St. Luke has made most believers aware that Jesus was born after a decree had gone out from Caesar Augustus. On this same political motto the emperor was able to outlive both his heirs and his enemies in a forty-six year rule, the longest in the millennial history of Rome. Since temples provided the ancients with immortality as history texts do the moderns, Augustus fought for and won

his place in eternity with this same policy of leisure. He became a god at roughly the age at which readers of this note became doctors and lawyers and Ph.D.'s, with a better press agent than any of us can hope for. Vergil announced to the weary world that the Augustan peace and leisure that had overtaken the world was a gift of a divine ruler: *deus nobis hoc otium fecit*. Small wonder that the Christians, in claiming for their own founder the internal and external peace made possible by the *pax Romana*, took over Augustus' prophet and made Vergil predict, in this same set of elegiac poems, the birth of Christ. Twentieth century American political aspirants may well take a lesson from Augustus and his policies. In an age that longs more and more for an emperor and that seems less and less satisfied with a president (as the Roman became unsatisfied by an annual consul), it would seem that today's time is ripe for election on a policy of *otium*, leisure for the common man.

At the same time, the moralists went quickly to work to denounce the easy life of the Augustan tradition. Almost every great work of literature of the Roman Empire was anti-Vergilian and anti-Augustan in its theme. In the latter years of Augustus' own rule, Ovid got himself banished to a Mediterranean Siberia on the shores of the Black Sea for writing against the *otium* policies of the emperor. The general thesis of his *Metamorphoses* is that Roman youth, unchallenged by war or even political participation, are being metamorphosed into mere flower children, Narcissus blossoms or Syrinx reeds that do nothing but grow beside the still waters and reflect themselves in the limpid depths or let the quiet breezes hum sweet melodies through their systems. Everywhere passivity is their mark, and water—tepid, currentless pools of quiet water—their symbol. We can predict that

those leaders, professors, and columnists who attack the apathetic American youth of the Seventies will sometime find this great epic poem and make it the gospel of their claims. They, like Ovid, see the new generation as pampered, subservient and devoid of commitment, merely sweet nymphs and beautiful youths who have escaped to the forest retreats of a modern Arcadia. One political viewpoint sees them as unwilling to fight to save a Viet Nam or Korea in distress; another condemns their political and social apathy toward the plight of minorities and the poor. *Otium* is a pleasant hope in times of trouble, but the restless spirit and the ethic of work cannot find any satisfaction in its permanent peace when it finally comes.

It is Juvenal who does the most to exercise Romans for their everlasting devotion to leisure. For him the beast Domitian grows directly out of the

flaccid Augustus. His attack was joined by the Christian mystic who saw on the island of Patmos a vision of heavenly leisure that would need, however, to wait for a cosmic battle with some beast whose number adds up to suspiciously like the name of the emperor Domitian. And what was the sin of Domitian? It seems to have been his all-out attack on the financial inflation that had accompanied the century of legalized leisure in the Roman world. Rome had become, in the wake of Augustus policies, a consuming and not a producing world. Thousands of the imperial silver coins had flowed to India, Bactria, and Arabia for the luxuries they produced. Still today they are to be found in hoards in those regions, and new ones are ploughed up every year. Yet when one emperor tried to stop that flow, he was denounced by pagan and Christian alike as cur and Anti-Christ. Both had come to assume their leisure all the while they denounced their luxury.

So it is that leisure in the ancient world makes strange bedfellows. The apolitical Vergil joins with Augustus, for whom politics was life, in proclaiming the gospel of leisure to the world. Ovid, the naughty *immoraliste* of love poetry, becomes alarmed at a race of young Romans who have enjoyed so much leisure that they will not even breed. Juvenal and the Christians lay aside their mutual bitterness long enough to join in attacking, first, the leisure class itself and then the emperor Domitian, whose economic austerities threatened to bring all the Roman *otium* to an end. Such are the paradoxes of the past; and, as usual, they make a fairly serviceable laboratory for today's discussions of the moral dilemmas of a leisure-centered world.

