I have gathered together, in Compliance with you desire, all the Specimens of <u>Carabidae</u> lent to me by you, & shall return them in a few days.

I am sorry to say that one Specimen of <u>Chlorophanes</u> from Cayenne cannot be found, although probably only mislaid. All the rest, however, have been duly eliminated from their various hiding places. The <u>Vireo-Sylvia virginalis</u> is also not to be found, & I think must have been returned to you at an earlier time. If not, however, it will doubtless turn up, as it cannot be lost.

When Coues was here he went over the gulls & brought his monograph up to

Are there any species of the family that you lack? If so, now will be the time to ask for them. Dear Lawrence,

I received your letter of the 13th on my return from a short visit to Carlisle & Philadelphia. As to Sumichrast - we have already written him in reply to his Communications, expressing our regret that the state of our friends will not permit us to furnish the means to make the explorations he desires. If we had a few hundred dollars to spare, it could not be better bestowed than in helping him along; & it is very possible that the sale of his duplicates will realize that amount. We, however, are not in a Condition ever to advance the money, to be repaid at a future time. I wish the American Museum of Natural History could take stock in his enterprise & have a share of the proceeds. In that way the interest of all parties might be properly served.

We have already sent you, I think the biographical notices of the birds to which Sumichrast refers. They embrace some

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figures of birds nests, & some other matters. Have you not received it?

We received quite a nice lot of Falkland Island birds the other day from Salvin, embracing several species new to our collection. We are at present overhauling the South American ducks & geese, & find much interest in the examination.
