ALLEN TANNER was born in 1898 in to a large musical family of southern Illinois. Endowed at earliest age with absolute pitch, he was taught the rudiments of Music by an Aunt, an accomplished pianist, acquiring also a general knowledge of Music from a cousin, Mabel Pavey, active for years throughout the state as a skilled and cultured musician.

WHEN SIXTEM he was taken to Chicago, again by a relative residing there, whose interests were also musical. Soon he was awarded a scholarship to the classes of Victor Heinze one of the noted Leschetizky pupils, and it was not long before he appeared in publicity. He was heard by Margaret Anderson, Editor of the renowned "Little Review", who was lavish in praise of his gifts, and art, drawing him enthusiastically into the famous group surrounding that now legendary avant-garde magazine.

DEPARTING SOON AFTERWARD for New York, he was immediately engaged by Rugno Rogislav (Mrs. Riccardo Mertin) to assist in joint recitals of unusual and rarely he related. There followed invitations from Mesdames Alda, D'Alverez, Leblanc-Maeterlinck and others, to participate in concerts of modern French and Spanish music. A appeared also in the recitals, playing in the distinguished musical salons of that Colynew York and throughout the East.

HIS GIFTS ATTRACTED THE ATTENTION of several eminent musicians, and under the sponsorship of such as Myra Hess, Artur Rubenstein, Paul Kochanski and Karol Szymanowski he soon left for Europe with an enthusiastic letter of commendation from Alexander Siloti, the pupil of Liszt and teacher of Rachmaninoff.

IN BEHLIN he became a scholar of Leonide Kreutzer, going later to Paris where Mme. Chailley-Richez, an assistant to Cortot prepared him for lessons with that Master.

AFTER YEARS OF SUCCESSUL ACTIVITY in the European music world, he returned to his native land in 1934, where he has since lived, played and taught and where he has taken up residence again permanently, coaching piano students in concert repertory.
