## THUMB BETTER THAN CANDLE 7 FOR TESTING OUT VOICES.

Prima Donna Says Flicker of Light
Is Not Infallible Test of Wrong
Vibrations in Singers.

Mme. Hanna Butler, prima donna, of he Auditorium hotel, does not believe in the indiscriminate use of the candle flame as a means of testing voices. Dr. Floyd S. Mackey of Columbia university told the National Council of Teachers of English that a wavering candle flame before a tone meant something wrong with the tone.

Mme. Butler showed a TRIBUNE photographer both the right tone with an unwavering flame and the wrong one with a flickering light.

"It wouldn't do for a beginner to test her voice with the candle," said Mme. Butler, "because she might have a throaty tone and the candle would not flicker. Most young women who have done a little amateur singing without proper training are 'muscle bound.' When they sing the muscles at the base of the tongue stand out. A teacher is apt to advise the pupil to relax, but a beginner doesn't know how to do it. She may feel her throat with her thumb, however, and tell easily whether or not she is relaxing."
