Mashington 16 April 1828

Your reporter has this maning made me & Jay, that every cent laid whom Molafses, would operate to give the farmer two or three cents a bushel on his grain. I men expressed such an openion. I did say, that every thron gallons of Molafres, imported into this country, to be manufactured into New England Steem, word took the place of one bushel of cour or you: and that for each cent her gallon which was added to the price of whisher, the distillers in my District could, & did give an additional price, of between two & three cents per bushel for grand. you will please to publish this consciens. Gentlemen:/

I did say, that every three gallons of Molasses, imported into this country, to be manufactured into New England Rum, took the place of one bushel of corn or rye: and that for each cent per gallon which was added to the price of whiskey, the distillers in my District could, & did give an additional price, of between two and three cents per bushel for grain.
