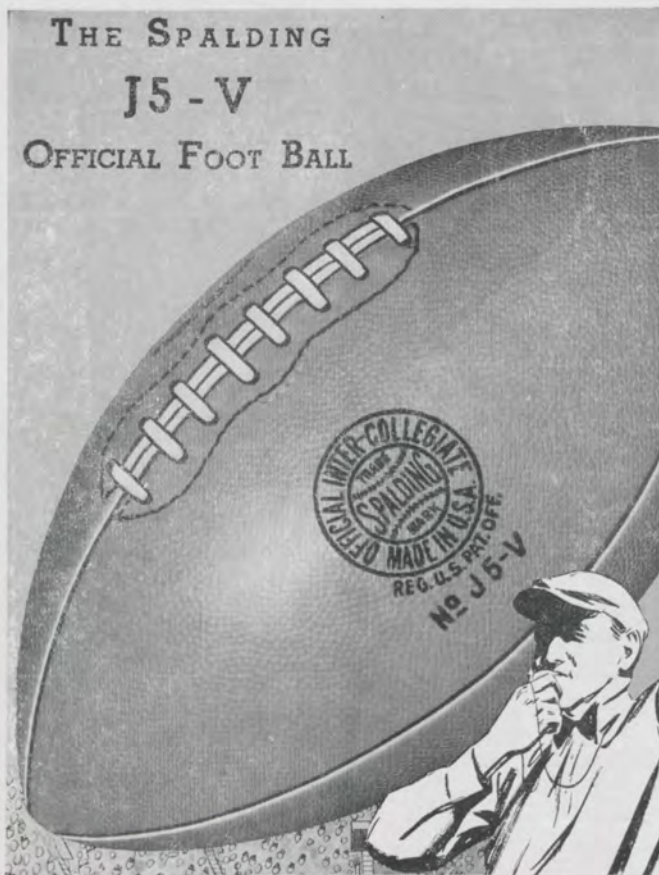

45 Years of Gettysburg-Dickinson Football Lore

As Told by Arthur Renfrew, Harrisburg Telegraph Sports Writer

Back in the gay nineties when any kind of short trousers and shoes were appropriate but a time when you simply couldn't play football without canvass jackets and toboggan caps, twenty-two brave and self-coached gridiron sons, wearing the proud and traditional colors of Gettysburg and Dickinson Colleges, wrote into the now shop worn record books the first chapter of an intercollegiate classic which in later years was to become the greatest and most colorful gridiron drama in all Central Pennsylvania.

The first official gridiron battle between Gettysburg and Dickinson was held in 1892 and from that memorable October afternoon in the gay nineties until today, November 6, 1937, unheralded figures of the gridiron have risen to heroic heights each year, bringing fame, glory and victory to his team and at the same time casting a shadow of grief and defeat on the opponent.

However, Gettysburg and Dickinson met on the football battlefield long before 1892. Informal duels were held as far back as 1879, when on the afternoon of September 25, one full week ahead of schedule, a scrappy band of Red Devils appeared on the Battlefield where Civil War history was made and issued a defiant challenge to Gettysburg. Gettysburg (then Pennsylvania College) accepted the bold challenge and after three hours of rip snortin' action the Bullets hoisted the Orange and Blue banner in triumph, tabulating an 11-6 win. Dickinson had its day later in the same season when the Red Devils floored the Bullets by an 11-10 count.

The early Gettysburg-Dickinson brawls attracted considerable interest but it wasn't until 1892 when enthusiasm soared to a new level. For it was in this year that Gettysburg and Dickinson opened the now musty leaves of the record books to write the first two of the thirty-three chapters which have been scribbled into Central Pennsylvania's outstanding football classic.

But the following season it was a different story and Gettysburg kayoed Dickinson by scores of 24-14 and 4-0. From that time on the Bullets have more or less, and mostly more, dominated this traditional classic, winning twenty-two battles from the Red Devils as compared to Dickinson's ten conquests. One skirmish, waged in 1931, resulted in a scoreless tie. But regardless of the scores, many of which were lop-sided, and who won, the Gettysburg-Dickinson series has been packed with thrills and spills and upsets.

After the pair of Gettysburg triumphs in 1893, eleven closely fought conflicts were staged between 1894 and 1911, Gettysburg and Dickinson taking every other game until 1911 when the Red Devils launched a three-game winning streak over the Bullets and at the same time made "believe it or not" gridiron history.

The lucky No. 11 played the leading role in the writing of a unique piece of history as the Dickinson eleven, rolling up eleven first downs, conquered Gettysburg, 11-0, on the eleventh day, of the eleventh month, of 1911. After Dickinson bested the Bullets, 38-14, in 1913, climaxing the longest Red Devil winning spurt in this forty-five-year-old rivalry, it was eleven years later when Dickinson repeated, the Red and White scoring a 20-12 decision over the Orange and Blue on Harrisburg's Island Park in 1924. And following this conquest, it was eleven more years before the Red and White warriors of 32 points to 12 in 1935 on the Carlisle gridiron.

