I see by the Newspapers that it is necessary applications for acceptance of Companies under the 15 Regiment Law or State Reserve must be made in five Days. I presume as my Company the "Union Volunteers" has already been accepted on the 15th May by his Excellency Gov Curtin under said Law: it is not necessary now that any formal application be now made. If so it is hereby made. You will pardon me for troubling you so much with what may perhaps be unnecessary Correspondence: but my apology is that I have a fine Company of Young men who are very anxious to get into Service and who Expect me to leave nothing undone which shall promote the interests of the Company: and make sure of their position in those 15 Regiments.

I wrote you a few Days ago in Reference to marching orders. The Ten Days limited by the Governor within which time my company would be ordered into Camp is up on Friday next 24th inst. and it is necessary that my men should assemble and go to Pittsburg the Day before in order to comply with the order and be Ready to go into Camp on Thursday or Friday.

That all things may be right I trust that you will have marching orders sent me immediately & transmit orders to commanding officer at Camp Wilkins to receive the Company & prepare Quarters &c. I leave here with the Company on Thursday.

Give him my congratulations on his Victory over the Copperheads. I think we can mange them easily now. In a few years none will own they were such.