There was a pool, silver with shining water,
To which no shepherds came, no goats, no cattle,
Whose glass no bird, no beast, no falling leaf
Had ever troubled. Grass grew all around it,
Green from the nearby water, and with shadow
No sun burned hotly down on. Here Narcissus,
Worn from the heat of hunting, came to rest
Finding the place delightful, and the spring
Refreshing for the thirsty. As he tried
To quench his thirst, inside him, deep within him,
Another thirst was growing, for he saw
An image in the pool, and fell in love
With that unbodied hope, and found a substance:
In what was only shadow. He looks in wonder,
Charmed by himself, spell-bound, and no more moving
Than any marble statue. Lying prone
He sees his eyes, twin stars, and locks as comely
As those of Bacchus or the god Apollo,
Smooth cheeks, and ivory neck, and the bright beauty
Of countenance, and a flush of color rising
In the fair whiteness. Everything attracts him
That makes him so attractive. Foolish boy,
He wants himself; the loved becomes the lover,
The seeker sought, the kindler burns. How often
He tries to kiss the image in the water,
Dips in his arms to embrace the boy he sees there,
And finds the boy, himself, elusive always,
Not knowing what he sees, but burning for it,
The same delusion mocking his eyes and teasing.
Why try to catch an always fleeing image,
Poor credulous youngster? What you seek is nowhere,
And if you turn away, you will take with you
The boy you love. The vision is only shadow,
Only reflection, lacking any substance.

Leisure—what's a person to do with it? It is a quantity of time which each of us possesses to either a large or small amount but which we all handle in our own unique ways. The manner in which people approach leisure time indicates a tremendous amount about them. Leisure is a very personal experience; you are what you do.

For some, leisure time is something that no matter how much of it they have, they never seem to have enough. Each of us is familiar with that special type of individual who can fill every waking moment with a zest for life. Such individuals never lack anything to do; they are constantly motivated to get involved and to participate. Their activity does not cease at the end of the working day. Rather, their leisure time is filled with a multitude of options.

Others, however, are not as fortunate. When faced with even the smallest amount of free time, they are overwhelmed by it. These individuals either cannot, or will not, open themselves up to new experiences. Many times these are the people who live, and will probably die, by schedules, convenient little packages of time neatly mapped out and then carefully recorded in appointment books. Their lives are so inflexible that when free time does occur, they do not know what to do. There is no spontaneity in their lives and no involvement for them beyond the confines of personal and office responsibilities.

The majority of people does not fall into either of these two groups. Many have not really made a decision about what to do with their leisure time. If, however, a person is even slightly willing to get involved and to experiment with leisure time, there are thousands of directions to take.

Each year the federal government spends millions, probably billions, of dollars on national parks, recreational centers, the arts, educational enrichment programs, and much, much more. Local communities sponsor theater groups, recreational programs for the young and the old alike, volunteer programs, and also provide the opportunity to get involved in the operations of local government.

It does not stop there, however. People are out running and jogging; there are tennis courts, racquet ball courts, squash courts, swimming pools, movie theaters, concerts, lectures, museums, and any number of other entertainment options. The scope of options is limitless, and an individual merely has to take a step forward and get involved. It is that easy.

Unfortunately, all too often people take the easy way out and abandon activity for the comforting soft gray glow of the television set. Instead of getting involved, they resign themselves to watching the antics of favorite T.V. heroes. Still others take a more literary approach to their non-involvement and bury themselves under a mountain of books. They spend hours at a time reading true and fictional accounts about what other people have done with their lives. To be sure, there is a great deal of value in literature, and to some extent in television, but its value is to enlighten and to excite, not to inhibit.

With numerous options to choose from, it is sad that many people are satisfied merely to be passive recipients rather than active participants in life.

Perhaps, as in most cases, a balanced approach to leisure time is the best approach. Passive forms of leisure only truly become harmful when they are the sole factor which consumes an individual's free time. Likewise, active involvement can become a negative force if it is carried to the

extreme. In a mad dash to get involved with everything, many times individuals find that they are not really involved in anything. They so fill themselves with action that, at best, life just goes by in a blur.

Quiet moments and moments of reflection and thought are just as important as being active and involved. People need time to sit back, relax, and see where they are and where they are going. A healthy balance between active involvement and passive reflection can be a very rewarding experience.

As leisure increasingly becomes a larger portion of our everyday lives, the question of what we do with leisure time becomes even more important. Realistically, leisure time is a relatively new and complex concept. It has only truly become available to all people since the advent of the industrial revolution. In the ensuing years, society has had neither the time nor the inclination to fully examine the role that leisure should play in our lives. Thus, it is up to us now to make determinations.

Depending upon the decisions that we make, leisure can either be a rewarding and fulfilling experience or an empty void which merely fills the gap between one work day and the next. With the variety of options open it would be a pity to exist in a void when it is just as easy to flourish in a wealth of activities. The decision is up to you. After all, you are what you do.

Advance to GO, Collect \$200

When it comes to playing it, Monopoly isn't just a game. It's *the* game. While for some 250 million players it's fun, it isn't at all relaxing for Parker Brothers which is fighting to preserve its monopoly on Monopoly. In that battle, Parker Brothers' parent conglomerate, the General Mills Fun Group, is not letting the facts of the game's origin stand in the way of a good story.