From 1918, after a lapse of five years, to 1923, inclusive, Gettysburg painted the picture with six straight victories and after the 20-12 reversal on Island Park, Harrisburg, 1924, the Bullets continued their overwhelming supremacy, winning nine of the ten battles, the 1931 contest ending in a scoreless tie.

The mention of the 1924 Dickinson conquest recalls to our memory of the days when Gettysburg and Dickinson held Central Pennsylvania's big show of the year in Harrisburg but it was a financial failure and beginning in 1925 Gettysburg and Carlisle were again the scenes of this nerve-tingling drama of the gridiron.

In 1935, just about the time when it was getting to be a habit of losing to Gettysburg, Dickinson placed its football destinies under a new ruler, Art Kahler, a robust genius from the broad wheat plains of Kansas, and the Red Devils put on a brilliant fight to get back into the victory column for the first time in eleven years by soundly thrashing the Orange and Blue, 32-12, on Biddle Field, Carlisle, and a year ago Gettysburg and Dickinson waged probably the most magnificent, thrilling and colorful scrap seen in the history of this traditional feud as the Red Devils manufactured a 21-13 triumph.

Which brings us to another season and another sizzling and all-important show, the Gettysburg-Dickinson gridiron follies of 1937.

There's more than tradition at stake on the battle-scarred turf below us today. Far more than tradition. It's football warfare with a vengeance for the Bullets, who will fight desperately to the last ditch to regain the prestige lost in 1935 and 1936 when Dickinson halted the long reign of the Bullets.

Come what may, the 1937 episode, the thirty-fourth since 1892, promises to be just one of the many spectacular chapters written by Gettysburg and Dickinson.

And now, we're all set for the Gettysburg-Dickinson gridiron follies of 1937. O. K., Major, strike up the band!

