May it please your Honour

In your verbal Message of the 19th of March and several other Messages you werepleased to recommend it to the House to make the Supply Bill then returned conformable to the Decree of His Majesty in Council relative to the Taxation of the Proprietary located unimproved Lands & Lotts "after which you would readily pass it into a Law."

This the House have strictly complied with in the present Bill, from an earnest Desire that His Majesty's service should not be longer obstructed; and yet your Honour has in your Message of this Day been pleased to start two objections, both of them new, notwithstanding the parts of the Bill objected to, have been repeatedly and long before you. And as these Objections do not appear to us justly founded, we have returnd the Bill & request your Honour would give your Assent to the same without further Delay, that the important service for which the supplies are intended may not be frustrated from the lateness of the season.
