Dear Sir

Inclosed you have sundrie papers from Mr. Davaise Smith which informs that the Indians have done Damage in this Province and that and Indian war seems near at hand. I tremble for the Poor Inhabitants who are almost unprovid'd with arms and indeed too many of these men is order'd away. I fear Congress will see their Error when too late in ordering Col. McCays Battalion from Ketaning. I think imediate assistance ought to be sent and I hope you will write to Mr. Wilson to urge it in the warmest manner. Supose some of the Militia were ordered from Virginia and some from Bedford County and some from Maryland to continue there for a few months untill Regular troop(s) could be sent up. These are a few Crude thoughts as the Bearer waits. I have the above account from Wm. Lockrey and believe it' too true. Mrs. Montgomery joyns in Compliments to you and Mrs. Yeats.