The rags to riches tale of a poor, down and out father who, dreaming of better days when he could afford to take his family on vacation, inked the streets of Atlantic City on a piece of oil cloth spread on the kitchen table and created Monopoly, millions for his family, and fame and fortune for a floundering game company is, like most Horatio Algerish tales, fiction.

All you have to do is ask Ralph Anspach, a professor of economics at San Francisco State and perhaps the world's foremost authority on the game. Or ask Ruth Raiford '24 who played the game in the early 1930s, and through her friends the Todds indirectly introduced Charles Darrow, credited with inventing Monopoly, to the game.

Reading the brochure supplied with the Parker Brothers game, you picture a poor but proud, unemployed engineer, wrestling with the Depression and trying to find some way to feed his young family. He invents a better bridge score pad and a novel beach toy that is a combination of a bat and ball. Neither bring money enough to pay the rent let alone visit the family's favorite vacation spa . . . Atlantic City.

Lamenting his plight, he sketches the streets of Atlantic City on a piece of oil cloth, and, deciding that it would be great fun to play at being wealthy and involved in real estate, he devises a harmless parlor game wherein players buy, improve, lease, and sell real estate.

Instantly popular, the game is much sought after, and Darrow works night and day turning out copies by hand. He tries to sell the game to Parker Brothers but . . . you guessed it . . . the game company isn't interested. Monopoly has 52 fatal flaws and certainly would be played only by a few intellectuals, not the millions of people needed to market a game successfully.

Undaunted, he produces the game in limited quantity and sells sets to the Wanamaker and F.A.O. Schwartz stores. One of the Schwartz sets is bought by a friend of the daughter of the president of Parker Brothers. The friend tells the daughter who tells her daddy what an absolutely smashing game Monopoly is, and suddenly those 52 fatal flaws aren't quite so serious after all. Parker Brothers offers Darrow a handsome royalty, refines the game, and makes millions of dollars. Darrow becomes a

millionaire just 13 years after making his first crude sketch and retires to a life of leisure and fame as the man who invented Monopoly, the nation's most popular board game.

About all that's true in the Parker Brothers account is that Charles Darrow made money from Monopoly. "One thing for sure," says Mrs. Raiford, "it was not invented by Charles Darrow."

Well, if Darrow didn't invent Monopoly who did? And what is Mrs. Raiford's connection to the game?

Ralph Anspach is an economics professor at San Francisco State who dabbles in game inventing as a side line. He dreamed-up and successfully marketed Anti-Monopoly, a game which demonstrated the harmfulness rather than the glories of monopolistic practice. Parker Brothers, or more correctly the General Mills Fun Group which ingested the game manufacturer some

years ago, won a suit in federal court claiming that Anti-Monopoly infringed on the sanctity of Monopoly, a registered trademark. But during the court cases the facts of the development of Monopoly, as Anspach states them, were unchallenged.

According to Anspach's history, Lizzie J. Magie developed The Landlord's Game around the turn of the century to dramatize the theories of Henry George, a 19th century reformer who felt that capitalism would only work if no individuals were permitted to profit from the ownership of land. Her game was widely played in Arden, Delaware by the "Single Taxers," a group who believed in George's proposal that the taxing of land alone would distribute the profits from it to all.

Living in Arden about that time was Scott Nearing who, while fired as a leftist from the University of Pennsylvania in 1915, received honorary emeritus status from the university some 60 years later for advocating a return to a simpler life on the land. Nearings recollects playing the game in Arden, according to an article in the February 13, 1978 *New Yorker* magazine.

Nearing's colleagues and students from Penn played a version of The Landlord's Game which was similar to today's Monopoly but different in that land was auctioned rather than sold outright. The game spread through college towns up and down the East coast and west to Indianapolis where a Quaker teacher from Atlantic City, learned the game while on vacation.

She took the game to Atlantic City, and she taught the game to her friends, including several Quaker teachers at the Atlantic City Friends School. Among the group was Jesse Raiford, brother of Eugene Raiford, then Ruth's fiancé and later, husband. Jesse and the Quakers adapted the game from its Indianapolis setting, which used street names of that



city, to names from Atlantic City.

Ruth Raiford remembers bringing the game back to Westtown where she was then teaching and introducing the Atlantic City version of Monopoly to her circle of friends, who included Charles and Olive Todd of Germantown. The Todds taught the game to Esther Jones, a childhood friend of Todd's, and her husband, Charles Darrow. And one night the Darrows invited the Todds and the Raifords to their home to play the game. ("They wanted to be sure they were playing it correctly," surmises Mrs. Raiford.)

