Dear Sir/

On the evening of the 28 Ultimo I received yours of the 18th. of January together with the packet which you had deposited in the Russian Embassy at Paris. Some of the letters had been written before the Presidential election. I shall suffer considerable inconvenience from the delay in receiving one of them; and my situation in regard to an important affair would have been very awkward had not a duplicate of one of the Dispatches arrived very à-propos. I do not mention these circumstances with any view but to impress upon you the necessity of sending my private letters immediately by Mail should any hereafter be forwarded to your case. In relation to the Despatches you will be guided by the instructions of the Department.

Private letters have been received here via Liverpool from N. York by the Packet of the 24 January.

The Mission of General Mouravieff to the Pasha of Egypt it seems from the Journal of St. Petersbourg of this morning, has been successful. He the Pasha has commanded Ibrahim to arrest his march & an expectation is entertained that a definitive Treaty will be speedily concluded. The Russian fleet, it is probable, has ere this arrived at Constantinople & a corps of the Army is in motion from the Danube. The Emperor's conduct on this occasion has been in my opinion dictated by good faith & under an imperious sense of duty which he owed to the interests of his empire.
