Wheatland 4 July 1849.

Ily dear James | I have received your letter of the 30 te ultimo & and rejoiced to learn that you are succeeding well in your steadies. I trust nows that you will be able to enter the Sophomore Clap at Inencetore.

I forgot to lete you that Il! Bolmar advised new to let him give you the necepary pochet money, as he does to others; & I promised that I would comply with his request. you may therefore, apply to him.

The weather was so hot I I was so much oppressed by it during my visit to Washington, that I ded not see so much of my friends as I could have desired. The Measonlins were well & late a great interest, especially elles Clem, in your weefare. They made many affectionate inquiries concurring yourself & your progress.

Harriet & myself, with M. Wom B Fordnes & Miles Backman inlend to leave for the Bodford Springs Commonous. I hope to veret West Chester Some line after my return. I objerve that you subscribe your name I to Henry, instead of James B Honry . I have wilnifted so much inconvence from parsons subscribing only the bulials of the Christian name, that here I she, Harnet, Met Hetty I Esher de all Send there kendet live.

## Wheatland 4 July 1849.

My dear James/