That all transpired in the 1930s, and now 45 years later some 80 million Monopoly games are played in 46 countries by roughly 250 million people. It appears that Parker Brothers of the General Mills Fun Group has a virtual monopoly on Monopoly. They bought up a competitive game in the 30s and recently plowed 40,000 sets of Anti-Monopoly into a sanitary land fill in Minnesota.

And Ruth Raiford has given up the fictitious world of Park Place for the challenge of being a stock broker and buying and selling securities on the

American and New York exchanges. With a Bachelor of Philosophy degree in Mathematics from Dickinson and years of teaching at the Westtown School outside Philadelphia, she says Monopoly and her interest in stocks and bonds have gone together. She admits having always had "this thing" for numbers.

A Thirst for New Thinking

"What I needed was a chance to be in on some of the latest thinking of people who have time to think." "What I wanted was input from some of the fields that I ignored when I was at Dickinson." "I wanted to hear some good dialogue."

"I wanted to get my wheels turning." "We wanted our kids to get a taste of a place where people love to learn." "We wanted to have some vacation time that would feed us—without leaving the children out of it."

These were the kinds of longings and hopes that pushed us to suggest and then to help create the first Alumni College. We had a thirst for new thinking, a need to step outside our year-round milieu of work and family, a wish to get in touch with streams of thought that we hadn't the time or resources to tap on our own. We wanted to become a part again—even for a short time—of the community that nurtured us and gave us a taste for learning.

The Alumni Colleges of June 1977 and 1978 were Dickinson's response to these needs. President Sam Banks, Peggy Garrett of the Office of Continuing Education, and George Stehley of the Alumni Office each saw our need as one which they had a stake in meeting. We joined with faculty and other alumni to shape a weekend each June that would offer a variety of opportunities for learning, refreshment, and dialogue for alumni and their families.

A balance would be struck between input from faculty and exchange with alumni. Morning sessions would focus on new information or new departures in several disciplines, with each seminar offered twice so that participants could select two of three areas. Afternoon sessions would give faculty and alumni the opportunity to relate new insights to the world we live in.

Plans for the children would utilize the resources of the college. There would be time for recreation, time for talk, and a flexible schedule of seminars so that each person could sample broadly, tackle one issue, or finesse it all and play tennis.

For us, it was a good, rich experience. The seminars ranged over many fields . . . limits to growth, our national prospects, changing vocations, passages in adult life, recombinant DNA, the Shaker community, Sylvia Plath's poetry. The faculty was provocative and imaginative; they shared ideas with us and with each other in classes and over beer or chicken salad. We had the opportunity to dip into new areas or renew our romance with old favorites or both. We were sometimes impressed, sometimes intimidated, sometimes aggravated,—but always stimulated and revitalized—by the faculty and alumni who led us.

We lived in style with every family housed in a suite in McKenney Hall, a sociable and hospitable place that made it easy for adults and children to get together . . . or to stay apart! We were fed royally; memories of Slater food were erased by cookouts complete with steak, corn on the cob, and strawberry shortcake.

Our children wanted to go back to Alumni College II, and already they are eager for III. They still remember and talk excitedly about writing the script and filming a movie, playing computer games, learning a bit of Spanish, going on a nature hike, swimming, eating, singing, making friends. For them as for us, Alumni College was a good time in a good place.

