Guerney had ever given any intelligence or assistance to the Enemy -- and that the whole Matter arose from some British soldiers telling a woman in Germain Town that their Army received intelligence from a Gen. Officer a Lieut. Col & a Capt. of Ours; and that the said woman made answer it look'd bad as a Lieut Col. of Ours had lately resignd mentioning Col. Guerney, this being spoke in company was not properly understood which gave rise to the examination of Col. Guerney.
