BASKETBALL

D'son beat Gettysburg 52-44. It was the first time in 14 contests that the Red Devils have managed to defeat the men from G-burg. With things well under hand by half time, the Devils, in front 26-12, played a controlled second half, taking only 14 shots, sinking 9. High man was Weaver with 23. Anglada hit for 13 and Valenti for 12. Our team's fine showing against a squad which last night lost to Muhlenberg 64-63, one of the strongest teams in the east, gives an indication of how well we can expect them to do the rest of the season.

WRESTLING

The Lehigh J.V. scored a 25-12 victory over D'son before 4000 spectators. Highlights for the Devils include pinnings by Marcucci in the lightweight division (123 lbs) and Miele in the unlimited class. Sackman tied his opponent. The squad did better than expectations against a team stronger than we will meet all season.

BASKETBALL

Saturday night, D'son beat the cagers from Hopkins 71-65. Coasting along after a big halftime lead of 39-27, the team played control basketball to win their fourth straight contest, in easy fashion.

Weaver was high man for the Devils with 19 points. Valenti hit for 18. Anglada scored 12. This makes the team 7-3 for the campaign.

Diehl scored 9 points, and Olinsky has been good for 8 or 9 points every game. This is part of the bench strength, which along with our increased height, Coach DuCharme attributes much of the team's continued success. He expects the winning ways to continue against Moravian tonight. The game, to be played at Bethlehem will be covered in tomorrow morning's daily senator.

SWIM MEET

Saturday afternoon, the men from Dickinson sank G-burg 62-22. The meet was highlighted by the record breaking performance of the freestyle relay team. Costin, Theiler, Kolpe and Mulligan swam the event in 4:52.1 besting the old mark by 0.3 of a second. This feat shows how well Coach Levenson has kept his crew in top condition. He is pushing them on to better times when there is no pressure to win. This should make for a good showing in the Middle Atlantic this year.

SENATE ELECTIONS

At the last meeting of the Senate, the Elections Committee presented a list of by laws which when they were adopted instituted the party system on the Dickinson campus.

The advantages of the system are, the stimulating of widespread campus interest, and by the election of a unified group of officers elected on a single ticket, the establishing of leader responsibility. Further it would broaden the base of student representation by allowing non-Senators to participate in policy making decisions by virtue of their being active in party affairs. Lastly, the party structure would provide continuity of action from one administration to the next.

Saturday night the Red Devils lost a thrilling game by two points scored in a last second set shot by Lebanon Valley. The D'son cagers, behind in the first half 28-26, ended with a 59-57 score. Ray Weaver was high scorer with 18 points with Ralph Chase close behind with 17.

In a return to the home court the Devils face Lehigh Tuesday night in what should be a great struggle, as our best ball this season has been played at home.

SWIMMING

The 28th of the month the team travels to Wilkes College, the scene of the Middle Atlantic. D'son should well be proud of the efforts of Coach Ream and his squad for turning in such a fine record this year.

BASKETBALL

Last Friday night F & M defeated Dickinson 86-69 at Lancaster. This defeat, the fourth in a row for the Devils, puts them 7-7 for the season thus far.

Riding the crest of a 5 game winning streak they were unbeatable. By half-time we were behind 42-28. Their rebounding ability especially hurt us, as they controlled the boards all night.

High scorer for D'son was Chase with 20. Valenti scored for 18, Weaver hit for 13. For Franklin and Marshall, Kugle had 21, and Swetnam, who lead with 20 rebounds, scored 20 points.

SWIMMING

D'son beat Lycoming 66-20 for the Devils 15th straight. In the course of the afternoon three pool and school records were set. The first or medly relay consisting of Kline O'Neill, Altaker and Coston; the 200-yd. butterfly swum by O'Neill; and the 50-yd. freestyle by Kulp were events in which records fell Saturday.

We took a first in every event but the freestyle relay, in which we entered an all fresh team. The noted improvement in the diving competition can be attributed to the hard work of Dean Coutts, who has been coaching the divers this season. This should help our chances in the Middle Atlantic this year.