New Directions for Alumni

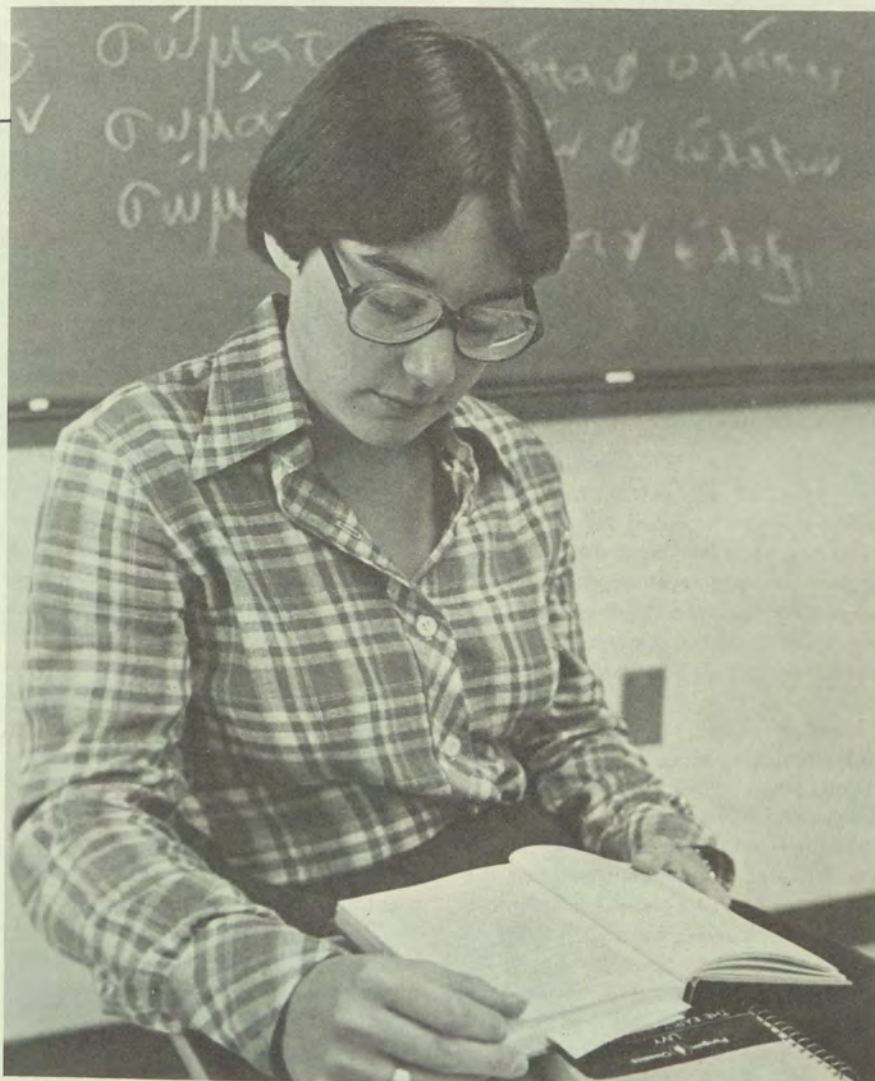
Maybe you can go home again. At least it seems that way to Ann Heermans '75, who came back to Dickinson this past summer to complete another major field of study, this time in classics.

Ann's story illustrates what can happen as society changes its attitude toward just when and how people should go to school. For a long time the college had held that learning can and should be going on for everyone at all stages of life, but until recently a formal liberal arts education was reserved for the fortunate few between the ages of 18 and 22.

Since 1976 a growing number of older students have been taking advantage of the opportunity to study at Dickinson. This past spring Dickinson's faculty approved a special program, New Directions for Alumni, designed to help our own graduates return to the classroom if further undergraduate study would help them to prepare for a new career or personal interests. Ann Heermans is the first full-time student in the New Directions Program.

What caused Ann to give up her position at Georgetown University and a promising career in counselling to come back to Dickinson? After two successful years at Georgetown, Ann realized that she would need additional study if she were to pursue her work in counselling. Having reached a turning point in her own career, she asked herself whether she wanted to do graduate work in counselling or whether she would prefer to return to an earlier love, the study of classics.

As a religion major at Dickinson, Ann had taken a course in New Testament Greek in her sophomore year which she had followed with a second year in Greek. When graduation came, she really did not want to go on to graduate school and she had gone out into the

much celebrated "real world." Now events seemed to suggest that she needed to go back to school. Why not a subject of great interest to her?

To test her theory, she resigned her position at Georgetown and joined Prof. Leon Fitts and the Dickinson summer classics program, the Archaeology of Roman Britain, in England. During her summer dig in Yorkshire, reading and discussing Roman history, Ann became convinced that her real love was classics. She returned to Washington, found a four-day-a-week job in a research organization to support herself, and began

part-time study of both Latin and Greek.

Now that Ann's life had indeed taken a new direction, she realized that as soon as she could afford to do so, she wanted to become fully involved in pursuing a classics major. Her resolve coincided with the College's development of the New Directions program for its own graduates, so that when Ann inquired about returning to Dickinson, the College could ease her way.

Prof. Philip Lockhart, chairman of the classics department, had been following Ann's path since her graduation and helped her gain the department's ap-

proval as a post-graduate major. With Lockhart's help she planned out her entire program and returned to full-time study during the 1978 summer session. She will complete her classwork at the end of the fall 1978 semester and then, once again with help from the classics department, will complete a teaching internship in a private secondary school. Prof. Lockhart has been active in developing the opportunities for interested classics graduates to begin their teaching under the guidance of experienced secondary teachers. Thus while Ann's ties to the Dickinson department are still close, she can explore her new career option.

