Dear Sir,

On being informed some time ago, "that there was on Record a Mortgage by James Wilson, Vicar on my Land near Carlisle to Mr Henry for £100 - & no satisfaction entered", I wrote to Mr Wilson on the subject - In his Answer of the 5th of last September he says - "The Bond which I sent to Mr Henry, and which was accompanied with the Mortgage you mention, is paid, cancelled, & in my Possession - No satisfaction was omitted to be entered on the Record of the Mortgage, I cannot, at this Distance of Time, amount: But I think I have a private Resolution that the Mortgage with a power of Attorney to enter satisfaction was sent to Carlisle, either to Robert Mullan Esq. or to John Agnew Esq."

You Sir, will exceedingly oblige Me, if you will be so kind, as to have a strict Inquiry made for the proper Voucher in this Affair, & if you will be so good as to inform Me how it now stands, & what Mr Henry was the Mortgagee,

On being informed some time ago, "that there was on Record a Mortgage by James Wilson Esquire on my Land near Carlisle to M^r Henry for £400 - & no satisfaction entered", I wrote to M^r Wilson on the subject - In his answer of the 8th of last September, he says - "The Bond which I executed to M^r Henry, and which was accompanied with the Mortgage You mention, is paid, cancelled, & in my possession - How satisfaction was omitted to be entered on the Record of the Mortgage, I cannot, at this Distance of Time, account: But I think I have a faint Recollection that the Mortgage with a power of Attorney to enter satisfaction was sent to Carlisle, either to Robert Millar Esq. or to John Agnew Esq."

You, Sir, will exceedingly oblige Me, if You will be so kind, as to have a strict Enquiry made for the proper Voucher in this Affair, & if You will be so good as to inform Me how it now stands, & what M^r Henry was the Mortgagee
