

Names Project Quilt Coming!

The Names Project AIDS Memorial Quilt is coming to Lancaster on December 1-3, of this year. The American Red Cross (Lanc. Chapt.) will co-sponsor the Quilt's coming to Lancaster with Millersville University along with the Lancaster AIDS Project, Betty Finney House, RAIN, Dream Ride for AIDS, The Crispus Attucks Center, and the Urban League of Lancaster. This venture unites the many AIDS service organizations of Lancaster and will again remind us of how the AIDS virus affects all of us.

The Quilt was conceived in November of 1985 by Cleve Jones, a gay rights activist from San Francisco. Cleve was inspired by the sight of thousands of names of those lost to AIDS, that were displayed on placards on the wall of the San Francisco Federal Building. A little over a year later he created the first

panel in memory of longtime friend Marvin Feldman. In June of 1987 The Names Project Foundation officially began. It was displayed for the first time on October 11,1987 during the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights. At that time it consisted of 1,920 panels. Today the Ouilt covers more than 32 acres and icludes more that 50,000 panels.

The Ouilt is the largest example of a community art project in the world and holds more meaning than words can express. It reminds us of how the AIDS epidemic has touched all of our hearts in some manner. Earlier this summer, the Lancaster Newspaper's headlines again reported the arrests of men involved in sexual activities at Long's Park. The police department's approach of using undercover agents for entrapment followed by a big exposé by the newspaper has done little to stop the use of the public rest rooms by gay men. However, it "outed" some men, caused others to lose their jobs, friends, and families, and created more negative press about homosexuals.

We all know that cruising tea rooms is illegal, but many of us have done it ourselves. So I pose the following questions. What do we ,as a gay community, do to change the policies of the police department? Do gay men have other healthy and legal sexual alternatives in Lancaster County? Why does the Lancaster Newspaper consider this news worthy? How often do heterosexual adults caught having consensual sex in a back seat of a car, get reported under special headlines? These are questions that we as a community need to address.

If these issues concern you, as they do me, there are several things you should consider. Come to a Pink Triangle Meeting, contact a board Member, or just call the PTC and offer your support. You can aid the PTC in its attempts to create change in the Lancaster Police Department's and the Lancaster Newspaper's view of the gay community.

Finally, if you or someone you know has been a victim of this type of harassment, contact the PTC. There are things that the victim needs to do to avoid having a criminal record. The PTC can offer you support and possibly direction to help you to deal with the legal actions filed against you.

Help PTC make a positive change in the community that you call HOME!