Now graduate school looks much more inviting to Ann. As she says, having received an excellent preparation at Dickinson, she will be able to enter a first-rate master's program in the following fall and complete preparation for her new career as a classics teacher in a private secondary school.

What are special advantages of the New Directions program? Ann answers by saying that when one makes a change in one's career plans, one wants to minimize risks. She was certain of the high quality of Dickinson's classics department. Her part-time study at several Washington, D.C. schools also made her realize the advantages of the personal attention she would receive at Dickinson.

Once the classics department had approved her academic plans, the Office of Continuing Education was able to take care of all the details of registration and record keeping for her. Also, she was now eligible for the special continuing education tuition rate, so that her course of study was within her financial means.

Other alumni are currently involved in similar additional study at Dickinson.

Mr. Roger Morgenthal, a Carlisle attorney and Dickinson graduate of the class of 1968, had found that he could deal with his clients more effectively if he had a greater knowledge of psychology. For the past three semesters he has been working toward an additional major in psychology by taking one course at a time. Several recent alumni have realized late in their undergraduate careers or within several years of graduation that they wished to pursue careers in fields outside their original major. They have returned to full-time study for a semester or two to prepare for those fields, for example to complete requirements for entry into graduate or professional school or to fulfill the requirements for teacher certification. Within the past month, another alumna, Suzanne Fost Green '71 has begun preparation for an additional major in classics. Since Prof. Lockhart's department seems to have particular appeal for alumni, we asked him what his feelings were about adults beginning a new major area of study.

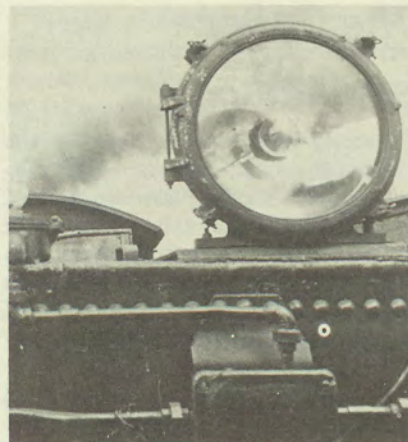
Lockhart pointed out that while classical languages were part of the regular course of study for children in earlier times, now students don't come to Latin or Greek until the high school or college years. This tradition has fallen on bad times, he remarked, partly because there is no children's literature that has survived in the classical languages. While he admits that beginning a new language is more difficult for an adult, he contends that Latin is perhaps less difficult than a modern spoken language because the student must only master the reading vocabulary. He believes that adults bring a more fully developed sensitivity to the paradoxes

inherent within the translation of Latin than do younger students. Certainly he has found that returning adults who have felt their education has been incomplete without the study of classics have made contributions which have enriched his own undergraduate classes.

With such encouragement and support it is no surprise that Ann Heermans feels very much as if she has come home again. While she herself has changed and refined her life goals, she has enjoyed coming back to campus to find many of her former professors as well as the helpful and welcoming smiles of college staff. This semester she is carrying four courses in the classics department but feels less pressure than she did when she was an undergraduate. She is a bit amazed at all she has accomplished in such a short time.

New Advisor

Carol C. Laise, director general of the Foreign Service, has been named to the board of advisors of Dickinson College.

Ambassador Laise is the 18th member of the board of advisors which was founded last year to provide additional special counsel to the president and to the College's governing board of trustees.

She was named to her present post at the State Department in 1975. Her responsibilities include directing the personnel policy, recruitment, training, assignment, and promotion of about 7,000 foreign service officers. Ambassador Laise is married to Ellsworth Bunker.

Prior to assuming her current post, Ambassador Laise was Assistant Secretary of State for Public Affairs. She was



the first woman ever appointed an assistant secretary of state, and she is the first to lead the foreign service.

A veteran of 28 years in the foreign service, she served as ambassador to Nepal from 1966 to 1973. In Washington, she has been the country director for India, Nepal, Sri Lanka and the Maldives; director for the Office of South Asia Affairs; and director of the Office of International Organization Affairs.

Born in Winchester, Virginia, the new advisor earned baccalaureate and master's degrees from American University and went to work for the civil service commission in 1940, before joining the State Department in 1948.

For her life-long commitment to cross cultural learning and international understanding, Dickinson College awarded Ambassador Laise the honorary doctor of laws degree during commencement in 1977.

A Tale of the Mermaid

"The freshman looks to the College, and atop the ivy-covered walls of Old West he sees the familiar silhouette of a mermaid." So said Eric J. Groves '64, the founding editor of the student handbook, *The Mermaid's Tale*.

