501, (502) COURSE RELATED INDE-PENDENT STUDY. (Open only to Freshman and Sophomores who on the basis of Advanced Placement have qualified for credit in an introductory course but who desire to work more extensively at the survey or princi-ples level of a disciplime. Prerequisite: Agreement by supervising instructor and permission by the Chairman of the Department.) 2 to 3 semester hours per semester.
A tutorial directed course or half-course in Independent Study within the same body of knowledge as that for which advanced placement with credit given. The option does not apply to Eng. 1-2, or 2a, Mathematics 5,6, or to Foreign Languages below 20.
