My Dear Spouse I have just arrived at Carlisle now in good health and perfect safety. I came to the Warden the first night and next morning started early and made 50 miles journey next morning made York mean by 10 o clock Mr. Short observed me just up and invited me to dine with him and after dinner set out for Dr Dills, where remained yesterday and this morning till after breakfast I am now at the Creigh where I am to dine, the horse stands the journey exceeding well but friend Clock to much to blame he gave me such a bare saddle and hurt her back very much the first night I would rather have had as much wood as such a very injurious old thing however it is the only thing that I have found disagreeable