Over the past centuries this maiden has not only greeted many but has bade farewell to thousands of students at Dickinson College. Her outstretched arms, as if in the first motions of a parting hug, have waved in the wind on many Commencement Sundays while Dickinson seniors have descended the

to scan the horizon before and behind. On each of her sides she also possesses a set of breasts (about which Dr. Charles Coleman Sellers, the college historian, once quipped, when asked why she had four bosoms: "Oh, that's because there's one for each class!").

To many Dickinsonians over the years she has been the object of devilish pranks, in particular, her annual abduction which has resulted in one of the most exciting and prestigious feats a freshman floor can achieve.

The origin of this unique mermaid

traditional "Old Stone Steps" to receive their sheepskin diplomas.

Her height measures about 34 inches, while her arms span 36 inches. This petite lady is endowed with the Janus-like feature of two faces, allowing her

dates back to the early years of the College. Most historians credit Benjamin Latrobe, the surveyor of the Public Works of the United States, who designed Old West in 1804, with conceiving the idea for her creation. Latrobe was

President Banks took part in a panel discussion at the American Bar Association Convention in August on questions raised by test tube babies and cloning genetically identical people.

Scientists and lawyers met together to consider the possibility of guidelines



in connection with the multitude of questions raised by the scientific breakthroughs.

Dr. Banks said that for the sake of scientists, questions must be answered about who controls the results of experimentation. For instance, he asked, who is liable for the rights of a test tube baby—the researcher, the person who contributed the sperm, or the woman in whose womb it grew?

Others on the panel included Ethan Signer, a biology professor at Massachusetts Institute of Technology; Morton Ziner, molecular biology professor at Rockefeller University; and Richard Emery, New York Civil Liberties Union.

Buchanan Letters

Mary Peterman Bare '28 has presented the college with two Buchanan letters. Mrs. Bare appeared in the Morris Room on alumni day, when she celebrated her 50th reunion, with the first of the letters. Mrs. Martha Slotten, archivist, received the second one in August.

The letters, handwritten by Buchanan, were sent to James A. Caldwell, a state senator from Pennsylvania (Lancaster) when Buchanan was a United States

the distinguished early American architect who also designed such outstanding structures as the Catholic Cathedral in Baltimore and the Nation's Capitol in Washington, D.C. Latrobe, like his fellow architect, Thomas Jefferson, was very much influenced by classical motifs and derived many of his principles from Vitruvius and Palladio, the Renaissance Vicenzan architect.

Paul F. Norton, in his article about Old West, tells us that Latrobe, having thus been steeped in classical forms, designed for Old West a cupola—the Renaissance offspring of the Roman dome. Supported by twelve unfluted columns, this prominent structure housed the College bell. To finish off the domical covering of the cupola, Latrobe decided to crown it with a weathervane. The form he chose was that of Triton, who in Greek mythology was a merman, with human head and trunk and the tail of a fish.

Latrobe probably derived the idea from his personal copy of Stuart and Revett's *Antiquities of Athens*, in which he found a reproduction of the Triton which graced the Tower of the Winds in Athens. However, Latrobe's intended form for the Old West weathervane was altered by the local metalworker, who, apparently unfamiliar with the sex of Triton, forged a very feminine figure.

"For years her form has caught the eye of many a young Dickinsonian; in instances such fascination has driven freshmen to scale the heights and meet her face-to-face," reports Mr. Groves, recalling the long-standing tradition of Mermaid-napping.

About the origin of this custom little is known. We read, however, in *A Pioneer College and its Background: Dickinson* by Dr. Charles W. Super of the class of 1866, the story of the "Rape of the Bell" which may have set the tradition for the popular student scheme, in

Senator from Pennsylvania. The first letter concerns the gubernatorial election of 1838 and the second one is to Andrew Jackson, introducing him to Caldwell.

Mrs. Slotten says the letters are rare treasures to add to the college's collection. Mrs. Bare's husband, Howard D. '24, who bought them at a sale, served Methodist churches in Lancaster and elsewhere.

Centenary Coins

This summer the Morris Room also received a centenary coin and a letter concerning another one from Colorado. The American Numismatic Association had directed the Colorado collector to the archivist for information.

The coin was issued in 1866. Mrs. Slotten says that the college issued it in connection with a fundraising campaign honoring the hundredth anniversary of American Methodism. Dickinson's ties with the Methodist Church were very strong then and the medals were given to Sunday School students who contributed to the campaign.

