What's Going on Here?

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Three Mile Island has been on my mind not only since March 28, 1979, but for the past ten years. I've been concerned about nuclear power and its uses for a long time, and what happened on March 28 did not surprise me; it angered me. In my opinion it was inevitable since power companies, as so much of capitalism, put profits ahead of human concerns. When I first heard of the accident at TMI, I became concerned, and my concern was deep because I had reason to believe that something more than a transient (accident) had happened. I felt deep down that Met-Ed was up to its old tricks of lying to the general public and possibly to the government. After all, at hearings on Reactor 1 and 2 they had lied about informing the public of the dangers of a nuclear power plant in their backyards. The fact lies with us that for 18 hours Unit 2 Reactor was out of the control of the operators of the plant. Death and life became meaningless, and the name of the game was profit at all costs. And I hadn't even seen China Syndrome.

What does this have to do with gay people? gay Catholics? As the events of TMI began to unfold like some fiction story and as individuals became aware of the danger around them and alarmed for the safety of themselves and their families, an eerie mood prevailed. It's hard to describe. Where was this danger, what will it do, and should I evacuate? Unlike floods which I had been through before, a radiation leak and the threat of a nuclear holocaust was an invisible partner. It was like discovering your gayness. At first I just couldn't put my finger on it, but I knew it was there just the same. Finally on Saturday night after so many had left town for parts or places unknown, including my brother, sister, and their families, I couldn't take it anymore. The eeriness and danger was there, but where? I began to ride around the countryside, finally winding up on the road just across the river from TMI, about 1000 feet away, at 5 am. There it was, all lit up like a glowing candle. It finally hit me that this invisible danger was real. It was like discovering my gayness was real, and like the first knowledge of my gayness, it was confusing and was uncertain. I knew no other gay person to help me with my struggle, and with TMI there wasn't another person around who knew anymore than I did. In my first coming out of the closet to myself, I felt pitifully helpless. After all, who could I turn to? Looking at Reactor 2 from the banks of the Susquehanna River also left me with the feeling of being pitifully helpless. And finally my first reaction to the knowledge about being gay was to run away. It was too confusing, uncertain, and frightening, and besides it was always the easier way. The same holds true with many people volunteers. For information, call 234-0328. in relation to TMI-they just wanted to run away. -

It seemed to be the only same thing to do. But I didn't run away from my gayness but rather embraced it as a gift. I was not about to do the same for TMI. It was no gift to anyone, including us anti-nuclear people. I knew I did not want to experience another six days as I just did. While the confusion and uncertainty, the fright of the unknown, the helplessness and the desire to run away from the knowledge of my gayness only served to strengthen me, the threat of being wiped out by a nuclear accident only made me more angry and determined that I will do what I can to stop it.from happening again. As I drove away from TMI that morning yelling choice epitaphs at TMI and Met-Ed, I already began to feel better. The eeriness began to fade away.

REFLECTIONS


That's the Good News. Many find it too true to be true.
