

He was a founder, and is president emeritus, of the Montgomery Improvement Association, the direct forerunner of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference of which he is president. The internationally known civil rights leader continues as pastor of West Hunter Street Baptist Church in Atlanta, Georgia.