On one side of the coin is Old West, designed by Benjamin Latrobe. On the other side Susana Wesley, the mother of John Wesley, founder of Methodism, is shown with him.

earlier years of stealing the clapper, and then, later, the mermaid. Dr. Super reports that it was during the administration of President Jesse Truesdell Peck that the College bell initially disappeared.

Sometime after the theft Peck happened to be aboard a steamboat on the Mississippi, and he heard the vessel's bell tolling as the ship navigated the choppy waters. The bell's tone sounded very familiar to Peck, who, after inquiring of the captain, discovered that it was indeed the one which belonged on top of Old West. After negotiations, the bell was returned to its customary place within the College cupola.

Its replacement soon enticed students to repeat the successful theft of the bell. Since, however, it has now been hung more securely, the attempt to abscond with the bell was thwarted.



They settled with merely removing the clapper. Paul Hoch, a local journalist, remarks that soon afterwards, probably because the clapper was no longer being replaced by disgruntled College officials, attention began to focus on the mermaid. The riskiest scheme was the leap onto the roof from the tree, now gone, on the south side of the building.

Custom required that she be carried, by the freshman floor which successfully stole her, to the president at half-time of the Homecoming football game. Her final restoration to the windy realms (so that the tradition could continue) has been achieved by the Wheel and Chain, the senior women's honorary organization. In recent years a replica has replaced the original and valuable piece of folk art.

This academic year found the annual tradition altered slightly. President Banks and others in the College community have become concerned with the potential hazards which students confront when balancing on top of the cupola in their removal of the maiden of the winds. Some maintain that one unfortunate student, knocked from his balance by a strong gale, fell to his death from the dome in the late 1800s or early 1900s.

Whether this fatality be true or not, it is because of the inherent dangers that the mermaid was grounded this year and hidden somewhere on campus. All freshman floors were given clues leading them on a treasure hunt around the College grounds. Racing against wits and time, the floors competed until one successfully discovered the landlocked lady. And with this change, for the first time in the history of the kidnapping caper, women's floors were afforded the same chance as the men's to meet the mermaid face-to-face.

Thus, in 1978, despite minor alterations, the custom of the mermaid continues. And (to paraphrase Mr. Groves) though she may be only a minor part of the incoming student's experience, the spirit she represents is as great as any the College knows.

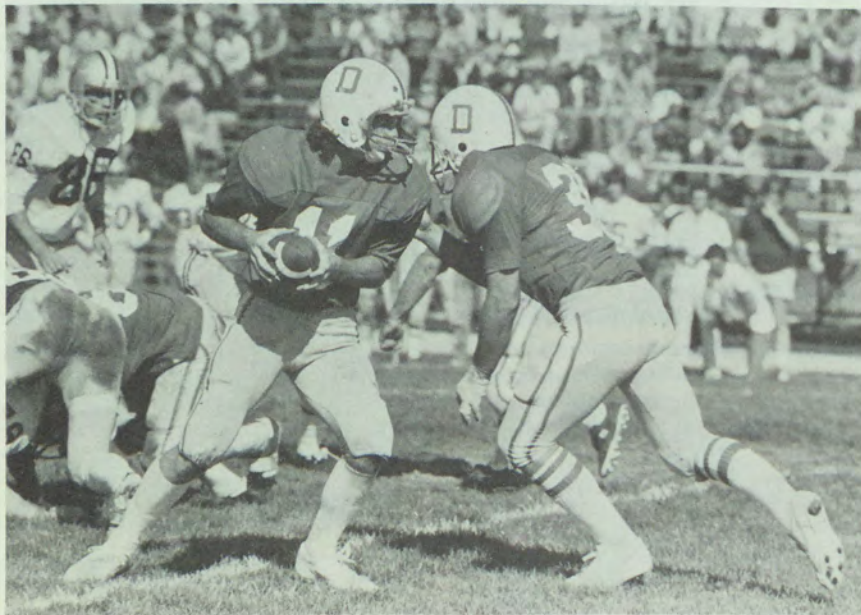
Your responsibilities are over! Perhaps you have helped to make a connection that would not have existed—one that will be mutually beneficial for the student and the College.


1977-1978 Dickinson College Gift Report

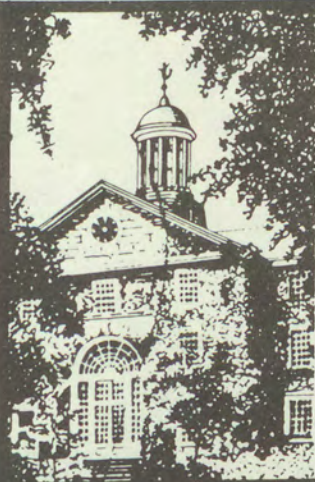
