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Executive Mansion May 13th, 1860

My dear Father,

I wrote you quite a lengthy epistle on Friday, and now merely wish to send a few lines to show that I am always thinking of you, amid all my enjoyments. The large dinner on the day I wrote, was charming. The guests were 36 in number among them gen. Scott in full uniform, gorgeous, & dazzling to behold, [Chapean?] Sword & all complete! After the company had dispersed The President went up to smoke a cigar in his office, & I with him, for a chat. I told him he would have to get up some sort of uniform in which to receive the Japanese, or they certainly would mistake gen. Scott for the great man of the nation. He laughed, & said "well I have a dressing gown that gen. Harney gave me, perhaps that would do, but afterwards concluded, that for him to be in plain black in the midst of all the uniforms would show them that simplicity was a mark of distinction in this Country. I enclose you today's "Constitution" with pretty sharp notice of Mr. Ingersoll's speech, which it merited, how in the world could he have been guilty of such bad taste? We are all surprised at Mr. Everett's accepting the Nomination for Vice President. The Post Master at New York, Mr. Fowler, has been discovered to be a defaulter to the amount of one hundred and fifty-six thousand dollars, & the Post-office there was yesterday placed in the hands of The Federal Government agents, sent on for the purpose. The President & Mr. Holt are greatly displeased about it. Your friend Steinberger is here trying for the mission to Guatemala & is strongly backed by gen. Lane, but he will not get it. Emily Padnalader & Mr. & Mrs. George Blight were at Hattie's reception yesterday. They are all staying with Mrs. Palmer. Emily looks wretchedly. Mrs. Clay was also here & asked for you very kindly as did also Mr. Taylor & others. Col. Hardee arrived on Friday & looks remarkably well, he is coming to go to church with me this morning. To show how hurried Mr. Buchanan is, all the time, as soon as I mentioned on Friday evening, that I had a visit from my friend Col. Hardee that morning he said, "Well you must ask him to come & take a family dinner with us, & we will invite gen. Johnston, who has just arrived too." My package by express came safely to hand on Friday, thanks for the same to you & Aunty & Annie, as all I believe had a hand in dispatching it.
