The adoption of Robert David Dykes by pediatrician Dr. Albert Dykes and his lover Rev. James Dykes was approved by a Los Angeles court judge on Jan. 12. Since Gay marriages are not recognized by the state of California Dr. Dykes is recognized as the parent while Rev. Dykes is the Guardian. The couple would now like to adopt a little girl.

Philadelphia-Gay organizations from all over the country recently met to discuss a Gay march on Washington to be held in October 1979.

New York City-The Lesbian Herstory Archives has announced the start of a Lesbian photograph drive "to end the legacy of lost faces". 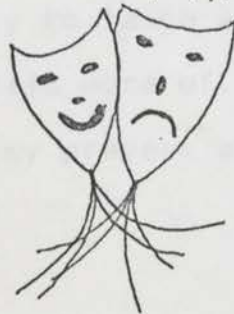
