Last Saturday Dickinson matmen ended their regular season with a 18-14 victory over Western Maryland. This makes them 2-3 for this, their first season. A break down of the scoring is as follows: Marcucci pinned his opponent in the 123-pound division, Shmeltz lost a docision, Beaver won with a pin in the 137-pound event, Sackman won by forfeit, Mowrer lost a decision, Skladany won by a decision in the 177-pound class, Hoberman was pinned, and Miele was decisioned.

The 28th of the month the team travels to Wilkes College, the scene of the Middle Atlantics. D'son should well be proud of the efforts of Coach Ream and his squad for turning in such a fine record this year.
