Oh dear, Jane, if you know how bad I did feeal to be in poor sister Nancy's so long 3 weeks with all of my children you would pitty her as well as me and to cap of all I had to move in this house before the family moved out 2 weeks longer. I really thought that I never would get settled the man that we bought this place of done his best to take the place from us again after John paying him for it they got sorry for selling it but they could not get it back from John they abused us shamefuly in every way they hindered us to put up our stove and our beds I had to sleep on the floor for 2 weeks befor we could get rid of them I took cold in my head and inflammation in my eyes and tooth ache I suffered every thing for the last 2 months but I thank god that I am still alive and taking comfort in my new home with my dear

husband once more oh how I wish that you could just hop in and see me now I think that you would like the looks of my little house it is so clean and nice and every thing new in it so sweet and clean it is a newe life to me to get rid of the old ones I think that god took pitty on me and raised that [illegible] [illegible] for my good and grace the good friends to help me on My dear sister if you knew how greatful we do feel to you and to your dear good and noble husband I would not have everything to keep house with onley for you and your husband may God help him and his every day of his life is my prayer.

John received a letter from the Captain a few days ago. I am glad that you received the two box of grapes I hope that they were good ones. This is a beautiful fruite country I like it well I am in hope to be able to send you some of its fruites after I feed highly complimented in the Captain speaking of me in such high terms I onley wish that I was worthy of this praise I must bring this to a close I hope that you wll excuse this bad writing as my [illegible] is very poor one.

My husband joins me in kind regards to the Captain and to your self and to your children in hopes to here from you soon. I remain as ever your friend & greatful sister Mary Goodin.