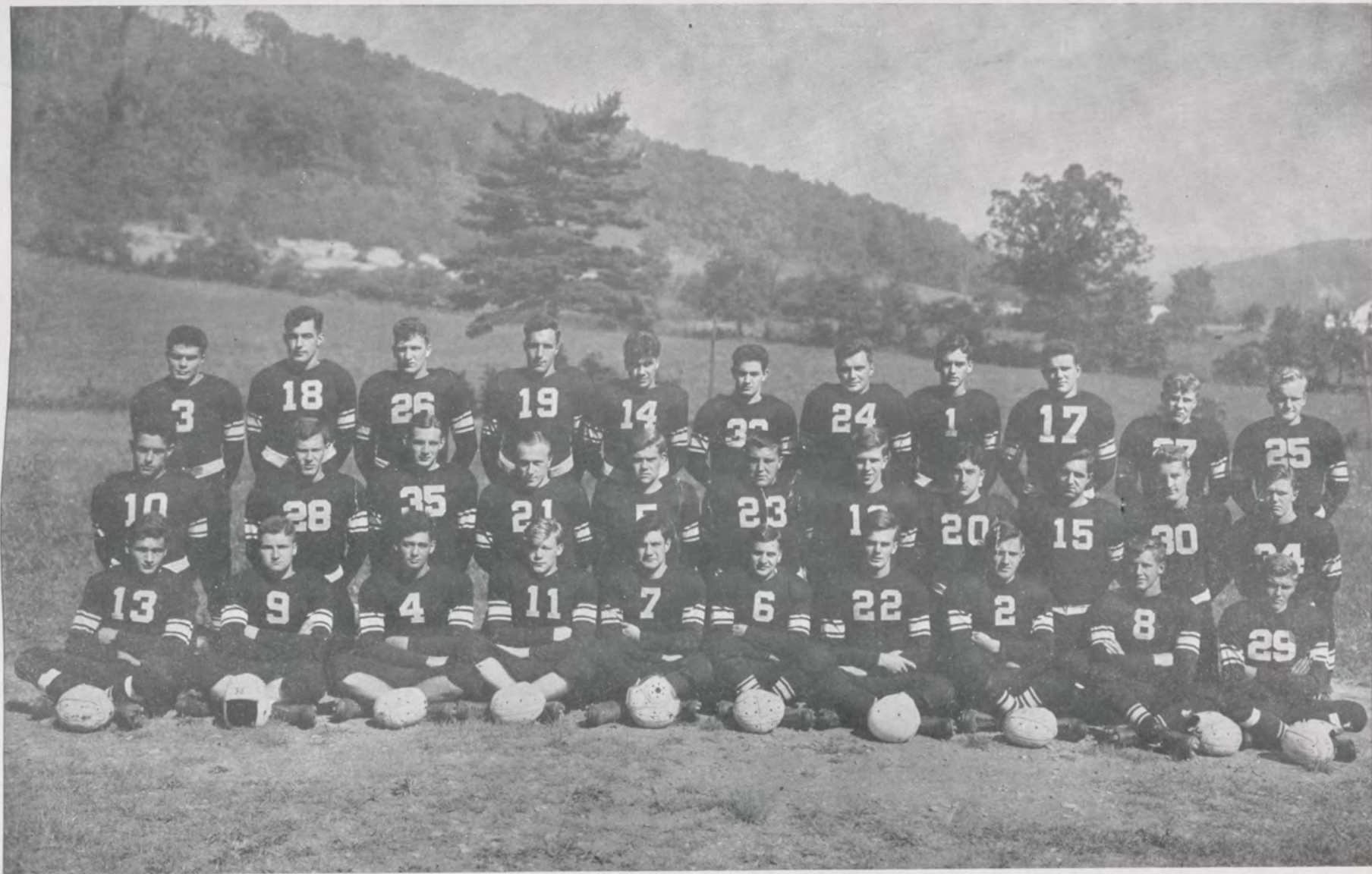

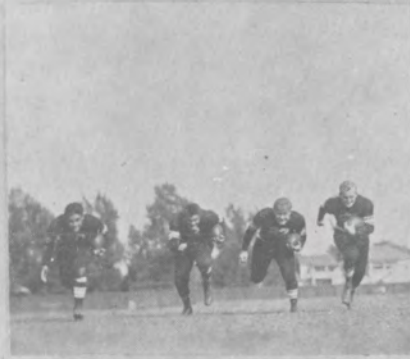

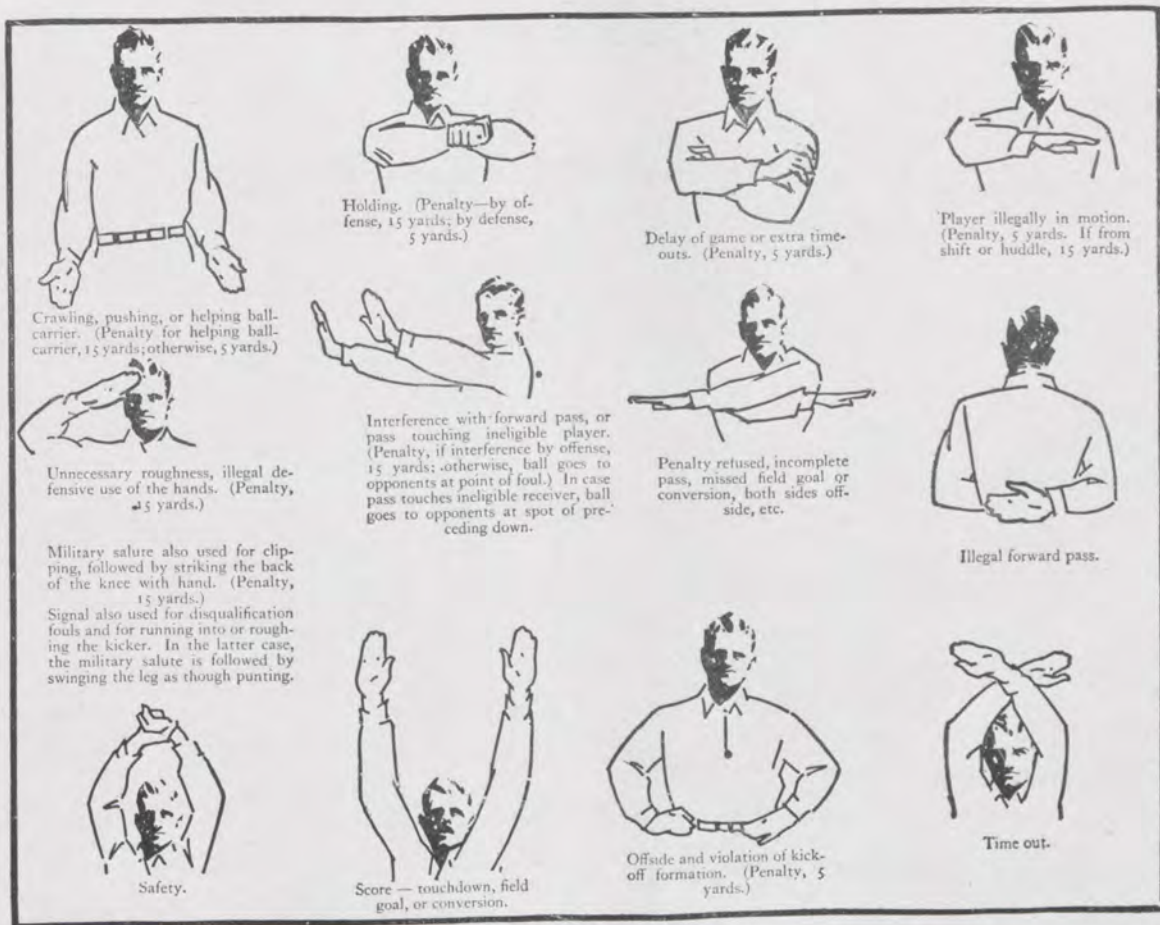
