Perhaps when

Capt. Pratt's next letter comes to my husband it may suggest some plan which will make Howling Wolf's coming, yet possible. Nothing was done for his eyes after Dr. Lang operated upon them, until the proposition to bring him to New York was made & we cannot feel confident of any ones treating them successfully but your self. I am so glad that you do not like many others think the Indians all treacherous and incapable of civilization
